

## Exemption **Forms** Available

Eastland County property owners wishing to sign up for 1987 property tax exemptions and/or special land valuations may obtain the necessary application forms at the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District in the Eastland County Cour-

The completed applications must be on file with the Appraisal District by May 1, 1987, if they are to be allowed for the 1987 tax year.

A list of several of the exemptions available appears at the end of this article. If a property owner has any questions as to his or her eligibility, they should contact the Appraisal District for assistance.

It is emphasized that a Residential Homestead exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If the residential homestead owner still resides in the same house for 1987 that he or she lived in for 1986; they do not have to file again if they received the exemption on the property in 1986. An exception to this would be the residential homeowner who turned 65 years of age before January 1, 1987; they need to sign up for the Over-65 exemtpion that is available for Over-65 homeowners.

If you have any doubts as to whether you are receiving a Homestead exemption or as to your eligibility, please contact the Appraisal District. The Appraisal District office is located on the second floor of the **Eastland County Courthouse** and the telephone number is

A number of leaders in Eastland County agriculture and community life attended the Extension Program Council dinner at K-Bob's Restaurant on Feb. 12.







## **Hundreds Of Texas Children Need Homes**

Hundreds of Texas children need homes, some temporary, some forever. The Texas Department of Human Services is searching for individuals and families who can provide

homes for these children. Who are these children? Where do they come from? These are children who have been severely abused and neglected and have had to be removed from their biological parents for their own protection. They are children who have been traumatized by very poor parenting practices and most show the effects of chaos, cruelty or disinterest and neglect. They range in age from birth to seventeen, They come from all ethnic groups. They usually have special needs resulting from their damaged background, from physical handicaps to learning difficulties to emotional and social adjustment problems. Many have been sexually exploited, which creates a whole spectrum of special problems for children, and their caretakers.

What kinds of homes are needed for these children? There is a critical need for individuals and familes who will be willing to be licensed as foster homes. These homes receive these children in an emergency situation when they have been removed by a court order from their parents. These homes work toward healing broken hearts and often broken bodies of very traumatized children while Children's Protective Services workers work toward developing a permanent plan for these children to grow up safely. Foster parents are there for children at a time of critical need and have an opportunity to really love and nurture them through a frightening and confusing time. Foster parents are reinbursed for this care at he rate of \$8 a day from birth to age 9 and \$9 a day for ages 10 through 17. All medical expenses are


Adoptive homes are needed also. Some of these children will become free for adoption and permanent homes are needed for them. It is much less expensive to adopt through the Texas Department of Human Services than through private agencies. The children available for adoption are these children who have been through much tragedy and have special needs. They are older children, usually school age, sometimes even up to teenagers, before they become free for adoption. There is a real need for adoptive homes for older children, minority children, and children with special needs. Incidently, many foster parents also adopt, so the program is not mutually exclusive.

A growing number of individuals are licensed as foster parents who are also interested in adoption. This makes it possible for the agency to place a child who is likely to become free for adoption into a "Legal Risk" foster home when they initially come into protective care, in order to reduce the number of homes that the child a ust adjust to. This can bear a extremely helpful program for a child, and there is a need for many, many more families and individuals who would be willing to participate in it.

Single persons, families, working mothers, grandparents will all be considered as possible resoucres for children needing a safe, nurturing home. Training will be provided to meet the needs of abused and neglected children. The need for homes for these children, some temporary, some forever, is

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## Senator Glasgow Report From Austin

Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) has announced that the Texas Senate is in high gear as several bills have been passed out of the Senate and on to the House of Represen-

The Senator stated that Senate Bill 215 was passed in response to the current prison crisis. The Texas Department of Corrections is present under contempt order issued by Judge

William Wayne Justice and if the TDC is out of compliance with the Judge's order on March 31, 1987. fines against the State could total as much as \$24 million a month.

Glasgow stated that the bill will address three major problems relating to the prison crisis: "to ease overcrowding and stabilize the prison population, to emphasize alternatives to TDC incarceration, and to correct

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current release policies that endanger the citizenry."

The bill provides for the creation of an "intensive supervision parole" system for those inmates serving a sentence for ten years or less and who would pose no harm to the public. The bill further provides for certain procedures to be followed when the TDC inmate population reaches the 95% capacity level. District Judges would be given wider latitude to authorize intensive probation and extension of probation in lieu of revocation of probation. Other measures authorized by the bill include surveillance parole, home confinement, and electronic monitoring of inmates. Probation officers could modify certain terms and restrictions imposed as conditions

of probation. Another bill passed by the Senate, Senate Bill 16, would establish hospital protocol and procedures for identifying potential organ and tissue donors and for informing potential donors of the option to donate. "This bill could have a significant impact on the lives of those who are waiting for organ and tissue transplants," Glasgow said.

Senate Bill 172 would exempt lump sum awards and benefits under a life, health, or accident insurance policy from execution or other legal process. Current law exempts insurance payments or benefits only if tendered to the beneficiaries on a weekly, monthly or other periodic basis. This will treat lump sum awards to insurance beneficiaries the same as those made in installment payments.



## **Emergency Farm Loan Applications**

Applications for emergency loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eastland, FmHA County Supervisor, Jack Phillips said today

Eastland County is one of twenty in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from adverse weather conditions. Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for

The Emergency Loan Program Question and Answer **Fact Sheet** 

1. After a county is eligible, who can get a loan?

An established farm operator who is a citizen of the United States, is of good character; can show evidence of having suffered a qualifying physical or production loss; has adequate security and repayment ability.

2. What is a qualifying production loss? Loss of at least 30 percent

below a normal year's production. 3. How much can an eligi-

ble farmer borrow? Up to 80 percent of actual production loss or \$500,000 or enough for next year's operation whichever is less but not more than is actually

needed. 4. What is the interest rate?

For borrowers unable to obtain credit from a private lending institution, the rate is 4.5 percent.

5. What can the money be used for?

To restore property, pay production costs, pay delinquent debts, pay living expenses, repair buildings, buy equipment and refinance

6. How long can the loan

The term is based on the type of loss, use of loan funds, type of collateral and borrower's repayment ability. Production losses are normally up to 7 years; real estate normally is required as security for longer terms. 7. How is PIK counted?

Any acreage unplanted of PIK (Payment-In-Kind) or conservation reserve is counted as having produced a year's normal production in determining actual loss.

8. How are prices determined for production losses? "The average monthly price in effect for the previous year" is the

guideline - as required by congressionallymandated Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981. Prices are obtained from the statistical Reporting Service, USDA.

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




