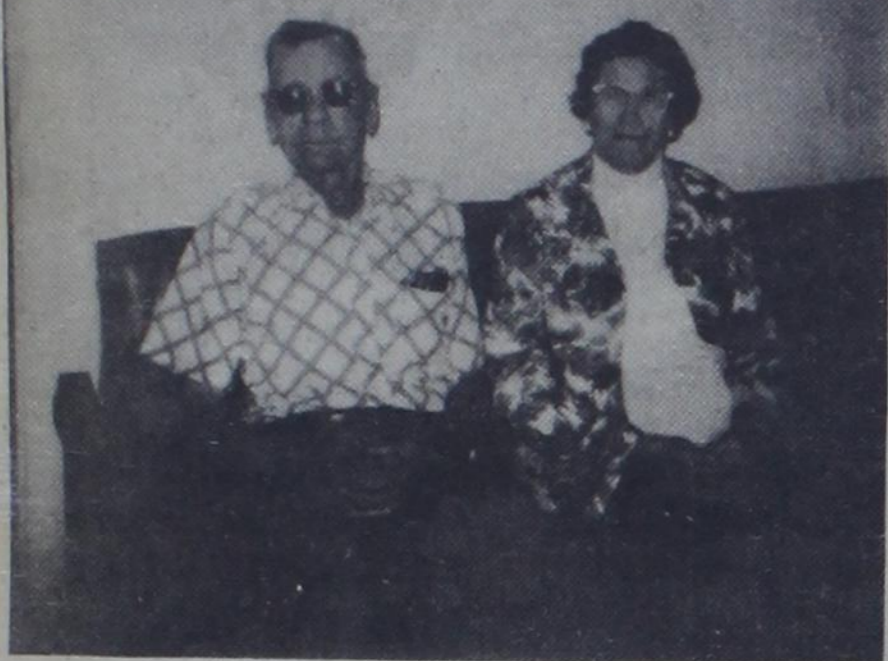

### Acres Of Peanut Farmland Remains Unchanged

Austin-The number of Texas farmland devoted to peanuts remains unchanged from last year, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan V. Brown said today. In addition, Brown announced, this year's peanut harvest follows very closely last year's.

"This is encouraging," said Commissioner Brown, "because even with a dry, hot late summer last year, Texas peanut farmers harvested enough to make the state third in the nation of pounds produced. I believe this year could be even better if we could get a little more rain in the Cross Timbers region."

Brown noted that the total number of acres planted in peanuts this year was 310,000. He also said that, at 304,000 acres already harvested this year, this matches exactly the number of acres harvested at the end of June in 1976.

"Because of the late winter and early spring rains," said Brown, "development in the southern half of the state is generally behind, while crops in the High and Low Plains are well ahead of schedule."

Last year, Comanche County was the top producing county in the state, followed by Frio, Eastland, Atacosa, Wilson, Mason, Erath, Lee, Gaines and Fannin Counties in that order.

### your National Parks Right Around Home by Ben Moffett



If you study the satellite photos on your TV weather, you might have noticed that a pretty fair sized cloud always seem to linger over southern New Mexico.

What the satellite's weather camera is picking up is not a cloud formation, but the sprawling white sands, the world's largest above ground gypsum deposit.

Some 230 square miles of the sands are within White Sands National Monument, a favorite area in the far flung National System to many kids.

Here's a park where a little boy can scratch his name on the side of a dune and the wind will obliterate it in short order. Here's a spot where he can run barefoot through the dunes and climb on a sand surfboard for a rip down the biggest one in sight.

A 16 mile round trip scenic drive begins at the visitor center on U.S. 70 and winds into the heart of the dunes. Before going into the dune area where the action is, most visitors, including kids, like to bone up on how the dunes were formed. They can at the visitor center museum.

During the summer, a unique talk starts at 8:45 on Fridays until Sept. 5. This is a "star trekking program," a "walk through the heavens" according to the park staff. The talk is held in the dunes picnic area.

Perhaps the best time to visit the monument during the summer is on full moon nights when the dunes are open until midnight. Here's an opportunity to enjoy the dunes in the cool of the evening. It gets very hot at White Sands in the afternoon.

The full moon nights, July 29-30-31 and August 28-29-30 this summer, include

interpretive programs featuring guest speakers at 8:45.

Other programs at the monument until Sept. 5 include:

- a one hour morning walk tuesday and thursday at 9 leaving from the visitor center.
- a 30 minute siesta time talk daily at 1 on the visitor center patio.
- a one hour walk in the dunes at sunset daily except tuesday and thursday. Starting time 7

Evening naturalist programs on Monday, Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday at 8:45 in the picnic area.

There is no campground at the monument, but there is a variety of accommodations at Alamogordo, 15 miles away.

If you are planning to visit a park on your next vacation, write the National Park Service, P.O. box 728 Room N-18, Santa Fe, N.M. 87501 for a free Super 77 trip planner which lists NPS areas within an easy drive of your home and charts the facilities and services at these areas.
