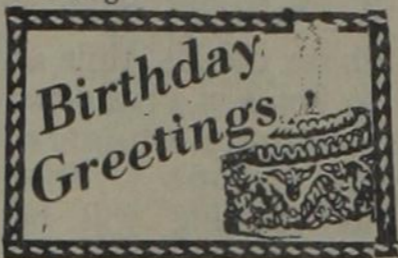

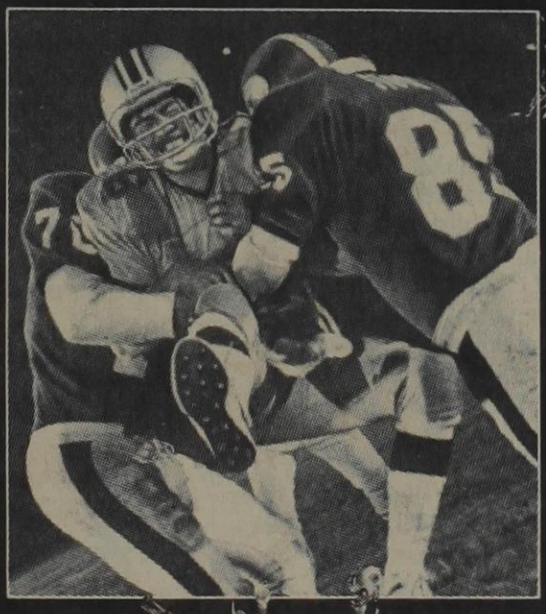

 In a small space we will endeavor to give a brief history of the 1949 Wildcats...Regional III Champs for the second

consecutive year.

Never before in the history of Rising Star has the high school and town received so much favorable publicity. Never has a football team of this school played the game before so many fans.

It was our opinion last year that the Wildcats of '48 were as good as we would ever have, but time proved us wrong in our prediction. The Wildcats of '49 were in our opinion, the best Class B football squad we have ever had the privilege to watch.

Along with playing before huge crowds of fans, this team was scouted by nearly all of the larger universities of the Southwest conference and we feel that we are safe in predicting that several of the members of this team will be heard from in college and professional football before their careers are finished.

Before going into the game-by-game history of the season, we believe that a word should be said here about what caused this team to be "GREAT." After winning the Bi-District Crown the 'CATS advanced to the REGIONAL battle—the highest in Class B football and found themselves pitted against a strong Eleven from Rule. Again playing in Lion Stadium in Brownwood, the 'CATS won the REGIONAL CROWN after battling to a 32-20 victory.
