



Wheat grown on nitrogen deficient soil responds to the addition of fertilizer. L. D. Rouse, I who operates a farm in the! Owens Community, tried fertilizing his wheat this Spring. Mr. Rouse, using a chisel type applicator, applied anhydrous ammonia under his grain at the rate of about 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre. He left a small check plot to check the results of the fertilizer. In a few weeks the grain receiving the fertilizer developed a dark green color and started shooting up new growth, whereas, the check plot remained a pale green color and its growth appeared to be stunted.

Mr. Rouse, a cooperator with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, plans to include a legume in his crop rotation for soil conditioning. Legumes have a lasting effect. They add organic matter which condition the soil to hold more water, allows air to circulate through the soil better, and adds nitrogen for

plant growth. One of the most important parts organic matter plays is to cause the soil to release many plant foods that are otherwise not available for plant growth. It acts as a catalyst in breaking down minerals into a form the plant can use.







U. S. National Debt Placed At Near \$900 Billion

ABILENE, - (Spl)-The national debt of the United States has been "conservatively estimated" at about \$900 billion, instead of the legal limit of \$280 billion, an article in the current issue of West Texas Chamber of Commerce publication says.

The article takes into account all the financial obligations of the Federal government in arriving at the \$900 billion figure. Referring to the United States

at the "world's most generous banker," the article says: Taking all Federal obligations "into perspective we find that the

United States is in the position of a debtor who has made so many promises, of so many kinds, to so many people, that no financial auditing could possibly determine the exact finanicial position."

"A 'wild' guess as to the magnitude of the over-all obligations' could be made - that wiuld be a figure of around \$900 billions and that is in all probability a conservative estimate.'

The article, which appears in the May issue of the WTCC monthly magazine, West Texas Today, defines the national debt of the United States as consisting of all promises to pay, commitments to spend, and assumed obligations.

The promises to pay, the article states, are in the form of government bonds in the formal or recognized national debt. This portion of the debt in round figures is approximately \$275 to \$280 billion.

The commitments to spend on the part of the Federal government range at an average of about \$110 billion. Although much of this money will be collected from taxpayers, the article contends: "That the money has not yet been collected for the commitment to spend does not alter the fact that this is an obligation for which the Federal government has signed on the dotted line."

In discussing the obligations which have been assumed by the Federal government, the article points out that most of the major obligations are in the form of Social Security, veteran's pensions and benefits, agricultural payments, public health and education programs and Federal housing subsidies.

"Congress has continued to make new commitments for loans and guarantees to home buyers, farmers, veterans, foreign governments and small businessmen which the Budget Bureau figures will total about \$22 billion and cost nearly \$1.5 billion this fiscal year alone. This is about \$1 billion more than the credit load last year."

"Just what the Federal government considers its over-all financial obligations is conjecture -Senator Harry Flood Byrd has frequently stated "the figure runs into hundreds of billions of dollars." It has been estimated by some authorities in the field that the Federal government's Social Security liability alone runs up to \$350 billion."

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


