### **County To Terminate Emergency** Services September 30th

Eastland County Commissioners Monday voted to set Sept. 30, 1991 as the county's withdrawal and termination date on ambulance and other emergency contracts with the various governmental agencies affected.

be sent to the hospitais and fire department operating these services.

on March 11 to withdraw the county's part of the subsidies to Emergency Services "after 180 days." Sept. 30 ends the fiscal year for the county.

It was June, 1989 when a ports required. private ambulance service operating in portions of the county shut down. The publically funded services were established in some, and continued in other portions of the county. The subsidy this year is reported to be \$30,000 for each of the four Precincts.

In other business Monday the Commissioners declined to sign a Contract between the County and Texas Department of Commerce which would enable Rising Star Vineyards Inc. to obtain a Grant of \$100,000.

The grant money would be administered by the county, and would be used to hire 12 employees. Rising Star Vineyards had previously requested \$225,000 for this enterprise, which is located 8 mi. north of Rising Star.

Appearing at the court for Rising Star Vineyards was Dr. Bill Lagle, owner of the property, Randy Mosely, CPA, and Vineyard Manager Steve Campbell and his wife, Kay. Also with the group was Carl Young of the Texas Depart-

District Attorney Leslie Vance, the county's legal advisor, told the court that he had only two objections to the contract: "liability and supervision."

The vote on whether the county should approve the present contract was as follows: three commissioners voting "no" - Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Calvin Ainsworth, Pct. 2, Reggie Pittman, Pct. 4. One commissioner, L. T. Owen of Pct. 3, abstained from

After the contract was rejected Judge Scott Bailey and the commissioners told the Rising Star Vineyard representatives that the court would be interested in reconsidering a different sort of proposal.

On other agenda items, the commissioners approved the lease-purchase of a 1991 Ford Taurus for the Eastland County Sheriff's Department. The car will cost \$14,598, and will come from Hood-King Motor Co.

**Local Voters to Decide** 

In addition to the selection of a mayor and two city councilmen at the May 4 election, Rising Star citizens will be asked to consider sales of local water to the Comanche County Water Supply Corporation.

At a meeting of the Rising Star City Council on August 14 last year, a request was received for the council to approve Rising Star treated water sales to the Comanche Corporation. It seems that the wholesale water would be received at the city limits and would primarily go to the Sipe Springs area where a water shortage exists.

The quantity of water requested was an amount up to 1 million gallons per month with no minimum purchase required. The proposed price was \$1.50 per thousand gallons. Rising Star would provide a 6 inch main line to the city limits with pressure maintained at approxiamately 60 psi. The proposed contract for water sales was for a period of 45 years. This period of time is due to an FHA loan.

In discussing the proposal the council brought up the following points:

1. Does Rising Star have the resources to supply Comanche County with water sales for 45 years without endangering our own water supply? This time period seems an excessive commitment without a vote of our

2. Why should we sell water to Comanche County for \$1.50 per thousand gallons when our own citizens pay a

sand gallons thereafter? It was pointed out that this was a reasonable wholesale cost for water unmetered to individual residents.

3. Comanche County does not propose any minimum water purchase and Rising Star could go to considerable expense providing water with insufficient guaranteed sales to pay these costs.

4. Several councilmen inquired as to why the Comanche County Water Supply Corporation did not purchase their water from Lake Proctor which has abundant water and currently supplies both DeLeon and Gorman with water sales.

It was obvious from discussions on both sides of the question that there is a water shortage in the Sipe Springs area. Whether Rising Starcan and should provide for some of these needs will be decided by voters on May 4.

Proposed wording on the ballot will give voters a choice to vote for or against: sales of Rising Star water to the Comanche County Water Supply Corporation for a period of 45 years.

**April Is Child Abuse** 

In the state of Texas there are thousands of children who are victims of child abuse and neglect. Their suffering may go unchecked for years, often permanently impairing their health and development and sometimes costing their lives. Such children may be too young, too terrified, or simply too confused to tell anyone.

If you suspect a child has been abused or neglected, the law requires that you report it to the Texas Department of Human Services and a law enforcement agency. Child abuse and neglect are against the law in Texas, and so is failure to report cases of child mistreatment. Persons making reports in good faith are protected by laws from liability, and their identities are kept confidential.

To report to DHS, call Eastland County's Child Protective Services office, 817-629-3317, or call the 24-hour toll-free Abuse Hotline 1-800-252-5400, from anywhere in the state. The important thing is that you tell someone.

Lake Leon bassin' was almost to easy, according to reports received. The old saying of a five pounder in every bush was close though folks. Saturday one angler reported numbers of 3 to 6 pound fish coming from 3 to 4 feet of water. Sunday the fishing was just as good or better with having caught and released 2 limits of fish going from 2 1/2 to 5 pounds. Other anglers I visited with reported the same success. Jigs, spinners, and Rat-L-Traps ac-

counted for the better catches. The fish seem to be making

Mid Way Into 72nd Legislative Session

With the Regular Session of the 72nd Legislature almost half-way over, work on a number of important bills is continuing. Senate Bill 1, the Ethics Reform Bill, has passed the Senate and is currently before a House of Representatives committee. Senate Bill 351, the School Finance Bill, is pending in a conference committee of both Senate and House members appointed to work out the differences between the two bills. SB 351 is expected to be on the Governor's desk before the Texas Supreme Court's April 1 deadline.

One bill of significant importance to the environment has recently been introduced in the Senate. Senate Bill 35 would create a single, central agency in charge of environment-related regulation. The

new Texas Department of Natural Resources would incorporate the functions of a number of current State agencies including the Texas Air Control Board and the Texas Water Commission. Under the bill, the new agency would have five divisions: environmental health protections, economic impact and planning, legal affairs, administrative hearings and permitting and monitoring.

Placing all environmentrelated permitting authority and other regulatory functions in one agency would create a streamlined application process for new and expanding businesses. While the new agency is intended to provide simplified procedures, it is not intended to be a "rubber stamp" agency, but to provide adequate and comprehensive review and environmental protection.

EASTER EGGS AND EGGS IN GENERAL -Play It Safe-

The Easter season brings to mind Easter eggs and egg hunts, a holiday tradition. With current concerns regarding safety of foods such as eggs, follow these suggestions for selection, preparation and storage of eggs to contribute to a happy, healthy holiday.

When purchasing eggs, check to be sure that eggs are clean and not cracked. Cracks give microorganisms a change to enter and contaminate the egg. If a cracked egg is accidentally purchased, do not eat

Refrigerate purchased eggs as soon as possible. Store them in the cartons in which they were purchased, on a shelf in the refrigerator. The egg slots on a refrigerator door are not the best place to store eggs because the temperature fluctuates in this areas as the door opens and closes. Eggs need

For hard cooked eggs, place them in water in a pan and cover. Bring to a boil. Do not stack eggs. This will prevent uneven cooking. When water comes to a boil, take the pan off the heat and let sit for 20 minutes. Pour off hot water and cool the eggs under cold running water.

Hard cooked eggs are still perishable, so store the cooked eggs in the refrigerator until time to decorate. When you decorate them, do it quickly and cleanly; then place eggs back in the refrigerator until time for the egg hunt. If you plan to eat the eggs, don't leave them unrefrigerated.

If you plan to eat the Easter

eggs, plan to hunt so that eggs are "hidden," "hunted" and gathered in a short period of time. Either follow the twohour rule or don't eat them. The two-hour rule says that any perishable foods should not be left at room temperatures for more than two hours. Room temperatures promote the growth of bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. Be wary of consuming any eggs that may have become cracked in the hunt.

Any hard-cooked eggs not used in the hunt can be held in the refrigerator for up to a

It's wise to take precautions with any perishable foods including protein foods such as meats, poultry, eggs, fish and dairy foods. Cleanliness is very important in handling these foods in order to prevent contamination by bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. This is especially important for those people highly susceptible, including the very young, the very old, pregnant women and those with chronic diseases and weakened immune systems.

Raw or under-cooked eggs should not be consumed, especially for those susceptible groups. Exercise special caution with soft-cooked,







#### **Prompt Reports Are Key To Avoiding Overpayments**

Most Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) overpayments result from beneficiaries not promptly reporting changes that affect the amount of, or entitlement to, their checks. Failure to make a timely report can result in a penalty as

The single biggest cause of Social Security overpayments is beneficiaries not reporting, or under reporting, yearly earnings. Some benefits must be withheld if 1991 earnings will exceed \$9,720 for those who are 65-69 years old, or \$7,080 for those under age 65. This report must be made directly to Social Security by any beneficiary under age 70 whose earnings will go over these limits.

There are special rules that apply to disability beneficiaries (including disabled widows and disabled adult children) who work. For these people any work must be reported, regardless of the amount earnings. We need to know about any medical improvement as well.

SSI recipients must report any change in their income

and resources, as well as any change in living arrangements. As other income increase, the SSI check must decrease. There is a resource limit each year that must be carefully observed. A living arrangement change can also cause the SSI check to increase or decrease.

Other evens that must be reported by all beneficiaries

\*\*\*Death or marriage of the

\*\*\*Change of address; and \*\*\*A beneficiary who is no longer in custody of his or her representative payee.

We send a booklet about events that must be reported along with every benefit award letter. It is the beneficiary's responsibility to make these reports promptly in order to avoid overpayments and possible penalties.

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,736,352 barrels daily in December 1990, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Robert Krueger. December 1989 preliminary production was 1,675,160 barrels daily.

This figure compares with preliminary November production of 1,773,825 barrels daily. Final production reports for November indicated average production at 1,797,478 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for December is 53,826,906 barrels, up from 53,228,401 barrels in November. December 1989 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 51,929,949

Texas preliminary crude production for 1990 totaled 632,192,872 barrels, a two percent decrease compared to the 1989 preliminary total of 645,036,694 barrels.

Krueger said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary December production, were: Gaines, 3,665,276 barrels; Andrews, 3,087,276 barrels; Andrews, 3,087,957 barrels; Ector, 2,907,885 barrels; Yoakum, 2,743,306 barrels; Gregg, 2,606,404 barrels; Hockley 2,445,493 barrels; Pecos, 2,118,842 barrels; Crane, 1,532,685 barrels; Frio, 1,201,537 barrels; and Kent 983,554 barrels.

Eastland County produced 74,715 barrels of crude oil in December, which is the latest month with figures available.

#### Search Starts For Top 1991 Texas Rural Minister

Nominations are being sought for the top 1991 rural minister of Texas.

"Often, the rural minister serves as an unsung hero, and the award is a way to bestow some special recognition," said Dr. Dave Ruesink, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service sociologist.

Ruesink said the award is given annually by the Progressive Farmer Magazine during the Town and Country Church Conference, scheduled for Oct. 7-8 at Texas A & M University.

The 1991 conference theme will be "Town and Country Churches" Wellsprings of Hope in Critical Times," and ministers who have responded with programs to meet critical needs in their communities may be prime candidates for nomination, he said.

Designed for ministers and lay leaders serving rural and small town churches in Texas. the conference is an educational program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This year's event will be the 46th to be held.

To be eligible for the award, Ruesink said, a minister should serve a congregation in a rural community or a town of less than 10,000 population and should have served the nominating congregation at least two years.

"Nominations should focus on how the minister has made a difference to the church and community," Ruesink said.

"Assisting the membership in strategies to inspire and improve involvement is a key component of effective ministry," Ruesink said. "Developing efforts to assist families as they are faced with serious problems may make the difference in the survival of rural and small town

A minister's leadership can be described in special outreach programs that support church goals, Ruesink added. "Indicate how the congregation developed and supported programs related to finding and using spiritual, economic and social resources to meet today's crises."

Ruesink said 60 ministers were nominated in 1990. The winner was the Very Rev. Melvin "Mel" W. LaFollette, pastor of the Episcopal Big Bend River Ministries headquartered at Presidio.


#### State Representative Bob Turners Is Shown Into Office March 6




