TV Cable Rates Increase Slightly

Brownwood Television Cable Service will increase certain rates effective January 1, 1989.

Basic cable rates will increase one dollar (\$1.00) per month in Rising Star and Cross Plains. HBO rate will increase fifty cents (\$.50) per month. Senior citizens will continue to receive \$2.70 discount on basic cable service.

The rate increase is necessary to offset the increased cost of programming. "Most of the companies who supply us with satellite services have increased the

tees they charge us," stated Bob Nevill, manager of the cable company. "We have absorbed some of these increases but some of the increased cost is reflected in the new rates."

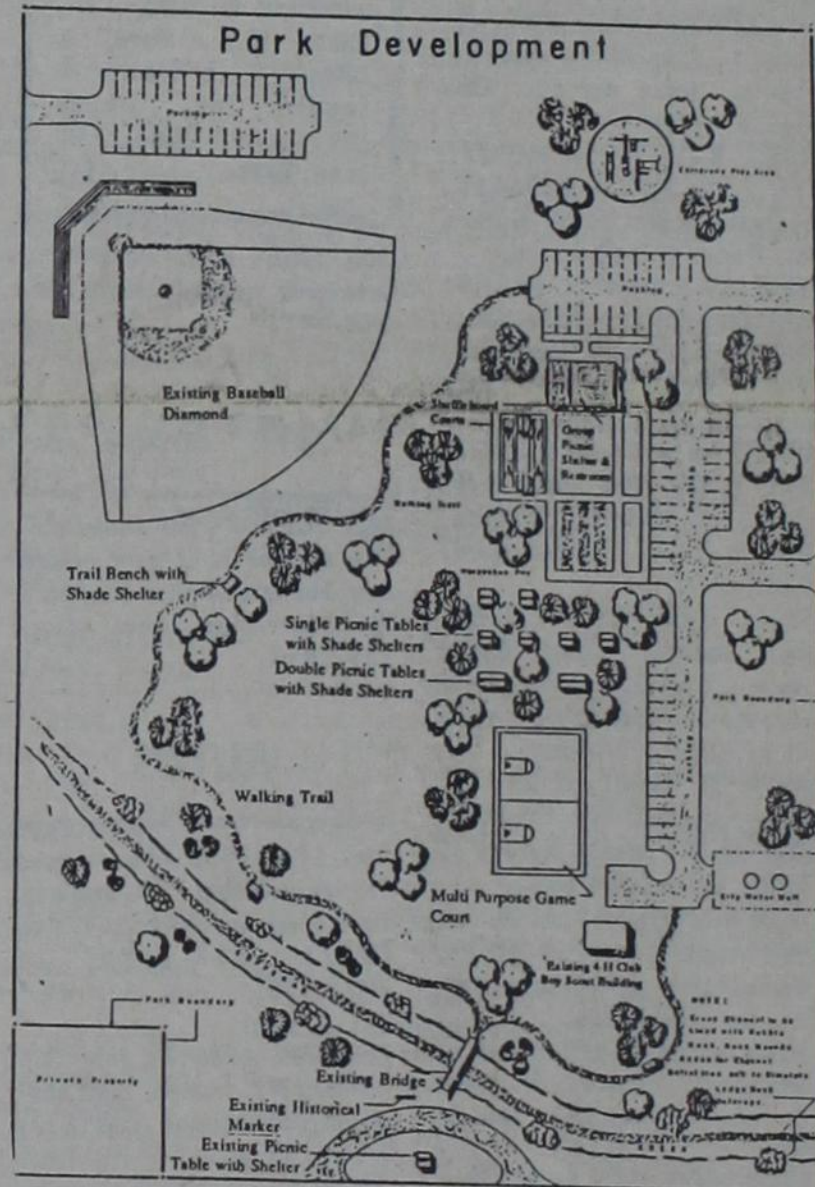
It's our chance to help get a grant to develop Rising Star's City Park, the Colquitt E. Williams Memorial Park.

USDA Announces 1989 Peanut Poundage Quota

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the national poundage quota of 1,440,000 short tons (2,880 million pounds) for the 1989 peanut marketing year. This quota is 37,800 short tons above the quota that was established for the 1988 crop.

As required by the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, the national poundage quota for the 1989 crop of peanuts has been set at a level that is equal to the estimated quantity of peanuts that will be devoted to domestic edible, seed and related use in the 1989 marketing year which begins Aug. 1, 1989.

Increases in a state's poundage quota will be allocated among qualifying farms in accordance with prescribed producers.

In a January 1986 referen-

dum, peanut growers approved poundage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops.

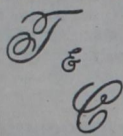

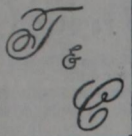

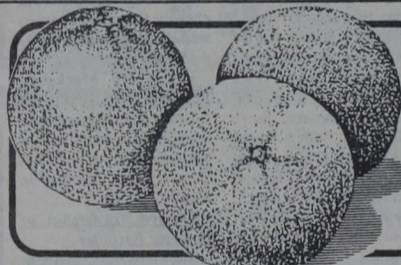

Mid-Winter Policy Meet Set In Austin Jan. 16-17

Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association policy committee members will meet in Austin Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 16-17 at the Radisson Plaza Hotel for the Association's Mid-Winter Policy Meeting. All TIPRO members are invited to attend, particularly those who wish to serve on a committee (Please call TIPRO headquarters if you have questions about committee membership).

Registration for the meeting will begin at 1 p.m. Monday, Jan. 16, on the mezzanine of the Radisson Plaza Hotel. The first policy committee event is the Biannual Legislative Reception 6:30 - 8 p.m. in Ballroom B. New members and leaders of the Texas Legislature and other elected officials will visit with TIPRO members in this relaxed setting.

Registration for the meeting continues on the mezzanine at 8 a.m. Tuesday. A continental breakfast will be served from 7:30 - 8:30 a.m. The Membership Committee, chaired by Thomas D. Coffman, will meet from 9-10 a.m. in the Senate Room. The State Petroleum Issues and Legislative committees—chaired by Stacey Smyre and Rex H. Crude Oil Marketing Problems

Crude oil marketing problems will be a major item of discussion during this Mid-Winter Policy Meeting in Austin.

Foreign Ownership of Domestic Facilities

The TIPRO office has been receiving a growing number of inquiries from members concerned about the trend toward foreign ownership of domestic refining and retailing operations and the motivation involved. Transactions that have sparks particular interest include certain purchases by Venezuela from Champlin Refining, Ciggo, and Unocal, and the Saudi/Texaco deal.

In the opinion of some

members, Venezuelan operation of a Champlin refinery in Corpus Christi could mean that some 9,000 bpd of domestic crude will be backed out by imports. In addition to the potential loss of buyers for domestic crude, transactions such as this raise questions about the relative price between foreign and domestic crudes and the pricing strategies of foreign governments. If, for example, the Saudi's end up owning 50 percent of Texaco's operations, many wonder if this will add to that Mideast nation's apparent motivation to keep crude prices depressed. Until now, a primary Saudi interest has been to control Iranian behavior at the bargaining table; soon the motivation may be to improve profits from newly acquired refining and marketing business.

Oilfield Trucking Rates

The Oil Field Haulers Association is in the process of "simplifying" the Railroad Commission prescribed rates contained in their current Tariff 6. Although such rates generally are already higher than comparable interstate rates, the current proposal would increase typical flatbed transportation prices by about 10 percent. TIPRO may become involved in this issue.

The Relation Between Postings and Futures Prices

The TIPRO staff has initiated a study of the relationship between futures prices and key posted prices for Texas crude. The study will document the answers to questions such as: Is it true that postings follow futures prices faster on the down slope than on the up slope? How much is the lag, if any, costing domestic producers?

Hopefully these issues can be clarified and some answers found during this meeting.

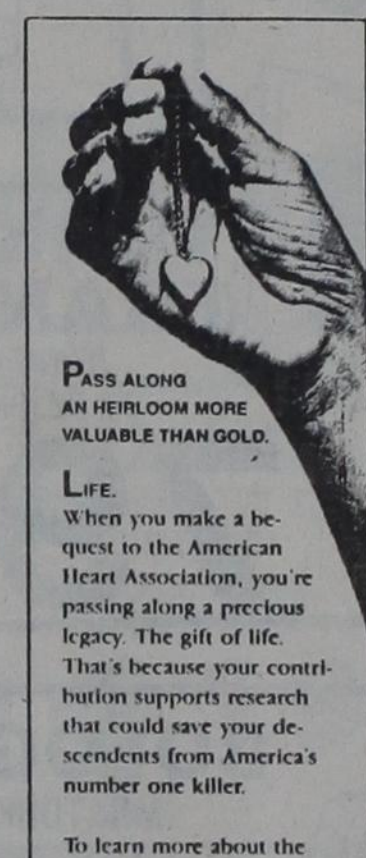
workshop has helped to improve his skills.

This knowledge comes at various times to all people, the reporter thought. And the bad part is - at some time or other almost everyone needs to write something for publication. And newspaper reporters, no matter how dedicated, are not omnipresent. They are not always available to cover everything they would like to.

This incident faded in the background, but a need continued to exist. Sometimes people mentioned that they were never really interested in writing - they sneaked out of composition in High School (before the days of HB 72) and had other fields in college. But suddenly machines couldn't think for

1989 Peanut Quota Announced

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the national poundage quota of 1,440,000 short tons (2,880 million pounds) for the 1989 peanut marketing year. This quota is 37,800 short tons above the quota that was established for the 1988 crop.

As required by the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, the na-

tional poundage quota for the 1989 crop of peanuts has been set at a level that is equal to the estimated quantity of peanuts that will be devoted to domestic edible, seed and related use in the 1989 marketing year which begins Aug. 1, 1989.

The 1989 crop national poundage quota will be allocated to each state based on the state's share of the 1988 crop national poundage

quota. Increases in a state's poundage quota will be allocated among qualifying farms in accordance with prescribed procedures.

In a January 1986 referendum, peanut growers approved poundage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops.
