It would be difficult to say who profited most from the benefit softball game between teams of local merchants at the City Park Little League field last Saturday night—the Boy Scouts, who realized \$36 for their new hut, the spectators, who had a fun-fest, or the players, who came out wiser than they went in.

It is true that the teams, "The East Side Nickle Nurses" and the "West Side Money Grubbers," had a ball literally and figuratively.

Physically the ball was liberally and often illegally used and the scoreboard was about as honest as a swindler's conscience.

The umpiring, for all that it had the appearance of legality, was about as effective as a political argument. Decisions, for the most part, were arrived at by a consensus of opinion, the weight of it having nothing at all to do with morality or rule, but solely with the ability of one side or the other to shout the loudest.

It is worthy of note that none of the participants were ejected by decree. As a matter of fact there were more "injections" than "ejections", one team or the other having at times as many as 17 or 18 players on the diamond.

Even so, for all this saturation of right, left and center field, a fly caught was a miracle performed, and a hot grounder—comparatively speaking, of course—left as many human indignities sprawled upon the sun-browned turf as there were heroic efforts to stop it.

Most of those who left the game did so wisely and voluntarily. A lot of middle-aged Rising Star business men discovered—later, if not sooner—that it is nice and romantic to think 20 years so long as you don't make a contract at 40.

The spectators liked it. There were demands for a repeat performance. But it can be said with authority that there will be no return engagement for some six or eight months.

It is going to take the players that long to recover.

In the case of the Rising Star Wildcats, in their season-opener with the Melvin Bulldogs last Friday night, the game wasn't won until then. The Wildcats were ahead of their visiting opponents for less than two minutes of the game, but it was enough to win the game.

It was a contest reminiscent in many respects of a well-played professional game. It started off as a scoring fest, settled down to a battle of defense, and ended in a well-ought perfect field goal attack from the 15-yard line as the final quarter drew to a close. There were very few errors.

Frazier Clark, 160-pound junior Wildcat tackle, drew the hero's role in subduing the Bulldogs who have always been tough for the Wildcats. He had plenty of help, including Terry Gey, junior quarterback, who, although injured in practice during the week and used only on offense, engineered two touchdowns to put the Wildcats within field goal distance of the victory. There were Bill Clark and Danny Wooley, whose fine running kept the Cats in the game despite an eight point deficit for most of time, and there was also Kenney Butler, the only nonletterman on the starting eleven, whose line smashes gained valuable yardage and kept the visiting defense thoroughly and apprehensively honest.

Touring the Land of Manana...

EDITOR'S NOTE — Following is the first installment of an account of a vacation trip to Mexico this summer made by Mr. and Mrs. Marion West. Other installments will follow.

(First I will give a short description of the country and then describe some of the points of interest we visited during our vacation trip to Old Mexico.)

Mexico is a country in North America, on the southern border of the United States. It is more than 760,000 square miles in area, almost three times as large as Texas, and more than twenty-seven million people live there, four times as many as live in Texas. Many of the people of Mexico live and work as their ancestors did, in little villages.

Visiting these villages is like going back many centuries in time, but parts of Mexico, for example the Capital, Mexico City are very modern. Many people go to Mexico for vacations because of the

beautiful scenery and to see the ancient remains of the highly civilized Maya and Aztec Indians who lived there long before white men came.

Most of two-thirds of the Mexican people are a mixed race. They have ancestors who were American Indians and some who were Europeans from Spain. These people are called "Mestizas." A smaller group are pure-blooded Indians. They have not intermarried with the Spanish and have kept their own customs and ways of living. A still smaller group are members of families that came from Spain, the United States, and Canada. Most of the Mexican people belong to the Roman Catholic Church. They speak Spanish, but it is mingled with many Indian dialects.

Many Mexicans also speak and understand English, especially in Northern Mexico. There is a great difference in the way various groups of Mexicans live. Some of the people are very rich. They live in beautiful Spanish-style houses. Usually such a house has white columns in front, an open bal-

cony on its second story, and an inner courtyard, or patio, where flowers and vines grow and where the family can gather to eat and entertain guests.

Most of the Mexicans are very poor. They earn only about one hundred and fifty dollars a year, which is less than the average person in the United States makes in a month.

The Mexicans live in houses made of sun-dried bricks of mud and straw, called "adobe". These houses usually have no windows and are not very comfortable. The people have very little furniture and sleep on the floor or on straw mats.

The Mexican worker most often wears a pair of cotton trousers, a shirt, a wide brimmed straw hat, and a pair of sandals or goes barefooted. A Mexican woman wears a blouse and full-length skirt, with a shawl called a rebozo, on her head. She usually goes barefooted. A woman is not seen in Mexico wearing shorts or slacks.

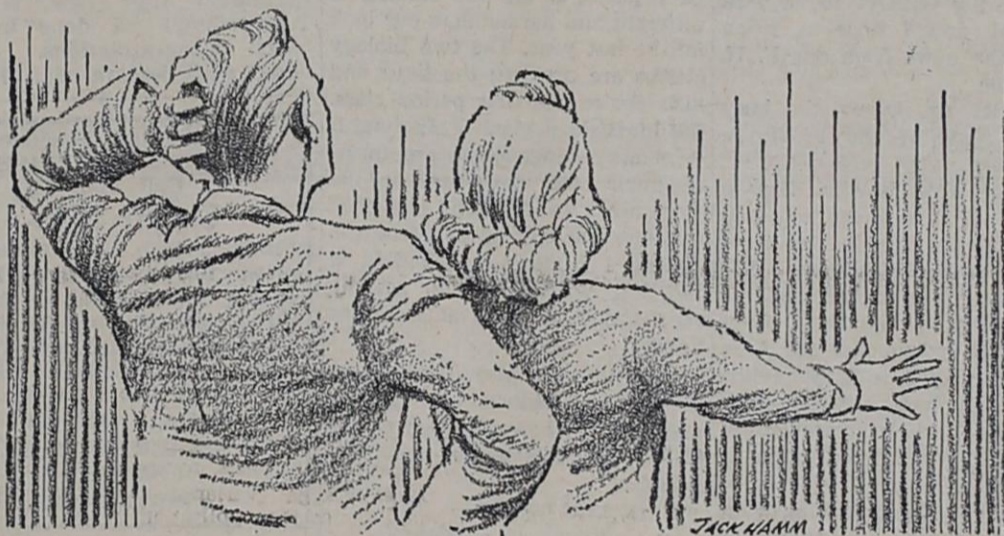

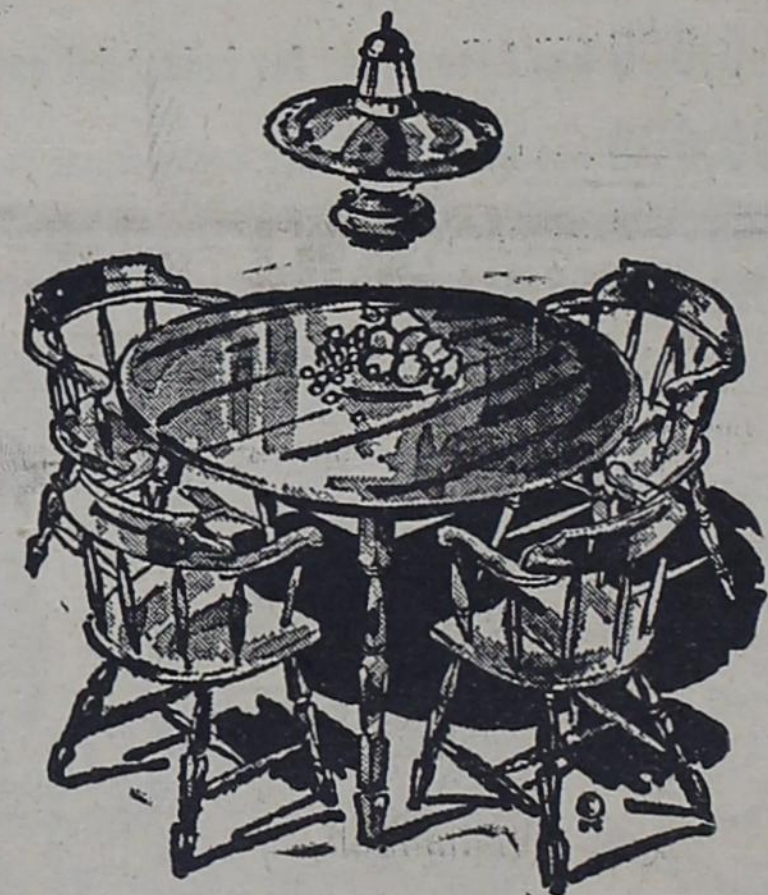

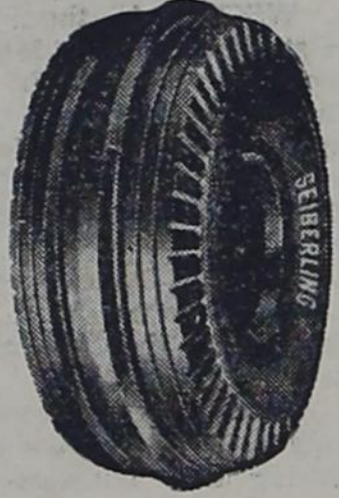
