MARCH, 2, 1974 --HOUSTON - - Auction records for both the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Steer were smashed at the Houston Livestock Show. The Grand Champion Steer, a Maine -Anjou Angus crossbreed exhibited by 13 year old Theresa Scott of Rising Star, brought \$40,000, a new record for the Houston Livestock Show. The previous record price was \$35,000 set in 1970.

The Grand Champion Steer was bought by a group of long time Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo supporters. Tommie Vaughn, current president of the association bid for a 31 member group which included four past presidents of the show. On behalf of a the group, Vaughn then donated the steer to Mr. Edgar W. Brown, Jr. of Orange, Texas, to whom the 1974 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is dedicated.

Mr. Brown, in accepting the gift, noted that "I wish I could take it home with me and keep it as long as it lives." However, he donated the steer to the Animal Science Department of Texas A&M University.

The 1283 pound crossbred Maine - Anjou was the first of its breed ever to be selected as Grand Champion Steer of a major livestock show. David Merrill, representing the Maine - Anjou Association, presented Theresa Scott with a check for \$1,000 from the breed association in recognition of her win. The steer was bred by Larry Hollin of Cody,

FROM OUR CHURCHES

Church of Christ Rising Star

One of the most difficult tasks facing anyone attempting to share the Gospel is to create in the heart of others a consciousness of sin. It is always easier to imagine ourselves much better than we really are, or seek to excuse ourselves from fault by claiming some degree of superiority over those around us. Human pride all too often blocks any thought of imperfection from our mind, or causes us to resist any effort to accept a definition of right and wrong from without

The Bible lays heavy stress upon the reality of sin in the world (Romans 5:12). The universality of it is also emphasized (Romans 3:9 - 18; Romans 3:23; 1 John 1:8 - 10). It is clearly defined as being: that which is not of faith (Romans 14:23; cf Romans 10:17); knowing to do good and not doing it (James 4:17); lawlessness (1 John 3:4), and :: all unrighteousness;; (1 John 5:17). The last two passages basically sum up the meaning of the term as being the violation of God's law, in keeping with the root meaning of the word translated "sin" in English, which is "missing the mark". Two things constitute this "mark": God Himself and His Word, or will for us.

Thus, when we compare ourselves with God himself, and not with others like ourselves (2 Corinthians 10:12) and as we measure our own worth according to God's will, as given in the Scriptures (2 Timothy 3:16, 17), we can only exclaim: "God be merciful to me; a sinner!" (Luke 18:13). On the practical level, God is love (1 John 4:8), but which of us would claim to have the same perfect love as He shows (John 3:16; Romans 5:8)? With God there is no falsehood (Hebrews 7:17, 18), but who can pretend never to have lied, either outrightly or through deceit? The fruit of God's Spirit is given as: love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, meekness and self control. (Galatians 5:22,23), but who can truthfully say that he has perfectly and consistently manifested these noble qualities? Who has never been angry "with his brother" (Matthew 5:21 - 26), or been pierced with even a fleeting arrow of impure thought (Matthew 5:27 - 32)?

In reality, sin is thus present in each of us and God uses His Holy Spirit to convict us of such (John 16:8), through the Scriptures (John 16:13), as God's nature and will are presented therein for comparison with our own.

Having no righteousness of our own, we can only rejoice in and freely claim the grace of God, as manifested through His gift of Jesus Christ (Ephesians 2:8,9). Being sinners, we merit the penalty: death (Romans 6:23; Isaiah 59:2), but through Christ, God has provided forgiveness (Ephesians 1:7) and this is appropriated (NOT earned - Ephesians 2:8,9; Romans 6:23), through conversion (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:36 - 38).

To know more about God's remedy for sin, be with us in the verse - by - verse Bible studies on Sunday morning at 9:30, on Wednesday evening at 7 p.m and for the Assemblies

Patrick Lucey; Dr. Barry Commoner, Director for the Center for the Biology of Natural Systems at Washington University in St. Lewis; White

House Trade Specialist Harald B. Malmgren; Honorable Henry Maier, Mayor of Milwaukee; Labor Department official William Kolberg; Saskatchewan Minister of Agriculture John R. Messer; former Federal Power Commission chairman Dr. Lee White; Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture James McHale and several members of Congress. The banquet speaker will be Minnesota Senator Walter Mondale, one of the

National Farmers Union President Tony Dechant of Denver termed the National Farmers Union Convention as. "One more step in educating the public on agriculture's role in the economy and world trade." 


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Nephew Of Locals Named To "Who's Who"
