May Tigers Down the Eagles 45-12

May's Tigers opened the Mitch Lee regime in impressive fashion Friday night with a 45-12 six-man romp over the visiting Jonesboro Eagles.

It was the first game for Lee, a former May athlete who succeeded Ronnie Watkins as head coach.

The Tiger led 13-0, 25-6 and 39-6 at the quarter breaks. "We played well, the line blocked real well for this early in the year. The kids were fired up and did a good job," said Lee.

May jumped to 13-0 first period lead on a seven-yard run by Keith Musick and a five-yard run by Scott Lindley. Sammy Young passed to Scott Ford for an extra point.

Musick's 13-yard run made it 19-0 early in the second quarter, but Jonesboro got on the board 1:01 before halftime on a 21-yard pass from Joe Nolte to Robert Snoddy.

Musick took the ensuing

kickoff back 82 yards to give May a 25-6 halftime lead.

May scored 14 third-quarter points on a 60-yard sweep by Lindley and 16-yard run by Musick. The Tigers converted after both scores, with Musick running in one and Ford passing to Young for another.

May got its final TD midway through the fourth quarter on Ford's nine-yard pass to Young.

"The defense played well," said Lee. "The kids really hit. We had a couple of mental errors on the secondary, but overall we got after them on defense."

Young was the leading tackler with 19. Michael Salinas was in on 14 stops. Lee also praised the blocking of the offensive line and the play of Ford, a sophomore, at quarterback and the pass coverage of freshman Chris Hardy.

May plays at Harper next week.

Apparent Hunting Accident Kills Boy at Long Branch

A 9-year old Irving boy was killed Sunday in an apparent hunting accident northeast of Rising Star, said George Yeilding, an Eastland County sheriff's deputy.

Chad Russell Sanders was shot in the head when a

shotgun fired by another 9-year-old boy apparently discharged accidentally, said Yeilding, who investigated the shooting.

The boys were both armed with shotguns while sitting near a stock tank in the Long Branch community, he said. Rising Star Justice of the Peace Tex Evans pronounced Sanders dead at the scene at 6:30 p.m.

Higginbotham Funeral Home of Rising Star handled local arrangements.

Gary Sanders, Chad's father, said adults were hunting doves and had told the two boys to go fishing, Yeilding said. Sanders said this was his son's first dove-hunting trip, and both boys had dove-hunting licenses, Yeilding said.

Wildcats Win Over Santo 34-0

The Rising Star Wildcats traveled to Santo Friday night to take on the 7-A district favorites. The Cats' opening drive set the tempo of the game. Fullback Stacy Green scored from one yard out with 6:18 remaining in the first quarter. Green's PAT was good giving the Cats a 7-0 lead. Santo tried to even the score but the Cats' defense proved too much. Defensive back Steven Wilson stripped the football from Santo's running back and defensive lineman Roanen Barron alertly recovered the football.

The Cats' second drive of the night proved as effective as the first with tailback Derrick White scoring on a 1-yard run. The Cats were penalized 5 yards on the extra point attempt but kicker Stacy Green was still able to split the uprights. The first quarter ended with Rising Star leading Santo 14-0.

In the second quarter the Wildcats' offense continued to impress the crowd with their versatility while the defense gave up only 10 yards the entire quarter. Quarterback David White ran around the end from 7 yards out for the Cats' third touchdown with 4:01 remaining in the half. Once again Green's PAT was good and the Cats led 21-0. Rising Star dodged a bullet when offensive lineman Roanen Barron

recovered his teammate's fumble. Tailback Derrick White led this offensive drive with a 26-yard dash. Fullback Stacy Green punched the ball in from 2 yards out giving Green his second touchdown of the night. This time his PAT was off by inches and the score was 27-0. The Wildcats' defense continued to harass Santo and defensive end James Holman recovered Santo's second fumble. The Cats went to the dressing room with a 27-0 lead.

The third quarter started out much the same. The Wildcat defense was outstanding. Linebacker Toby Long and defensive end James Holman teamed up on a key quarterback sack. Rising Star's next touchdown, David White's 65-yard scamper to the end zone, was negated on a holding penalty. The Cats had another offensive fumble but offensive lineman Kerry Hill recovered the pigskin. Santo's defense registered a quarterback sack on freshman Jimmy Evans and the Cats were forced to punt. The punt was blocked and the scramble for the loose pigskin resulted in David White recovering and Rising Star maintaining possession. Determined to build their lead, the Cats scored with 5 seconds left in the quarter on David White's 17-yard touchdown pass to wide

receiver Ronnie Evans. Once again Green's PAT split the uprights. The buzzer sounded with a Rising Star 34-0 lead over Santo.

The fourth quarter was a quarterback's nightmare as the swarming Wildcat defense registered 3 quarterback sacks, one each to James Holman, Stacy Green and Toby Long. The Wildcats fumbled on their drive and Santo recovered, only to be forced to punt. The Cats rushed the Santo kicker and he was unable to punt; this led to Santo's only substantial rushing gain of the game.

During the same drive they connected on a 20-yard pass and were inside the Wildcat 10-yard line. Once again the Wildcat defense showed their dominance, causing Santo to fumble and linebacker Stacy Green came up with the ball. The Cats' defense fumbled again and Santo had another chance to score. The determined Wildcat defense refused to allow the score and the resulting touchback gave the Cats possession on their own 20-yard line with 47 seconds remaining in the game. The final buzzer sounded and the scoreboard read Visitors 34 Home 0.

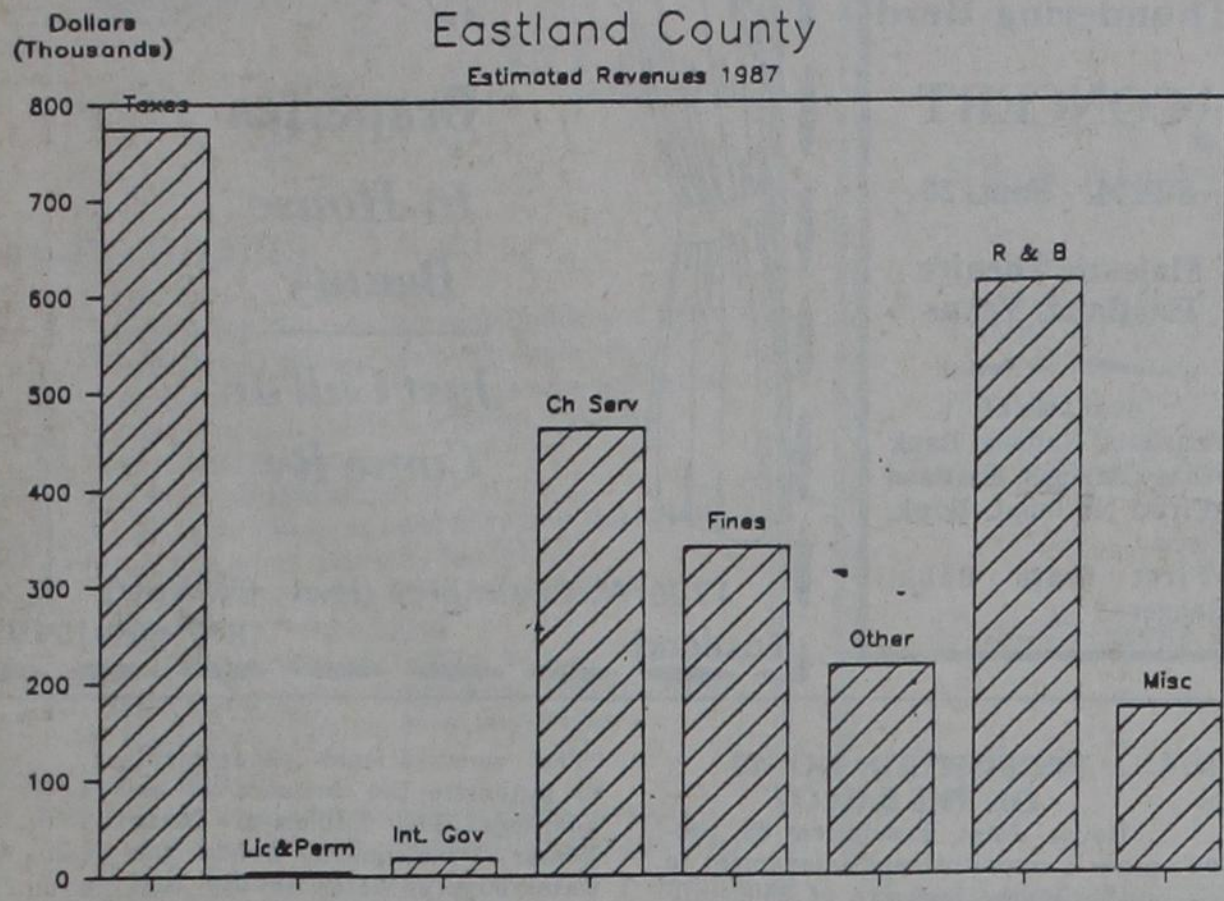

County Proposed Budget Tops \$3 Million

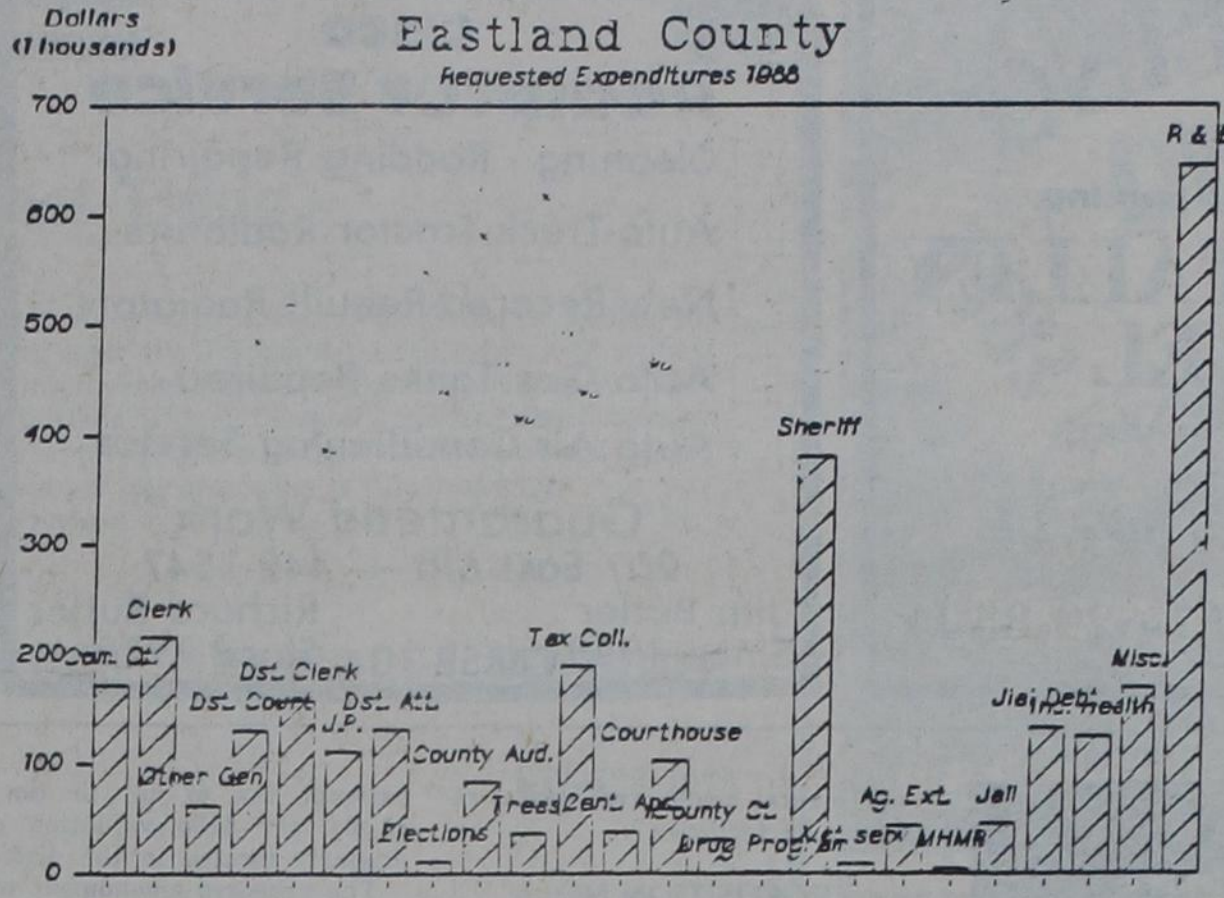


This graph shows the Estimated Revenue for 1987 for Eastland County, and its various sources.

CATEGORIES:

- Taxes** - general tax revenue.
- Lic. and Perm.** - Marriage License, beer, wine, boat, etc.
- Int. Gov.** - Intergovernmental revenue from the state, fees on mixed drinks, Court service fees, etc.
- Ch. Serv.** - Courthouse services of many kinds. They range from the County Judge's Probate fees to County Clerk's recording fees, financial statement fees, Probate fees, etc. There are auto registration fees, title application, Dist. Clerk's fees, and fees from Law Enforcement Departments.
- Fines** - Fines and forfeitures, including County Court fines, District Court fines, and J.P. Court fines.
- Other** - County Clerk Certified copies, Sheriff's Bond fees, interest on certain funds, etc.

- R & B** - Road and Bridge fees collected on Road taxes, auto registrations, special R & B Auto Tax, etc.
- Misc.** - County farm, other revenue sources not covered in above.



This computerized graph shows the expenditures requested to date by Eastland County Department heads for the fiscal year of 1988, beginning Oct. 1, 1987. A few of the requests are incomplete. All the requests on the graph are estimated to total over \$3 million.

The Commissioners are working on the budget, and it is not known how much of it will be approved.

Some items listed for consideration on this budget are so small that it is difficult to register them on the graph. These include County Libraries, \$1,500, Child Welfare, \$2,000, Lunacy, Rural Fire Protection, etc. These are lumped under "Other general", or "Misc."

The small category listed as "Jail" includes janitorial supplies and other jail needs. "R&B" means "Road and Bridge", or funds set aside to maintain rural roads. "Courthouse" includes the maintenance of this building, its utilities, etc.

Adult and Juvenile Probation is included under "Misc." in this graph.

The Eastland County Commissioners Court has a number of decisions to make before the beginning of the next fiscal year on Oct. 1 - and most of them involve finances.

With estimated County revenues around \$2,800,000 (about the same as last year) the Commissioners are facing requests totalling \$3,100,000 or more from all Departments.

These include salary raises - large in some cases - hikes in the cost of insurance, a large raise in indigent health costs, the price of sophisticated office machines, and fees for attorneys, including those Court-appointed.

The Commissioners must also deal with the cost of transporting prisoners and keeping them in other county jails. Costs are apparently also up on maintaining unpaved county roads.

The only Departments (wholly county funded) which reportedly did not ask for salary raises are the County Treasurer and County Auditor's office.

County Judge Scott Bailey reported during a Commissioners meeting several weeks ago that if the County overspent its income by \$300,000 for three years it would be broke. So the Commissioners will be attempting to sort the needs from the wants among Department requests.

The next regular Court meeting will be Sept. 14, beginning at 10 a.m. A final budget may be approved at this time.

Hope to see you all Saturday and Sunday on Lake Leon, for the 12th Annual E.C.B.C. Open Invitational. Sonar Exploration Set On Loch Ness, Oct. 9-11

Utilizing the finest products modern-day electronics technology, an armada of Scotland's famous Loch Ness, oct. 9-11.

Called "Operation Deepscan" the flotilla will sweep the 23-mile length of Loch Ness with powerful sonar and underwater television equipment.

The venture is being sponsored by the Loch Ness Exhibition Centre, Drumadrochit, Scotland, which maintains a complete museum complex on Loch Ness; Lowrance Electronics, Inc., Tulsa, OK., the world's largest manufacturer of sonar equipment; Swiftch, Ltd., Wallingford, England, distributor of Lowrance products and other electronic gear, and

Caley Cruisers, Inverness, Scotland, which operates a fleet of holiday (vacation) boats on Loch Ness. "It will be the largest scientific expedition ever undertaken on the mysterious lake," stated Adrian Shine, field leader of the project.

Shine has been conducting fisheries research and gathering scientific data on unidentified objects in Loch Ness for more than 10 years. "It is not just another hunt for 'Nessie', the so-called Loch Ness Monster," he stated. "Actually, we have four scientific objectives for the search.

Included will be: 1. Further investigation and study of an yet unidentified fish recently discovered on the bottom of Loch Ness in more than 700 feet of water. Underwater television film clearly shows several of the small fish (believed to be approximately a foot in length) swimming slowly past the moving camera.

2. The graphing of the Loch's deepest waters (more than 720 feet) with Lowrance X-16 chart recorders, in areas where large sonar "contacts" were made in 1982 and 1984.

3. Study of the fish distribution in the lake, which boasts large populations of char, trout and salmon.

4. A study of temperature changes and thermoclines in the Loch's sub-surface area, where unusual thermal pat-

terns have been recorded on sonar equipment.

Plans for Operation Deepscan have been more than a year in the making by Shine, who is supported by the Loch Ness Centre, and the other sponsors. Numerous tests on the multiple operation of sonar units, mounted on several boats running abreast, have been conducted since a six-boat trial was initiated last October.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 3, 1987

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 104 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide a guarantee for the Texas grain warehouse self-insurance fund. The guarantee of the fund may not exceed \$5 million, and when the fund reaches \$5 million, the guarantee will cease. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit rural fire prevention districts in counties with populations over 400,000 to levy a tax at a rate not to exceed six cents (\$.06) per \$100 property valuation for the district, if the voters of the district approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 48 proposes a constitutional amendment to extend the school ad valorem tax exemption for elderly persons to the surviving spouse of a person receiving the exemption. If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to limit school tax increases on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years of age."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create programs and make loans and grants of money for development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment, stimulation of agricultural innovation, promotion of agricultural enterprises, and development of transportation and commerce. Bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes must be approved by the voters in the political subdivision seeking such funding sources.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development in the state."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to contract with the Texas Turnpike Authority and to contribute money to the costs of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges of the Authority. The amendment would authorize the governing body of a county with a population over 400,000, a county adjoining such county, and any city or district located in or partially in such county to make agreements with the Texas Turnpike Authority and levy ad valorem taxes to pay part or all of the principal and interest on Turnpike Authority bonds and to pay maintenance and operating expenses of the Turnpike Authority, if the voters approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing agreements between the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties, and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads, and toll bridges by guaranteeing bonds issued by the Texas Turnpike Authority."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to establish three separate development funds. A Texas product development fund could be established to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in the state. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$15 million of general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas small business incubator fund could be established to foster and stimulate the development of small businesses in the state. Small businesses operating under the program would be exempt from ad valorem taxation. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$10 million in general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas agricultural fund could be established to promote the production, processing and marketing of agricultural products produced primarily in Texas by small Texas agricultural businesses. The amendment would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$100 million outstanding at one time to carry out the agricultural fund program. The legislature could require review and approval of the issuance of bonds and the use of bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to be used for loans to local governments for acquisition, construction, repair, renovation, and equipment of public facilities or for grants to local governments for planning public facilities. The amendment would also permit the issuance of revenue bonds for the same purposes to be repaid from excess revenue from repayments of loans made under the amendment and from other revenues pledged to the retirement of revenue bonds. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance certain local public facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 56 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to be used to acquire, construct, and equip new correctional institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions or to repair existing institutions. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the projects to be financed by the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions

and mental health and mental retardation facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that a state legislator is eligible to serve in another state office even if the compensation of the office was increased during his legislative term or even if the appointment is made in whole or in part (including Senate confirmation) by the legislature. The legislator could not, however, receive the increased compensation approved during his legislative term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed and to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Subsections (d) and (e) of Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all tangible personal property except structures which are used as residential dwellings and property held or used for the production of income. This exemption would be in addition to the personal property homestead exemption already established by the constitution. If the legislature authorizes the exemption of additional personal property from taxation, under this amendment, local political subdivisions may pass resolutions providing for taxation of such property unless the property is exempt from ad valorem taxation under another law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1, Subsections (f) and (g) of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation goods, wares, merchandise, and ores other than oil, gas and petroleum products. These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a married couple to agree in writing that all or part of their community property will become the property of the surviving spouse if one spouse dies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the creation of special districts to provide emergency services. The commissioners court in a county participating in a district could, upon approval of the voters, levy an ad

valorem tax of up to ten cents (\$.10) per \$100 valuation of the property located in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases. Under current law, only criminal defendants are allowed to appeal. This proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass laws granting state prosecutors the right to appeal in limited circumstances.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg County and transfer the duties of that office to the county auditor or an elected official designated by the commissioners court. The amendment would also abolish the office of county treasurer in Fayette and Nueces counties if a majority of the voters in those counties vote in favor of the amendment. In Fayette County, the functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county auditor or the officer succeeding to the auditor's functions. In Nueces County, the powers, duties, and functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the commissioners court in a county with a population of more than 150,000 to establish more than one Justice of the Peace court in each Justice of the Peace precinct, i.e., to provide for the election of more than one Justice of the Peace in each Justice of the Peace precinct.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to define by law those municipal functions that are governmental and those that are proprietary. This authorization would apply to laws passed by the 70th Legislature, 1987, and by future legislatures in regular or special session. A municipality is liable for damages arising out of acts committed under its proprietary functions, but not its governmental functions. Definition of such functions by the legislature would clarify the liability of a municipality in civil lawsuits filed against it.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality."

PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts. Financing of a jail district could be accomplished through the issuance of bonds and other obligations, or by levy of an ad valorem tax on property located in the district if the qualified electors of a district approve an ad valorem tax or bonds secured by a property tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the United States government, and to make appropriate grants for such undertakings."

PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for mobile offshore oil and gas well drilling equipment. The tax relief would be limited to equipment that is being stored while not in use in a county that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico or on a body of water that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative involvement in the executive branch of government by permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives in the membership of an agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch of government and performs executive functions. Under current law, the legislature is not allowed to exercise any powers in executive matters under Article II of the Texas Constitution, which provides for the "separation of powers" into three distinct departments.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives or the speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee."

PROPOSITION NO. 22 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the term of office of a gubernatorial appointee to a vacancy in a state or district office to a partial, temporary term if the appointment is made on or after November 1 of the last year of the governor's term and the governor is not reelected. Under this amendment, the legislature may provide that the tenure of such an appointee would end sooner than the term would normally expire.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if the governor is not reelected."

PROPOSITION NO. 23 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in water development bonds. Of the \$400 million authorized, \$200 million would be designated for conservation and development of water resources, \$150 million would be designated for water quality enhancement, and \$50 million would be designated for flood control. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$400 million of Texas Water Development Bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 24 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a county to use county equipment and personnel to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity if the commissioners court finds that the work will not interfere with the performance of county work and approves performance of the work. The governmental entity must be located wholly or partly in the county, and the governing body of the governmental entity must file a written work request with the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit a county to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity."

PROPOSITION NO. 25 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to authorize Randall County to levy a tax for the benefit of the Amarillo Hospital District. Any such tax could be levied only on property located outside the City of Amarillo and outside the South Randall County Hospital District. The tax could not be more than 75¢ per \$100 property valuation and would be effective only upon approval by the voters in the area to be taxed. If the tax is authorized by the Legislature and approved by voters, the Amarillo Hospital District is to serve residents of part of Randall County. If a tax is levied under this provision, Randall County must repay the State for the cost of publication of this amendment.

The proposed amendment also permits the legislature to authorize a hospital district to change its boundaries or jurisdiction if the district was created or authorized by a constitutional provision that includes a description of the boundaries or jurisdiction of the district. Any change in the boundaries or jurisdiction of such a hospital district would become effective only upon approval of the voters in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County, to authorize Randall County to provide financial assistance to the district, and to authorize certain hospital districts to change their boundaries or jurisdiction with voter approval."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 1

Senate Bill 86 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition passes, the Governor will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation throughout the State of Texas."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 2

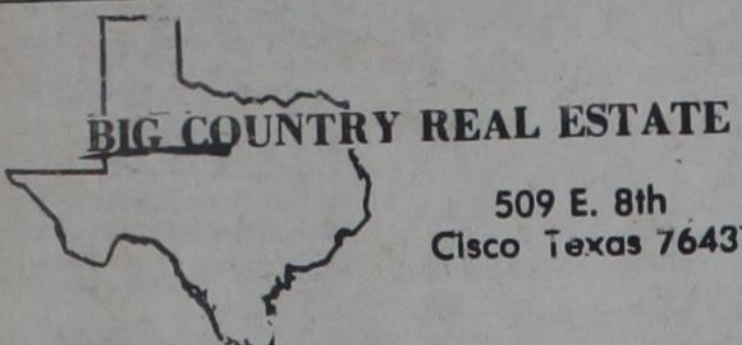
The Texas Racing Act submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutuel wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If pari-mutuel wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on pari-mutuel wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis." (7-10-87)

Mountain Top Pastor To Address College



Rev. John C. Jones, pastor of the Greater Mountain Top Church located 10 miles south of Cisco on Highway 183, has been invited to address the Christian Life College of Stockton, Ca., daily during the week of Sept. 7th. The president of the college, Rev. Kenneth Haney, invited Rev. Jones to preach to his over 3,000 member church in January of this year at their annual landmark services. Pastor Jones will also be preaching during this week for the church which is in the process of a new building that first will seat 6,200 and then enlarged to 10,000 seating.

All new college facilities are being built now. With over 200 students the present facilities are at maximum use, and the new facilities will accommodate 1,000 students, and 1,500 with the second phase.

The ministers of California have invited Pastor Jones several times in the past year to minister the Kingdom Principles of Faith to their churches, ministers, and district. Rev. and Mrs. Jones are scheduled to minister in Sicily at a national conference, preaching in the afternoon and evening services as featured speaker. The trip will take them on through Italy, Switzerland, Germany, France and into London where they will be the guest of a doctor he met in last year's trip into the Amazon jungle. The doctor was lecturing to physicians in Brazil and had taken a side trip into the Amazon and met Rev. Jones and went on with him to attend preaching service in the interior of the jungle. The trip for Rev. and Mrs. Jones will be in December. Rev. Jones annually overseas filling international invitations.

The Mountain Top Church has been located in the Romney community for some 50 years. However, last year the church voted to pursue relocation into the Cisco city limits. Property has been sought since some 90 percent plus of the congregation lives within the city limits. For them to relocate and maintain present affiliation with the UPCI which they are now organizing with, the change must be endorsed by the District Board and approved by the local congregation presently located within the city limits and pastored by Rev. Rev. Jones has enjoyed 20 years as pastor of the church, raised his daughter, Staci, in the Cisco public school, and presently is the chaplain for the Eastland County Sheriff's Department as well as the Eastland County Lawman's Association, who whom he meets monthly in their meetings.

TICKETS ARE still available for the Woody Herman Thundering Herd Concert to be held Saturday, Sept. 26 to officially re-open the Majestic Theatre in Eastland. (Tickets may be secured at the banks and savings and loan offices in the county as well as at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

IT IS HOPED that Woody himself will be present but, given his age and physical condition, there's no guarantee. BUT, THE HERD will be in concert, so there's no reason not to attend. The Herman Sound will have proper presentation in the newly-refurbished historic theatre.

At 74 years old, Herman is not young, and is not well - so it may be physically impossible for him to be here - but there's one thing which might influence his decision to be here: his close friendship with Eastland Band Director and Mrs. Phil Hewitt. Guesses are that if he is in any condition at all to travel, that he will make this "gig."

A USA TODAY writer recently said of Herman: They call him "the road father."

At 74, Woody Herman, with his Thundering Herd big band, still plays an average of 27 halls and ballrooms in as many cities each month. So extensively does his crisscross the country - the only major bandleader from the 1930s who still does - that he has barely spent 40 months in the Hollywood Hills home he bought 40 years ago.

He can't even take a vacation without getting on the phone to his agent to scare up some isolated gigs. "I'm so used to being involved with moving every day, after four or five days I wonder what to do with myself," he says during a stopover here.

His 50th anniversary year as a bandleader was particularly busy, first with a new album and then on July 16 with a special Hollywood Bowl concert featuring the

Ebony Concerto for clarinet, which Stravinsky wrote for him.

The traveling gets more difficult every year, he admits.

"But music is a great escape. As long as you're playing, nobody can get to you - about anything. If you're an independent kind of person who values freedom in music, the best existence is to be on the road. If you stay in one area you'll soon be playing the music somebody else wants you to play."

Herman has survived trials that would make most people want to escape the music profession altogether. During a low period in the 1950s, he did State Department tours of remote countries in Africa for lack of better work. In the 1960s, he tried, with mixed success, to attract a new audience by playing rock-jazz fusion and sharing the bill with such rock groups as The Who.

Three years ago, he opened his own nightclub in New Orleans. It failed to turn a profit and shut down after less than a year. The same month, Charlotte, his wife of 46 years, died.

Then, late last year, the Internal Revenue Service auctioned off his home. He still owes \$1.6 million in back taxes, the result, he says, of trusting to finances to a personal manager whose "gambling became a disease."

As a tenant, he still lives in his house with his only child, Ingrid, who manages "what's left of my affairs."

"People ask me why I'm not depressed," he says. "Well, I've been living with it for 25 years."

Still, Herman gives benefit concerts without hesitation, says saxophonist Stan Getz. "He's an all-giving guy."

As a bandleader, Herman is more an athletic coach than a dictator.

That's one of the reasons his bands play so well, says Leon Breeden, professor emeritus of jazz studies in North Texas State University in Denton, whose students have often graduated to Herman's band. "It makes you want to play music when you respect the guy who is up there."

Herman's sound came from his four saxophone lineup. Breeden says. "The combination of three tenors and a baritone gave it a deeper sound. You didn't

"He's a man of the present, not a man of the past," says classical clarinetist Richard Stoltzman, who has toured with Herman and was guest star in his Hollywood Bowl concert. "He could just play simple licks and get away with it, but all of a sudden, he'll play something really outrageous - without a net!"

Yet as a clarinetist, Herman has never been considered in the same class as Benny Goodman or Artie Shaw. Herman has always been particularly modest about it.

After hearing Stoltzman perform the Ebony Concerto, the bandleader exclaimed he's heard the solo "played correctly - for once."

But when dealing with nostalgia-minded fans, Herman isn't always so congenial. Band member Frank Tiberi has heard Herman rebuff requests for Glenn Miller tunes by saying, "I'll

tell Glenn when I see him high in the sky."

"I try not to be snide," Herman says. "I'll play any music that I have been involved with or am halfway responsible for. I don't want to play somebody else's dirty laundry."

Herman admits he has always considered audiences "the great unwashed. But you can't play down to them. If you do, you may make a million dollars, but you've lost anyway."

"The youth is changing - they're open to jazz. But general audiences are still the same in America as they've always been. They come in with a hangover and say, 'Entertain me.'"

Has he ever come close to quitting? "Oh, once a week. But after a breath or two, you just keep going. I've had a very good career and a very enjoyable one. I'm in reasonable shape. And I'm still doing what I was doing as a kid. Not many people are allowed that."

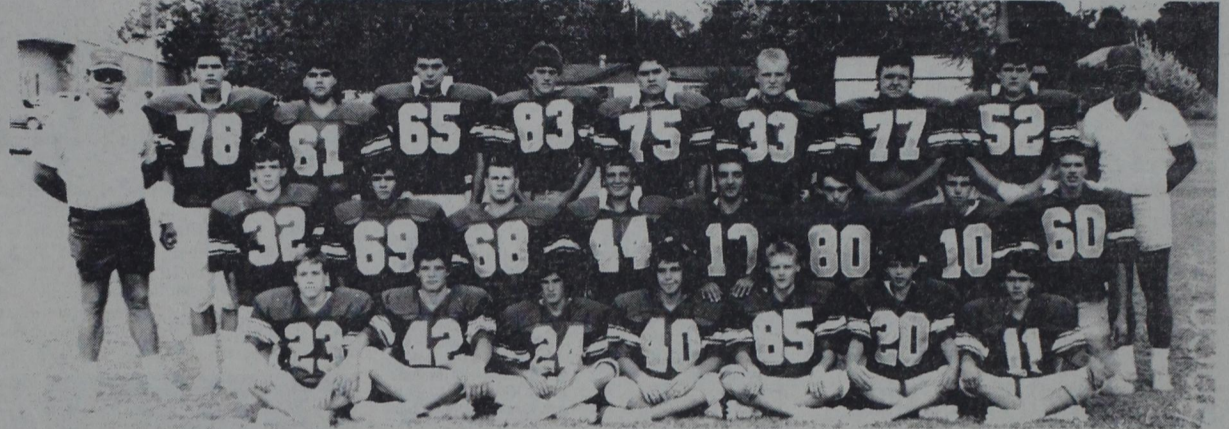

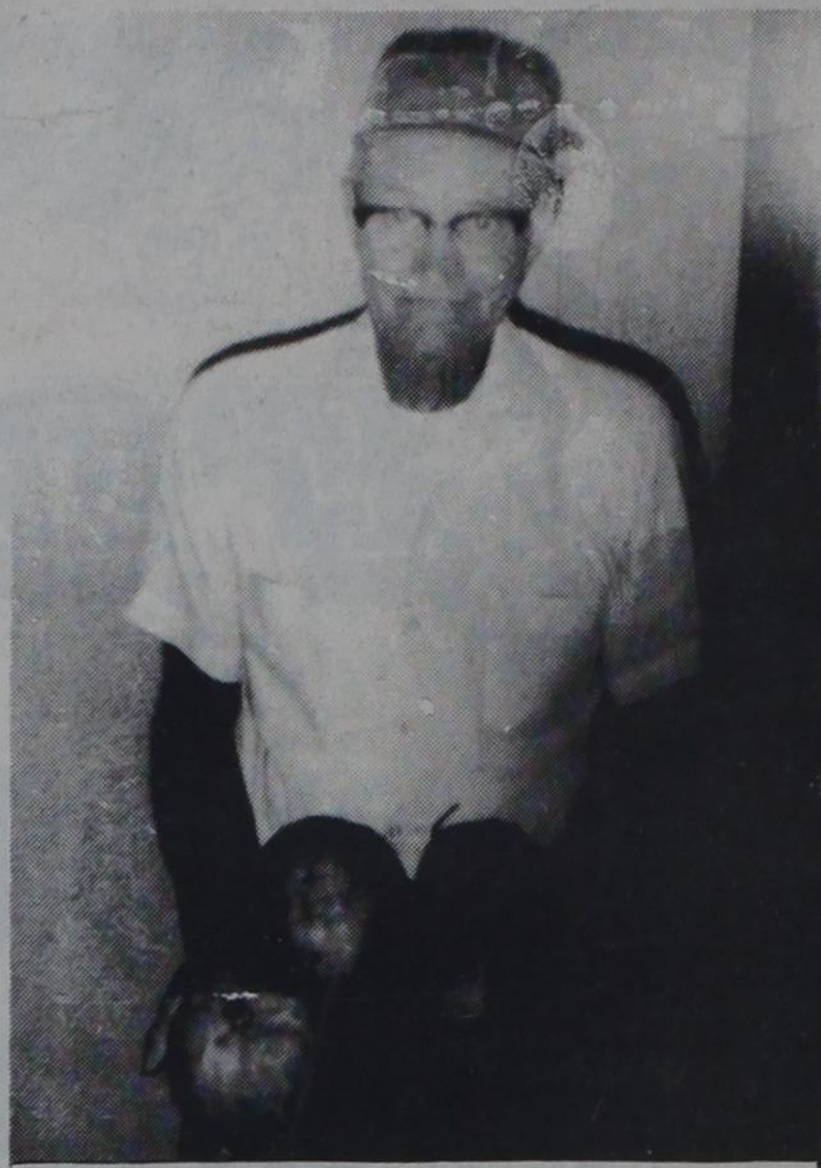

ACR MAINTENANCE Those participating in the 1987 Feed Grain, Wheat, or Cotton program are reminded that land designated as Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) must be maintained throughout the

1987 calendar year. Land must remain in an approved cover and weeds must be controlled.

FALL PEANUT QUOTA TRANSFERS

Transferring Farm A fall peanut quota transfer can be approved only if the transferring farm planted a sufficient acreage to be expected to produce the full effective quota and the total production was less than the effective quota due to reasons beyond the peanut producer's control.

Receiving Farm The amount of quota pounds that can be received is limited to the estimated ungraded pounds yet to be marketed less the quota balance on the marketing card for the receiving farm.

A fall ransfer to cover peanut marketings may never be made after the peanuts are graded.

County Office Listing We are maintaining a list for producers to indicate their need to transfer quota or receive quota under the fall transfer provisions.
