

CISCO - Ben A. Butler, 88. former editor of three area newspapers, died Sunday at his home. Services were at 1 p.m. Tuesday at the Cisco Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Ken Diehm officiating. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Born in Paris, Texas, he served as editor of the Eastland Telegram from 1924 to 1928, the Cisco Press

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

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



# Speaker Of The House Foley At Abilene News Conference

By Viola Payne

Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives Tom Foley-D, had high praises for Congressman Charles Stenholm at a Press Conference at Dyess Air Force Base last Friday, Sept. 8.

Foley said that Stenholm was "one of the principal voices in the Congress" and hinted that two important appointments might come soon to conservative members of the Democratic Party.

The Speaker, along with his host Stenholm and U.S. Reps. Bill Sarpalius, D-Amarillo, Mike Parker, D-Mississippi, Butler Derrick, D-South Carolina were in Abilene to tour Dyess Air Force Base. They also went to Stenholm's big Funday picnic at Ericksdahl on Satur-

Around 3 p.m. Friday the Congressmen attended a

briefing in the Conference Room of the Officer's Clubhouse at Dyess, and returned there at 5 p.m. after an inspection of Aircraft on the flight line.

It was a blistering afternoon, but the visitors (all hatless) survived their time on the grounds with high spirits. All seemed impressed with Dyess and the southwestem hospitality.

Major Mary Beth Kilgore, Dyess Public Affairs Officer, welcomed area journalists to the news conference. Congressman Stenholm introduced Speaker Foley and the other Representatives, saying that it was vital for Congressman to visit in Districts other than their own.

Foley agreed, saying that on the airplane down Stenholm had informed him of some of the problems of the oil and gas industry, as well

as other matters critical to the

17th Congressional District. The Speaker said he was from Spokane, Washington, in the eastern part of the state. There were some similarities between his and Congressman Stenholm's District. Foley said. They were about the same size, and each had a lot of agriculture. Much of the Spokane area consists of wheat farming, but also has some cattle and irrigated farming.

When asked about his opinion of the aircraft at Dyess, Foley called the B-1 a "truly impressive aircraft," but said there had been criticism with some of the plane's electronic systems. He said he hoped these problems could be cor-

The Speaker didn't seem as sure about the B-2 stealth bomber, but said congress will give it another year and then come to some decision.

He said the MX Rail Garrison System is being considered, and a House-Senate Conference hoped to resolve the questions in several

Foley chuckled as he remarked that Fairchild Airbase in Spokane is one of the Airbases on the list requesting the System, as well as Dyess Air Base.

The Speaker made no mention of Jim Wright's resignation of this post recently, or the circumstances surrounding it. But he did say that the lack of progress reported in Congress isn't as bad as it seems.

"What happened is that the Congress has really gotten back to a good work schedule," Foley said. "We've been moving on all the legislation. I think we've made up for the loss of time we suffered earlier in the year."

He added that "the backstabbing atmosphere" is gone from Congress. Stenholm nodded in agreement.

When asked about President Bush's drug plan, Foley praised the proposal. He also said that the President has bipartisan support, and that "reports of criticism from House Democrats may have been blown out of proportion."


On whether any equipment from Dyess will be sent to Columbia, Foley said that was a matter for the Airforce and Department of Defense. But he did think the President was to be congratulated for taking a strong stand on the drug menace.

Before he left the Conference Room Foley was asked about the Health-Care crisis in rural counties such as Eastland.

He replied that he was aware of the problem, and that Congress was trying to do something about it. There should be some encouraging announcements shortly, Foley said.

This was another matter he and Stenholm had discussed while coming down on the plane - and one of the most urgent, the Washington Democrat added.

An Airforce officer was rounding up the Congressmen for another flight, so Foley and the other visitors concluded their discussions and visiting. But the personal contact between news media and the Congressmen seemed to make an impression on both

# PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1989

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the salary of members of the legislature to onefourth of the Governor's salary and increase the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to one-half of the Governor's salary. The annual salary of members of the legislature, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is currently \$7,200. Under this provision, the annual salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker would be \$46,716, and the annual salary of members of the legislature would be \$23,358, based on the Governor's current annual salary of \$93,432. The increase for the Speaker and the members of the legislature would take effect when the legislature convenes for its regular session in January 1991. The increase for the Licutenant Governor would take effect when the term of that office begins in 1991. The salary increase for the Lieutenant Governor would not make members of the legislature ineligible to run for the office of Lieutenant Governor.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to limit the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to not more than one-half of the governor's salary and to limit the salary of a member of the legislature to not more than one-fourth of the governor's salary."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$500 million of Texas water development bonds. The additional bonds are to be used as follows: \$250 million of the bonds are to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition; \$200 million of the bonds are to be used for water quality enhancement projects; and \$50 million of the bonds are to be used for flood control. 

# Petition Against Prison Brought To County Commissioners

Opponent of a proposal to build a prison"in Eastland County had their day in Commissioners Court Mon-

Carol Bullock and Jimmie Hughes spoke for a overflow crowd at the Courtroom, and brought a petition with around 450 names of people who oppose the location of the facility here.

They also brought a Resolution from the City of Carbon opposing the prison, and a Resolution from the Carbon School Board not to support the prison.

Texas Department of Corrections for the 2500-bed Prison is a 1,000 acre tract of land near Carbon at a projected cost of \$650,000. The land would be donated to the State. This proposal was carried to Austin by the Eastland County Economic Development Council with Dr. Charles Barnes as Project Man-

The petition brought by Mrs. Bullock stated that a prison would "strain resources of school, law enforcement, hospitals, water,

> "In all fairness... in a matter of this sort... the people of this county should have had a vote on the matter. Our rights have been circumvented.'

the prison.

But all Commissioners except one (Billy Bacon of Pct. 4) voted against the election when members of the Eastland County Development group came to a called meeting and urged them to drop the referendum.

The Commissioners had earlier signed a Resolution supporting the proposal for a prison, and promising "to issue necessary certificates of obligation or other instruments of financing to fund the purchase of land."

The discussion became heated Monday as several people told the Commissioners that the Economic Group had promised land would be

paid for by donations and to them." pledges.

County Commissioners who had voted to rescind the election appeared to agree. One said: ""We signed an agreement with them. I don't think they're keeping their part of it."

John Berry, District Manager for TU Electric Co., defended the work of the County Economic Development Group and the location of a prison here.

He indicated the group couldn't absolutely guarantee that the full amount of money would be donated, but if Eastland County is selected "We'll have 45 days until we turn the deed of the land over

"We are only asking for the County's credit. It may take years for pledges to come in," Berry said.

The Commissioners were questioned from the floor as to whether the Court was legally obligated to pay for the land submitted for the

District Attorney Emory Walton was called in, and he said that the Resolution passed by the Commissioners made them "morally obligated, but not legally."

ber of answers, most indicating that this would be very difficult right now, or there wasn't enough time.

County Judge Scott Bailey said he had originally supported a bond referendum election to gauge support for the county borrowing money on the land purchase. But he also said the petition brought to the Court against the prison was not worded in a manner so that an election could be legally called for, now.

Mrs. Bullock requested a place on the agenda of the next Commissioners Court meeting, which will be held Sept. 25. At that time she may have a petition calling for a referendum.

County Clerk JoAnne

Johnson will study election laws to see if a special election would be possible.

"The County Economic Development Group members are not our elected representatives," one prison opponent said. "We want to speak for ourselves. That is the American way of doing things. Why are you so afraid of a vote?"


