Surrogate Parents Are Needed Here

A surrogate parent is required when a student's parents are unknown or cannot be found, or the student is a legal ward of the state. A surrogate parent represents the student as a parent would in all matters of identification, evaluation, educational placement and provision of a free, appropriate public education.

Requirements: You cannot work for a place or be related to the people that take care of the student. You will have knowledge and skills that make sure you can represent the interests of the student.

Responsibilities: Attend Surrogate Parent training

sessions. Learn about the student's needs, educational background and handicap. Represent the student in the identification, evaluation, educational placement and provision of an appropriate public education. You have all the rights of natural parents in getting a free appropriate public education for your child. This is only twice during the school year.

The training sessions will be held March 5 and 12, from 2:30-4:30 p.m. at the RSISD Tax Office on N. Main St.

City/School Will Take Ballot Applications

The terms of three members of the Rising Star Independent School District Board of Directors will expire this year. The election will be May 5 and applications may be made to secure a place on the ballot beginning February 19.

The terms of Ronnie Green, Gary Wilson and Dr. Charles Barnes will expire. Applications may be pick-

ed up at the school office on N. Main Street.

Three places on the Rising Star City Council will be vacated this year. They are held by Cole White, Clinton Crisp and E.L. "Moose" Vaughn.

The election will be held May 5. Applications for a place on the ballot may be picked up at City Hall beginning February 19.

PTO Reverses Financial Decisions

Despite recommendations of the finance committee, the Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO) assembly that met Tues., Feb. 13, both dismissed and added items to the proposed expenditure list.

Recommended expenditures included 25 student desks and chairs for the sixth grade room (app. \$1600-2000), video camera for the RSTV station (app. \$700), a copy of the Eastland County History book for the high school library (\$72.50), used teachers' desks for the first and sixth grade rooms (app. \$100), an allotment for grade school teachers to spend on equipment or supplies for classrooms (app. \$25 each) and to have the stage curtains cleaned (app. \$100). These items would use about \$3148 of the \$4,576.35 reported by the treasurer.

Supt. Dr. Don Bryan questioned whether the finance committee considered the \$770 requested for the Biology class trip to Port Aransas. President Kathy Bush indicated the committee took no action on this request. During the debate that followed, the first and sixth grade teachers made motions and received seconds to remove the teachers' desks from the list. Supt. Wright made a motion and received a second that the PTO help fund the Biology trip. Members present voted and approved the addition and deletion.

Old business discussed

revolved around children's safety and reading improvement. PTO will sponsor the fingerprinting project in March (parents will receive notices on this at a later date), a Department of Public Safety program on personal safety is being investigated, the possible implementation of the reading supplemental program Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) and a summer reading program in conjunction with the Saturday Club.

Winner of the coke party, with the most parents present, was the eighth grade and Belinda West won the door prize.

After the meeting was adjourned, the Wildcat Band played five musical selections in new, never-before seen-in-public uniforms. You missed a real treat if you were not present. The new uniforms are very distinctive and quite an improvement over the "old faithfuls" which were eight years old.

School personnel present were Dr. Donald E. Bryan, Weldon Hill and Robby Stuteville. Others present were Henry Burk, Jim Delashaw, James Cook, Dan Goodman, Georgia Hennessey and Stan Hennessey.

The Jan. 8 minutes were read and approved.

A motion by Dr. Barnes, seconded by Harris to enter into an agreement with the City of Rising Star to participate in a joint use of the Colquitt Williams Memorial Park facilities as submitted on Feb. 12, 1990 carried 7-0.

Big Country school administration and school board were discussed; no action was taken.

Reclassification of football and basketball district discussed, no action taken.

Supt. Bryan reported cash in bank and expenditures and revenue compared to budget.

A motion by Chambers,

seconded by G. Wilson, to extend contracts for Weldon Hill and Robby Stuteville for one year ending with the 1992 school year carried 7-0.

A motion by L. Wilson, seconded by Green, to hire Dan Goodman as Athletic Director for two years ending 1991-92 school year carried 7-0.

A motion was made by Long, seconded by Barnes, to accept the amended textbook list as submitted by the administration carried 7-0.

A motion by Green, seconded by Long, to enter into a contract the same as last year with Fullen Motor Co. to lease an auto for the drivers' education program carried 7-0. The board approved tuition of \$135 per student for the program.

The first reading of RSISD Board Policy TASB Localized Update 35 was approved. Stuteville reported that the TEAMS tests were completed in high school and that the attendance accounting period is Feb. 19 through March 16.

Hill reported that the TEAMS tests went smoothly in elementary school and gave the lunchroom report.

The meeting adjourned at 10:05 p.m.

"Jerry Harris has an impressive background in agriculture, combining years of experience as both a family farmer and a federal program administrator," the Senator said. "Dale Hunt, Dario Guerra and Keith Spears have done remarkable work in helping to lead the ASCS and I am pleased that they will be returning. And I am particularly pleased to have Hope Huffman joining the ASCS panel this year."

Harris is active in cotton ginning, warehousing and marketing, as well as operating a 7,000-acre family farm and continuing service on the Board of Governors of Lubbock Christian University.

Wool Prices

WASHINGTON - Support prices for wool and mohair for 1990 marketings will be \$1.82 per pound for shorn wool and \$4.632 per pound for mohair, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official announced.

Mohair is being supported at 85 percent of the percentage of parity at which shorn wool is supported.

Keith Bjerka, executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation, also said that pulled wool will be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool to maintain normal marketing practices for pulled wool.

Further details will be published in the Federal Register at a later date.

On March 2, 1992, the National Archives will make the 1920 census microfilm available to the public for the first time. And, the National Archives Microfilm Rental Program will rent copies made from the original silver masters.

"We're excited about the release of the 1920 census," said Rita Hope Counts, President of Professional Mail and Distribution Services, Inc. (PMDS), the company now fulfilling the Microfilm Rental Program contract for the National Archives. "In fact, we expect such a great demand for the census microfilm, we're taking advance rental orders starting September 1, 1991, so we can have them processed and ready to go as soon as we get the

microfilm in March."

The National Archives awarded PMDS the Microfilm Rental Program contract in September 1989, and PMDS plans to uphold the same level of service the program has provided since 1983. Under PMDS, the program will continue to be the only microfilm rental program to offer microfilm copied directly from the National Archives silver masters.

"Because of this," said the National Archives spokesperson, "the quality of film PMDS provides cannot be matched by any other rental program."

This microfilm can be ordered directly by individuals or through more than 6,000 local libraries across the country. The rental rates are \$3 per roll for orders of 1-4 rolls; \$2.50 per roll when 5-9 rolls

are ordered; and \$2 per roll for orders of 10 or more rolls. The postage and handling fee of \$3 is waived for orders of 4 or more rolls.

To assist first-time users, the Microfilm Rental Program offers a Start-Up Kit for \$20. Included in the Start-Up Kit are the complete set of catalogs required for census and Revolutionary War research, order forms for ship passenger arrival and veterans records, research guides, coupons for free rental of two rolls of microfilm, additional catalogs that list available genealogical publications, and a Rental Program membership card.

The membership is a lifetime one, entitling the member to a 10% discount on a selection of National Archives and other genealogical publications.

Interested individuals can

request a copy of the Archives Microfilm Rental Program, Post Office Box 30, Annapolis Junction, Maryland 20701.



On Feb. 28 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to six (0-6) at Eastland County MHMR center, 301 Pogue Ave., from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers. 

Hearing on Texas Highway System

A public hearing will be held Feb. 26 to receive public input on the criteria used in the selection of routes eligible for the Texas Highway Trunk System. The proposed rules are being published in the Texas Register and a condensed version appears with this notice. The meeting will be at 10 a.m. Mon., Feb. 26, in Room 101 in the Dewitt C. Greer Building at 11th and Brazos streets in Austin.

If you are unable to attend this public hearing, you can participate through written and phone-in comments addressed to Robert Cuellar, Transportation Planning Division, P.O. Box 5051, Austin, TX 78763-5051, (512) 465-7466.

After this hearing all comments will be analyzed and the final version of the rules will be presented before the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission for adoption.

Based on the adopted rules and previous public input, a revised Texas Highway Trunk System will be prepared for commission approval later this year.

Summary of Rules
Objective: To designate a rural network of four-lane or better divided roadways not to exceed 11,500 miles that will serve as a principal connector of all Texas cities with more than 20,000 population, major ports and points of entry.

Selection Criteria: To be included in the Texas Highway Trunk System, the commission will give consideration to routes that 1) maximize four-lane divided roadways, 2) minimize circuitous or indirect routing, 3) connect with principal Mexican points of entry, 4) connect with principal roadways from adjacent states, 5) connect with principal deep water ports with channel depths of 40 feet or more, 6) serve significant military installations, 7) serve tourism or recreational areas, 8) comprise major truck routes, or 9) are within 25 miles or less of cities of 10,000 population or greater.
