

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D.C. - - AT THE END OF LAST WEEK'S comments, a distinction was drawn between public and private wrongs as a matter of responsibility between the courts and the legislative branch of the Federal Government.

THE CONSERVATIVE VIEW IS THAT public wrongs do not lend themselves to judicial solutions. Rather it is a matter of legislative initiative Mrs. G.C. Stroebel and visited . to determine questions of public policy and spending priorities. Only a broadly based representative body can bring the judgment to bear on these factors in order to place them in perspective.

MORE FUNDAMENTAL DECISIONS involving public policy matters should be made by a democratically selected and a political body directly

answerable to the people. PROPERLY, THE COURTS HAVE played a role in limiting excesses in the exercise of legislative and executive power. But, they have done so within the context of private litigation and have carefully avoided challenging governmental policy as distinguished from constitutional power to act.

IN MORE RECENT YEARS THIS traditional role of the courts has changed. More entertained jurisdiction and ruled on matters aimed at asserted public wrongs. If the Legislative Branch of Government should frustrate the desires of a group of people by rejecting their claims, the courts are asked to furnish relief. This judicial activism is not consistent with the original role the courts were fashioned for and represents a dangerous shift of power from the people, acting through their elected representatives, to judges who are answerable only to themselves. It is a trend bad for

You may wonder what this problem has to do with Higginbothams. Just this: it concerns us because it concerns you, our customer and friend. Please be safe.


I, for one, plead guilty to the charge of carelessness. And I'm guilty on several counts. How about you?

Do you have a locked cabinet anywhere it your home where you store dangerous chemicals? Can you build one or add a lock to an existing one?



Do you store foods and household products separately?


