Emergency Road Repair Funds From ASCS

The Soil Conservation Service may furnish additional Federal Assistance to Eastland County for emergency work on county roads and bridges.

This was the word at an Emergency Called Meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners on Tuesday, May 8. The Commissioners discussed emergency road and bridge repair with Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service in Eastland, and Gary Batte of Brownwood, Area Supervisor of the Soil Con-

servation Service. The Commissioners told these A.S.C.S. directors that extensive damage had occurred to rural roads, especially in the southeast part of the County, Pct. 2. Norman Christian, Commissioner of that Precinct, had pictures with him of caved-in roads and huge washes across roads. Some families in his area that been isolated during the storms last week, and can barley get out now.

Other Commissioners reported damaged bridges and roads in bad shape.

Gary Batte told the Court there was a good chance that the county could get A.S.C.S. funds for emergency repairs, especially on mail routes, school bus routes and truck routes. He said this money could be used for temporary by-passes, for rock to fill up big washes, and other emergency purposes. He asked each Commissioner to identify his needs and estimate the costs

L.T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3, said he had already made most emergency repairs in his Precinct, so didn't think this program would do mush good. His work now would involve more permanent type of road building.

The other commissioners spent part of the afternoon working on estimates.

Two days later, on Thursday, May 10, Judge Bailey said it looked as if things were moving swiftly in the A.S.C.S. Emergency Department. He said he felt certain the County would get at least \$100,000 from this office on emergency repairs.

Extensions for State Tax Returns

Businesses that cannot file state tax returns by May 21 because of flooding damaged will be granted emergency filing extensions and will not face penalties or interest because of late filing. The toll free Comptroller's number is 1-800-252-5555.

Eastland County Commis-

sioners Monday again discussed emergency measures concerning recent flood damage to rural roads.

The County has been declared a Federal Disaster Area, and there is money available from both FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) and the Soil Conservation Service.

But the County has to first spend the money and then apply to receive it back.

The Commissioners approved a Resolution to take \$94,000 from the County-Wide Road and Bridge Fund to begin these repairs. It was estimated that total repairs in all Precincts will cost around \$698,000.

As various Precincts are reimbursed the money will be put back in the County-Wide Road and Bridge Fund.

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, appeared to sum up the situation: "We need to see that everything's documented - everything we've spent on every mud puddle. If we do it right, we'll get part of our money back."

The Commissioners continued to report widespread damage on all the roads, especially in Pct. 2. Norman Christian, Comm. of that

Precinct; had some pictures with him that left no doubt about the destruction.

Jail Passes, County To Fix Roads

County Judge Scott Bailey said that Federal money was expected to be available soon, with at least \$100,000 from the Soil Conservation Serv-

On other road matters, R. E. King of the Nimrod/Sabanno area, Pct. 3, said that water diverted from an oil lease by the Big M Oil Company Inc. was damaging a county road and causing flooding on his property and

in his driveway. His home was difficult of access, he

He told of attempts to contact owners of the Oil Company and to work out some better arrangement on the water flow.

"I didn't think (under state law) you could change a natural water way, and that's what he's done," King said.

After some discussion the Commissioners decided to ask District Attorney Emory Walton to look into the situation. Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service will also be contacted to see if impounding and diverting water is a violation of state

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, said that water had also been recently impounded in lakes on the Simpson property just north of Pleasant Hill Church. During the heavy rains May 1 and 2 the water ran out of these lakes, tore up two fences, and threw water in the County road nearby.

Bacon had some better news to report from the County Jail. The Jail passed the inspection on May 8 with "flying colors," he said. It was in "perfect condition" on inspection.

Things were not as good in Comanche County, he remarked. That Jail failed inspection on the same day, although it was a brand-new

There are currently 17 inmates in the Eastland County Jail, Bacon reported, and 7 of them belong to the

Bacon said he wanted to reply to a letter he had received about the Television sets in jail cells. The County does not buy T.V.'s for prisoners, he said. The County furnishes T. V. connections in the cells, and the prisoners have to furnish their won T.V.

Purified poison -- the Food and Drug Administration has approved the use of sterile botulism toxin to treat two eye muscle disorders. Treatment is the first to be successful against strabismus -- crossed or wall eyes -- and blepharospasm, in which eyes close involuntarily.

Use of the drug misoprostol is recommended to avoid the gastric upset and ulceration that may accompany the frequent use of nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, according to a report in the journal Geriatrics. The report says misoprostol does not interfere with the pain-killing effect of the NSAID.

USDA Price Support Levels for 1990 Crop Peanuts

WASHINGTON The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced average price support levels by type, quality and location for the 1990 peanut crop.

The levels are based on national price support levels of \$631.47 per short ton for quota peanut and \$149.75 per short ton for additional peanuts.

The quota support level by type for an average grade to of 1990 crop peanuts will be: -\$629.81 for Virginia-

type peanuts; —\$636.49 for Runner-type

peanuts; -\$588.40 for Spanishtype peanuts;

-\$629.81 for Valenciatype peanuts from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting; and

-\$588.40 for other Valencias. The method of computing the price support levels for

1990 crop peanuts and the grades within the types is the same used for the 1989 crop except for Spanish-type peanuts. For Spanish-type peanuts, the sound mature kernel (SMK) value has been set at

0.5 percent below the SMK

value for Runner-type pea-

nuts. For the 1989 crop of

Spanish-type peanuts the

SMK value was the same as for Runner-type peanuts.

For each percent of sound mature kernels in a ton, including sound split kernels, the support level will be: -Virginia-type peanuts,

\$9.200; -Runner-type peanuts,

\$9.020; -Spanish-type peanuts,

\$8.975; -Valencia-type peanuts in the Southwest area suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$9.440; and

-other Valencias, \$8,975. The loan value for additional peanuts will be 23.71 percent of the applicable quota rate. This factor represents the ratio of the \$149.75 per short ton national support level for 1990 crop additional peanuts to the \$631.47 per

short ton national support

level for 1990 crop quota

pcanuts. As with the 1989 crop, the price support for 1990 crop peanuts on which a growth regulator was used will be discounted by 100 percent from the support rate that otherwise would be appli-

The actual support level for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of kernels in each ton and other factors.

Gordon Spot

Owners of coastal bermudagrass pastures have been worried for sometime about their grass stands. Much of the grass has not greened up. I've looked at several stands and dug roots to try to determine if the roots are alive. It appears to me that most roots in the top three inches were killed by the December freeze. The soil is still cold and many of the live roots are not sending up green growth. We have found large numbers of live roots that should produce growth when the soil gets warmer.

I think the coastal pastures will eventually green up, but we will not get that early June cutting of hay. The coastal bermudagrass will have to be treated like the first year of establishment.

When the grass begins making runners, it should be fertilized. Fertilizing before the grass is making good growth will only promote weed growth and much of the fertilizer will be taken up by weeds before the grass is ready to use it.

Based on the number of calls I have received, all the fruitless mulberry trees in the county must be loosing their leaves. This is caused be Bacterial Blight and some fungus leafspot is present. These diseases are caused by humid weather. We are recommending spraying with a copper fungicide at 10 to 14 day intervals. Some of the copper fungicides are Kocide 101, Champion, Basicop and Top Cop.

The Elm leaf beetles are beginning their damage on elm trees. New infestations of young elm leaf beetle larvae are easily overlooked because of their feeding location. At first, the green part of the leaves are removed with just the thin veins remaining. As damage accumulates, dry skeltonized leaves become available includes:

Railroad Commission Assesses \$37,000 In Penalties

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$37,000 in penalties this week to seven oil and gas operators for problems under Commission well plugging and pollution rules.

Collingsworth Oil Company of Wellington was penalized a total of \$10,000 for five inactive and unplugged wells: one on the Jackson "A" lease in Gray County; the other four on the Trostle lease in Wheeler County; Putnam Oil Operator Account of Throckmorton was assessed \$3,000 for one well on the Putnam lease in Throckmorton County; Riverside Oil & Gas Co., Inc. of San Antonio was ordered to pay \$3,000 for one well on the W. O. Winsaurer lease in Bee County; Uselton Oil Company of Wichita Falls was penalized \$8,000 for four wells on the McCullough & Howard lease

in Wichita County; and, A. W. S. Petroleum Co. of San Angelo was assessed \$3,000 for one well on the Wright lease in Eastland County.

In addition, Fred B. Shelton III, Inc. of Dallas was ordered to pay \$5,000 for problems with a leaking well and having unauthorized oil field pits on the E. H. Jones Estate "A" lease in Gaines County; and, Bob's Oil & Gas Operating Company of Luling was penalized \$5,000 for oil spills and unauthorized discharge into earthen pits on the V. Lackey lease in Caldwell County.

To date in 1990, the Commission has levied more than \$406,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed a total of \$1,125,000 in such penalties.

Jail **Passes**


The Eastland County Jail was inspected last Tuesday afternoon, May 8, by Bob Dearing of the Texas Jail Standards Commission.

In an effort to speed relief to the people in the 16 counties approved for disaster assistance, a toll-free telephone number 1-800-782-6661 will be operational 8 a.m. - 6 p.m. daily until further notice, adds Graham Nance, appointed Federal Coordinating officer.

County Judge Scott Bailey received word on the declaration of Eastland County from the office of Senator Phil Gramm in Washington, D.C. This designation of the county as a disaster area followed a request from the Commissioners Court for funds to help repair rural roads and bridges. These were severely damaged
