## Budget Work Begins For County Commissioners

With discussion of the Patterson Ambulance Service deferred until Monday afternoon, Eastland County Commissioners tackled a number of other agenda items last Monday morning.

Requests for salary raises threaded through discussions on the 1989-90 county budget. It was finally suggested that across-the-board raises would be in order, with an additional 30 cents per hour for all full-time employees, and a \$30 increase per pay period for all elected officials.

It was also suggested that additional increases be given to the Justices of the Peace in Pct. 2 and 4, raising their sal-

ary to the level of the J.P. in Pct. 1.

Pct. 2 Justice of the Peace Alford Bush was granted a request for a larger office. The Commissioners agreed to pay an additional \$75 per month to rent an office in Ranger which Lone Star is leaving. Bush will move into these quarters on June 1.

On other job-related matters, the Commissioners approved a request by County Tax Collector Nancy Trout to give full-time employees for 10 years or more three weeks of vacation. Employees now get two weeks off after they've worked a year.

## County Commissioners Will Reconsider Ambulance Service

Tom Patterson of Patterson Ambulance Service came to Commissioners Court Monday to request that the Court not make any decisions about subsidizing ambulances from hospitals until the current situation could be re-evaluated.

Patterson said things had changed so drastically in the last few days that no decision should be made until the failure of the Cisco Hospital tax referendum and other matters be reconsidered. The bankruptcy filing of Ranger General Hospital could also bring changes, he said.

"We will continue to stay here and work and cooperate," the Ambulance Service owner said. "We will need financial support for this, for there has been a decrease in Medicare payments." There were also more welfare and indigent cases, Patterson informed the Commissioners.

"I figure we have saved the county \$1.7 million tax dollars (in the nine years of our operation)," Patterson stated.

Besides service Cisco and Eastland, Patterson said, his Ambulance Service backed up Ranger, Rising Star, Calhoun County and Clyde.

He said he lost on many Interstate runs, for he couldn't collect from out-of-state people.

Patterson reported that Ambulance memberships ran out in June, and the Company would put on a regular membership drive.

The Commissioners said they had not made any decisions on Ambulance Services and would not do so until the Cisco election could be evaluated.

Later Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, said that if subsidies were called for he had a problem with subsidizing a private business. "If we help him (Patterson) we open the door to help everyone," he stated.

Tommy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, also said he not in favor of helping private individuals with county tax money.

## Glasgow, Parker On Hoos-Gow Bandwagon

Twenty-eight members of the Eastland County Economic Development Council travelled to Austin for meetings with legislators Bob Glasgow and Jim Parker at breakfast Monday morning. Both promised enthusiastically to give 100 percent support to Eastland County in its efforts to obtain a state prison. Jim Parker stated that Eastland County was an ideal site for a large prison due to its central location and having services of the I-20 freeway. Also the nearness to the DFW metroplex which furnishes about 25 percent of the Department of Texas Corrections inmates, is a distinct plus. Senator Glasgow commented favorably on funding for this biennium and that there would probably be adequate monies for all the jail cells the governor wishes to build.

Mr. Jack Wheeler, a German native serving in Austin, hosted the breakfast and

pointed out the productivity of both our legislators and also the end of the session kept them both extremely busy.

Following the breakfast the Eastland contingent visited the bi-monthly meeting of the Board of Corrections. Of immediate importance was the announcement that requests for proposals for prison construction would be issued on May 19th and that all proposals must be in to Huntsville by June 30th. Also approved was the appointment of two sitting committees one of which affects Eastland County. These committees will be visiting proposal sites in mid summer and finalists in the selection process would probably be notified by October 1, 1989.

Visiting legislators and government officials is always a tiring task. However, all travellers reported a good trip and were very pleased at the response of the legislators and the Board of Corrections.

New business included: (1) Jim Delashaw with the Texas Department of Commerce discussed the Planning Grant application and the steps that will be taken in the future regarding the grant (2) Clinton Crisp moved to adopt a resolution to raise franchise taxes on street use to 5 percent seconded by Johnny Hubbard. Carried unanimously.

## May Election Results

Unofficial returns show May voters returning one incumbent to the May Independent School District Board of Trustees and turning out another in the two-seat election.

Jackie Brown, board president, was re-elected with 61 votes; Bob Ribble led the field of eight candidates

with 72 votes to win the other place. Incumbent Jim Cole Brown was third in the voting with 49.

Other candidates were Mike Hardwick, 48 votes; Bobby Chambers, 41 votes; Janet Murphree, 35 votes; Larry Ashworth, 21 votes; and Johnny Jackson, 20 votes.

## Rising Star Election Results

Rising Star citizens split their votes almost evenly in the mayor race Saturday. Incumbent Henry Burk outdistanced challenger Charles E. "Red" Chamberlain by 10 votes in

the unofficial returns. Burk received 163 votes and Chamberlain 153. One City Council member was returned and another ousted from office. James Cook was re-elected with 254 votes while incumbent Johnny Hubbard was third in the three-man race for two places. John G. Lee was voted into office with 184 votes.

The official returns of the Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees show both incumbents being returned to the board. David Harris had 193 votes and Tony Long had 192 votes with the newcomer in the three-way field for the two seats, Frank Agnew, pulling 175 votes.

Several write-in candidates received one or two votes each.

## ASCS News

AUSTIN - Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories. "Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans for 1989," state statistician Dennis Finley explained. "The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm program may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear livestock inventories and acreage estimates," Finley added.

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1989 acreage forecast will be published July 28, and the midyear cattle inventory will be published July 28. "Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Finley added.

Anthony Millar of Harare, Zimbabwe, Africa was a guest of K.E. and Ann Murdoch, Murdoch's Brangus & Quarter Horse Farm. He was accompanied by Tracy Peisinger, executive secretary of the Texas Brangus Breeders Association. Millar is in the states on a Nuffield Farming Scholarship. 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# "Painting For Freedom" Now Off The Press

One of the highlights of the Texas Circuit Literary Festival in Cisco last weekend was the announcement of H.V. and Gaynell O'Brien's book "Painting For Freedom."

H.V. O'Brien spoke Friday evening to Editors, publishers and other journalists assembled at the Hilton Center. The O'Briens are publishers of the Eastland County Newspapers and the Callahan County Star.

The book of southwestern history tells the story of artists Anna Laurie Harle of Abilene, who sold her tapestry paintings to help free her Doctor son from a Mexican prison.

Accused of implication in a murder, Dr. Charles Harle was imprisoned in Vera Cruz during the early 1900's.

Texas, Mexican and American National officials got to know Mrs. Harle well after that, and foreign well-knowners felt her influence. Mexican General Pancho Villa proved to be the key in reuniting the artist and her son.

In the later part of the drama, Dr. Harle rode with Pancho Villa as his personal physician.

O'Brien told the crowd at the Hilton Center Friday that he and his wife Gaynell have worked for a number of years on "Painting For Freedom." The 160-page volume may read like fiction, he said, but it is actually a documentary account of International intrigue.

They first began to put pieces of the strange puzzle

together when Gaynell bought a large unsigned tapestry painting during the disposal of furnishings from a nearby home in Eastland. The book was the result of research determining the artist of the painting.

The trail led to the National Archives, crumbling newspaper files, fading memories, interview, letter writing and days of library and cemetery research. None of the informants knew the whole story. There were many surprises, including the driving purpose behind Mrs. Harle's work.

The O'Brien's found that a number of Mrs. Harle's beautiful pastoral oil-on-tapestry paintings were in homes and churches in the area. Classical figures and religious scenes appear to have been

Mrs. Harle's favorites, although she used other themes occasionally.

The book contains photographs of Anna Laurie Harle's work, along with pictures of some of the main characters of the story.

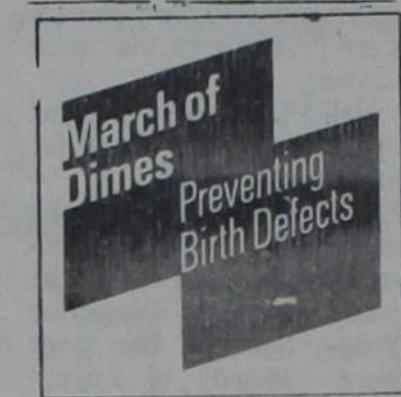

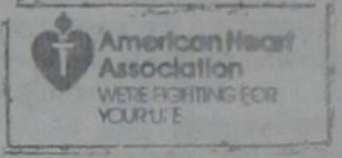

(speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two more more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers.

## Commissioners

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, said that 14 inmates were currently in the county jail, with about half of them scheduled to go to TDC. The County is presently allowed to take a small quota to the State Prisons each month.

Sheriff Dee Hogan requested permission to purchase a new 35 mm camera and special equipment at a cost of \$504.90. The Commissioners granted his request, but questioned why so much equipment was needed when they purchased such items before.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson said that two or three years ago the Sheriff (a previous administration) "had me take a pickup load of cameras, typewriters and other stuff to the city dump."

On other Law Enforcement matters, Judge Scott Bailey said he was personally concerned about some Legislation pending in Austin. If enacted, these measures would change the Criminal Justice System and alter the makeup of courts. More financial burdens would also be placed on the counties to provide alternate treatment and confinement centers.

"If they rock the boat a lot it will make the Court Systems more difficult and expensive for a County such as Eastland," the Judge said.

came all and told of the work of the Resource group. He said the organization was going through a rebuilding. A central office was now set up in Dublin, with Earnest D. Morbeck as Co-ordinator.

Procedures were underway to annex Hamilton County into the present group, the Judge said.

Henry, Burk, Mayor of Rising Star, made introductions and also discussed the work of the organization. Bill Grimes of Dublin, Secretary-Treasurer, led out in the business meeting.

Current recommendations of the organization were listed: That a public recreational facility be built at Glen Rose and also one at Bluffdale. A study of surface water at Stephenville was also recommended. But it was recommended that a proposed recreational area at Lake Cisco be canceled.

When the business meeting ended Kent Hance greeted the crowd, saying that it was treated to be at this beautiful spot of Lake Proctor. The conservation water and land was of the greatest importance, he said.

"The base of the Texas economy is energy and agriculture," he stated. "When they get in trouble our economy gets in bad shape. Banking and real estate follow any such decline."

He remarked that a \$5 per barrel increase in oil, sustained for 10 years, could mean more jobs than if we

had a number of Super-Colider projects.

Hance said that from 1933-73 the Texas Railroad Commission kept market stability and determined the world price of oil. We lost that position when OPEC became the "swing producers," he stated.

"We must keep a strong domestic oil and gas industry," the Railroad Commissioner declared. "It is absolutely vital to national defense, as well as the economy."

"What we need is stability. It's the sudden shock that puts independent producers out of business."

Hance said he thought the price would remain at \$18-\$21 per barrel the rest of this year. He reported that new measures in congress would give tax incentives for drilling and oil recovery projects - and he thought that would help.

he said he believed President Bush would support any Legislation offering a better chance for the oil business.

After his talk Kent Hance greeted people, recognizing faces and remembering names.

"Tell my friends in Eastland County that I haven't forgotten them," he said. "I taught half of them in Law School at Texas Tech."

"I know times are tough right now in the oil patch. But I'm going to be working for Eastland and all these oil producing counties - planning for better times ahead."

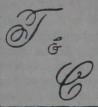

## Sharp-Montford Organize Opposition To Federal Gas Tax Increase

AUSTIN-Texas Railroad Commissioner John Sharp and State Senator John Montford of Lubbock, have announced today the organization of a committee called Texans Against Discriminatory Taxation whose primary purpose is to focus Texas opposition to increased federal gasoline taxes which would place an undue and discriminatory burden on Texans as compared to other areas of the country. Joining Montford and Sharp at the news conference were John Watson, President of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners, Robert Floyd, President of Texas Motor Transportation Association, Tom Johnson, Executive Vice President of Texas Association of General Contractors, Lawrence Olsen, Executive Vice President of Texas good Roads Association and Robert Looney,

President of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

In a statement, Sharp listed several reasons why the tax will fall heaviest on Texans as opposed to residents of northern and eastern states who utilize mass transit systems instead of personal automobiles. "The proposed 25 cents or 50 cent increase in the gasoline tax being battered about in Washington, D.C. is perhaps the worst thing that could happen in Texas in terms of slowing down our economic recovery. Aside from costing the Texas trucking and shipping industry hundreds of millions of dollars, it would cost average Texans, who use their cars much more than someone from New York or Chicago, a disproportionately larger share of their income", Sharp said. Sharp continued by saying that he "could not imagine any tax more discriminatory and unfair to Texans than this tax".

Sharp and Montford indicated that the tax would be discriminatory not only against the shipping industry

and individual families in Texas, but it would also be detrimental to the oil and gas industry in Texas which has already been hard hit.

They indicated that the purpose of the committee is to make sure that all Texans realize the negative impact that this proposed tax would have on Texas and to insure that the message of strong opposition to this tax from all Texans is conveyed in the strongest possible manner to Washington, D.C. Sharp and Montford said they soon will begin touring the State of Texas personally to develop intense opposition to such a tax.

**USDA Announces Support Level By Type, For 1989 - Crop Peanuts**

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced support levels - by type, quality and location - for the 1989 peanut crop. Support is based on the previously announced national levels of \$615.87 per short ton for quota peanuts and \$149.75 per short ton for additional peanuts.

The quota support for an average grade ton of 1989

crop peanuts will be: -\$610.89 for Virginia; \$621.06 for Runner; \$575.60 for Spanish; \$610.89 for the Valencia - type from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting; and \$575.60 for other Valencias - type peanuts.

The method of computing is the same as last year except for Spanish peanuts.

The quantity of Spanish peanuts placed under loan in recent years and subsequently crushed into oil and meal has demonstrated that the price support value of Spanish peanuts has been overstated relative to other types of peanuts. Therefore, the 1989-crop differentials were developed by setting the sound mature kernel (SMK) value for Spanish-type peanuts at the same SMK value as for Runner-type peanuts. Previously, the SMK value for Spanish-type peanuts was 0.5 percent more than the SMK value for Runner-type peanuts.

A five-year statistical base, 1984-88, was used to project the expected quality of the 1989-crop.

The actual support level for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of kernels in each ton and other factors.

For each percent of SMK's including sound split kernels, the support level for the type of peanuts per ton is:

-Virginia-type, \$8,949; Runner-type, \$8,774; Spanish-type, \$8,774; Valencia-type in the Southwest area suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$9,129; and other Valencias, \$8,774.

The loan value for additional peanuts is 24.32 percent of the applicable quota rate. The factor represents the ratio of the \$149.75 per short ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$615.87 per short ton national support level for quota peanuts.
