Public Hearing on Financing Education in Dallas August 2

AUSTIN - The Select Committee on Education will sponsor public hearings in eight Texas cities Aug. 1 through Sept. 7 to elicit comment on Texas' current system of public education financing.

Public hearings are scheduled in Tyler, Dallas, Austin, Edinburg, San Antonio, Lubbock, El Paso and Houston.

Governor Bill Clements created the 15-member blue ribbon panel in response to a ruling by Austin state District Judge Harley Clark, who declared unconstitutional the state's method of funding its public schools.

In addition to examining the state's system of education financing, the panel is evaluating the organization and management of Texas public schools and analyzing student performance.

The committee is scheduled to issue its report by Jan. 1, 1989.

The hearing in Dallas will be August 2, 9-5, SMU Hughes-Trigg Student Center Theatre, 3140 Dyer, Dallas, TX 75275.

The Select Committee on Education was created to examine the organization, management, and financing of public education and to evaluate measures to ensure accountability in Texas schools. The committee

seeks comments and suggestions on various issues and concepts under consideration. To be most effective with the use of your time, please make your remarks relative to the areas listed below.

Student Performance Issues:
-State funding tied to student performance.

-Expansion of student testing to include norm-referencing for comparative purposes and to include more emphasis on higher order thinking skills.

-Limiting state accreditation cycle visits for exemplary school districts. Expanded state intervention for poor performing districts.

Finance Issues:
-Establishment of a required minimum level of local expenditures.

-Establishment of a maximum level or cap on local expenditures.

-Full State Funding.
-Retention or expansion of the current system of a basic per student allotment with supplements for specific educational programs and special district circumstances.

-Funding for public education guaranteed yield basis which provides reward for high local tax effort and penalty for low tax effort districts.

-Recapture of funds above the recognized state program for a basic education from wealthy, low effort local districts to be redirected to low wealth, high need districts.

-Establishment of an emergency capital fund to address specific facilities problems in high need, high tax, low wealth districts.

-Creation of an equalized per pupil allotment for capital depreciation and debt service.

-Substitution of a county authority for taxation purposes only rather than on a local school district basis.

-Taxing of oil/gas and utility properties equity with adequacy in public school finance.

Legal Issues:
-A constitutional amendment validating legislative prerogative in establishing policy and financing for Texas public education.

County Commissioners Denied Variance for Laying Pipeline

Eastland County Commissioners Monday denied a request of Bengal Gas Transmission Co. to lay a gas pipeline on a road right-of-way west of Cisco. This would be in the Dothan Community in Pct. 4, with Billy Bacon the Commissioner.

Billy Wright Jr., Cisco attorney, again accompanied representatives of Bengal Gas and made the request. He first brought the request to the Court on June 27.

At that time Truman Bacon and Clifford Pippen also came before the Court and spoke in opposition to the pipeline.

Attorney Billy Wright said Monday that Bengal Gas was a "public utility" and "common carrier," and entitled to run the line. He also discussed how the Company could meet legal requirements on space, depth and type of pipe required.

Bacon told Wright and the Bengal officials that landowners on both sides of the road pay taxes on the land and the County only has an easement. He said he had measured the road - it was too narrow for a pipeline to be laid beside it.

"Frankly, I don't want you on the County road," the Commissioner said. "It's too dangerous. If my crew hit a rock, cut the pipeline - got a fire started or a man electrocuted - I don't want to be responsible."

Other Commissioners, L.T. Owen, Richard Robinson and Norman Christian, also said that granting permission to Bengal could "cause problems". They voted against it, with Bacon abstaining, since a relative owns land along the road.

The Bengal representatives asked to be placed on the August 11 Commissioners Court agenda, where they will request a pipeline crossing on the road.

In other matters, the Commissioners approved a request from Paladin Geophysical Inc. to conduct seismic tests along a 4.7 mi. stretch of County road southwest of Cisco.

They also granted a request from Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2, to buy a used Motor Grader and spare parts from the Texas Highway Department.

On Jail Standards compliance, Billy Bacon reported that 22 prisoners were presently in the county jail, and the facility "looked good." But he also reported that the ice machine had quit working, and ice was having to be made in the deep freezer.

The Commissioners voted to purchase another ice maker for the jail, at a cost of around \$1850. This item will be purchased from a local dealer.

There was discussion of in-

creased allowance for Juvenile Detention, due to the fact that an Eastland County juvenile is now being held in the facility in Abilene for an undetermined time. The cost to the county for such detention is \$60 per day. The auditor presented bills from Attorney Bill Hart for

his continued investigation of the Garcia case. It was decided to place such bills on the budget of the 91st District Court.

On an agenda item, the Commissioners voted to use the firm of Smith, Verette and Parker for an outside audit of the County funds.

9-1-1 Equalization Surcharge Effective July 1

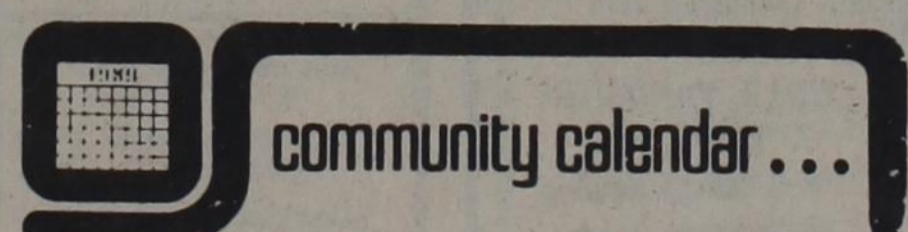
Telephone customers in 21 Texas counties are being charged a two-tenths of one percent (0.2%) 9-1-1 equalization surcharge on intrastate long distance services as of July 1. The equalization surcharge was approved by the Advisory Commission on Emergency Communications to help finance regional 9-1-1 emergency systems across Texas.

"That amounts to one cent for every \$5 of long distance billing on calls or services within Texas," according to State Representative Bill G. Carter of Fort Worth, House sponsor of House Bill 911, passed by the 70th Legislature in 1987. The surcharge is assessed only in those counties having a population greater than 120,000, Carter said.

The surcharge applies to intrastate long distance charges, including WATS, private line and data circuit services for both business and residential customers. The 9-1-1 equalization surcharge is collected by telephone companies that either provide or bill intrastate, interexchange long distance services. The companies collect the surcharge for the state as required in HB 911.

The telephone companies remit the surcharge to the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications, the agency created by HB 911 to oversee implementation of regional 9-1-1 systems throughout the state. The advisory commission will allocate the collected funds to the regional planning commissions or other public agencies designated by the regional planning commissions to help operate regional 9-1-1 systems. The legislation also states that the advisory commission may retain the

amount necessary for the agency to carry out duties.

Carter said telephone customers in counties with populations greater than 120,000 are required to pay the surcharge, even though they may not currently have 9-1-1 service available to them. "House Bill 911 requires that 9-1-1 service be available by September 1, 1995, in all Texas counties with populations greater than 120,000. So, eventually, all citizens paying the 9-1-1 surcharge will be serviced by a 9-1-1 system."

Those counties with populations greater than 120,000 are Bell, Bexar, Brazoria, Cameron, Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Lubbock, McLennan, Montgomery, Nueces, Smith, Tarrant, Travis and Wichita.

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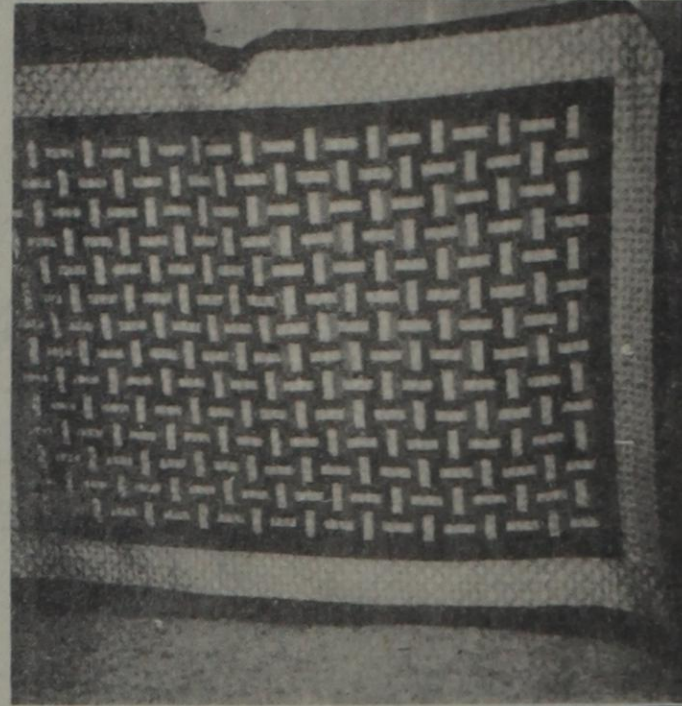

of their limitations and this can become very frustrating. They become easily confused and may display symptoms such as screaming, putting hands over ears, hand-flapping, etc., in different situations. High functioning autistic people have been known to acquire doctors' degrees, help other autistic people and work at jobs for livelihood. Later we will describe some of the symptoms of this handicap which appear in early childhood.

with a metal key into a thunder storm and got the pants near shocked off of him by lightning? Nor was that the only thing he was credited with discovering.
I enjoyed seeing people on TV who quit jobs most people would consider quite good and start new careers in midlife. Anyone who ever put a penny in their mouth can understand that tea dried on copper or brass plates can have a distinctive flavor but most think the only differences in tea are brands on the grocers shelf, whether you use lemon or maybe a bit of mint. A few try herb teas but just for the experience I tried tea dried on silver plates. Not bad at all but not different enough that there will be an American market catering to mass consumption. If tea ever attained the ritual status it holds in the Orient we might be offered tea dried on gold plates but Americans seem too busy to consider anything with a flavor variation greater than junk food. Come to think of it, that is quite a difference at times but tea tasting like wine tasting requires concentration and keen taste discrimination.
I wonder how many people visiting the fruit stand check to see what kinds of unusual fruits they have. Most often we go to buy tomatoes, peaches or melons and concentrate on those or notice any of the usual. When we see mango or other less common fruits we take no notice. It is as if we see without seeing.
Maybe I think it is so simply because I was never much on "window shopping."
Anyhow, you might even enjoy a variation from black-eye peas and corn bread.
There is an old saying, "Variety is the spice of life." For my part I have enjoyed a lot of variety and if your system isn't too badly upset by spice you might risk something for the adventure.
You can bet that a lot of new things I tried didn't suit my taste but a lot did and I am not so soured on NEW that the overused commercials of New and IMPROVED are quite repulsive. Still, I do not chase wildly about looking for unattainable satisfaction. I am a bit cautious. One brother nearly died just from eating lobster salad. Some people are allergic to shell fish and crab. I just haven't chanced any after John's near fatal meal. Cautiously or cautiously? Well, a couple of friends recently commented on my picking up mushrooms in the pasture, peeling them and eating them raw. There are supposed to be dozens of non-poisonous varieties but I only know one for certain and stick to that.
I like seeing new places and would like to travel to some exotic places to see nature and history but not the bright lights and crowds. I could never get lost in such things nor become a gourmet roaming the world testing all sorts of food. I enjoy home cooking and there is really no place like ---
