**A SALUTE TO PROGRESS...**

Marjory West

Marjory Steel West was born on a farm, southwest of Rising Star, in Brown County, in the year 1914, one of two daughters of George and Maggie Steel. As a child, Marjory attended rural schools, using her horse as the means of transportation. The schools were one and two room types, with each teacher having charge of several grades. With a twinkle in her exquisite brown eyes, she recalls, "I think of those days with fond memories. Happy times, filled with the joy of living." Marjory remembers the schools taught a frank love for our great country. The history of our great nation was presented with pride and gratitude. The basic "Three Rs" were faithfully instilled into each student. It was a "no-frills" education, but one which was guaranteed to "stick to" the learner.

In May of 1935, Marjory graduated from Cross Plains High School. On November 24, that same year, she married Marion West of Rising Star. They bought their first farm, located two miles south of Rising Star, where they presently live. The West have two daughters and one son. They also are blessed with three grandchildren. Their son, Oliver, lives in Rising Star, while their daughter, Wanda Brown, lives in Carrollton, Texas; Juanita West Hollis, their youngest makes her home in Stephenville Texas.

In 1952, Marjory took a job with Kizer Telephone Co. She worked as an operator for several years, and was promoted to the business office, where she worked till

the office closed in 1971. When asked if she had any outstanding hopes and dreams as she grew up, Marjory told of her hopes for surgery which would relieve her feet of their handicapped condition. The first surgery, at age eight, was not successful; because of that discouragement, she felt she never wanted to try again. However, when she was 50 years old, the wife of a former Rising Star doctor was helpful in persuading her to go to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, where she again had surgery on her feet. Upon her return to her home, she went right to work, again, at the telephone office, being off only long enough to have the removal of the cast, three months later. In retrospect, she stated, "Though the surgery did not entirely end my handicap, my feet and legs are so much stronger and better, I certainly feel my dreams of good-walking feet have been fulfilled."

She tells of some hard times, and rough, in her lifetime having gone through days of the depression, the Second World War, and other difficult days. But, she is certain that learning to cope with many of those hardships was very helpful in the development of endurance, patience and strength of her character. In such times, one learns to "make do-get by the best you can. Marjory tells of the days just prior to the War, at the approach of the time of the peanut harvest, when the Draft picked off the four young lads who were helpers in the farm work. "In fact, in a matter of weeks, every boy of draft age, disappeared from our midst. We tried to

use some who offered their services on the farms, they being too old for the Army. It was soon learned they were also past the age to put in long, hot days in the peanut fields, too. I thought, well, I've tried to do a lot of things in my lifetime too. I thought, well, I've tried to do a lot of things in my lifetime, and been pretty successful in most. So, why not give it a whirl in the peanut hay work?" She soon developed quite a skill at tying hay bales-so much so that her reputation as a competent worker went far and wide over this part of the country. She tells of an incident when two farmers got into an argument. One said, "There's a woman over in Brown County who can out-tie any man I ever heard of, tying hay bales." The other replied, "Well, she can't come nowhere near as good as the one over in Eastland County!" The argument grew quite heated, for a time, until someone was sharp enough to ask they name of the woman of whom each spoke. It was then discovered they were both talking of the one and only Marjory West, who lived so near the county line, each man was claiming her in his own.

Marjory was asked if there were any certain quality of life which she would like to bequeath to her children and grandchildren. She replied she felt she had so lived that she could leave a full measure of enthusiasm, hope and personal strength of character to her progeny.

Retirement has not pushed inertia upon Marjory West, for she has kept busy with her family, home and hobbies. She has made an interesting collection of upwards of 200 dolls, many of which are hand-crafted, hand-painted, and hand-dressed.

In the collection there are such nationally, and internationally, known figures as President John F. Kennedy, Jackie Kennedy, Dwight Eisenhower, Queen Elizabeth, Dale Evans and Shirley Temple-just to name a few. She also keeps busy at crocheting and other hand-work. Her next "collecting-love" is an ever-growing number of rapiers.

Visitors present were Troy Willett and Travis Williams. Travis Williams, local WTU manager discussed the new meter deposit system adopted by West Texas Utilities with members of the City Council.

Councilmen discussed outstanding debts. The service contract for the posting machine (billing machine) was discussed. The council is considering the possibility of going to a computer operation for billing.

Mayor Lee told the council that a sewer line roto-roter has been ordered for the city. Several problems have arisen the last couple of weeks of sewer lines.

H.L. Killion made a motion to pay the existing contract made with the Eastland County Dispatch Co-Op, up until the time of the one year

In other business, the council voted to pay bills. There being no further business on the agenda, the council adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

## Stenholm Announces That Recommendations For The 1979 Peanut Crop Program Are Being Sought

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announces that the public has been invited to recommend price support levels and other provisions of the 1979 crop peanut program by February 5, 1979.

Among the items for which recommendations are sought are:

- the national support level for quota peanuts;
- the national support level for additional peanuts;
- sales policy for additional peanuts acquired by the government under the 1979 program and sold for export edible use.

Comments should be directed to the Acting Director, Price Support and Loan Division, ASCS, USDA Room 3741 South Building, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Legislation requires price support of not less than \$420 per ton be made available on 1979 crop peanuts produced within a farm's poundage quota. It also requires price support on peanuts produced within a farm's acreage allotment but in excess of the poundage

Perhaps no greater burden can rest upon a person that to know of some wrong done that is not made right.

So often an unkind word spoken, an insult given, a fight which injured, or an indiscretion pursued have left a mark on the lives of others and upon ourselves. The results can hardly be changed but we can be changed.

In Psalm 32 David was in such a situation. The Bible calls such harmful acts sin. Here in the Psalm David explains the full meaning of sinful acts. Sin is a transgression that is a stepping over prescribed laws and doing what is wrong. It is missing the mark, that is not living up to what one should. It is also iniquity or inner impurity causing one to turn aside.

The sense of guilt because of sin should be normal and natural. Failure to rid ourselves of guilt can have a devastating effect upon our lives. David spoke of it as a wasting away. He said that his strength was sapped as in the heat of summer. (Verses 3-4)

True guilt can destroy us both mentally and physically. Shakespeare said that the mind full of guilt is full of scorpions.

Is there freedom, a release, an avenue of escape? We can never undo that harm done to others but we can renew our own soul before God. "For there is forgiveness with thee..." (Psalm 130:4)

We must start somewhere. Verse five as Socino Commentary puts it says, "I began to make known to thee". The Psalmist after keeping it to himself for so long just began to open his heart to the Lord about his sin. He admitted it was there. He is stopped trying to hide it.

Secondly, He confessed it to God. To confess is to "say the same thing about it that God says about it." We might say it this way, "God you have always said this (whatever the sin might be) is wrong. I agree with you. It is wrong. I have sinned before you, against others and myself."

What happened? God forgave him! Peace of mind and heart returned to his soul. (Verses 5,11).

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9).

I believe that we know deep down inside that this is wrong and cannot be God's way. When the errors were "little" it was harder to see, but not any more. The truth to people who want it is: Get back to the Bible and to the Bible only. More than ever we need to return to the grand old Book. It remains "a lamp unto our feet, and a light unto our pathway." (Psalm 119:105). We desperately need to teach only and all the Bible. **Sun. 7th:** React members assisted two cars which had slid off in the ditch on Hi. W. 36.





# Conrad Hilton, Hotel Magnate, Bought His First Hotel In Cisco

Conrad Hilton, the small boy who became a 235-hotel magnate opened his first hotel in Cisco, Texas. When he died of pneumonia late Wednesday in Santa Monica, California, his name had become a synonym for hotel. He was board chairman of a hotel chain estimated to be worth more than half a billion dollars.

The 91-year-old hotel magnate, who was born on Christmas Day in San Antonio, New Mexico, died at 10 p.m. Wednesday, three days after entering St. John's Hospital, said Jacques, Cosse, spokesman for the Hilton Hotels Division of Hilton Hotels Corporation.

Although his eldest son, 50-year-old Barron, is president of Hilton Hotels Corp., the lean 6-foot-2 elder Hilton remained active in the business.

"He was working right up until just before Christmas," Cosse said. "He was ill and went into the hospital just before the holidays and then went back into the hospital three days ago."

Although a New Mexican by birth, Hilton came to the West Texas oil fields during the boom of 1919 and opened his first hotel in Cisco. That was the Mobley, located at Avenue D and Fourth Street, a structure that was sleeping oil field workers in three shifts. Hilton invested his life savings of \$5,000 in the Mobley.

The two-story, red brick Mobley Hotel contained 50 rooms. In his autobiography, *Be My Guest*, Hilton recalled, "The Mobley, when I first saw it, looked like a convenient place to sleep. Nothing more."

But he bought it after the owner said, "I'm tied down here to this glorified boarding house when I ought to be out there in the oil field making real money."

About the Mobley, Hilton also said, "The Mobley in Cisco, my first love, was a great lady. She taught us the way to promotion and pay, plus a lot about running hotels. She was indestructible the ideal hotel to practice on. L.M. Brown and I did just that."

"It was at the Mobley that I tried out two principles that have been basic in every one of my subsequent operations from Waco to Istanbul."

In his acknowledgments for the book, Hilton stated, "My greatest debt, however, is to each individual who has ever been my guest in any hotel—

whether in Cisco, Texas, New York or Istanbul—and to all those who will be my guests in the future. Without each and every one of them there would be no story to write."

The Mobley is still standing and was bought last year by a Houston trust. It is not known what the trust plans to do with the hotel.

From his success in Cisco, Hilton bought a series of small hotels in Texas and finally built his first one in Dallas.

The first building to bear his name as a Hilton Hotel was in Abilene: the current hotel Windsor at North Fourth and Pine. The Windsor operated under a lease with the Hilton name from its opening in 1927 to 1945.

Hilton also had hotels in Fort Worth, Dallas, Corsicana, Waco, Marlin, Plainview, San Angelo, Lubbock and El Paso. The Hilton Hotel in San Angelo is not the Cactus Hotel.

The real test of Hilton's business acumen came during the Depression, when 81 percent of the nation's hotels fell into bankruptcy. At one point, he was \$500,000 in debt with no income.

The Depression over, Hilton branched out in the late 1930's in time to capitalize on the World War II boom, and in 1942 he entered the New York hotel field. In 1945 he bought Chicago's Stevens Hotel and Palmer House. Another prestigious hotel he acquired was the Town in Los Angeles.

His biggest satisfaction came when the Waldorf-Astoria in New York

joined the Hilton chain in 1949, making him the No. 1 American hotelman.

The creation of Hilton International was highlighted by the construction of the Caribe Hilton in 1949. In the next decade, the Caribe Hilton's profits made possible eight more international hostels from Mexico City to Berlin. Hilton International's properties—owned, leased or managed—had grown to more than 50 hotels by the early '70s.

Hilton's continental U.S. collection had expanded to include 185 hotels.

Hilton's international operations are basically a lease arrangement with little or no equity interest in the hotels. Ownership of real estate is a much larger factor in domestic operations.

Known to employees as a gentle executive, Hilton was boyish, candid and trusting, with a hard streak of practicality and the ability to turn a shrewd deal.

"Connie," as friends called him, credited his success mainly to opportunities he saw lying in front of people who were looking elsewhere.

For example, in 1942, he bought Waldorf-Astoria Corp. bonds with a face value of \$500,000 for \$22,500 or 4 1/2 cents on the dollar. Later he sold these for \$412,000.

In 1949, he acquired operating control of the fashionable Waldorf-Astoria for \$3 million.

He hired hotel managers who knew the business and did not concern himself with operating details. But he insisted on increased financial returns, the guest for which he called "digging for gold."

Work was said to be the great love of his life.

Hilton's marriages to Zsa Zsa Gabor and Mary Barron ended in divorce. Miss Gabor said she visited him in the hospital shortly before his death.

Hilton is survived by his third wife, Mary Frances, who he married in 1976; two sons, Barron Hilton, president of Hilton Hotels Corp., and Michael Eric Hilton, a corporation vice president in Houston; and a daughter, Francesca, of Los Angeles. A third son, Conrad Nicholson Hilton Jr., known as "Nick" as former husband of actress Elizabeth Taylor, died of a heart attack in 1969.

Cosse said Hilton's death should not have "much effect on the ownership or leadership of the corporation because his son, Barron, is the corporate president and has been for some time."

carbon dioxide in the air to produce the lumber and shade we need," says Janne. "Too often we take the majestic beauty of our trees for granted; we forget the benefits they give us. As a gift to future generations, we should initiate programs in our community to plant trees in our home yards, parks, public grounds and many of the so-called waste lands, contends the landscape horticulturist.

Texas Arbor Day, the day traditionally set aside to plant trees, will be observed this year on Jan. 19.

"What better way to aid in preserving our environment than by planting a tree adapted to our area of this great state," emphasizes Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Arbor Day was once a special event in the lives of many Texas citizens. In many communities, the trees that are so admired today are the direct result of the labor and attention given so readily by children and interested adults of by-gone generations notes Janne.

"In recent years, much has been written about the value of trees for purposes other than to provide lumber and shade. Research reports indicate that tree barriers can reduce noise levels as much as 50 percent. They also serve as giant air cleaners filtering out the dust as well as using the

When planting a tree, give some thought in selecting varieties and species suited to the area, advises Janne. Too frequently people are impatient and want immediate results, so weak, fast growing varieties are used. All too often the silver maple, cottonwood, Siberian elm and other rapidly growing trees grow, mature and die out in one or two generations. For permanent plantings select oak, pecan, magnolia, bald cypress,

Deodar cedar and similar species.

"Remember, Texas Arbor Day occurs during the prime tree planting season. The cold, usually moist soil at this time allows tree roots to become established before top growth occurs. Trees are usually in prime condition for transplanting at this time and the chances for success are greatest," says Janne.

GORDON SPOT

The new year began with lots of bad weather. County stockmen, who have already reduced cattle herds to the lowest level in several years, are wishing they had even fewer cattle to feed.

The water supply is also very critical in some areas of the County. Many large stock tanks in the eastern part of the county are dry or almost dry.

With livestock feeding so critical now stockmen should separate dry cows and those with calves if at all possible. Supplemental requirements of these animals differ greatly. If adequate amounts of high quality hay or standing forage are available, the nutrient most deficient in the diet of a dry cow is protein. Under these conditions a high-protein, natural supplement is often the cheapest means of supplementation. The amount of supplement required might range from less than 1 lb. to 2 lb. per day depending on the quality of forage available. Liquid supplements and protein blocks may be applicable, especially if their convenience is considered important.

On the other hand, a cow with a calf is usually deficient in energy, or simply fuel to operate, as well as protein. Here a medium protein (15-25 percent crude protein), medium to high energy supplement is often most feasible. Liquid supplements and protein blocks are generally less desirable under these conditions for cows with calves because of their low energy content. Applicable classes of supplements are range cubes and mixtures of oilseed meal and gran. A common mix of the latter type would contain by weight 1/4 to 1/3 oil meal

and 3/4 to 2/3 grain. Anywhere from 3 to 6 lb. per day of such supplements may be necessary. The appropriate amount of feed would vary according to the quality and quantity of hay or grass.


