## Girls Sweep Relays In Regional Meet

The Rising Star girls stole the show last Saturday afternoon by taking the winning trophy in the 440, 880, and Mile Relays. Dottie Chambers added two points in the discus with a fine throw of 95 feet 6 1/2 inches for fifth as that gave the Cats 62 points and the runner-up spot in the Region II-B meet behind the well-rounded Newcastle team. Newcastle came in second behind the Wildcats in the Mile Relay to give them 68 points.

In the Sprint Relay the quartet of Laurie Hill, Vicki Elliott, Pam Hunt, and anchor Carolyn Bessent went into the finals with the second best time behind Throckmorton. Throckmorton was the only team, I believe that had beat the Cats in the 440 Relay this year. The girls had to get first or second to qualify for the State Meet in Austin and they left no doubt as the gun went off. After 220 yards 3 teams were fairly even but after Pam Hunt blew 'em off the curve their was no doubt as Bessent hit the tape in a school record 50.6 and 4 yards ahead of 2nd place Throckmorton. It was then 1 down, 2 to go.

In the 880 Relay the Cats took a commanding lead on a fine leg by Vicki Elliott and held their top qualifying time and completely left everyone else in the dust as Bessent again crossed the line in first with a 1:51.4, a good 10 yards to spare on again number 2 Throckmorton. We were still batting 1,000, 2 down, 1 to go.

The Mile Relay showed what winners are made of as the 4 had already run the 440 and 880 relays twice that day and it was going to take guts to win the 4 lap race. The order was Carolyn, Vicki, Pam, and Laurie. After 3 trips around the oval, Laurie Hill set out after front running Newcastle with a 5 yard deficit to make up. After 220 yards she had the decision of trying to pass on the curve and running that 3 extra yards or waiting and getting her on the straightway. The straightaway was the apparent decision as Laurie raced in and gave the Cats their 3rd relay victory for the afternoon in a fine 4:18.8. It then became three out of three, not bad for a days work.

Coach L.C. Hounsell's Wildcat now qualify for the State Girls Meet in Conference B on Saturday, May 8, in Memorial Stadium (University of Texas) in Austin. They are also running in a State Qualifiers meet Friday at DeLeon.

Only 8 teams go to state for their only 4 Regions for High School Track and Field. If the girls do good, as they have been, Rising Star might have a Bicentennial State Champion. Its not unlikely.

## Nation Looking At Texas 1st Presidential Preference

The whole nation is going to be looking at Texas as it holds its first (and probably last) presidential preference vote in connection with the party primaries next Saturday.

Eastland County voters are now on Daylight Saving Time and have one week to ponder the complexities of the ballot.

The Democrats will find a combination Eastland - Latin American ballot when the polls open at 7 a.m. Saturday at the nine county precinct voting spots.

Three presidential hopefuls each have three delegates on the ballots as well as one set of totally uncommitted group of three delegates.

Statewide Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others are urging that voters check all three of the Lloyd Bentsen delegates in order to insure a strong leadership for Sen. Bentsen and Gov. Briscoe at the New York Democratic Convention in June. In Eastland County Mike Collins is one of the Bentsen delegate nominees.

It's true that Bentsen is a dropout of the presidential race, but his leadership of the Texas delegation is considered necessary in the wide-open convention where he and his delegates could be, if not kings, then at least king-makers.

Therefore Bentsen is being

considered the Texas favorite son, even though delegate nominees for Wallace, and Carter also appear on the ballot.

Further down, voters find the races:

Incumbent Bentsen opposed by Leon Dugi, Hugh Wilson and strongest of all Phil Gramm for the United States Senate seat.

Cong. Omar Burleson of the 17th District is for the first time in a while unopposed for re-election.

It's a horse race in the railroad commission race where eight (count 'em) include Jerry Sadler (former land commissioner), R.R. Williams, Lane Denton, Robert (Bob) Wood, Woodrow Wilson Bean, Terence L. O'Rourke, David Finney and Jon Newton.

Associate Justice Supreme Court Jack Pope is unopposed.

Charles W. Barrow and Don Yarbrough are vying for Place Two on the top court and James G. Denton is unopposed for Place Three as is John F. Onion, presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

Truman Roberts is opposed by Jerome Chamberlain for Judge Court of Criminal Appeals; and Carl Dally, W.T. Phillips and Jim Vollers are each seeking the unexpired term to the Criminal Appeals Court judgeship.

Closer to home, Incumbent State Sen. Tom Creighton, 22nd Senatorial District, is opposed by Alex R. Tandy of Weatherford, and Incumbent State Rep. Joe Hanna, 54th District, is opposed by Eastlander Bob Vaught.

Chief Justice Austin McCloud of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals is unopposed, as is 91st District Court Judge Earl Conner Jr.

Now the County Sheriff's Office has attracted four candidates when Sheriff L.E. (Lefty) Sublett announced that he is not seeking re-election. Candidates are Ronnie White, Johnnie W. Morren, Benny Moseley and Louis Hollywood.

County Tax Assessor - Collector Nancy Trout is unopposed.

County Commissioner for Precinct No. Three (south part of the county including Rising Star, Carbon and Gorman) has Incumbent L.T. Owen of Rising Star and John A. Ingram of Gorman.

The local election will be held at the City Hall in Rising Star on Saturday, May 1. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

Dr. G.A. Dunn, County Democratic Party Chairman, will serve as election judge. He will be assisted by Kenneth Morrison.

## Jerry Murray Addresses Jaycee Banquet

The Rising Star Jaycees, at their second annual banquet Thursday evening, April 22, presented tokens of appreciation to three Rising Star men for outstanding contributions to the Jaycee community effort, and heard an Abilene speaker call for greater overall participation in the political field as the one sure means of guaranteeing this country's future in freedom.

Franklin Cox of the Rising Star Jaycee chapter, presented awards to two non-members, Weldon Hill, elementary school principal named as the "outstanding Jaycee supporter", and to County Comm't L.T. 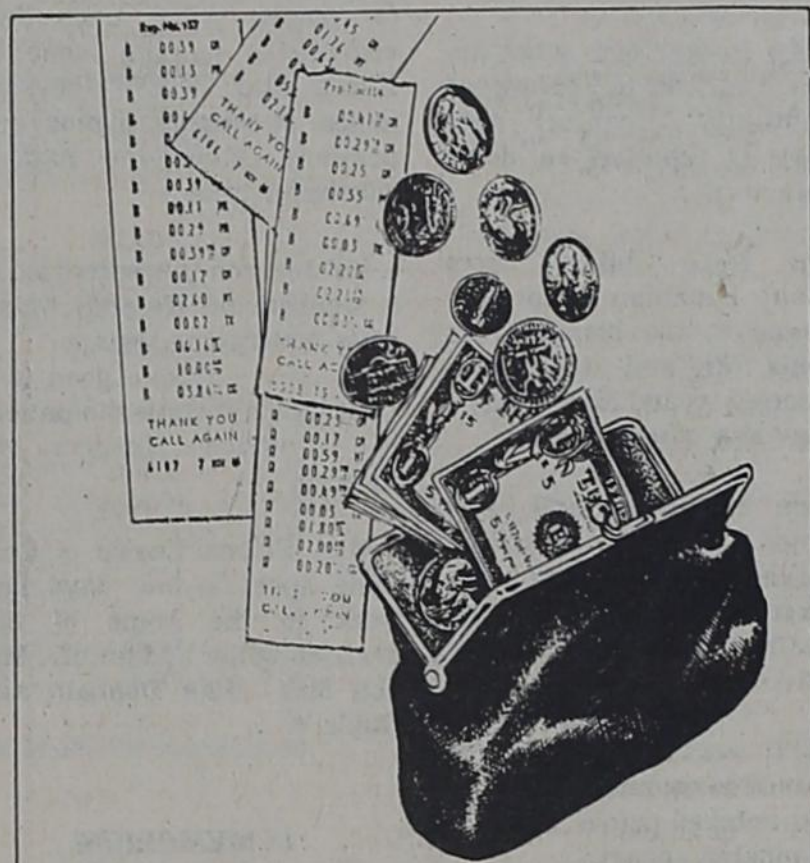

**Church of Christ**

The New Testament uses the term "church" to describe those called out of the world by the Gospel to follow Christ (2 Thessalonians 2:14). The collection of believers is also referred to as "the body of Christ" (Ephesians 5:23). This same passage makes it clear that those who are saved are in the church; otherwise stated, the "church" is the collective term for the community of the saved. Those who are saved are said to be "added" by God to it (Acts 2:47). But, how does a sinner: lost, condemned, separated from God and without hope, come to have the forgiveness of past sins, so that God can include him among the saved? No question can have greater importance and yet no question has perhaps been answered more diversely by the so-called Christian world. What does the Bible say?

First, it must be recognized that many things enter into the matter of salvation for lost humanity. There is the grace of God (Ephesians 2:8-9); there is the love of God (John 3:16); there is the shedding of Jesus' blood (Romans 5:8); Ephesians 1:7, there is the work of the Holy Spirit, in revealing the work and will of God to men, in the Gospel (Romans 1:16-17; 1 Corinthians 1:1-4; James 1:21-22) and there is the response of the sinner to all that God, Christ and the Holy Spirit have done. Salvation, in the Biblical view, is a cooperative process. God, Christ, the Holy Spirit and the individual all have a part. Just what is the sinner's response to the love and grace of God, to the life, teaching and suffering of Jesus and to the Word revealed by the Holy Spirit?

The book of Acts of Apostles presents a condensed history of the Gospel Era's beginning years, as the apostles begin to carry out Jesus' instructions. The pattern is consistent throughout the book. In each case, where a Gospel presentation is made to a group of individuals, whether Jewish or otherwise, although the basic approach may be different because of the background, the message and response requirements are the same. These we shall review, God willing, in the next article.

Dear Sis,  
I am leaving early this A.M. to purchase sewing supplies in Dallas—I will probably be gone 2 days—I have 2 recipes. Do you remember when you made this cake?

Here is a Chiffon cake recipe that is good and also easy to make. In a large bowl sift together 3 times—2 1/4 c. flour, 1 1/2 c. sugar, 3 teaspoons baking powder and 1 tsp. salt. Make a well in the center and add 1/2 c. salad oil, 5 unbeaten egg yolks, 3/4 c. cold water, 2 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 tsp. lemon extract and beat until smooth. In another large bowl, put 1 cup egg whites and 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar and beat until very stiff. Slowly pour flour mixture over egg whites and fold in with rubber spatula. Do not use PLASTIC bowl, scraper or spatula. Bake in an ungreased tube pan at 325 for 55 minutes, then increase heat to 350 for 15 minutes or until done. Let cool in pan for 1 hour. The finished cake is worth the trouble.
