### **Eastland County Will** Have Block at State Capitol

Eastland County and its year of organization will be memoralized on sidewalk paving just outside the State Capitol in Austin, according to information at the County Commissioners meeting Monday.

County Judge Scott Bailey told the Commissioners that the Capitol building is being refurbished, and each county is being asked for a \$300 donation for paving on the out-

In this sidewalk project a block will belong to each contributing county. For this county the words "Eastland County, 1873" will be enscribed.

The Commissioners approved this plan, and the money will come from a county fund designated for Historical Preservation.

### DAV Donated Vets Van

Eastland veterans need not worry about transportation to and from the Veterans Administration (VA) medical center in Waco.

That hospital will be one of 19 VA medical facilities to receive a van from the Disabled nonprofit American Veterans (DAV) on Tuesday, November 17. The donation was made possible through a cooperative effort of the DAV's national organization and its Department of Texas.

The vans will be driven by volunteers from local DAV Chapters and DAV Auxiliary Units. These volunteers will be participating in a nationwide DAV National Transportation Network. Overseeing the program at the VA Medical facility in Waco will be DAV Hospital Service Coordinator Donald W. Phillips.

The number of DAVdonated vans across the country will increase to 24 by the end of the year. The one-million-member organization hopes to fully meet the transportation needs of veterans at all the VA's 172 medical centers

donating vans wherever necessary.

"The DAV Transportation Network was established last spring when budget constraints forced the VA to terminate beneficiary travel benefits for nearly all veterans using VA facilities for medical treatment," said DAV National Director of Voluntary Services Bruce Nitsche. These benefits were paid to veterans to help them cover the costs of getting to and from the VA hospital or clinic.

"Among those affected by the benefit cut were most veterans seeking treatment for serviceconnected disabilities, as well as indigent veterans who have virtually no other source of health care," Nitsche said.

"The DAV simply could not stand aside and watch hundreds of thousands of veterans being left without health care simply because they live some distance from a VA hospital and had no means of transportation. Thanks to contributions from grateful Americans, many of them right here in Eastland, we were able to respond to this great need."



The Eastland County Pecan Show is scheduled for December 3 and 4, in the Eastland County Courthouse Lobby. This will be the 35th consecutive pecan show in Eastland County reports, Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association. The show is sponsored by the grower's association and the Eastland Chamber of Com-

Any pecan grower in the

area may submit entries to the show. Sometimes the best entries are submitted by a homeowner with one or two trees. There is no limit to the number of entries that an exhibitor may submit, put participants are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. A grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he wishes. The exhibitor must be the grower of the pecans. A minimum of 43 pecans are necessary for each entry. This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples - more than one variety in an entry - are disqualified.

The growers may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw en-

Nuts should be free of dust, dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed to the extent that shape or color is altered. Discolored shells and kernels may result from


shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 1987 crop and are judged on the basis of size (number per pound). appearance, and shell color. Kernel quality is also. important and is based on the percent kernel, color, general appearance, tex-

ture, and taste. All entries of pecans must be entered by 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, December 2. They may be sent or left at the County Agent's office in Eastland on, or prior

to December 2. The first place entries will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Entries not winning first place will be sold to pay expenses of the

Walker said there will be a class for every variety provided there are at least two entries in that class. There will be a class for the smallest pecans, native pecans, seedlings, as well as all varieties. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion in-shell, shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded for reserve champions and the first three place ribbons will be given in each

Eastland Chamber of Commerce members will assist pecan growers with the shelling of ten pecans from each entry on Thursday morning. The entries will be judged at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday and exhibits will be on display until 3:30 p.m. Friday in the first floor lobby of the cour-

### **Preparing Tender Venison**

COLLEGE STATION-If the venison's tough, don't blame the cook. It could be due to what the hunter did - or didn't do - in the field, says a wildlife specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"In addition to the age and sex of the animal, hunting and field dressing practices are extremely important in determining the quality of venison," says Don Steinbach.

"An undisturbed animal which is cleanly shot will yield more tender meat than a stressed animal. Field dressing the carcass as soon as possible and letting it hang for a full 48-hours will also increase tenderness by allowing muscles to stretch."

He adds that aging the carcass in cold storage just above freezing for about a week will add to the tenderness and possibly the flavor of the venison. that, the After tenderness is up to the

According to TAEX home economist Marilyn Haggard, the key to preparing tender venison is to cook it

as you would lean beef

"Most g. ne has little fat and so is very similar to lean beef. The naturally more tender cuts, such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted. But round steak, meat from the leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by braising, stewing or pot roasting," she says.

Haggard cautions against overcooking game meat. "It has short fibers that toughen quickly if overcooked or cooked at too high a temperature. Plan to serve it medium- to well-

done rather than rare or overcooked." Marinating venison for stir-fry, or fajitas and before pan-frying or roasting will also make it more tender. She advises marinating the meat in an acid-based sauce for at

least 24 hours. "If you use a sauce with the venison, reduce the amount of sugar in the recipe. The natural flavor is sweeter than other meat, so sauces made for domestic meats may be too sweet," notes the home



to self-baste and moisten venison as it roasts," she says. "If you're trying to cut back on your intake of fat, however, you'll be better off sticking to low-fat cooking methods such as marinating and stir-frying the meat."

Both specialists agree that venison has an undeserved reputation for toughness. yet, in a recent research study using taste panels, Texas A&M University graduate Dan Moczygemba found that venison was rated as tender as lean beef and only slightly less tender than lean pork.

When the beef pork and venison were compared for fat and cholesterol levels, Moczygemba preliminary analyses indicated no significant dif-

"From a health standpoint that means venison. like other lean meats, can make a significant contribution of protein and other nutrients to the diet without adding extra fat," Haggard maintains.





Leave oven door open a crack and bake 8 to 12 hours; or until meat is chewy. Test by tasting occasionally. Serve as an appetizer or snack. Store in plastic bag or airtight container on pantry

### Commissioners Study Jail-**Road Improvements**

Plans for a jail expansion costing \$1,336,665.00 were shown to the Eastland County Commissioners Court during a

The blueprints were brought to the Commissioners by James Wheeler, Abilene architect, who was hired some months ago to work on a possible jail ad-

This enlargement of the present facility would give the building a capacity of 48 inmates, including 42 men and six women, Wheeler said. Juveniles are

Commissioners discussed various parts of the proposal, and asked Sheriff Don Underwood about several items. They then asked Wheeler if the Texas Jail Standards Commission would approve this

"They have approved these schematics, and say we can proceed to the next phase of the plan," he

He couldn't proceed, Wheeler told the Court, "because you don't have your land nailed down."

Billy Bacon of Pct. 4 and other Commissioners told Wheeler his plan "looked pretty good to them."

Bacon also reported that a total of 15 prisoners were in the county jail at present. He said the electrician lacked only about two days work on the jail lighting, and after that the building ought to be ready for inspection for the Jail Standards Commission.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, made the motion that Memorial Eastland Hospital be designated as a mandated provider for this area. The motion carried.

A group listed as the Eastland Road Improvement Committee came to the Court to discuss the road from Eastland to Stephenville. Mrs. Dorothy Greenhaw, spokesman for the group, said these roads includes Rds, 570, 2214, and FM 8. She described this route as "Very hazardous", and told of many "no pass-



In a ruling last week in 91st District Court, James Jay of Gorman was refused a license to sell liquor from property he owns on the south side of I-20 at the lake road. Jay and his attorney, Lee Haney of Brownwood, appeared before the Ranger City Council May 11 and requested permission to sell liquor, beer and wine in the city limits. Mayor David Rogers advised Jay that voters had decided in 1985 to keep that area dry. Jay requested a certification from City Secretary Barbara Wheat to sell liquor at the aforementioned location, and was refused this by Mrs. Wheat. She based her refusal on an opinion by the Texas Attorney General that "A dry area annexed by a wet city remains dry." Jay then filed his lawsuit against Wheat on May 21. This suit has now been denied.

# **Holiday** Planning

COLLEGE STATION As the number of shopping
days until Christmas
decreases, it's easy to run
out of money, as well as
time.

"Christmas is the biggest spending season of the year, yet few families plan ahead for the added burden of their income," says Bonnie Piernot, a family economics specialist.

"A common strategy is to resort to credit spending for holiday expenses, although that may just postpone the financial problem until after the first of the year."

But it's not too late to evaluate your financial situation and gain some control over holiday spending, according to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Figure out the amount of money you have available for holiday expenses, including money from paychecks you will receive between now and Christmas," she advises. "Then estimate your remaining expenses, including holiday food and entertaining, cards, decorations, party clothes, gifts

If your estimated cost exceed available funds, Piernot suggests enlisting the entire family's help in curbing costs. Some options include establishing dollar limits for entertainment, clothing and holiday foods.

and other costs."

Since gifts are a major expense, she also advises setting dollar limits for each gift, making gifts and giving services, limiting gifts to certain members of the family or exchanging names to reduce the number of gifts.

"Once you know what gifts you plan to buy, go shopping with a list," says the specialist. "That will allow you to comparison shop for items at a specific amount and will reduce impulse buying."

pulse buying."

"If you decide to use your credit cards, set limits on how much you'll charge, and keep track of credit purchases so you won't run up large bills that are difficult to pay off in a reasonable amount of time," cautions Piernot.

"Remember too, that the finance charges on any unpaid charge card balances will actually add to the cost of your gifts."

The home economist suggests keeping accurate records of all holiday expenses this year, so you'll have a good estimate of expenses for planning ahead next year.

### Spice Nice, But Pepper Harms

So you are a heavy user of pepper on your food. You may want to reconsider this practice in view of a research report from the Veterans Administration Center and Baylor College of Medicine, Houston.

According to Dr. David Graham and colleagues, the infestion of either red or black pepper can cause minor bleeding in the stomach, as well as significant increase in the secretion of acid and the digestive enzyme pepsin and loss of potassium.

The effect on the stomach is similar to that of aspirin, says Dr. Graham. Observed bleeding ranged from tiny amounts in the lining of the stomach to "grossly visible gastric bleeding" in one case.

### **Smoking Alters** Medication

Smoking has long been reported as a risk factor for both lung disease and cancer. Now studies show that it can also reduce effectiveness of some medications as well as worsen existing health problems, thus complicating drug therapy, says the National Cancer Institute.

Compounds known as polycyclic aromatic wdrocarb as found in arette smoke can cause the liver to produce enzymes which chemically alter some medications. As a result, smokers may require larger or more frequent doses of such medications than do non-smokers, and tolerance for the drugs may increase after prolonged use.

Medications which can be affected by chemical compounds inhaled with cigarette smoke according to NCI, include:

\*Oral contraceptives \*Theophylline and antiasthmatic drugs

\*Anti-anginal drugs such as propranoloi and nifedipine

\*Painkillers

\*Tranquilizers Anti-depressants

 Anti-anxiety drugs · Heparin-anti-

coagulants

\*Furosemide, diuretics \*Vitamins B12 and C

In addition to drug interactions, smoking can adversely affect conditions in such diseases as allergies, angina, lung disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, peripheral vascular disease and ulcers, making drug therapy more difficult, says the National Cancer Institute.



> If you or your children walk or bicycle at dusk or after dark, then you should know that you can significantly increase visibility to motorists and reduce risk of pedestrian injury or death by wearing retro-reflective material or tags on clothing, backpacks or bicycle helmets, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics.

More than 60% of pedestrian-auto accidents occur late in the day when light is fading or absent. Studies of these accidents show that 85% of drivers do not see the victim in time to avoid collision and that over half are unaware of the pedestrian until actual contact.

### Guest Editorial Senator Phil Gramm

This is a sad time for Judge Douglas Ginsburg and his family, but I believe his tragedy carries with it an important lesson for the young people of America.

Judge Ginsburg withdrew from consideration for a seat on the Supeme Court after admitting he had used marijuana. His experience proves once again that drug use carries a high cost, payable both now and in the future.

I have known Judge Ginsburg since 1983, when he joined the Justice Department. He is a brilliant man, and I was therefore pleased when the President nominated him to the Supreme Court. I knew Judge Ginsburg would work to guarantee not only the political rights but also the economic rights of all Americans. He had already shown his abilities as a judge and government official.

But his use of drugs, no matter how long ago or how infrequent, called into question his judgment and his commitment to uphold the

Judge Ginsburg was a role model, whether he wanted to be or not. He was bright and successful; throughout his life his abilities made him a leader. He went to law school, served as a clerk to a Supreme Court Justice and taught law at Harvard before serving in the federal

law of the land, his use of drugs set a bad example.

You are also a role model, even though you may not realize it. If you use drugs, you make society lose a bit of its hope for a better tomorrow. If you say it is OK to experiment with drugs, you are telling other students that they can, too. You may beat the odds and not become addicted to drugs once you start using them, but your actions may condemn others who follow your example to a life of drug abuse and defeat.

And you are risking your own future by taking drugs, even if you escape addiction. Douglas Ginsburg used drugs casually, got away with it for a time, and went on to become very successful. But experimenting with drugs has now cost him dearly. Had he, at 41 years of age become a Justice of the Supreme Curt, he might eventually have become Chief Justice. He could have made his mark on history and the future of our Nation. Now, Douglas Ginsburg will You have heard many

times about the physical cost of drug abuse: the addiction, the effects on your health, the depression and failure using drugs can cause. But drug use also has a hidden cost, a cost Douglas Ginsburg is now paying. I wonder what Judge Ginsburg would give now to be able to go back and reverse his decision to use drugs.

The sad message of the Ginsburg nomination is this: if you do not use drugs, do not start. There is no such thing as "harmless" drug use. Something less than addiction can ruin your dreams. If you do use drugs, stop, and be a leader in urging others to do the same.

America ultimately may benefit from Judge Ginsburg's tragedy if young people like you, who face the lure of drugs every day, are impressed with the fact that you risk long-term damage to your family, and your future if you use drugs.


