

## 1981-1982 School Calendar Announced

Supt. Gene Williams has announced the following schedule for the 1981-82 school year.

Classes will begin on Monday, August 24, 1981 at 8:00 a.m.

High School registration will be held on Thursday, August 20, 1981 with the following order:

Seniors—10:00 a.m.

Juniors—11:00 a.m.

Sophomores—1:00 p.m.

Freshmen—2:00 p.m.

Books and lockers will be issued at this time.

Kindergarten will also begin on Monday, August 24, 1981. Supt. Williams stated, "We are planning to have Kindergarten all day long all year providing we can meet Federal regulations and qualify for Federal Funding, otherwise we will continue under the state provisions making the last day of Kindergarten January 14, 1982.

Supt. Williams went on to say that transfers will be available in the principals office. If you have not completed a transfer form by May 31, 1981 you must fill out a form on the first day of school.

## Recipe of the Week

### RIPE TOMATO RELISH

By Bonnie Johnson  
1 gal. ripe tomatoes  
4 large onions  
2 cups vinegar  
2 t. black pepper  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 t. dry mustard  
1 t. nutmeg  
1 t. allspice  
2 pods hot green pepper (optional)

Grind tomatoes and onions through a food chopper using a coarse blade, add the remaining ingredients and cook until tomatoes and onions are tender. Pour into hot jars and seal.

### WATERMELON PRESERVES

4 pounds watermelon rind (white part only)  
4 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 quarts water  
Peel, trim and cut watermelon into cubes. Cook over night in salt and water solution.

Drain. Cover rind with cold water to which has been added—1/2 teaspoon powdered alum. Boil 15 minutes, drain.

Make syrup of:  
9 cups sugar  
8 cups water  
Drop rind into syrup, add:

2 lemons sliced  
Spice bag if desired (stick cinnamon and cloves). Boil preserves until rind is tender. Pack in hot jars and seal.

### FRUIT SWEET PICKLES

(peaches, Pears, figs, etc.)

Boil for 10 minutes:  
3 pints vinegar  
1 pint water  
10 cups sugar

Add pickling spice tied in a bag. Add prepared fruit, enough to fill one or two jars at a time and boil until barely tender. Pack into hot jars and fill with the boiling syrup. Seal at once. Yields enough syrup for 10 to 12 pints of fruit.

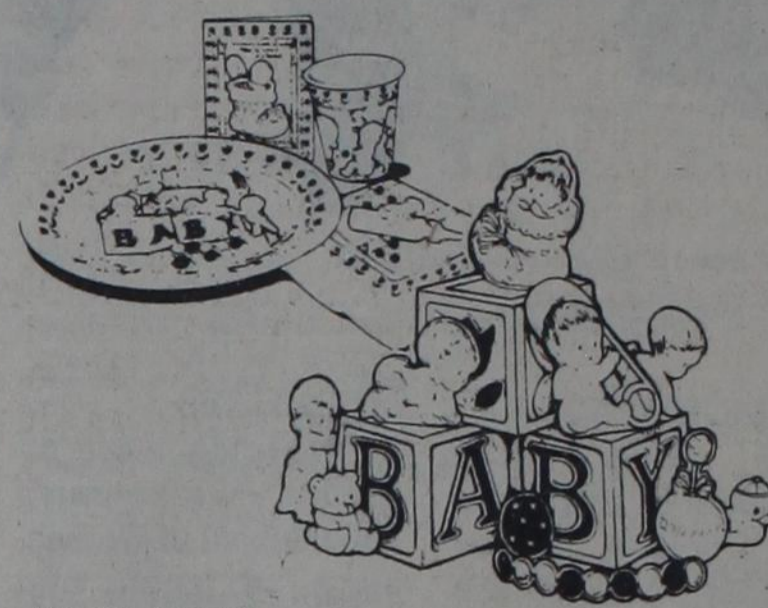

## The tale of Daddy's little girl and the diamond that she found

Diamonds. Say the word, and it conjures up a charisma of romance and love, whether you're referring to the girl next door's engagement ring or one of the fabulous beauties listed in Notable Diamonds of the World, reports the Jewelry Industry Council.

And, there is a romantic tale attached to each one of the more than 350 diamonds, telling of how they were discovered and what happened to them.

It is true that most people think of diamonds being found in South Africa, India, Brazil and even Siberia, but at least 60 of the noted diamonds were discovered right here in the United States—and many by amateur "rock hounds," declares the Council.

Take, for example, the 11.92 carat Cotton Belt Star.

It was a damp, cloudy, drizzly Tuesday morning in June, 1963, when Art Rogers of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, took his wife and four young daughters to Murfreesboro's Crater of Diamonds mine.

The mine, a popular tourist attraction, was a favorite place the family visited whenever Art had vacation time.

In fact, the family had been visiting the area since 1959 and, between Art, his wife and daughters, the Rogers had unearthed 24 small diamonds.

There was a modest fee charged to visitors—\$1.50 to adults, 50 cents to children, and infants were admitted free. Also, it was strictly "finders keepers" for any diamonds the visitors might find in the blue ground.

The morning drizzle and cloudiness burnt off under a smiling sun, and Art and his wife placed their youngest, Mary, 14 months old, on a blanket where she could be watched.

The precocious infant crept to the blanket's edge, and picked up some stones to play with.

Just as she was about to pop one into her mouth, Art treated, "Give it to Daddy!" and little Mary obediently handed over the object of her

attention—a rough diamond of approximately 12 carats.

Art thought it too big to be a diamond, but something about the stone intrigued him. He took it to the mine operator, James Johnston, a geologist, who confirmed the stone to be a diamond in the rough.

In fact, the gemmologist pointed out, the stone had probably originally been almost 25 carats in size, for the crystal was split in the middle of the cleavage line. Somewhere in the mud and rocks, the twin half of the diamond lay.

Proud of his daughter's exceptional find, Art, a diesel locomotive electrician who worked for the Cotton Belt Route of the Southern Pacific

Transportation Co., asked permission of his company to name the stone the "Star of the Cotton Belt."

The beautiful diamond, now cut into a handsome ring, is still in the Rogers family, and young Mary and her sisters still have the other gemstones they found with their parents made into jewelry—pleasant and nostalgic tokens of happier days when their father was alive.

### THE UN-FORGETTABLE MARIGOLD

by TED BRICE, THE GARDEN EDITOR

The Marigold is among the most popular flowers in the United States. They are exceeding easy to grow and require little attention. Their colors range from white, bronze, yellow, maroon and orange.

All marigolds are descendants of the wild Mexican species. They have been hybridized to produce four separate types. The African or sometimes referred to as the Aztec Marigold is the tallest variety ranging from 18 inches to three

feet with double blooms in a ball shape of 3 to 5 inches. These Marigolds resemble Chrysanthemums.

Then we have the French Marigolds which are usually a low growing variety ranging from six to 18 inches tall with one to two inch single and double blooms. Next we have the African-French Marigolds which are hybrids ranging from 12 to 18 inches. These flowers are usually double two to three inches in diameter born on very sturdy stems.

We also have the dwarf Marigolds which usually run about 12 inches tall and are topped with masses of single yellow or orange flowers measuring about one inch in diameter. In this variety we find the foliage to

be fern like and much finer than the other varieties. Many Marigolds have a brushing scent which is strong to some people and unpleasant while being attractive to others. There are some Marigolds that are odorless.

There are many ways to use the Marigold in the garden. Their vivid color mass planted in beds produce a color spectacular from summer to frost. They can be used as borders, baskets, and window boxes as well as pot plants. The taller ones can make good hedges. In Central America the Marigold is grown for chicken feed. When the blooms of the yellow Marigold are fed the chickens the hens will lay eggs with a darker yellow yoke. Scientists

have proved that the parasitic worm (nematode) vanishes where Marigolds are planted. Marigolds grow well in ordinary soil but need sunlight. They can be started inside from seed and set out after the danger of freezes are past. They can also be set out as bedding plants or the seed can be planted directly in the garden. It takes the seed about five days to germinate.

Dwarf varieties may be planted 6 to 10 inches apart with taller varieties 12 to 24 inches apart. Keep your blooms cut and the plants will reward you with new blooms until frost.

If you are going to cut some of the strong smelling variety cut them early in the day and arrange them outside.

After you put the vase in place, DO NOT disturb them. This will lessen the unpleasant odor. When you hear some of your gardening friends talk about Targets, you must remember that they are talking about Marigold using the Botanical name.

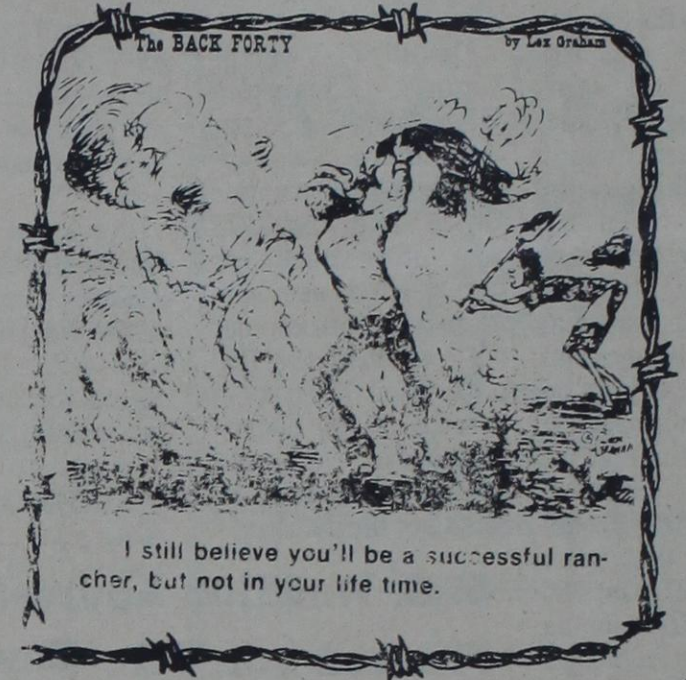

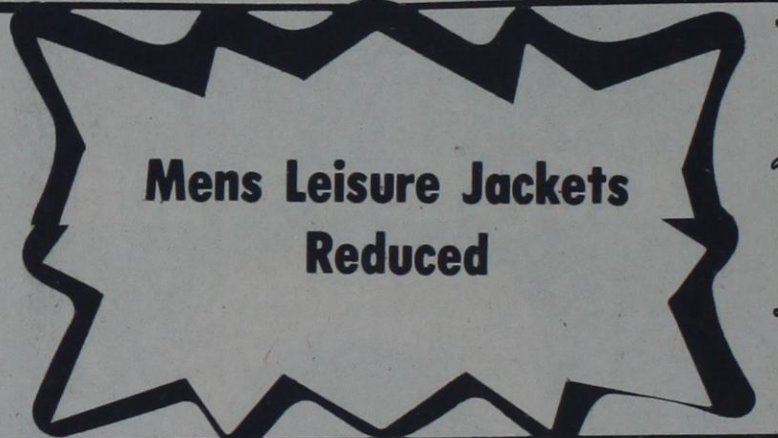

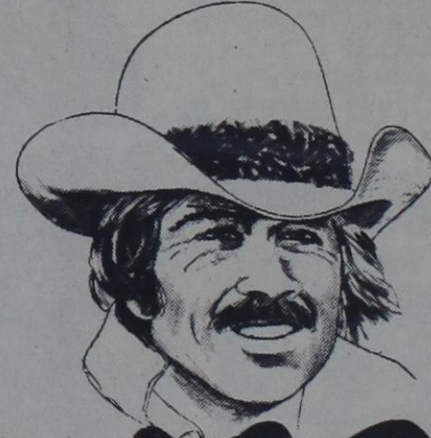

**GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION PROGRAM CELEBRATES 25TH ANNIVERSARY**

August 7, 1981 should be a historic day for farmers, ranchers, soil and water conservation district directors, and all of us who depend upon agricultural products for our food and clothing.

The date will be the silver anniversary of the Great Plains Conservation Program, Jack Prichard, Range Conservationist for the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service at Eastland said this week.

"Just 25 years ago, on August 7, 1956, President Eisenhower signed the bill authorizing the program," Prichard said. "It is available to producers in the ten Great Plains states--stretching through the Nation's breadbasket from North Dakota to Texas."

The Great Plains Program helps

farmers and ranchers solve problems of wind and water erosion, drought, and other resource-related problems with technical and financial aid based on conservation plans tailored to each farm or ranch.

The first Great Plains contracts in Eastland County were signed by B.A. May and W.D. Gattis on February 21, 1963. A total of 307 contracts protecting 132,112 acres have been signed in Eastland County.

"Grass seeding, brush management, grassed waterways, livestock water facilities, cross-fences, and livestock grazing programs are among GPCP practices for which a landowner can receive technical and/or cost-sharing assistance," Prichard said.

The conservation practices in the GPCP plan are scheduled to be applied over 3 to 10 years. The U.S. Department of

Agriculture has assigned leadership of the program to the Soil Conservation Service.

"All the problems aren't solved in the Great Plains area," Prichard said. "But since the program has been in operation, wind erosion has not caused the tragic damage of the dust bowl days of the 1930s and the drought of the '50s."

"The serious drought of 1980, however, threatened approximately 11 million acres with wind damage," Prichard said. "While last year's drought did not become a disaster, it and the resulting threat shows that we can never let our guard down when it comes to protecting our natural resources."

Throughout the rest of the Revelation, the throne of God is the central object of focus. Around it everything else revolves, from it pour forth the judgments of God, and toward it all the inhabitants of heaven bow in worship. Of course, the throne is only as important as the One who occupies it. We know that it's the throne of God the Father, but the description given of the One sitting on it appears to be that of God the Son. He's not described in the form of man, however, and since we know that Jesus is in heaven in His human body, it's most likely that John's vision was that of God the Father. Revelation 4:2,3 And instantly I was caught up in the Spirit and saw a throne that was set in heaven,

and the One sitting on it. And He who was sitting there looked like a jasper and a sardius stone; and there was a rainbow encircling the throne that looked like an emerald. The Splendor of God, the impact on John was overwhelming! The glory and splendor was breathtaking. At a loss for words, John attempts to describe God in majestic terms. He was the Occupant of the throne as jasper and sardius stones in appearance. A rainbow around the throne was emerald in color. A jasper is a precious stone but some believe it to be a diamond. As John looked at the throne he was impressed with something that radiated like a multifaceted gem. Mercy in Judgment, The purpose of a rainbow is given in Genesis 9:11-17 where God reveals that He set His bow in the sky as a symbol of His promise that He would never again completely

devastate the world with water. He also proclaimed that as long as the present earth existed the four seasons would continue, and that there would be light and darkness as well as the sun for heat. The rainbow around God's throne is therefore a gracious reminder that God will remember His post-flood promise of mercy even during the awful days of Tribulation. In the Bible the color green symbolizes life, and circles symbolize eternity. The circular, emerald-colored rainbow therefore also pictures God's gift of eternal life which He will offer to those on earth even in the midst of the horrors of Tribulation judgment.

The Twenty-Four Elders, Rev. 4:4, And round about the throne were twenty-four thrones, and I saw twenty four Elders sitting on the thrones, clothed in white robes,

and they had crowns of gold on their heads. The identity of these twenty-four enthroned Elders is not certain. Many Bible scholars feel that they are a special group of angels to minister to God and assist in the administration of the universe. That's a possibility, but I personally believe that they are representative of the Church. Twenty-four is the number associated with priestly service and is symbolic of the Church operation in its role as priest.

# Sipe Springs Homecoming

There were no members of the last graduation class present, but Joyce Foster Burk recalled that as a member of the Class of 1935 the Depression had closed in and saw school funds were so

scarce that School board members decided the only way Sipe Springs schools could open that fall was to eliminate the faculty for the seniors. And they did. Joyce finished at Rising Star, out of necessity, not from choice. The next year was a bit better and the seniors of '36 were able to attend their home town school.

At this time young Clint Leonard asked to address the gathering. It seems that at the tender age of 5 years Clint realized a responsibility toward the cemetery association and asked to become a member. His speech this past Sunday shows that he still feels his responsibility. He said: "Hello folks, I am Clint Leonard, grandson of Nonnie and Mae Leonard. I am proud to be a member of this Sipe Springs Cemetery Association. I am proud to see everyone. I came to the Homecoming from Glenrock, Wyoming to be here for my Grandmother and Granddaddy." At the age of 8 years Clint has a few more years to go.

James Wyatt gave a brief devotional from Matt. 7:13-14. An Eastern Meadow Lark sang from an Oak tree in the cemetery as James referred to the fork in the road of life that each must choose. John McKeehan gave the closing prayer.

For a short time the business of eating took precedence as the contents of baskets were spread and fried chicken, baked ham and barbequed brisket was set out with the fried okra, fresh tomatoes, black-eyed

I stopped to admire Tisha Barton, black haired great granddaughter of Iola and Ted Barton, who was making her first appearance at age 3 1/2 months. She is the daughter of Shirlee and Larry Barton of Enid, Oklahoma. And I sought Mrs. Ruby New of Rising Star to tell her I had the old photograph taken of the baptizing at Sipe Springs reservoir some decades ago. At age 92 Mrs. New still lives alone and was looking forward to her August birthday. One of 13 children of Columbus Monroe Lee and his wife, Selena Chandler Lee, she is

the sole survivor of this big family. Her escort was a daughter, Jeffa Nell New Fenwick of Abilene.

I would have traded hats with Kenneth Foster of Austin, but his Panama was a special gift from a son and is only worn on special occasions so that eliminated a trade.

Oleta Stamey came by to say that the Stamey family had a grand total present of 24. And I am sure that just about everybody at the Homecoming was a bit of kin to one another or a brother-in-law.

Plans are currently underway to complete the new chain link fence across the north line of the cemetery. And without reservation those donors and workers who have made the repairs and upkeep possible can point with pride to the grounds and tabernacle and say "the best kept Cemetery in Comanche County."

## Pension Offset May Affect Spouse's Social Benefit

People working in a Federal, State, or local government job not covered by social security should know that the pension from this work could affect the social security benefit they were expecting to receive as a husband or wife, Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

This is because the social security benefit for a husband, wife, widow, or widower will be reduced-dollar for dollar-by the amount of the government pension. This offset will not affect the amount of the government pension or the amount of any social security benefit the person receives based on his or her own work covered by social security.

In addition, Hammons said, the law provides an exception for some people. A person is exempt from the offset if:

• He or she is eligible to receive a Federal, State, or local government pension before December 1982 even though he or she does not apply for it, and

• He or she meets all the requirements for wife's husband's, widow's, or widower's benefits in effect in January 1977. At that time, a man had to have been dependent upon his wife for more than half of his support to be eligible as a husband or widower, and a divorced woman's marriage had to have

lasted 20 years, rather than the 10 years now required for her to be eligible.

The purpose of the offset is to prevent windfall payments to retired government workers who have their own pensions and would also receive social security benefits as a spouse or surviving spouse, Hammons said.

In addition, the offset will not apply if the person's government job is covered by social security on the last day the person works.

# Sipe Springs Homecoming

WAGON WHEELS keep on turning 41st Anniversary of Sipe Springs Cemetery Association

I was a bit late turning off the Farm Road to the country lane that leads up the hill to the Sipe Springs tabernacle this past Saturday night and the cars, vans and pickup trucks were parked halfway down the hill and the musicians were already turned up and underway when I found a parking place and joined the crowd.

The very first person I stopped to greet was Master Justin Richards, 5-month old son of Jackie and Angela Richards and grandson of Bobbye and James Wyatt. Dale Merworth was carrying Justin who was garbed in blue and white striped overalls and was giving everybody a big "Howdy Do" smile!

Drifting toward the center of the tabernacle I took a seat near the musicians. This group included the Halls from Stag Creek with Leroy Woody of Rising Star on the guitar and doubling as vocalist, also Carl Hall, saxophone, and Wade Hall on the accordion completed the quartet. They played a medley of oldies. Red Wing, Cotton-eyed Joe, Beer Barrel Polka, and concluded with a

popular number from 1927-28, My Blue Heaven, with Woody on the lyrics.

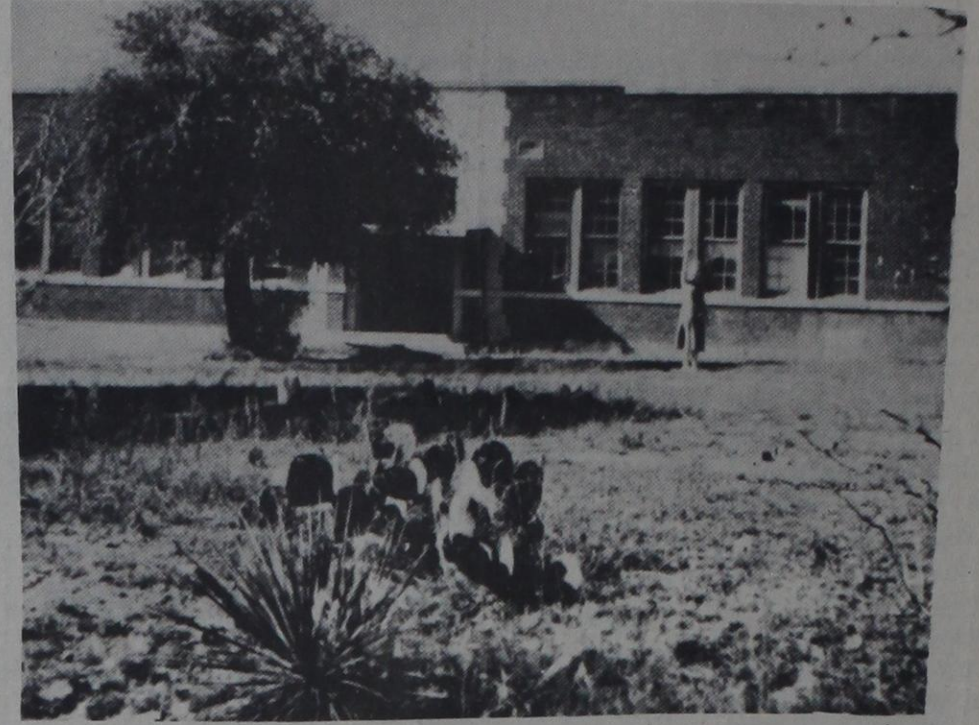
Edna Earl Jones came over to chat and pointed out the fresh coat of paint on long wooden pews. The light grey finish on the benches and tables made everything look nice and eliminated any stray splinters.

The crowd was seated on the pews under the southside of the tabernacle with a drift of visitors standing in conversation by the Mesquite trees where the water wagon was parked. It was a moonless evening but the soft summer breeze made a pleasant sharing of this 41st Homecoming and business meeting of the Sipe Springs Cemetery Association.

For thirty-nine years the Saturday night musical was held on the front porch and yard of the old Masonic building in down-town Sipe Springs. But the passing years lessened the number of helping hands when it came time to move the heavy pews from the tabernacle by the Cemetery down the hill to the musical site. Then on Sunday morning, these same workers, had to be out bright and early to load the pews on their pickup trucks and shuttle them back up

the hill and in place under the tabernacle for the Sunday meeting of the Association, plus moving two water tanks on the water wagon. So a vote was taken two years ago to hold the Saturday night musical and visiting period at the tabernacle, thus eliminating this moving task. As one pro-voter worded it, "We voted to move Mohammed to the mountain," so the entire association meeting is now held at the top of the hill under the tabernacle.

The cicadas sang in the Cedars among the toms and the fiddle swung into "Old Joe Clark" and "The 8th of January" as a musical group from De Leon took their place on the podium with Bob Solomon on the fiddle: Raymond Moore on the

lead guitar, joined by Edith Brownlee and Virginia Newcomb on guitars. Conversation ebbed and flowed as new arrivals joined the throng. Enthusiastic appreciation of the music was expressed by the applause at the conclusion of the numbers or in the hand clapping rhythm.

Duby Jones joined friends in back of me as I watched the 4th and 5th generation descendants of Sipe Springs settlers gambol on the lighted grounds around the tabernacle. Mrs. Whaley Jackson came by to visit. The musicians were playing "The Death of Floyd Collins," followed by "The Bully of the Town."

Bob Solomon swung into "Rye Whiskey;" and I looked across the scene and thought, "If you dropped from

another planet you would know you were in Texas." It was 10:00 o'clock at night and there were hatted and booted men dressed as their forebearers had dressed a century ago here on these same grounds. The only thing different was the absence of the snorting of the horses and the restless movement of the animals at the buggies and wagons. Some things have not changed.

Olin Brownlee took the fiddle and moved to the mike to sing the concluding number, "I'll Waltz Across Texas With You."

"Goodbyes" and "I'll See You Tomorrow" was heard on every side. I started to the car and stopped to chat with Lorene Foster and Dora Faye McPhail Brewer. Dora

Faye taught in the Sipe Springs schools until they closed in the '40's.

My intention of being early on Sunday morning was well and good but by the time I turned off the highway to take the country lane the dust ahead of me told that I was not first by any means. The perfectly mowed grounds were already lined with early arrivals. As I parked, others near me were taking picnic hampers and gallon jugs of tea and lemonade from the trunks of their vehicles. Scores of well filled baskets were already placed on the 10 long tables under the east side of the tabernacle.

I stopped to chat with Willie Wyatt of Mountain Grove, Missouri, who is a familiar figure at the Homecomings. A sud-

den thirst drew me to the big water wagon with its twin tanks of ice water and handy paper cups. Sharing a cold drink were Darin Leonard of Corpus Christi and Edward Millwee of Sipe Springs. Both are descendants of early day families. I asked young Millwee what brand of snuff he used and he verified my guess, "Copenhagen." He has just turned sixteen and has embarked on a career of bull riding this summer. He said he lost his seat before the buzzer sounded at Zephyr recently, but hopes to do better in his next try.

J.R. Hill of Bangs came by and chatted. Then young Clint Leonard came by with a horned toad. I took the reptile and held it to check the tiny claws and horny spines that

gives the name "Horned," to the Texas toad. About this time a gaggle of Nonnie and Mae Leonard's grandsons came by, Terry Leonard of Abilene, Gayle Leonard of Fort Worth and Gary Leonard of Odessa. 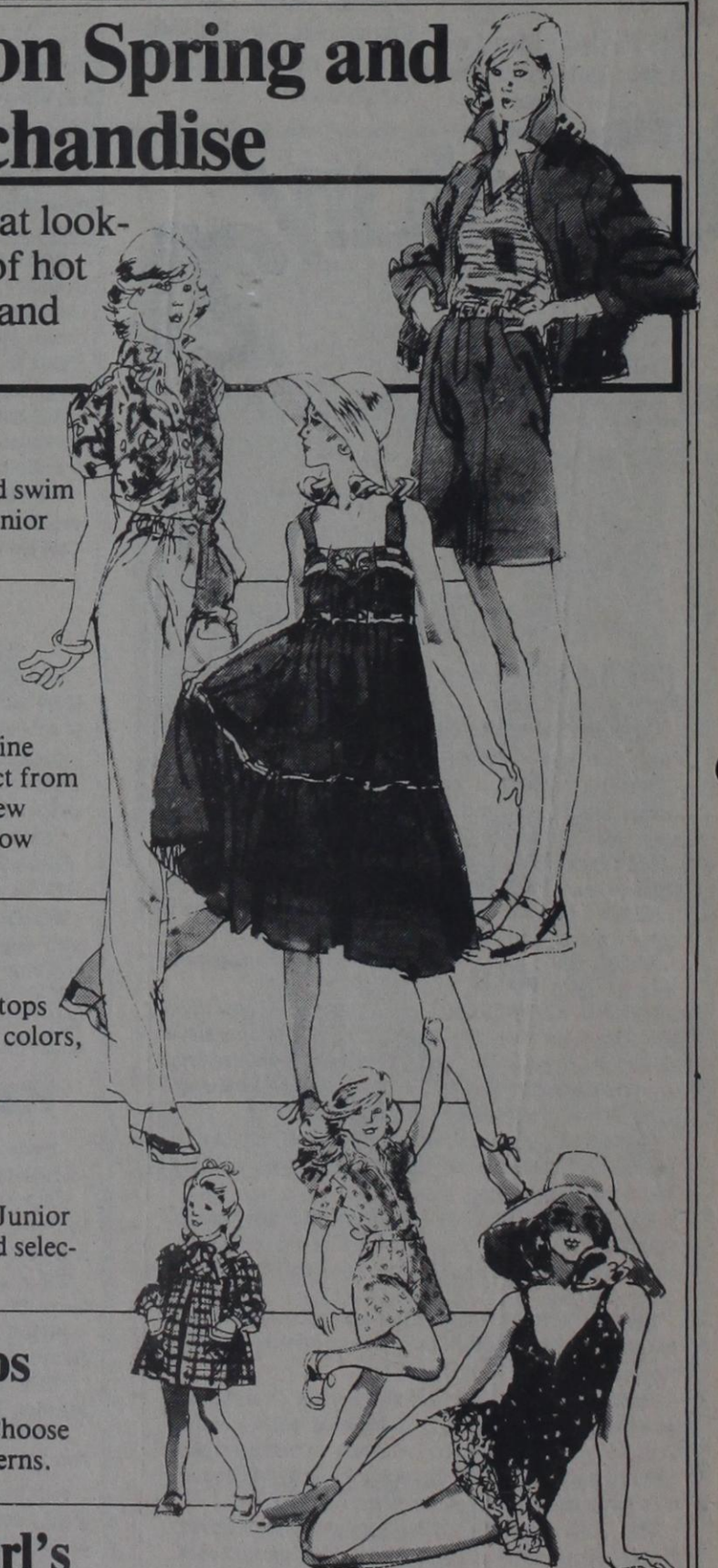
