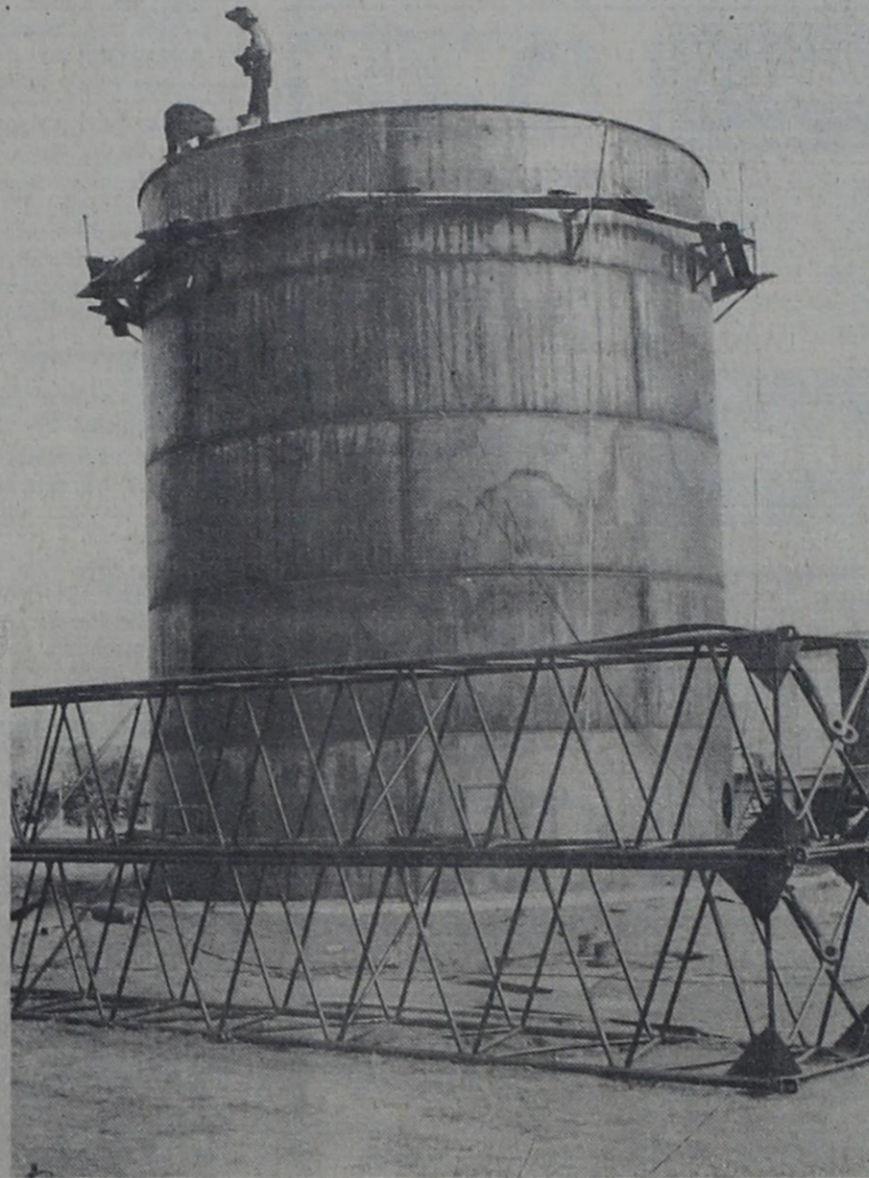

## City Installs New Water Storage And Treatment Plant



Many people have been wondering what is being assembled at City Park.

Mayor H.L. Killion stated that this is the new water storage and treatment plant for Rising Star. The facility is being installed by Bulldog Steel Company of Clyde, Texas and is expected to be complete sometime this week. Capacity for the storage tank is 100,000 gallons. The tank is 25 feet in diameter, 30 foot high and has a tank ring size of 32 feet. This will be used primarily as a back up unit in conjunction with the other storage facilities owned by the city including the 75,000 gallon capacity water tower and the 125,000 gallon tower located next to city hall, stated Curt Smith.

Once complete, the plant will be painted powder blue.

Also in progress by the City is the installation of new water and sewer lines.

Contractor for the water system is McLean Plumbing of Killeen. Utilities Specialist Inc. of Duncanville, Texas was awarded the sewer contract.

300 days has been allowed for the completion of the project by FHA. The installation is running ahead of schedule although no completion date has been announced.

Once the new sewer lines are installed, Mayor Killion stated that lines will be available to everyone in town. At present, some sections of town are not served.

**Farmers Are Eligible For Loans**  
Farmers in Eastland County are eligible to apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration for damage caused by drought and extreme temperatures. Emergency loans are made to farmers to cover losses resulting from designated major disasters. In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered production losses or physical losses to buildings or other structures. Crop production must be 20 percent or more below normal in order to qualify for loss loans. Loan applicants must be unable to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources in order to qualify. Farmers who sustained losses may apply for assistance at the local office which is located in the Eastland National Bank Building, Room 312, Eastland, Texas.

### Congressional Comment

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, re-elected without opposition to the 17th Congressional seat, said Wednesday that the national Democratic leadership "has to awaken to the need for redirecting our priorities to fit the needs of a changing country," in light of Tuesday's election results.

Stenholm, a Stamford who will be serving his second term in Congress, said the sweep of conservative victories across the country "underlines what I have been saying through my voting record for the past two years. The American people want to see this country returned to a sound fiscally responsible economic policy, returned to a strong defensive posture, returned to the dreams and promises held out to them in our Constitution and returned and to the Free Enterprise System.

Commenting on the Texas Congressional races, Stenholm said, "of course in a couple of the races, we will have to wait until the dust settles, but at this point the delegation seems to be holding its own. At the same time, the closeness of many of those races cannot be ignored."

Stenholm, taking a "wait and see" but positive attitude about working with the Reagan Administration, said on general issues such as defense and the economy "we are not far apart philosophically. Where we may differ is in how to best answer those needs, but the seriousness of the problems facing our country dictates the necessity for putting aside political differences and putting forth a united effort. Any partisan interests

must be left behind with yesterday's newspapers."

Stenholm applauded the record voter turnout nationwide, saying "no one can cry about voter apathy. The system worked the way the system was designed to work. Now it's time for those of us elected to do our part."

### Know Times To Contact Social Security

It is important that everyone in the area know the proper times to contact social security, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said recently.

Knowing the five times action is needed is too important to take for granted, Hammons said. It can mean greater security for local residents and members of their families. A person should contact social security:

- Before he or she gets a first job, because a social security number is needed to get proper credit for earnings.
- After a death in the

family, to learn if survivor benefits or a lump-sum death payment are payable.

When somebody is disabled, to find out if disability benefits are payable.

A retirement age; 65 for full cash benefits or as early as 62 for reduced payments. Sign up for Medicare 2 to 3 months before 65, even if the person has no plans to stop working.

Whenever a person has a question about social security or needs to report a change that will affect monthly benefits.

The people at any social security office can tell a person how much work he or she needs to be insured, who can qualify for benefits, how to replace a lost social security or Medicare card, how to get a free statement of his or her earnings record, or what documents are needed when a person applies for benefits.

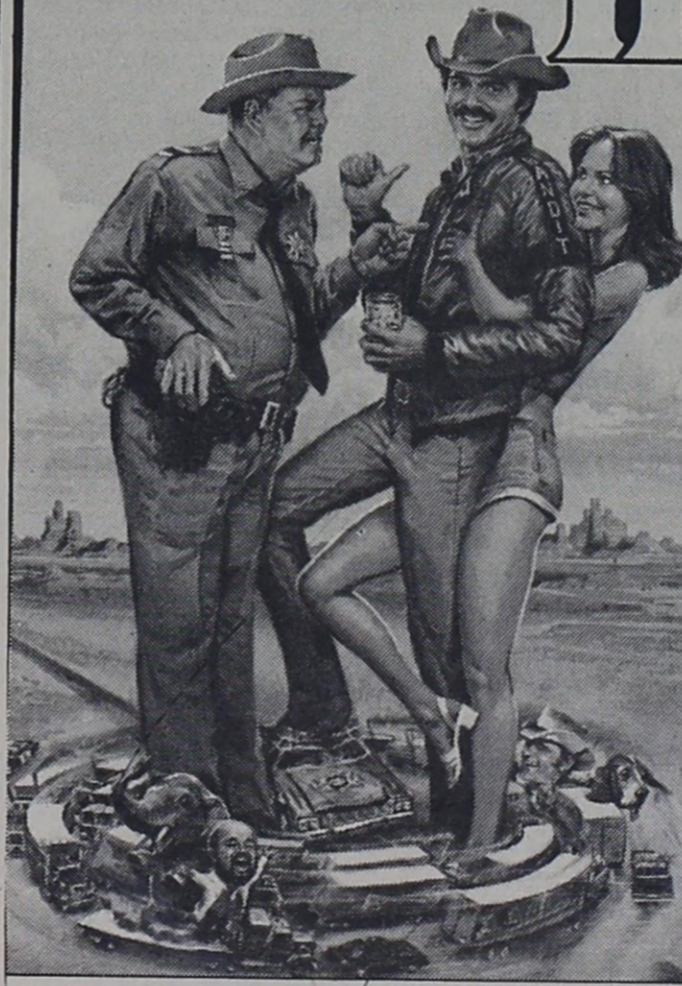

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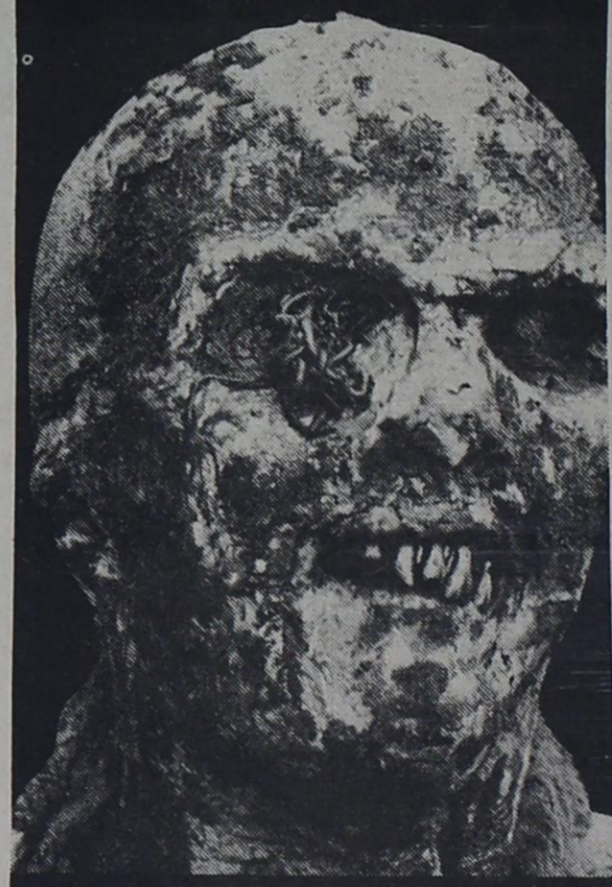

# Trying To Capture A Bottled Sunbeam

Thursday, November 13, 1980

It is a week day in Cisco, and in the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel about 150 Senior Citizens attending the Nutrition Program Luncheon are settled back for a tasty meal and visiting with friends. The atmosphere is pleasant and relaxed, like that of any good cafeteria. Director Ruth Cartee is making a wide circle somewhere among volunteers, serving trays, and long tables. The voices begin to fade as a dark haired woman heads for the stage at a lively pace. She positions the mike near the piano, radiating good cheer while fixing things. The audience knows that Program Director Annie Rendall has something good lined up.



Besides music, we have games, ceramic classes, exercise classes, and other things. These people are meeting new friends, taking more interest in life, and participating in the community more. And for me - this Program has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life."

Describing Annie Rendall is like trying to capture and bottle up a sunbeam. So you simply bask in her warm smile, notice how her brown eyes light up, and listen to her up-beat contralto voice.

First there are the announcements, ranging from happy to sad. (We're all family here," she says, "We care what happens to our people.")

And then this hearty suggestion: "Now listen here, folks, let's make these musicians welcome! You know they love us, or they wouldn't come out and give their time and music here!"

As the program continues, it is evident that Annie is absorbed in the music, engrossed in a great love of her life. "Sure I love music," she says. People and music - those are the things I love most. Along with my Church, of course."

People and music make a winning combination in this work. For Annie coordinates not only musicians - usually an individualistic lot - but the work of about 150 other devoted volunteers. Around 30 of these public-spirited folk are used each day, and Annie prides them highly.

"Those wonderful people - it does me good just to associate with them. And Ruth Cartee - she is one of the most remarkable women I have ever met. When C.J.C. started this Program, only about fifty people came. Now there are 150 regular participants, with more than 200 on special days. A number of disabled people are coming, and about 50 who are unable to carry their trays are served at a table by volunteers.

The experiences of Annie Rendall's life, rewarding and otherwise, have encompassed many things. She was born to W.Z. and Amanda Latch in Murray County, Georgia. Annie began school in Georgia, then the family moved to Queen City, Texas, and on to Cisco during the first oil boom in 1920. Annie, a vivacious child with bouncing dark curls, joined the Methodist Church at age ten. Many Cisco people still remember the Latch family and their eight outstanding children. Four of these children, besides Annie, are still living: Mary (Latch) Carey of Alaska, Lela (Latch) Lloyd of Cisco, Bill Latch of Durango, Colorado, and Paul of New Braunfels, Texas.

While Annie was growing up she loved to sing, recite poetry, and be in school programs. She also enjoyed all sorts of sports. But more than anything she wanted to be a Missionary.

She graduated from Cisco High School in 1926, and enrolled in Cisco Junior College. But about that time she met a young man named Bob Rendall, who had come from Indiana to work in the oil fields. He was a driller, he loved his work, and he soon became interested in Annie Latch. The young couple were married in 1928, and went back to Indiana to see Bob's father on their honeymoon.

"It looks like we had a long honeymoon," smiles Annie. "For we didn't come back to Texas to live until 1937. By that time we had three children! But when we got to Indiana we found that Oil

Field wages were better than in Texas. About that time the boom burst in Cisco, the depression hit, and Bob decided to hang on to a steady job."

The family weathered the depression better than most, and when it began to ease up Bob had a chance to work in Odessa. After a short time there, he took a job with Hickok Oil and Gas Co., and returned to Cisco to stay.

Bob, a devoted Christian, had great plans for his family. He wanted his children to all be Church workers and get educations. These goals seemed easy to reach until one day he was badly injured in an Oil Field accident. At that time Annie was expecting her fourth child. The baby, a girl whom they named Judy, was born a month later. About this time, also, a feed store the family owned burned one night.

Bob, surveying his situation from a hospital bed, asked one thing. "Lord, I want to live long enough to see my other children and that baby grown and educated!"

Although he was never strong again, his wish was granted. And if he could see the list of his children and grandchildren now, he would know his dream are continuing to be realized. He and Annie's daughter, Lenora Preston, of Anchorage, Alaska, graduated from Hardin-Simmons University. She is a teacher and Housemother for handicapped children. Robert Rendall graduated from Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, and presently lives in Abilene. He is a Divisional Manager for Smith Tool Co., and his wife, Pat, is a Kindergarten teacher. Mary Jane Little graduated from McMurry College, and she and her husband, Bobby, are teachers in Tyler, Texas. Judy Hall has a B.A. Degree from John Tarlton University, and teaches Physical Education. She lives in Brownwood, and her husband, Randy Hall, works for the Santa Fe Railroad.

There are ten grandchildren and two great-grandchildren among these families, and all the adults are leaders and workers in various Church congregations.

In 1950 the Rendalls began a Washateria on Avenue D in Cisco, and Annie found she enjoyed working with the public. The customers appreciated her bright smile and ready wit, and the Laun-

dry became an informal gathering place. Annie, who always participated in Methodist Church activities, often combined Bible study with tending machines, or kept needlework handy.

As the years went by she held almost every office in the Philathea Class of the First Methodist Church. She was a member of the United Methodist Women, and was given a Life Membership Pin. She was a member of the Church Prayer Group, worked with Juniors, and helped in many other projects.

In 1973 Bob Rendall died. Annie ran the Laundry for two more years, but found it more difficult. She stayed with the .25 cent per load price, but utilities were going up. It was harder, too, to replace parts for broken machines. In 1975 she sold the business and went to Alaska to visit a daughter and her photo-journalist and Author sister, Mary Carey.

"That's the only place I was ever speechless," she chuckles. "I was walking around Mary's Lodge, and met a big bear face to face!" Annie, along with her Author sister Lela Latch Lloyd, became interested in the work of the A.A.R.P. as they attended meetings in Cisco. Annie became Reporter (Public Relations Director) for the Association.

"Now I know I can't write like my sisters," she declared, "But I'm going to do the best I can."

And her best consisted of sparking, humorous accounts of various trips and projects. In 1978 Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe awarded Annie a Citation for her outstanding work with the retired people. This made her a natural for the Cisco Junior College position of Program Director for the Nutrition Project.

"And our 80 Plus Club - you wouldn't believe that we have more than 100 members in that group! And the best part is that they're enjoying life!"

The sparkle in Annie's eyes show she is enjoying life too, and will do so as long as God gives it to her.

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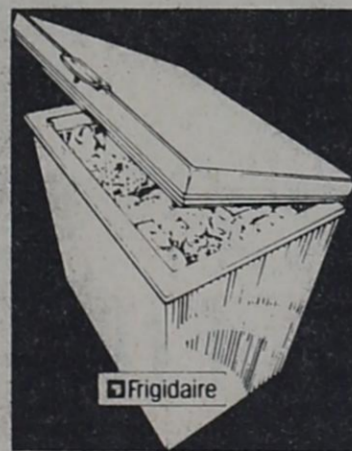

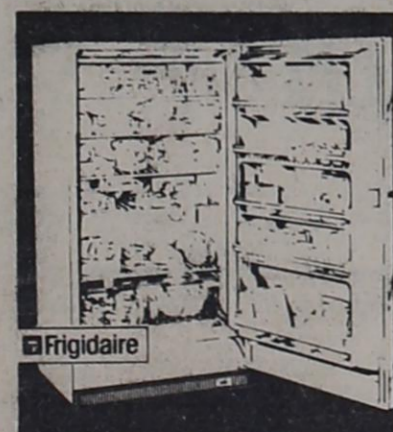

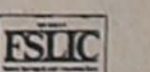
