## Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

The Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees held orientation and a regular meeting June 11 in the board room. Board member orientation Standard 12 began at 7 p.m. with Frances Agnew, Larry Wilson and Dale Wolf present. Regular session began at 8 p.m. with Pres. Larry Wilson, Vice-Pres. Tony Long, Sec. David Harris, Larry Chambers, Frances Agnew and Dale Wolf present. Gary Wilson was absent.

Others present were Dr. Donald E. Bryan, Weldon Hill, Robby Stutcliffe, Dan Goodman and Anna Ezzell, all school personnel, and Dana Mehaffey.

The minutes of the May 4 meeting were read and approved.

Dana Mehaffey of AA Investments discussed the merits of reopening and producing a well in the Rising Star ISD at AA Investments' expense in exchange for dropping taxes owed against the property. The board took no action.

Members discussed a public meeting at Education Service Center on June 26 at 7 p.m. for providing information and soliciting public input for the preliminary proposals which address the accreditation changes required by Senate Bill 417.

Supt. Bryan reported cash in bank, expenditures and revenue compared to budget.

The board went into executive session at 9:42 p.m. to discuss personnel and returned to regular meeting at 10:30. Motion by Chambers, seconded by Logn, to hire Steve Harrelson carried, as did a motion by Agnew, seconded by Wolf, to hire Don Claborn for a half day, pending state requirements being met. The board regretfully accepted the resignation of

Weldon Hill effective June 15 after 34 years of service.

The board contracted with Eastland County Appraisal District as submitted by Steve Thomas, Chief Appraiser for the county.

The first reading of Policy Update FMF (local) regarding recommended cheerleader rules and regulations was held.

Discussion regarding pay schedule for superintendent, principals, para-professionals and auxiliary personnel was postponed.

A motion by Harris, seconded by Long, to purchase mower deck and bagger for school maintenance lawn mower carried.

Two student transfers that were inadvertently omitted from the transfer list submitted to Texas Education Agency on May 1 were voted to be included.

Any person that wishes to view the counted ballots of the school trustee election may do so 60 days after the election. You may come to the Rising Star ISD business office on or about July 5-9. After these dates all ballots will be destroyed. All requests must be in writing.

Agnew was designated as delegate and Wolf as alternate to the TASB/TASA Convention that will be held in Houston Sept. 22.

Education Service Center contract including Learning Resource Center, Administrative Technical Assistance, Gifted and Talented, Drug Free Coop, RSCCC Business Services and RSCCC Student Services was accepted.

A Chapter I Improvement Plan submitted by Chapter I and II Advisory Committee was reviewed. Recommendations of financial expenditures were addressed.

Meeting adjourned at 12:25 a.m.

## County Commissioners:

## Soil Conservation Service Flood Agreements Signed

Eastland County Commissioners Monday signed emergency flood agreements with Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service.

The County is expected to receive just under \$100,000 in federal assistance for labor and materials on roads and bridges in Pct. 2. This Precinct was badly damaged by flooding earlier this year, with many roads needing extensive rebuilding.

Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, was designated Project Manager of the road repair. Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, was named Alternate Project Manager.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that after paperwork is submitted the county should receive a check in about three weeks.

In other business, the Commissioners approved another service contract with Kirbo Typewriter Co. of Brownwood on the county's 28 typewriters. These machines will be maintained at a cost of \$89.59 per typewriter per year.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, reported that the county jail has 15 prisoners, and seven of these belong to the state. He said that everything was 'clean and in good shape' at the jail.

The Commissioners voted to award Steve Thomas of the County Tax Appraisal Office a contract for tax assessment services.

On other matters, the Commissioners signed a Resolution against an increase in postal rates, calling it 'double taxation.' Strong opposition was expressed on the proposed raise.

After a recess at noon, the Commissioners met again during the afternoon to review budget requests from various Departments. A Public Hearing on the proposed budget for 1990-91 is expected to be held June 25.

At Monday's Commissioners Court meeting the Com-

missioners and County Judge Scott Bailey signed a Resolution stating that they are against an increase in postal rates. The resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service has filed notice for an increase in postage rates to be effective upon the approval of all appropriate bodies, and

WHEREAS, such a postal increase will mandate a significant financial impact on local county governments who provide such essential local services as voter registration forms, jury duty summonses and pay, tax notices, payments for JTPA and other Federal or special service programs, and

WHEREAS, in essence, such a postal increase will thus be a form of 'double taxation' on local taxpayers, for required governmental services, and

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service and local county governments should be working toward the mutual benefit of local taxpayers

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eastland County Commissioners' Court does hereby urge the United States Postal Service to create a 'local government postal rate' as part of its current rate filing in an effort to eliminate a potential federal mandate to increase local tax rates due to an increase in postal rates.

Judge Bailey reported that the Texas Association of Counties has sent copies of this Resolution to all 254 counties in the state. Commissioners Courts which pass the Resolution are being asked to forward it to Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank, Washington, D.C.

During the May 24 meeting of the Texas Association of Counties Board of Directors a Resolution was also passed requesting that the Postmaster General establish a 'local government postal rate' for county governments.

## Memorial Erected on Courthouse Lawn



Dave Evans of Wilson, Texas and Gerald Willis are pictured by the white marble bench erected on the Courthouse lawn in memory of Troy Willis, Court Baliff. Dave Evans served with Troy Willis in Italy during WWII. Gerald Willis, Troy's brother, lives at Lake Leon.

An enduring tribute to Troy Willis, 91st District Court Baliff, now stands on the northeast side of the Courthouse lawn.

This classic bench of white Georgia marble was erected there on May 15, a memorial gift from Gerald and Inez Willis, brother and sister-in-law of the deceased.

The 6 ft. long bench stands in the shade of a big pecan tree, and is clearly visible from the street. One side is inscribed with the name of the person honored, and the other with the donors.

Troy Willis devoted much

of his adult life to law enforcement. After his retirement several years ago from the Taylor County Sheriff's Department he moved to Lake Leon.

In 1987 he was appointed by Judge Jim Wright as a Baliff for the 91st District Court. He served there until his death Jan. 2, 1989.

This week a long-time friend of Troy Willis, Dave Evans of Wilson, Texas, stopped by to view the beautiful memorial. Evans served with Troy Willis in Italy during World War II, stationed with a Reconnaissance (Cavalry) Unit of the 10th Mountain Division.

## Dental Dialogue

### The Best Toothbrush

**Q.** What is the best type of toothbrush for an adult?

**A.** There are many kinds of toothbrushes available on the market. The A. D. A. recommends a soft bristle brush with rounded ends, a flat brushing surface, and a straight handle. Try to select a brush that has a small enough head to fit into your mouth without causing injury, yet still reach all your teeth easily. If you have a particularly small mouth, you may want to purchase a child-size brush. Another feature to look for is whether the handle will fit comfortably in your hand. Some brushes have a rubber tip to clean between the teeth, but if you are brushing and flossing properly, such an option isn't necessary.

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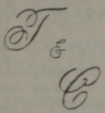
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# Cancer Patient Conference Successful

Karol Hoffmann of Eastland was in charge of the beautiful decorations for the luncheon.

Persons from a wide area attended the Conference. Houston, Eastland, Cisco, Abilene, Granbury, Anson, Millsap, Breckenridge, Coleman, Albany, Stephenville, South Bend, Ranger — all were represented.

It truly was a day of joint caring and interest - one that can happen again as long as so many people are involved and are concerned about a better life for all cancer patients."

She adds that the Anderson Network offers many avenues of support for the cancer patient, especially those who are being referred to M.D. Anderson Cancer Center or who are presently patients at the Center. 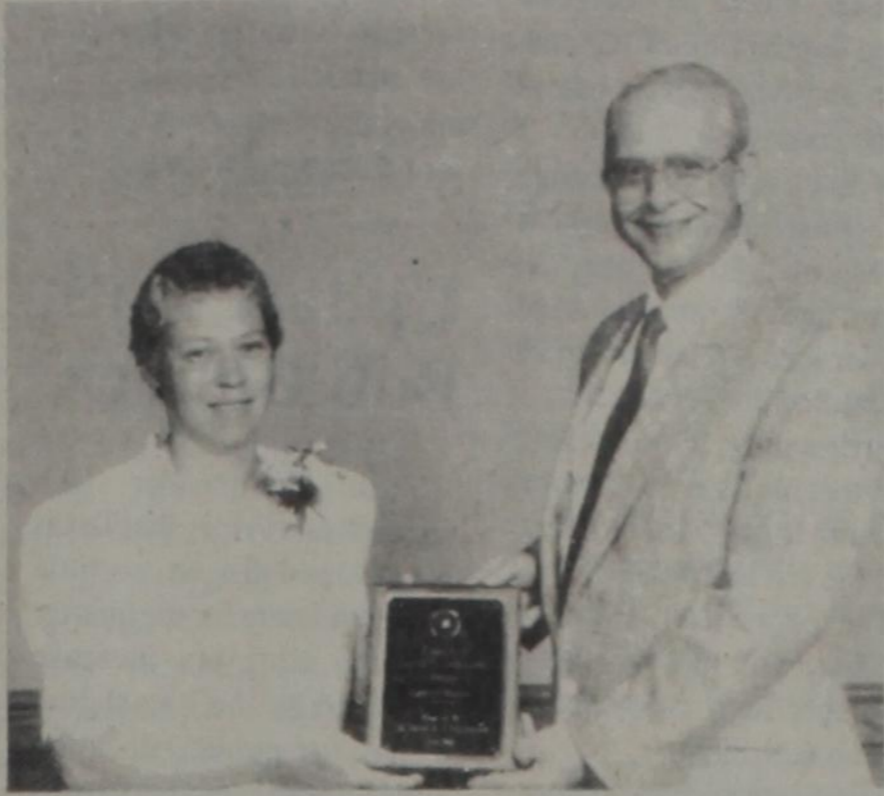

## Pharmacy Topics

One key to adult-onset diabetes, says a biochemist at the United States Department of Agriculture, is a deficiency in chromium, the mineral that augments insulin activity. To increase chromium uptake, eat more whole grains, meats, fruits and vegetables and less sweets.

New technique to repair brain aneurysm has been developed by a doctor at the University of California/San Francisco. Balloon-tipped catheter is threaded through the groin artery to the brain, then a quick-hardening polymer is injected into the balloon to form a plug which remains in place after the catheter is removed.

To reduce the stress that may accompany dental appointments, a University of Cincinnati study offered an eight-minute tape that described what would happen at the next visit, and taught how to replace negative thoughts with pleasant ones.

New protection against poison ivy is in the works. A spray-on clay (it doesn't show) is said to be 95 percent effective and will be available in two years. Current barrier creams offer 60 percent protection.

# Help Available For Expecting Singles

When an unmarried woman, often a teenager, suspects that she is pregnant, to whom does she turn?

An effort supported by area churches and staffed by volunteers is providing answers. It is the Pregnancy Counseling Service of Abilene, with an active arm in Eastland County.

Pregnancy testing and counseling are offered to the

women and girls who are needing to make decisions, decisions which will affect them for the rest of their lives. They often feel that they can't turn to relatives and may even fear that relatives will reject them.

The possibility of a baby in their lives raises questions and problems for the women, who often feel that they don't want or can't provide for a child.

Pregnancy Counseling Service offers the women choices, and tries to encourage the women to make up their own minds. The women are informed about adoption agencies, and assisted in arranging for counseling.

The Service may assist the women in obtaining medical care, and women with limited finances who choose to keep their babies may be helped with some of their needs.

Celia Shackelford, wife of a minister, is the Eastland County representative for the Counseling Service. Richard

Watson, Pastor of the New Hope Baptist Church has also been involved as have others in the county.

Women may call to arrange for counseling, and many do. In March 180 women, 30 under age 18, and in April 179 women, 20 under age 18 utilized of the Service.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas businesses will have very little time to prepare for the quarter percent sales tax increase approved by the Legislature to pay for public education and human services pro-

grams. "We will do everything possible to help businesses and merchants with this rate change," Bullock said. "The short amount of time puts a very heavy burden on the 467,000 businesses that collect sales tax from their customers."

The sales tax increase, signed by Governor Clements on Thursday, takes effect July 1. It raises the state sales tax from 6 percent to 6 1/4 percent. With local sales tax added, the new maximum will be 8 1/4 percent.

Bullock is mailing a post-

card notice to all sales tax permit holders Friday to notify them of the change. New 6 1/4 percent and 8 1/4 percent rate cards have been printed and will be available in all 33 Comptroller offices throughout the state next week. A new listing of the combined state and local sales tax rates for every city in the state will be available by June 18.

"Unfortunately businesses will have to make this change almost overnight," Bullock said.

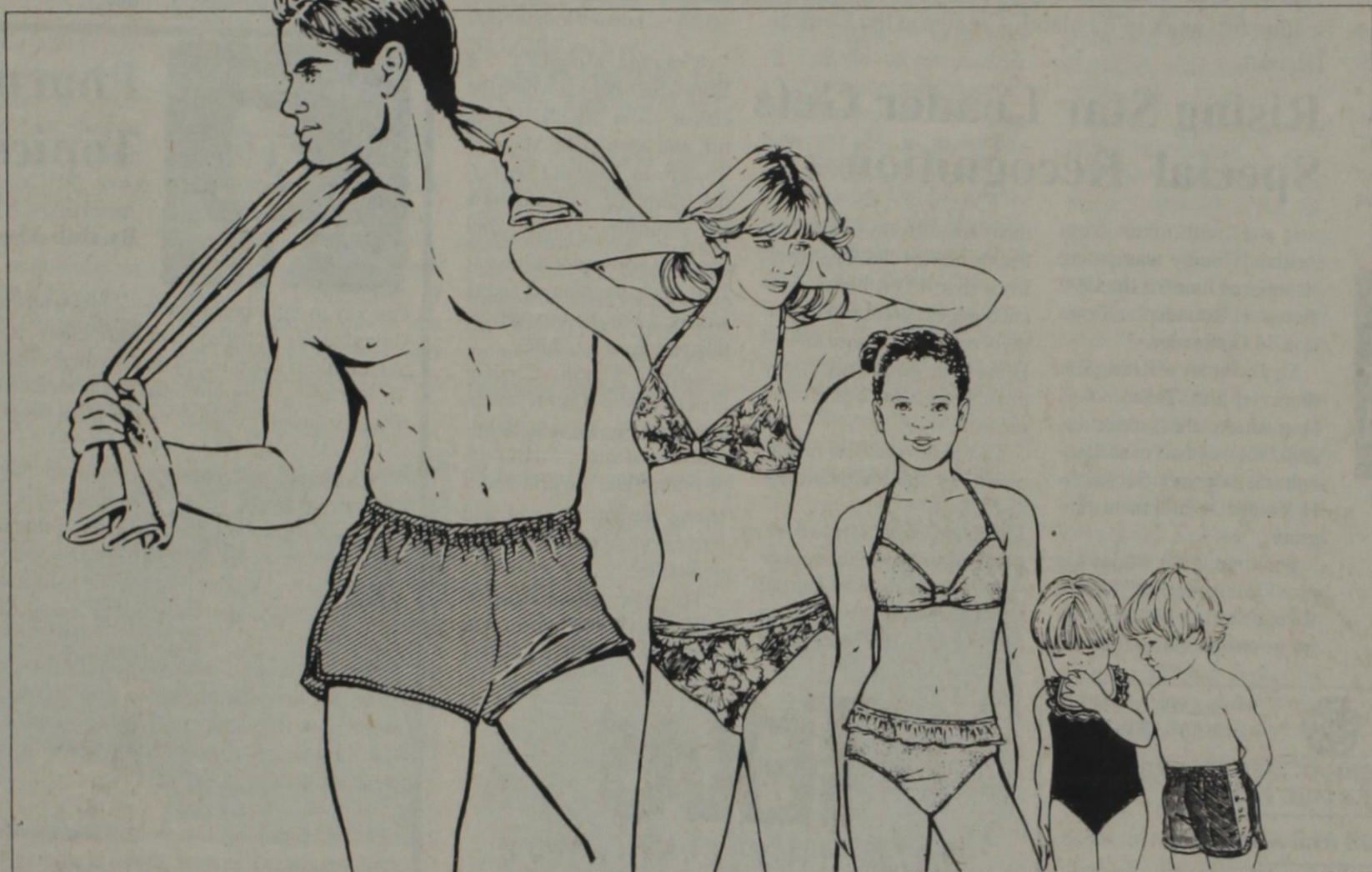

## TDA Releases The 1990 'Texas Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory'

"Hunting has always been a way of life for many Texans. The sale of hunting leases is helping many Texas farmers and ranchers make a living, and the publication of the 1990 edition of the "Texas Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory" will assist a growing number of rural Texans in making use of this valuable source of extra income," Deputy State Agriculture Commissioner Mike Moeller announced today.

The 1990 directory, along with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Deer

Hunting Lease Register, lists 956 available leases covering a total of 4.3 million acres in every region of Texas. The 118-page directory, which is available free of charge, is a joint project TDA and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Interested hunters and rural landowners will receive copies of the directory upon request.

"More than 200 listings in this year's edition of the directory are new, and a large number of these listings have never been hunted on a lease basis before," Moeller said.

"The directory listings are arranged by county in alphabetical order, and the directory includes a wide range of fish and game. Hunters can find leases to hunt and fish for wild turkey, bass, catfish, javelina, and whitetail deer. We've also got listings for exotic game species like axis deer and blackbuck antelope. The listings also include useful information such as the location of the nearest airports and hotels, as well as services and amenities provided on leases.

"The four-year-old Clear-

inghouse program has become popular with hunters and rural landowners alike. More than 1.3 million Texans hold hunting licenses, and land capable of producing huntable wildlife is limited. The directory puts hunters in contact with rural landowners who need the additional income generated by hunting leases. In previous years, farmers and ranchers who leased their land through the clearinghouse program added an average of \$2,200 to their income. Hunting leases generate about \$146 million each year for Texas farmers and ranchers. As the demand for hunting leases increases, many rural landowners are putting more emphasis on

wildlife management practices in order to satisfy this demand," Moeller said.

Farmers and ranchers with land available to lease may apply to the Texas Department of Agriculture for a free listing in the directory. Applications for inclusion in the directory are accepted throughout the year.
