County Commissioners

The Eastland County Commissioners Court had a full house for their meeting on Monday, Feb. 13. Tax collection lawyers, bankers, citizens with road problems, State Highway officials and others were present. At times they listened and at other times participated in the lengthy discussions morning and afternoon.

One of the first items on the agenda concerned the awarding of bids for the County Depository and Trust Funds for the District and County Clerks.

The Commissioners voted to place the County Clerk's account and trust funds with Olney Savings, under the condition of their bid. First National Bank of Cisco will serve as the County's Depository, and Eastland National Bank will hold the District Clerk's accounts and trust funds.

On another matter, the Commissioners decided to continue the contract with Pritchard & Abbot, Inc. for On-Line Tax Collection services. Attorney Jim Pritchard spoke to the Court, telling of alternate plans to up-date the service.

County Judge Scott Bailey questioned Pritchard as to why taxes due years ago would now show up on statements, with firms and individuals saying they were never informed in the year the taxes were due.

Pritchard said this was an "unfortunate situation," and listed several possible causes.

The Commissioners said they were presently under a contract with the Austin Tax Collection firm of McCreary, Veselka, Beck and Allen to collect delinquent taxes for the County and would honor this. Representatives of this firm were in the courtroom, and described their activities in searching out delinquencies and collecting.

Elliot Beck said the firm had mailed out 10,605 letters during the past year, filed 119 suits, and collected \$87,762 for the county.

During the morning a number of citizens appeared before the Commissioners to ask for improvement to a stretch of road on the South side of Lake Leon. Earl Trout

and Georgia Hunter spoke for the group, telling of a narrow and dangerous stretch of dirt road about 1 1/2 miles long near the Lake.

Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. J, agreed with the statements as to the condition of the road, and said fixing this roadway was top priority in his schedule. He mentioned some of the difficulty in working on road in this area, where rain or an overflow from the lake could hinder large machinery.

The citizens seemed to agree that all the conditions that were not Christian's fault. They mentioned some large mesquite bushes growing in the bar ditches - showing that the ditches hadn't been cleared out there for many years.

In other road-related matters, citizens told the Commissioners of trouble with access to Center Point Cemetery, in Pct. 3 south of Carbon. Reportedly there is just one way into the Cemetery at present, on the south side. Commissioner L.T. Owen put a cattle guard on the north side and someone placed a gate across it.

Information on a plat which will apparently be subdivided was presented to the Commissioners by Dick Johnson. This 27.7 acres is in SE/4 of Sect. 94, Block 3, H&TC, A-1378, Eastland County. It lies off Highway 206 just southeast of the Nimrod Community.

The motion was made and approved to accept the plat, with the stipulation that the county not accept any obligation to build or maintain roads in the development.

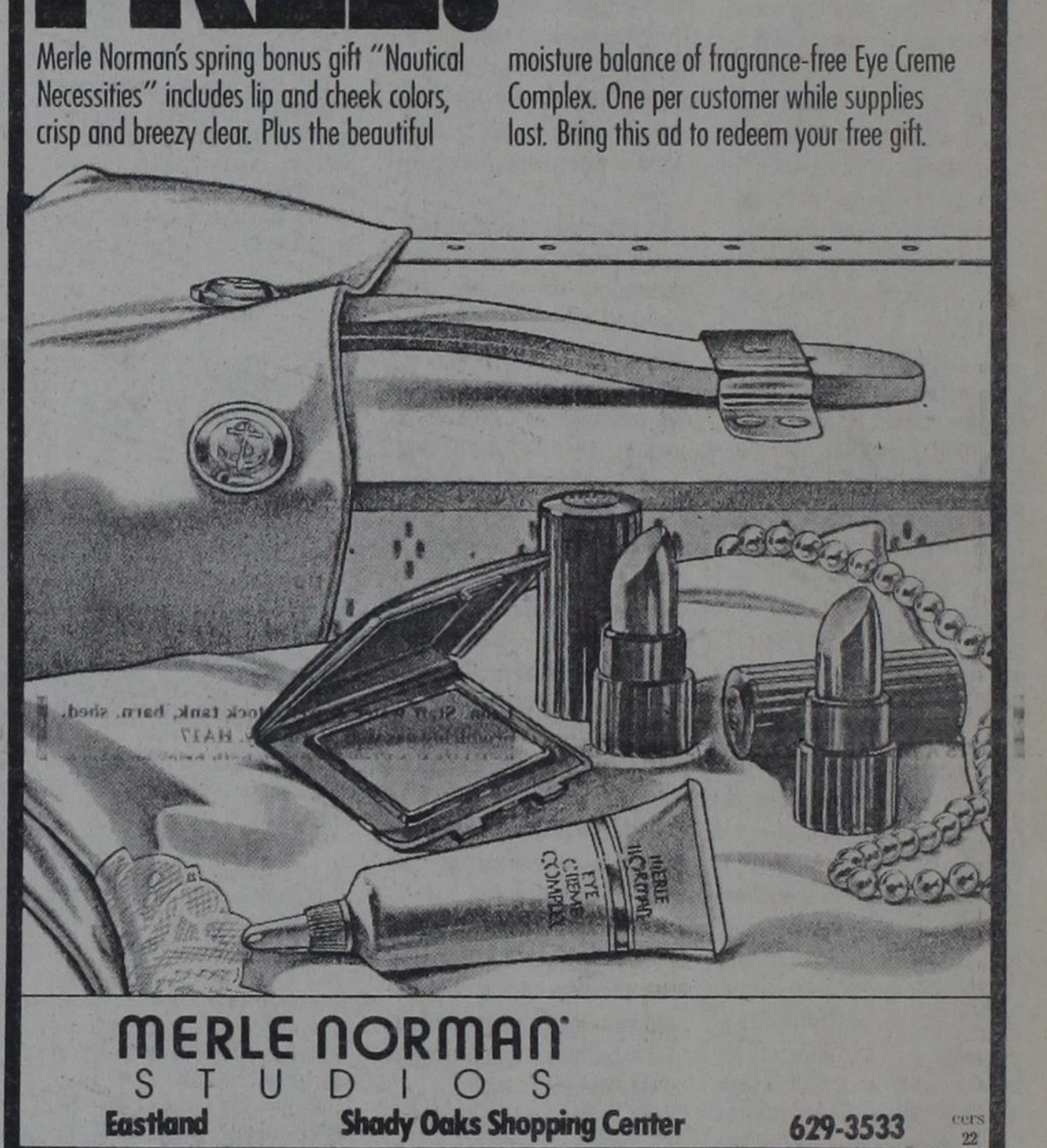

As always, when a youth wins a major steer show, speculation about what to do with the prize money begins.

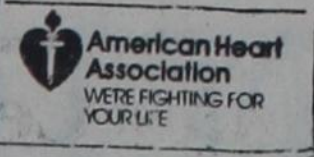
"It'll go in my college fund - whatever I get," she said. Last year's grand champion
