

1976-'77 School Term To Open Here Monday

Summer will officially come to an end for Rising Star young people as classes begin on Monday morning August 23 in Rising Star Public Schools.

High School students are to register this Friday, August 20, according to the following schedule released by the office of the superintendent of schools, J. L. Newbury: Freshmen, 10:00 - 11:00 a.m.; Sophomores, 11:00 - 12:00 a.m.; Juniors, 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.; Seniors, 2:00 - 3:00 p.m. Registration will be held at the high school main building.

Students who will be new in Rising Star junior high are to report for registration at the junior high building on Friday

afternoon between the hours of 1:00 and 3:00 p.m.

Classes for the fall term will begin Monday morning at 8:25. Students will be dismissed at 3:05 while teachers will remain until 3:45 for conferences, planning, etc. Mr. Newbury said.

In considering this year's enrollment, Mr. Newbury said that he anticipated an enrollment of about 270 students, with 170 of this total in the elementary school and the other 100 students enrolled in high school. He said this compared about equally with last year's enrollment figures.

Local teachers were involved this week in in-service

training and preparation for the start of class on Monday.

New to the Rising Star faculty this fall are three teachers, completing the faculty roster and making a total of 21 teachers on the faculty for the high school, junior high and elementary schools.

The new teaching personnel include Mike Davis, band director and music teacher for the entire school system; Mrs. Martha Casey who will be teaching high school English and will sponsor the yearbook and the "Wildcat Tales", and Mrs. Doris Griffin who will be teaching sixth, seventh and eighth grade science in the

junior high school Pictures and biographical sketches of Mrs. Casey and Mrs. Griffin can be found in this edition of The Rising Star. Mr. Davis was interviewed in last week's paper.

Mrs. Casey's appointment to the high school English position was made necessary by the transfer of Mrs. Linda Burns to the junior high faculty.

Light Voter Turnout Says "Thumbs Down" On County Tax Issue

A very light ballot was cast in Saturday's tax election with the count on the local scene reading 18 votes for and 40 against the proposed tax increase of 30 cents per \$100 valuation, with the said increase to be allocated to a road and bridge fund.

The Saturday election was called by the Eastland County Commissioners in an attempt to secure additional revenues to effect the inflationary increase in the cost of maintenance and construction of county roads

and bridges. The loss in this election poses another problem for the county commissioners: that of finding another means of financing the increase in operational costs.

Voting in the various boxes in the county was as follows: Eastland, 60 for, 67 against; Cisco, 47-54; Ranger, 12-43; Gorman 24-19; Carbon, 10-22; Olden, 10-26; Desdemona, 26-9; Rising Star, 18-40; Lake Leon, 5-6; with absentee votes going 10 for and 7 against.

School Announces Policy For Free Lunch Program

Rising Star schools have set a policy for free and reduced price meals and milk for children unable to pay the full price. The policy was adopted in accordance with the National School Lunch, School Breakfast and Special Milk Programs, Supt. J.L. Newbury said.

Price for the reduced lunches will be 20c. Regular lunches will be 70c, while adults lunches will be \$1.00.

Children from families whose income is at or below certain levels are eligible for free or reduced price meals and milk under the policy. Families who may not meet the criteria but suffer from other unusual expenses such as high medical costs, shelter expenses will take 300/0 of the family's medical income, special education expenses, or disaster or casualty losses may also qualify, Mr. Newbury explained.

Application forms are currently being sent to homes of the district. Additional copies are

available at the principal's office.

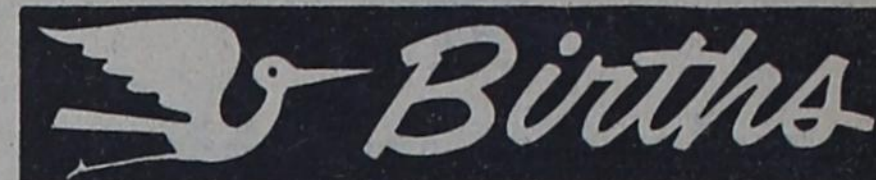

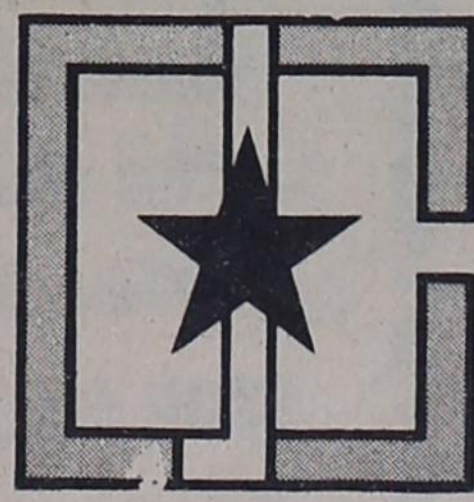

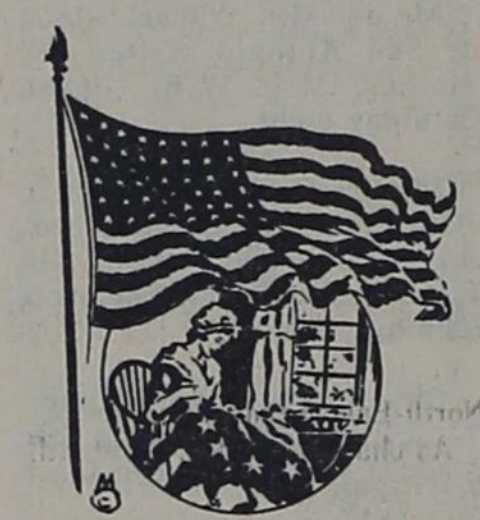

Mrs. Steel Heads Cystic Fibrosis Drive

Mrs. George Steel has been named chairman in Rising Star for the September Breath of Life Campaign of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation by William B. Henley, Jr., president of the

North-East Texas Chapter.

As chairman, Mrs. Steel will be responsible for recruiting volunteers for a public education and door-to-door drive.

According to Mr. Henley, a Dallas attorney, little more than ten years ago the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was working to deep CF youngsters alive long enough to start school. But today, because of earlier diagnosis and advances in research and care, half of these same patients have grown to young adulthood. "It is progress such as this that is supported by volunteering and contributing to the Breath of Life Campaign," he pointed out.

Roberta Peters, internationally known opera star and National Campaign Chairman for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation urges: "When a CF Breath of Life marcher knocks on your door, give as generously as your able. Remember that even today, with the improvements research and care have brought, there is no cure for this inherited disease. It is still destroying lungs, digestion and lives."

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation supports over 100 CF Centers across the nation, five of which are in Texas. These Centers provide diagnosis and treatment for children who have CF and other lung-damaging diseases. The foundation also finances research to find a cure and improved control for cystic fibrosis, the most serious of the lung-damaging diseases, and to develop better treatment for children suffering from all lung disorders.

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. It affects one out every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits one carrier gene from each parent. The parents do not have Cystic Fibrosis, but they are among the 10 million carriers of the gene in the United States. One goal of Foundation-supported research is a test to detect these carriers.

"We don't need more reasons than these to actively support the Breath of Life Campaign," says Miss Peters.

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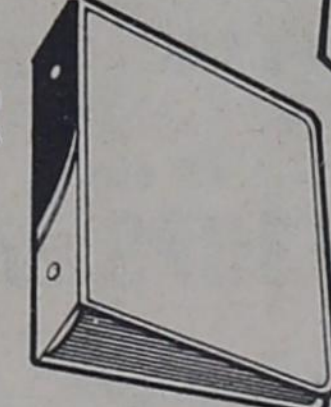

Bentsen Praises Changes In Estate Tax

Washington, D.C.—Senator Lloyd Bentsen Friday said changes in the estate tax approved by the Senate, which have the effect of increasing the tax exemption to \$200,000, are a boon to the widows and children of farmers, ranchers, and small businessmen in Texas.

Bentsen, a member of the Senate Finance Committee, had introduced a bill to increase the inheritance tax exemption from \$60,000 to \$200,000. The inheritance tax changes written by the Finance Committee and approved by the full Senate late Thursday night include portions of the Bentsen bill and portions of measures proposed by other Senators.

It would replace the existing estate tax exemption with a \$30,000 credit against the estate tax which would gradually increase to a \$50,000 credit by 1981. This would be the equivalent of a \$200,000 exemption.

"Sixty thousand dollars is no longer a typical value for a small farm or ranch or business, as it was when this exemption was set in 1942. We live in a far different world and I am pleased that the Senate has acted to correct this situation," Bentsen said.

"According to best estimates, for example, a farmer earning only about \$10,000 a year will leave an estate valued at \$320,000. An inheritance exemption of only \$60,000 for him means his widow and his sons and daughters would have to sell the family farm just to pay the taxes," the Senator said.

The Senate-approved bill also includes a provision by Bentsen against artificially high land valuations that drive up the estate tax. It prohibits an existing Internal Revenue Service practice of assessing some farm land at its commercial rather than its agricultural value for estate tax purposes.

"From all evidence the federal inheritance tax is helping break up the family farm, ranch and business and I am hopeful that Congress will give final approval to these changes in the tax this year," Senator Bentsen said.
