





City Of Rising Star Receives \$861.90

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said October payments to cities levying the optional one-percent sales tax brings the 1980 total rebates to more than \$446.8 million.

He sais payments of \$28.2 million were made to cities for the month of October.

Bullock said the October payments bring rebates to Texas cities this year within \$20.2 million of total moneys returned to cities during all of 1979, and with two months remaining in the year, 1980 payments should go well over last year's.

The one-percent city sales tax is collected along with the state's four-percent tax by merchants businesses and returned monthly in the cities where it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

The City of Rising Star received \$861.90 for the period ending 10-03-80, making total year \$14,321.04.

SWPGA Support Loans According D.B. Warren, President, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, Gorman,

Peanut price support storage facilities will be available at marketing points throughout Southwest peanut producing areas to handle the 1980 crop. Warehouses will be available for the storage of both quota additional peanuts.

The Association loan program serves growers who by their own choice wish to utilize it. The loan is also available for growers who may proadditional peanuts in excess of the total amount contracted to shellers as well as to growers who plant only the quota fraction of their allotments but produce additional peanuts due to larger than anticipated yields. Association officials, however, continue to advise growers not to place additional peanuts in the area type pools if other satisfactory alternatives are available. The leasing of quota pounds at harvest time provided beneficial to many growers in the marketing of such peanuts.

The overriding purpose of providing loan availability through the peanut price supprogram, port however, is to establish a floor under the farmers stock market at a level of at least the USDA supedible markets. The who present outlook has caused already dramatic market reactions with record prices quotea for most edible grade shelled peanuts. This situation could intensify if the October 1, USDA Peanut Crop Estimate is reduced at the time the estimate is announced on October 10 or 11.





The world crop at 63.4 million bales means a drop of about 2.1 million from 1979 levels. Both Russia and China have somewhat better cotton crops this year...

"While most producers are currently enjoying stronger cotton prices, the market's strength may soften once cotton users adjust their demand to higher price levels," says Anderson. "Some mills are already building up excessive inventories of unsold goods and have cut work weeks to three or four days."

Average daily spot prices for Strict Low Middling 1-1 sixteenth inch cotton in mid-September were some 30 cents a pound above last year's prices, notes the economist. However, this year's drouth has reduced the staple length of a lot of cotton, leading to price

discounts of 10 to 20 cents under SLM 1-1 sixteenth inch cotton.

While domestic use of cotton is expected to be off about a half million bales this year, exports may drop more than three million. This will put domestic use as well as exports at some six million bales each for a total disappearance of 12 millions bales. U.S. cotton exports of 9.2 million bales during the 1979-80 season were the largest in 53 years.

With this year's expected crop of 11.7 million bales or less, carryover next August may be substantially under the three million bales remaining after the 1979 crop.

"Despite some slackening in the demand for cotton both at home and abroad, the market should remain strong for at least a few months," believes Anderson.

He urges producers to stay abreast of market developments and try to anticipate future prices as influenced by changes in supply, mill use, export demands, farm programs and international trade developments.

Short Peanut Crop

According D.B. Warren, President Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, Gorman, Texas.

The U.S. peanut crop in 1980 was estimated USDA by September 1 at 1,569,000 tons. That projection, if correct, would mean a reduction of 421,000 tons from the U.S. production in 1979. To further compound the problem, there appears to be every indication that a sizable tonage of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts, perhaps a total reaching 150,000 tons, will be included in the 1,569,000 ton total thus reducing further the volume of edible and seed stocks. There is also the distinct

possibility that the

peanut crop estimate

may be reduced when

the October revision is

Approximately 1,300,000 tons from the 1979 crop were required for domestic edible and seed use. Assuming only a 4 percent increase in 1980, about 1,350,000 tons will be required to fill the domestic demand for the 1980-81 year out of a total supply of some 1,420,000 tons of segregation 1 peanuts. In this calculation no consideration is given to export market demand which has been totaling about 400,000 tons in recent years.

The current supplydemand outlook is resulting in dramatic escalations in market levels of shelled

peanuts. Based on information received . price quoted for Runner Jumbos, U.S. No. 1's and U.S. Splits renged from 60 percent to about 75 percent over prices for those grades a year ago. Prices per pound quoted by peanut brokers for Runners were Jumbos from 60 cents to 68 cents, U.S. No 1's 49 cents to 56 cents and U.S. Splits 57 cents to 60 cents and for Spanish Jumbos 65 cents to 75 cents, U.S. No 1's 50 cents to 55 cents and U.S.Splits 55 cents to 60 cents. Spanish prices were averaging about 64 cents over those prevailing a year ago. It is reported that shelled prices are extremely difficult to quote at this time and are somewhat erratic since offerings are light and very little trading is occuring. The shelled export market is reported very strong at present with prices ranging as high or higher than domestic markets.

Per capita consumption of peanut products at 7.1 lbs. was at a record high in the marketing year ending July 31, 1980. This is a substantial increase over the 6.6 pounds per capita consumed for the previous year. Observers will be interested in the effect of the current year high shelled peanut prices on domestic consumption, provided of course, production of edible quality peanuts is sufficient to meet the total demand.
