Ranger Field Brings In A Pair Of New Producers

A pair of new producers for a 1,400-ft. Eastland Counhave been brought on line by Ridge Oil of Breckenridge in Eastland County's Northwest Ranger Field.

The new wells are designated as the Nos. 1 and 2 Hodges, pumping 76 and 81 barrels of oil per day, respectively. Location is in a 97-acre lease in the BBB&CRR Survey, A-663.

Ridge took the No. 1 Well to 3,550-ft. bottom and perforated for production 3,194 to 3,335 feet into the hole. The No. 2 bottomed at an even 3,600 feet and will produce 3,214 to 3,355 feet into the hole. Both wells will produce from the Marble Falls Formation.

Tax Payment DIC

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to make estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says. Generally, if you have income, with no tax withheld, of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$300 on this year's return, you are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax and for making payments. Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return,

Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments.

For 1983, the four estimated tax installment dates are: April 15, 1983; June 15, 1983; September 15, 1983; and January 16, 1984.


