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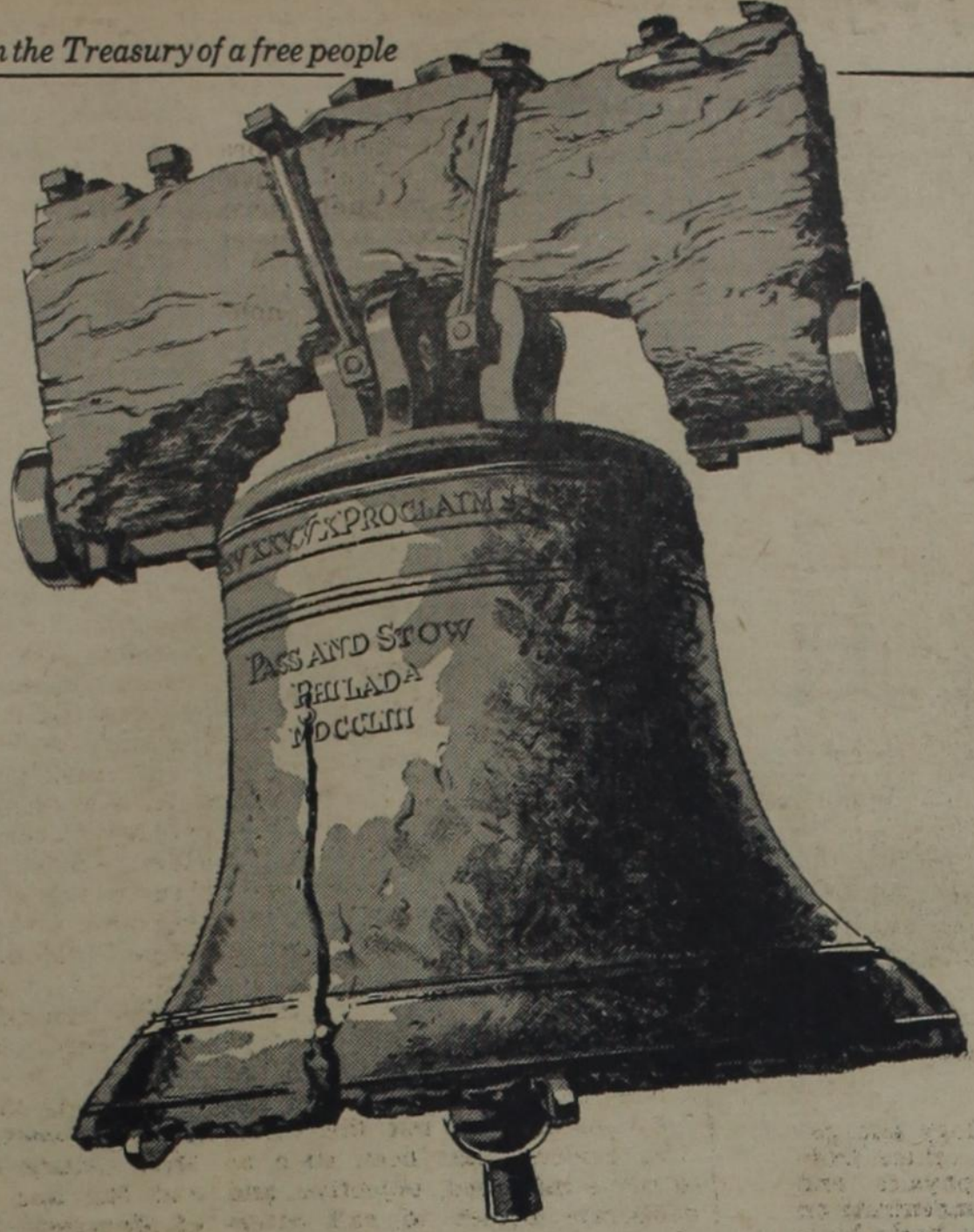

stripping off window screens and destroying part of a brick chimney. It took sheet iron from the Callaway chicken houses and wrapped it around light wires and posts like fantastic flags, tore out electric wires and even pulled fence posts out of the ground, residents said. Kizer Telephone company installations escaped major damage. The company lost one pole.

The H. L. Callaway residence which is near the Don Callaway home, was not damaged.

From the Callaway place the storm wove a twisted path of destruction through open fields and ranches to the Sipe Springs community, a mile and a half east, where it hit the present Ted Barton home, curving about the residence to do extensive damage to the barn and other houses. After leaving Sipe Springs the twister moved on toward De Leon doing damage to several other farms and residences.

So far as was known no one was injured.

The REA sent crews into the area shortly after the storm and restored electric service after several hours.

Mrs. Callaway said she and her two daughters were at the house alone, her husband having gone to his father's home a short distance away. The children were watching television.

"All of a sudden," said Mrs. Callaway, "it got very still. My eardrums felt as if they would burst and it was hard to breathe. Then we heard a lot of noise and I ran outside. I've always heard that tornadoes are black but that thing looked like a lot of white smoke going round and round with a lot of objects in it that must have been things it had picked up. I was scared half to death. All I could think of was 'run' in the house and be with the children. I remembered to open the front and back doors. But there wasn't any other place to go or time to do anything else."

The storm, fortunately, spared the residence as it seemed to take care to do in all the other places that were hit, destroying or damaging only barns and out-houses, fences, wires and trees.

At Sipe Springs a pick-up belonging to Newman Jones, who had gone to a storm cellar, was picked up and damaged.

Very little and no hail accompanied the twister.

Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Huddleston, who were returning from a visit to Gorman late Monday, became apprehensive of the stormy looking cloud and stopped at Duster until it had cleared.

were his brother, Oscar Schaefer, C. W. Richter, Forrest Boone and others. Richter's barns and chicken houses were heavily hit and Mr. Boone lost a barn roof.

Most of the crops throughout the stricken area were a total loss. Wheat was beaten into the ground, corn was left with shredded stumps sticking out of the ground, young melon vines beaten down and cotton destroyed.

From an inch to an inch and a half of rain was estimated. Most rain gauges were destroyed.

The storm struck shortly after six o'clock. From the Cook community the storm path moved eastward doing great damage to farms south of Criswell's store where E. T. Hudnall had extensive roof damage. Among other farmers reporting damage were George Hill, Tommy Poe and Fred Cooper.

The cloud which spawned the destructive weather activity seemed to split west of Rising Star during the afternoon, one part moving north and eastward and the other following a course south of here and possibly causing the tornadic activity which was most severe in the Sipe Springs area.

Johnny Jones Will Take Outstanding Athletic Record To Abilene College

ABILENE—Johnny Jones of Rising Star, outstanding basketball player and state champion high jumper and broad jumper, will enroll at Abilene Christian College this fall to participate in basketball and track, college officials announced Friday.

The 5-9, 140-pounder scored 23 points per game last winter after a junior season scoring average of 21 per game. He earned selection to eight all-tournament basketball teams, was named to the All-32B District basketball team for three seasons and earned honorable mention All-Area selection for three years.

In district track competition this year he won the high jump, broad jump and 180-yard low hurdles, while running on winning 440-yard and one-mile relays. He won the same individual event in regional competition and anchored the 440-yard relay championship team.

Jones scored 27 points in the state meet in Class B competition, winning the high jump and broad jump, placing fourth in the low hurdles and anchoring the third place 440-yard relay team. He broke regional records in the high jump and broad jump and tied the Bluebonnet Relays high jump record.

His best marks are 22-10 1/4 for the broad jump, 6-3 1/2 for the high jump, 20.0 for the low hur-

You have certainly been kind to me. Your vote will be greatly appreciated.

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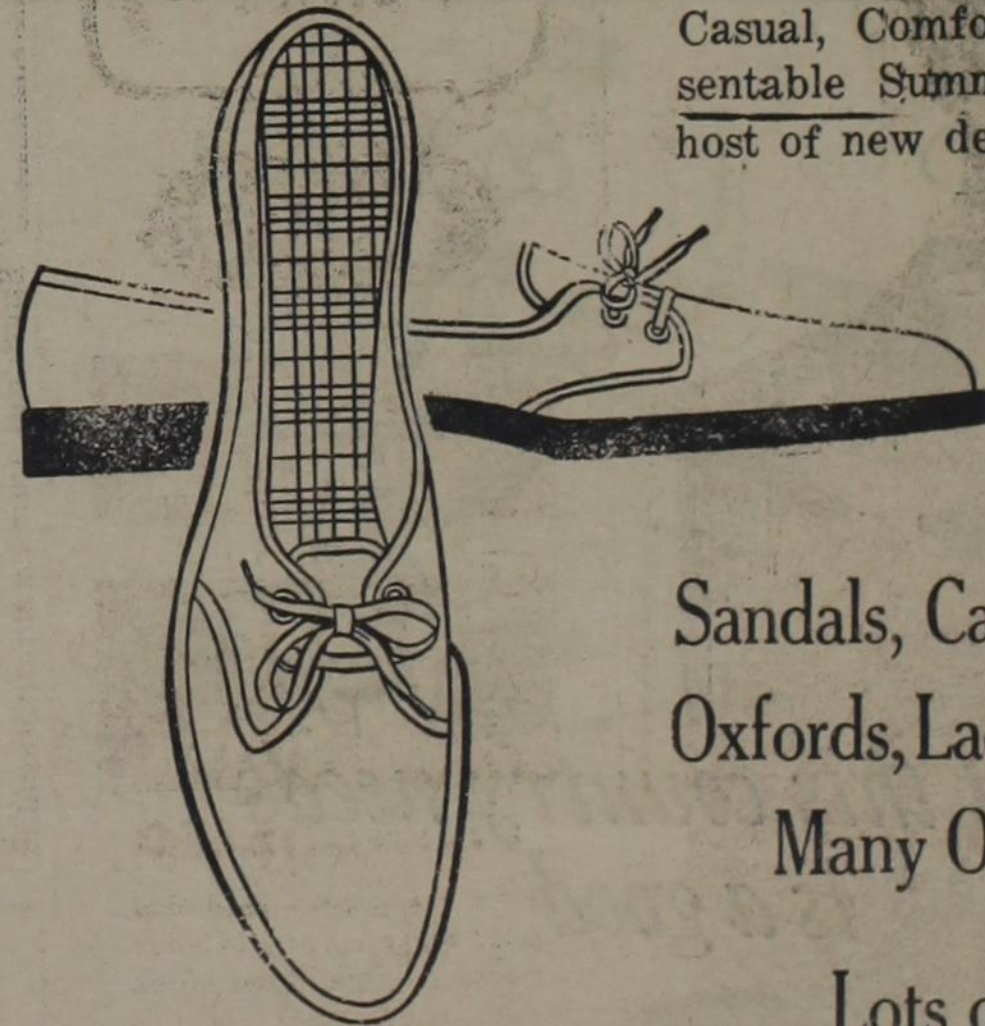
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Participates In Two Weeks Training Event

They hope that all citizens will attend and participate.

Chairman Phillips said "It behooves all Texans to pause in their busy lives and offer thanksgiving unto our Lord for the super abundance that we enjoy. All must be made aware that from Mother Earth all that sustains life has its beginning; that we must protect it, husband it, and enrich it is that future generations of Texans may not be in want. Truly the earth is the Lord's and we are its caretakers and guardians."

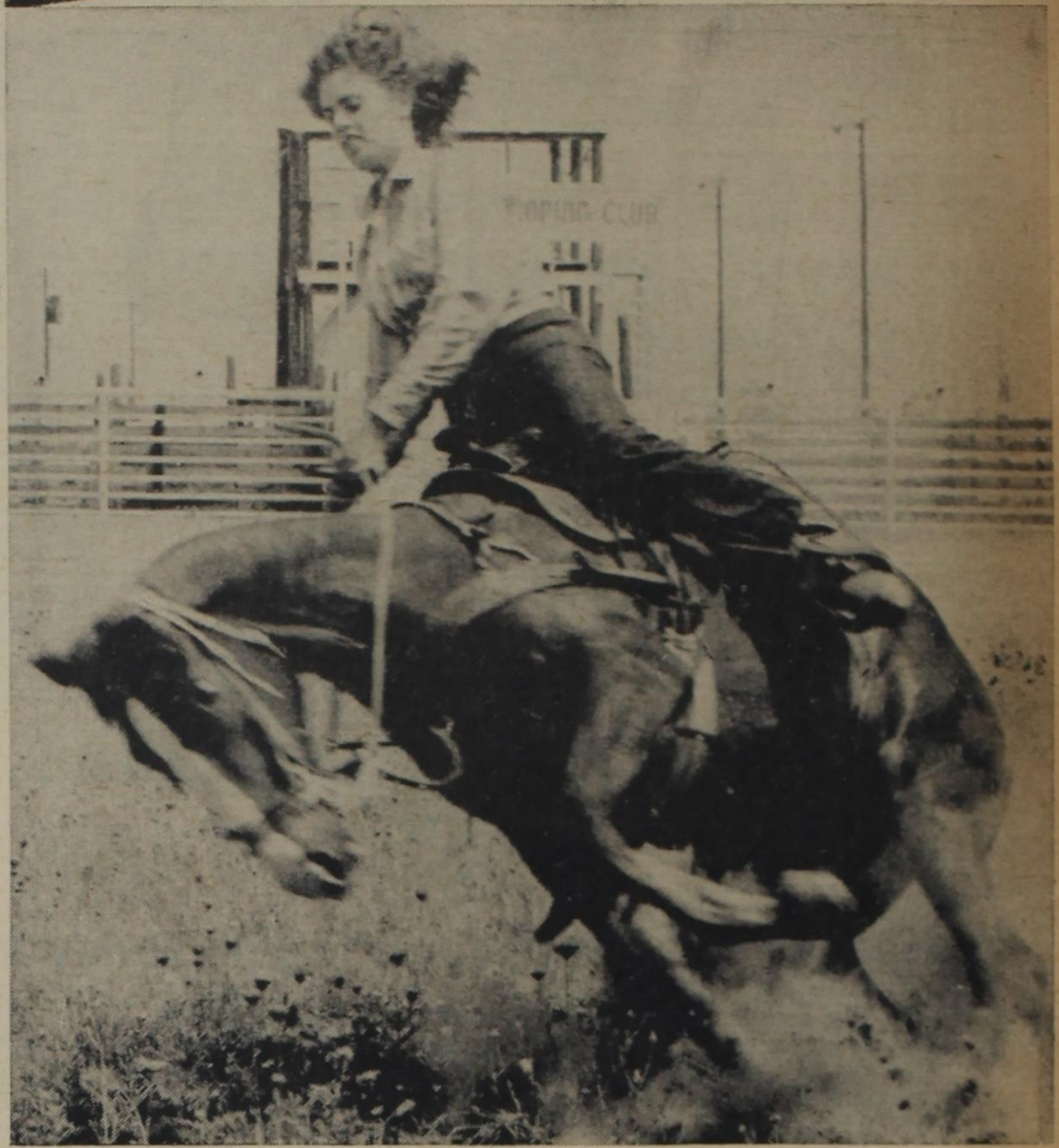
Anyone reading this material carefully would find himself quite familiar with the general layout and features of the fair and better equipped for a profitable visit.
