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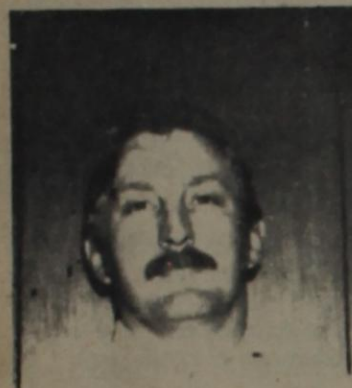

## FROM OUR CHURCHES

### Church of Christ

#### WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?

**Jon N. Bailey**  
**QUESTION:** What kind of faith saves a man from sin?

**ANSWER:** The above question will be answered quite differently by members of various religious groups. Some will answer that simple acceptance of the fact that God exists is sufficient faith to save. Others maintain that a person must believe in Jesus and "receive" him as one's "Personal Savior". Still others will answer that saving involves the belief that "God, for Christ's sake, has forgiven" one's sins. Numerous variations of these same answers can be obtained. The basic error of all these views is the teaching that saving faith is an inward feeling or emotion rather than obeying God.

The scriptures teach that God saves man on the basis of faith (Rom. 3:22, 26; 4:5; 5:1; Eph. 2:8; etc.). The scriptures also make clear that this faith is an obedient faith (Rom. 1:5; 16:26; James 2:14-26). Jesus is "the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him" (Heb. 5:9). Those who do not obey the Lord shall be eternally lost (John 3:36; 2 Thess. 1:7-9). Saving faith not only believes that God exists, but that "he is a rewarder of them that seek him" (Heb. 11:6). Saving faith will believe, trust, and obey every statement, promise and command of God.

Saving faith involves a DECISION of faith. Everyone who truly believes in God must decide to turn from sin and serve God. This decision is called "repentance". Jesus said, "except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Lk. 13:5). Even though one who believes in Jesus "should not perish, but have eternal life", if a person's faith does not bring him to repentance, he shall perish eternally (ACTS 2:38; 3:19; 17:30; etc.).

Saving faith involves a DECLARATION of faith. A person who believes in Jesus Christ, must also declare this faith before men (Mt. 10:32-33). Just as Peter (Mt. 16:16) and Timothy (1 Tim. 6:12) made the "good confession" so must every person who desires salvation declare this faith, "because if thou shalt confess with thy mouth Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thy heart that God raised him from the dead thou shalt be saved: for with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Rom. 10:9-10).

Saving faith also involves

**DEMONSTRATION** of faith. Every person who believes the gospel must also demonstrate his faith in baptism if he is to be saved, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..." (Mk. 16:15-16). In baptism we demonstrate our faith in God (Col. 2:12), believing that our sins will be washed away (Acts 22:16) as we receive salvation (1 Peter 3:21). In baptism we demonstrate our faith in the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus for we are "baptized into his death", "buried" with him, and "raised" to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:3-5; Col. 2:12). From this point on we must live faithful to God, "faithful unto death".

Have you been saved by faith as the Bible teaches? Are you living faithful to God now?

#### The Key To Health

"Pure air, sunlight, abstemiousness, rest, exercise, proper diet, the use of water, trust in divine power—these are the TRUE, REMEDIES. **PURE AIR**

The building of homes, should include plans that provide for letting in an abundance of sunlight. All rooms should be well supplied by mother nature's gift during various times of the day.

Many people today would take on a more healthy color and appearance if only they would get a little sunshine. Sun baths in a proper enclosure can be taken up to an hour at a time.

**ABSTEMIOUSNESS**  
 Abstemiousness means to be sparing in the use of good food, and abstaining from those things that are harmful. Many reasons can be given why we should abstain from taking into our body, such things as: white sugar products, tea, and coffee, hard fats, spices, flesh meats, and milk and sugar combinations.

Abstaining would include not eating one morsel between meals. Regular hours for meals should provide, to maintain proper digestion of foods. "Abstemiousness in diet is rewarded with mental and moral vigor; it also aids in the control of the passions. Overeating is especially harmful to those who are sluggish in temperament; these should eat sparingly, and take plenty of physical exercise."

"Let Your Moderation Be Known Unto All Men."

Eat and fill yourself; but don't eat and kill yourself.

### First Baptist Church

Much emphasis is given these days to the importance of physical exercise. A healthy body is a good house to live in.

What is true of the body is true of our spiritual life. Paul commands to train yourself in godliness. (1 Tim. 4:8)

This suggests that godliness just doesn't happen. Further, it takes work and effort to achieve godliness in this life.

Spiritual laziness, spectator christianity, or supernatural miracle will not do what God has ordained to be accomplished by discipline, sweat, and perseverance.

## Sheriff's Office Odd Auction

The Eastland County Sheriff's Office will hold an unusual public auction of three horses on Monday, August 11, 1980, at 10:00 a.m. in Ranger, Texas.

The sale is the result of complaints made to the Sheriff's Office about the three horses belonging to Mr. William S. Hines of Ranger who reportedly had left the horses without food and water.

After investigation of the matter, Sheriff Johnnie W. Morran filed an application with Justice of the Peace M.D. Underwood of Ranger to seize cruelly treated animals.

Judge Underwood ordered the horses seized by the Sheriff and set a hearing on the matter.

At the hearing, Mr. Hines did not appear and the testimony showed that the horses had gone for some

time without food and water except what was furnished by neighbors.

After hearing the evidence presented, Judge Underwood ordered the horses to be sold at a public auction.

The sale will be held at a lot of Larry Monroe in Ranger who is taking care of the horses under the Court order, signed on July 21, 1980.

District Attorney Emory Walton said that this is the first time he is aware of the 1975 law being used to this extent in Eastland County because in other instances the law enforcement officials have been able to resolve the matter with the owners.

# GORDON SPOT

Hot summer temperatures can put cattle in stress and cause death losses if they are not managed properly.

With proper management, cattlemen should not lose any cattle or suffer production losses during hot weather.

When outside temperatures range from 90-100 degrees F., cattle should be left alone as much as possible. Avoid movement, crowding and handling of cattle because exercise and excitement increase body temperature. When the animal's physiological mechanisms are already trying to reduce body temperature during hot weather, any extra physical trauma may result in permanent damage or death to the animal.

Also, protect cattle from flies by using sprays, dustbags, oillers or other approved control measures.

In addition, delay surgery such as dehorning and castration during hot weather since excessive bleeding may occur due to the animal's increased blood flow.

It's also vital that cattle have a water supply available. Many creeks and stock tanks dry up during a long, hot summer such as the one we've been experiencing this year. If water has to be hauled, remember that a yearling requires 8-12 gallons of water a day during hot weather while a cow nursing a calf needs about 16 gallons.

If cattle must be moved on foot or transported during heat stress periods, this should be done during the early morning, at night or in late afternoon when temperatures are cooler. If cattle must be moved and then later worked, they

should be moved to a holding trap in late evening and worked early the next morning. Keep cattle as calm as possible and avoid overcrowding.

Although wind movement from fans can increase feed intake, daily gains and improved feed conversion for feedlot cattle, shade is about the only economical means for cow-calf operators to change the environment. Research has shown that during periods of 90 degrees F. weather with a relative humidity of 63 percent, cattle under shade gained weight while those without shade lost weight.

To improve management practices, producers must first understand the physiological mechanisms that beef cattle use to control body heat create by increased environmental temperatures. Animals seek to remove excessive heat by increased blood flow, water is added to the blood and there is a greater rate of respiration and sweating. All cattle possess the ability to maintain body temperatures under heat stress. Studies have shown that Brahman and Brahman cross cattle maintain lower body temperatures and respiration rates due to a lower heat production when compared to other breeds.

It is important to the life processes of the animal that a normal temperature be maintained. The normal body temperature of cattle taken rectally averages 101.5° F. and has a range of 100.4-102.8 degrees F. It is lower in cold weather, in older animals and at night. Rising environmental temperatures as well as excitement, exercise and infection increase this body

temperature along with the pulse and respiration rates. The pulse rate indicates the rapidity of heart action. It can be taken either on the outside of the jaw just above its lower border, on the soft area immediately above the inner dewclaw, or just above the hock joint. The normal pulse rate is 60-67 per minute.

To determine the respiration rate, place the hand on the flank or observe the use and fall of the flanks. The normal respiration rate is 10-30 per minute.

With proper care during hot weather, cattle can continue to function efficiently. The key is to keep their rate of activity down.

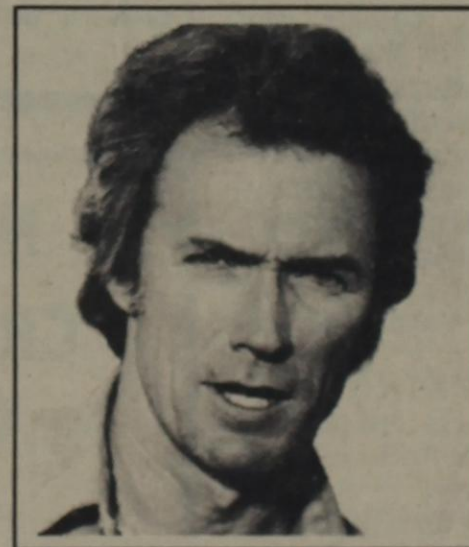
