### Improved Turkey Prices Forecast For Coming Fall

COLLEGE STATION, June 28. — Present indications point to slightly better turkey prices in the fall of 1958 than in the fall of 1957, according to F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist.

Beanblossom bases this prediction mainly on the outlook for about 14 percent drop in the 1958 crop in the U. S. It now appears that a drop from the 1957 record output of 81 million birds is certain and this should help prices.

However, he points out, the price rise will be tempered by large storage stocks. Too, the paying prices that storers will be willing to offer for 15 to 20 percent of the crop which normally goes into long-time storage will be tempered by businessmen's judgments of the price that will prevail at the time the stored turkeys would normally be resold.

The use of turkeys from storage since January 1 has been greater than any preceding year, says the specialist. However, storage stocks are still large and on May 1 amounted to 104 million pounds compared to 109 million pounds on the same date last year and the 1947-56 average of only 67 million pounds.

Any increase in demand for turkeys over 1957 is not in the picture. Consumers may not have as many dollars available for turkeys in the fall of 1958 as in the fall of 1957.

Other factors which the specialist says may affect prices are the present outlook for increased broiler production over 1957 and larger supplies of other competing meats.

tron, Grant and Hidalgo counties.

In fact, Morrison came to New Mexico from his Texas home town of Rising Star in September of 1923. The fledgling highway department, established a few years before, had scarcely 250 employees.

He came to Lordsburg, doing highway locations between that city and Deming and between Deming and Columbus.

In 1924 he transferred to District 2, with Roswell as headquarters and served many years as project engineer. In 1955 he was appointed to the post of district engineer and came to Deming to fill that post in this district.

He has made an enviable record here and is the first district engineer to retire at 30 years.

What does a man do after 30 years of important work for the highways in New Mexico? How can he retire into a life of ease?

Morrison had the answers on the tip of his tongue, because he has given much thought to the questions in recent months.

"First I will just relax, away from the daily responsibility of being a district engineer," he said. He added he will then catch up on a lot of neglected fishing, not any particular kind of fishing — but just fishing.

Mr. and Mrs. Morrison have resided in Deming at 709 West Elm, and they will miss many friends made in southwest New Mexico over the years. But they have a permanent home at Fort Sumner, N. Mex. and while they will travel much and fish a lot, they will always return to their Fort Sumner home.

They have one son, Alfred M. Morrison Jr., a deputy sheriff in Grant County, stationed at Santa Rita. Two granddaughters there will fetch Mr. and Mrs. Morrison back this way often he said.

Morrison sees a bright future for New Mexico highways, now that the mammoth interstate

highway job is going ahead full speed. He is proud of the personnel of the highway department in this district, and will be extremely happy to turn over to his successor a personnel second to none in any highway district. Many of the employees in this district have been with the highway department for many years and he says their know how can't be equalled anywhere.

When District Engineer Morrison quits his post on July 1 after thirty faithful years, he will

be succeeded by John Barber, who is now assistant district engineer at the Albuquerque highway district.

The retiring district engineer is in perfect health and is looking ahead now to many busy years — not building highways, but mostly fishing and looking after things at the family home at Fort Sumner.

## ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

With the blanks unfilled, Form Number 68-R573 is nothing but rows of cold and impersonal lines of type on a printed page.

It is only when a doctor enters a boy or girl's name, or a man or woman's... an age... an address... a telephone number... that Form Number 68-R573 relates its story of personal tragedy and human error.

Form Number 68-R573 is impressively titled "Poliomyelitis Surveillance Case Record." More simply it is the State Health Department's way of keeping checks on victims of the disease which by all right of reason should be practically a thing of the past.

Seventy-two times so far this year the form has lost its impersonal character and become grimly personal. At first blush you think 72 cases of polio among some eight million Texans is an insignificant number.

But is it really? Can even a single case be "insignificant" when it costs an active youngster the use of arms or legs, or an adult the ability to support a family?

The thing that heightens the tragedy is that it might have been avoided. That's where the human error, or "apathy," or "ignorance" comes in.

Like a 37-year-old North Texas man who firmly insisted that all four of his children be properly vaccinated, while at the same time complacently considering himself too old to be in danger. Now his name, age, address, and telephone number fill blanks on Form Number 68-R573. There is also a check mark in the "bulbar" square on the form.

Or like the 13-year-old Little League infielder and his 3-year-old sister, neither of whom had a single shot of vaccine. It would have added hurt to injury to ask their parents why.

This human error — and that is the charitable name for it — has caused one major manufacturer of Salk vaccine to discon-

tinue production of the vital fluid for which parents all over the nation were piously praying just a few short years ago. The reason: vaccine stocks simply are not being used. By the literal gallons, vaccine is growing old and impotent on drug store shelves.

It is a sad thing to see the polio surveillance forms come in each week. It is sadder still to reduce people to numbers for publication and mailing each Thursday to city and county health officers of Texas and to the Federal government.

Somehow it makes you think of those famous lines by Whittier... "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these; 'It might have been.'"



### REASONABLE TIME

Before a contract arises someone must make an offer and another must accept it.

Without an offer, no acceptance; with no acceptance, no agreement.

But there is often a time within which you can accept the offer. And if not, the offer ends anyhow within a "reasonable time" which is determined by circumstances and the parties' intentions.

Smith had a set of books which Brown wanted. Brown wrote and offered him \$200 for the set.

Smith didn't answer for six months, and meantime Brown bought a similar set. One day Brown got a letter from Smith saying "I accept your offer of \$200 for the set of books."

Brown told Smith he'd bought the books elsewhere, but Smith still claimed that his belated "acceptance" had nevertheless sealed the contract with Brown.

Was there a contract? No, the offer had lapsed because it had not been accepted in the circumstances within a reasonable time.

There are many ways to end an offer. You may withdraw it, or the other party may turn it down directly or by making a counter offer.

Here Smith had failed to accept Brown's offer within a reasonable time, which ended it just as though it had been withdrawn.

What is a reasonable time? It varies. The offer could expire in a few minutes in the stock market or last for quite a while, depending upon what a court would think is a reasonable time.

But in Smith's case six months was unreasonable.

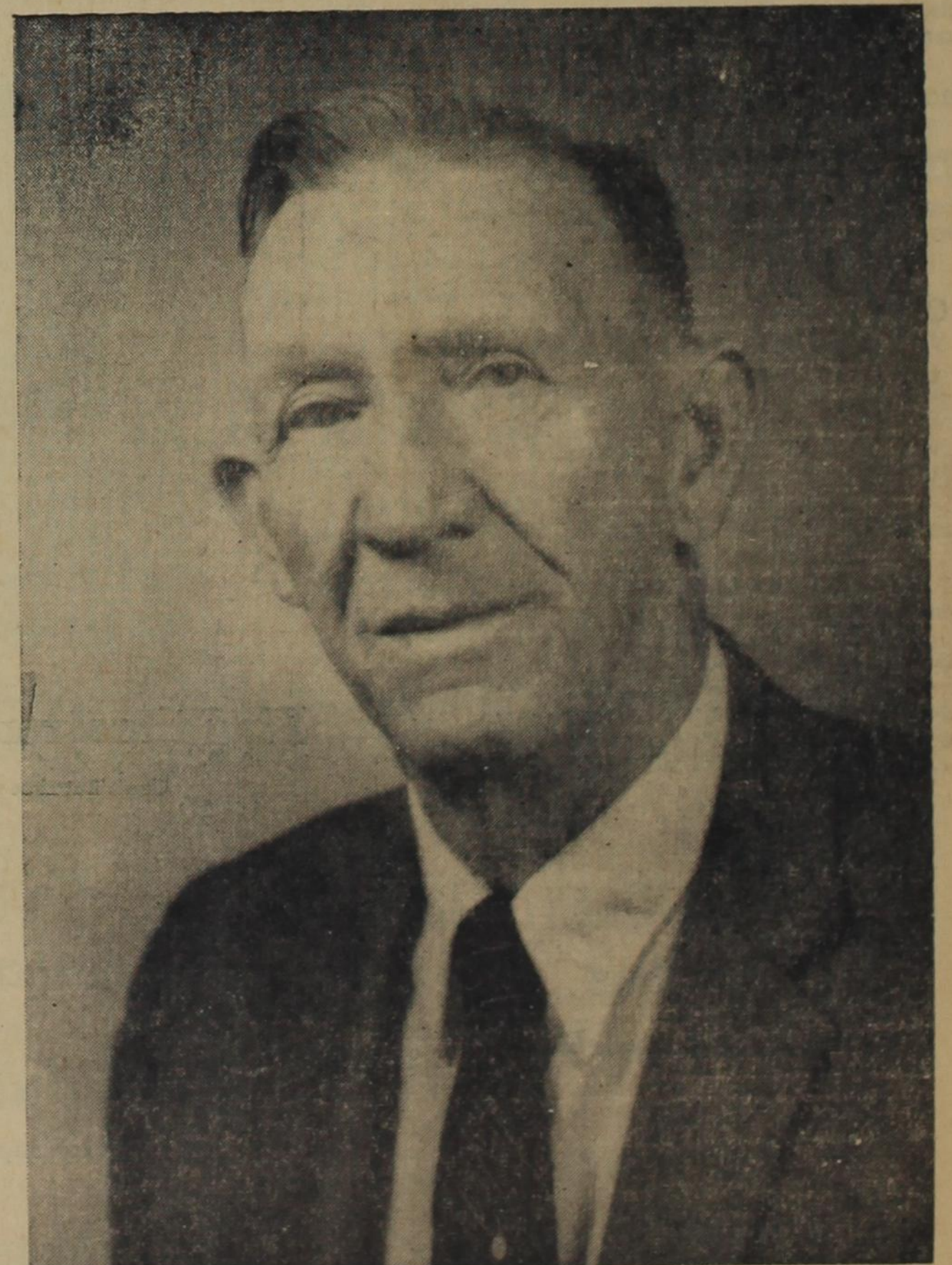

## ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

With the blanks unfilled, Form Number 68-R573 is nothing but rows of cold and impersonal lines of type on a printed page.

It is only when a doctor enters a boy or girl's name, or a man or woman's... an age... an address... a telephone number... that Form Number 68-R573 relates its story of personal tragedy and human error.

Form Number 68-R573 is impressively titled "Poliomyelitis Surveillance Case Record." More simply it is the State Health Department's way of keeping checks on victims of the disease which by all right of reason should be practically a thing of the past.

Seventy-two times so far this year the form has lost its impersonal character and become grimly personal. At first blush you think 72 cases of polio among some eight million Texans is an insignificant number.

But is it really? Can even a single case be "insignificant" when it costs an active youngster the use of arms or legs, or an adult the ability to support a family?

The thing that heightens the tragedy is that it might have been avoided. That's where the human error, or "apathy," or "ignorance" comes in.

Like a 37-year-old North Texas man who firmly insisted that all four of his children be properly vaccinated, while at the same time complacently considering himself too old to be in danger. Now his name, age, address, and telephone number fill blanks on Form Number 68-R573. There is also a check mark in the "bulbar" square on the form.

Or like the 13-year-old Little League infielder and his 3-year-old sister, neither of whom had a single shot of vaccine. It would have added hurt to injury to ask their parents why.

This human error — and that is the charitable name for it — has caused one major manufacturer of Salk vaccine to discon-

tinue production of the vital fluid for which parents all over the nation were piously praying just a few short years ago. The reason: vaccine stocks simply are not being used. By the literal gallons, vaccine is growing old and impotent on drug store shelves.

It is a sad thing to see the polio surveillance forms come in each week. It is sadder still to reduce people to numbers for publication and mailing each Thursday to city and county health officers of Texas and to the Federal government.

Somehow it makes you think of those famous lines by Whittier... "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these: 'It might have been.'"

**REASONABLE TIME**  
 Before a contract arises someone must make an offer and another must accept it.

Without an offer, no acceptance; with no acceptance, no agreement. But there is often a time within which you can accept the offer. And if not, the offer ends anyhow within a "reasonable time" which is determined by circumstances and the parties' intentions.

Smith had a set of books which Brown wanted. Brown wrote and offered him \$200 for the set.

Smith didn't answer for six months, and meantime Brown bought a similar set. One day Brown got a letter from Smith saying "I accept your offer of \$200 for the set of books."

Brown told Smith he'd bought the books elsewhere, but Smith still claimed that his belated "acceptance" had nevertheless sealed the contract with Brown.

Was there a contract? No, the offer had lapsed because it had not been accepted in the circumstances within a reasonable time.

There are many ways to end an offer. You may withdraw it, or the other party may turn it down directly or by making a counter offer.

Here Smith had failed to accept Brown's offer within a reasonable time, which ended it just as though it had been withdrawn. What is a reasonable time? It varies. The offer could expire in a few minutes in the stock market or last for quite a while, depending upon what a court would think is a reasonable time.

But in Smith's case six months was unreasonable.

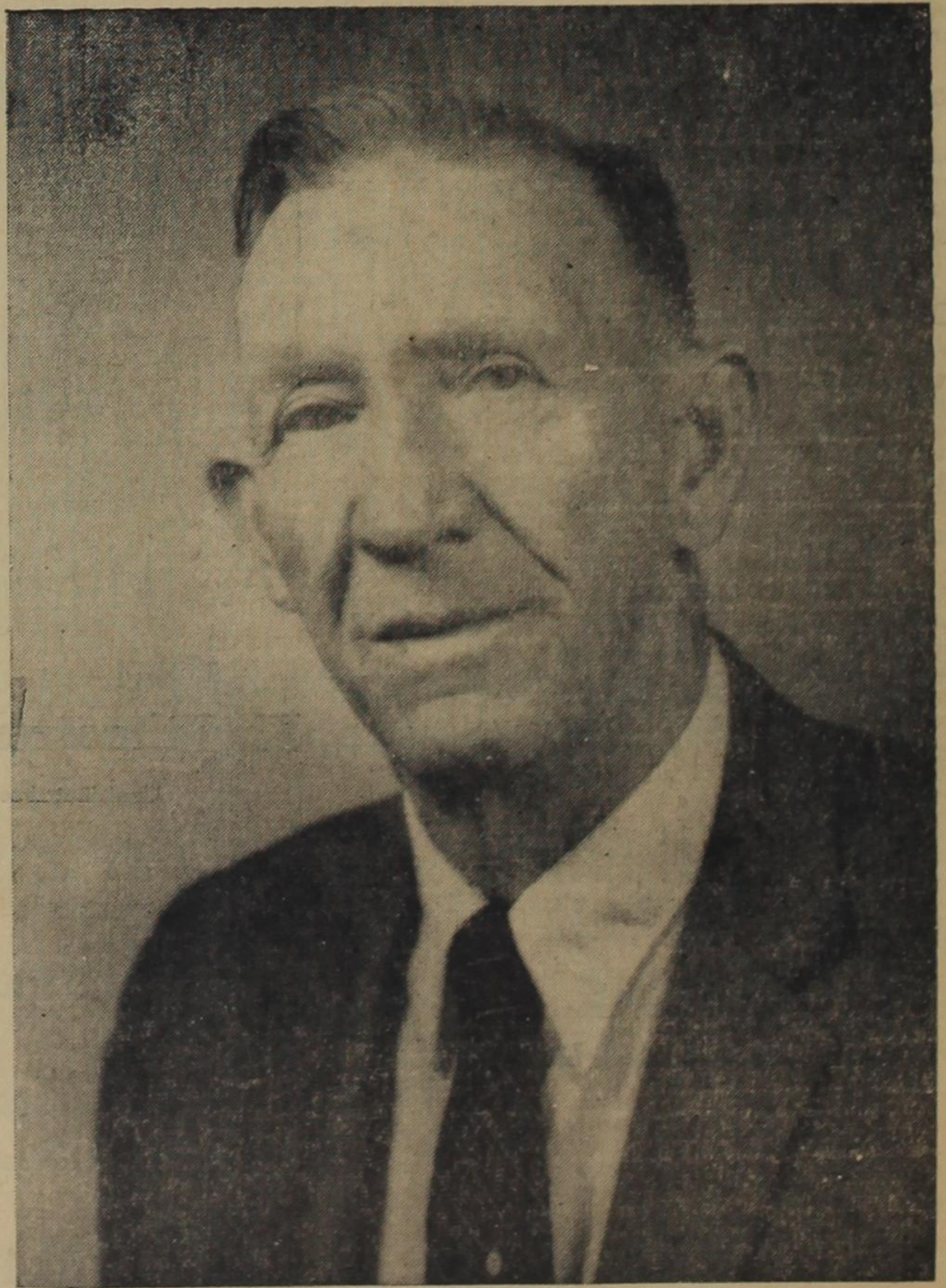

### Veterans Buying More Land Each Month In Texas

AUSTIN — More veterans are buying land every month through the Veterans' Land Program, Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn reported this week.

In March, the Veterans' Land Board bought 37 tracts of land for Texas ex-servicemen. In April this number increased to 95, and in May the Board bought 127 tracts.

Through June 20, 118 tracts have been purchased through the Program, and before the month is ended, this figure is expected to rise to 175.

In October, the Board expects to level off its purchases at about 350 tracts a month, Allcorn says. This land is being bought with money from three sales of Veterans' Land Bonds since December, 1957, which have made \$37½ million available for land purchases.

### White Seeks Re-election As Ag Commissioner

AUSTIN — A major advance for the Texas Department of Agriculture was claimed by Commissioner John C. White this week with the announcement that Texas now stands first among 12 southern states in the amount and enforcement of farm legislation.

"Since 1951, we have jumped from seventh to first position in modern farm laws," said White. "These legal provisions have enabled us to increase our services in Texas by as much as 300%. As

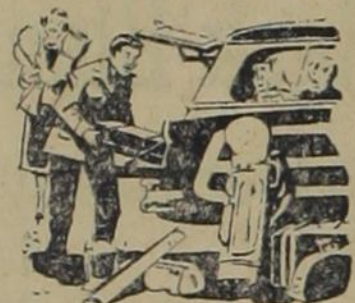
