The fact that a conviction of drug abuse under state law was involved in the noisy protest suggests that drugs were an even more immediate stimulus. But a more sinister fact to be observed is in the relaitself to the orderly processes of government.

When the actions of only a few individuals can disrupt a public gathering, prevent a high government official from speaking and, even more seriously, deny to the majority the right to hear, it poses a grave threat to the future of the constitutional guarantees and forms under which we have lived for some 200 years.
