## Four Eastland Fans Die In Auto Crash

Two joint funeral services Monday were formal expressions of concern and sympathy as all Eastland mourns the loss of four of its finest young people and attempt to comfort the families.

The Thanksgiving Week and athletic accomplishments are vividly marked with an inward look by all in Eastland public schools and all over town. Four Eastland area teenagers returning from the high school football game were killed early Saturday when their collided south of Graham with a semi-tractor-trailer truck. Dead at the scene were the driver, Scott Brown, Grandal Garrett, both 18 and of Eastland, and Carrie Frances Hays, 19, of Carbon. The fourth victim, Brenda Carole Hull, 17, of Eastland was dead on arrival at Graham Memorial Hospital, according to the Department of Public Safety.

The youths were returning from the area playoff game in Wichita Falls where the Eastland High School Mavericks defeated Holliday High School when the wreck occurred shortly after midnight 12 miles south of Graham in Young County. Brown and Garrett, both 1982 graduates of Eastland High, had been starting linemen on the team their senior year, and they worked together at Moylan Construction. Miss Hull was a senior at the school, while Miss Hays worked as an assistant dental hygienist in Eastland.

"They were some of the doers in our school, academically and in extracurriculars," said Eastland High School Principal Keith Watkins. "It just puts a damper on the whole community because they were just good citizens. DPS Trooper Robert Dial said the car carrying four Eastland-area teenagers did not turn into the path of the truck as was earlier reported.

The Sunday Reporter-News used erroneous reports from The Associated Press stating that the youths' car had attempted to make a left turn in front of the truck when the collision occurred. Dial said Sunday, however, that witnesses - one of whom was Eastland resident and DPS trooper Roy Petty - saw the truck turn in front of the car just before the collision.

Brown was born June 15, 1964, in Nocona, and attended school there until moving to Eastland during his junior year in high school. He participated in football and track at both schools, and while at Eastland High School was a Junior Historian and was nominated for pep squad beaur his senior year. He was a member of the Church of the Brethren in Nocona.

Miss Hull was born in Eastland Aug. 7, 1965, and had lived here all her life. At Eastland High School, she was captain of the basketball team, a four-year member of the Beta Club, and a member of the student council, Future Homemakers of America and the track team and was a Junior Historian. She was a member of First Baptist Church.

Brown is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Brown of Eastland; a brother, Rowdy J. of Eastland; and his grandparents, Grace L. Brown and Mr. and Mrs. E.F. Killian, all of Bowie.

Miss Hull is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don Hull of Eastland; her grandparents, George and Wanda Hull of Eastland and Thelma Raspberry of Carbon; two sisters, Lonnie Doyle of Llano and Becky Hull of Eastland; and a nephew.

She was a member of First Baptist Church in Carbon.

Carrie was the first Sweetheart of the Carbon Lions Club.

Garrett is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Garrett of Eastland; his grandparents, Merle Garrett and Mr. and Mrs. N.A. Johnson, all of Eastland; a brother and sister-in-law, James and Carla Garrett of Eastland; three aunts; two uncles; a niece; and nine cousins.

Miss Hays' survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Lee Hays of Carbon; her grandmother, Frances Baird of Olden; and two brothers, Travis and Jory, both of the home.

Mary Hall, both of Amarillo; mother, Essie Green of Rising Star; and two grandchildren.

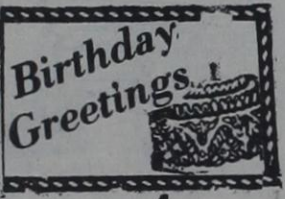
## Sophia Busbee

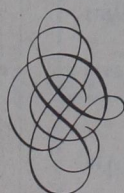

This year, the Postal Service is joining forces with the business community of Fort Worth, Texas in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

Postmaster W.H. Hathman has officially declared the start of the holiday shopping season by asking shoppers to shop early and mail early this year and to make certain that mail is addressed correctly (including ZIP codes) and packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays.

"Normally, we handle about 1.2 million pieces of mail a day--including cards, letters and packages, but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 4.7 million

pieces," the Postmaster says.

The key to successful holiday mailings is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Hathman says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates--including those for the armed forces stationed overseas--occur this month. Mailers can get specific information on the inter-national dates by calling us here at 334-2985," Hathman said. "Customers should also take care to write Legible ZIP Coded addresses for both the intended recipient and the sender.

Since mail sorting depends on the ZIP Code as well as the name of the particular city and state, the use

of the correct ZIP Code will aid us in processing the mail.

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season."

# Pecan Bake Show Next Week

The 30th annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be Friday, December 3rd at the Eastland County Courthouse.

Everyone is invited to enter the Pecan Bake Show and Center-piece divisions.

The rules for these divisions are:

### ADULT DIVISION

1. There shall be 6 divisions of products with a requirement for each:

- a. Pies - must enter one whole pie
- b. Cakes - must enter one whole cake
- c. Candy - must enter at least 12 pieces
- d. Nut Bread - must enter one whole loaf
- e. Cookies - must enter at least 12 cookies
- f. Snacks - must enter whole recipe or ample portion for judging and display. Food entered as a snack cannot be entered in the above 5 baked food divisions. Suggested pecan snack items would include coated or salted nuts, party appetizers, etc.

2. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries.

3. All entries must contain pecans. No refrigerated items and no food products made with mixes will be accepted.

4. Anyone, man or woman, from Eastland County may enter products in the show.

5. All entries must be entered in place by 11:00 a.m., Friday December 3 when the judging will begin in the Courthouse lobby.

6. The judges will be trained in Home Economics.

7. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 6 divisions and cash prizes and ribbons awarded according to score. Cash awards shall be as follows:

- 1st - \$2.50
- 2nd - \$1.50
- 3rd - \$1.00

8. There will be a Grand Champion and a Reserve Champion for the whole show. Cash awards shall be as follows: Champion - \$5.00; and Reserve Champion - \$4.00.

9. Entries in the adult pecan bake show division will be returned to their owners between 4 and 5 p.m. on Friday, December 3. Pecan Bake Show entries not claimed by 5 p.m. on Friday, December 3 will be sold to the public and money will go to the Extension Homemaker Council treasury fund.

10. One piece of prize winning entries shall remain and be on display to the public during the remainder of the show.

All pecan bake show entries should be entered on disposable plates, foil, or paper, or pieces of stiff cardboard. All products need to be covered with clear plastic wrap.

All cash awards and ribbons are sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

### PECAN CENTER-PIECE ARRANGEMENTS

This division will consist of centerpieces and arrangements made from pecans or parts of the pecan plant, such as the

leaves. The rules for this show are as follows:

### ADULT DIVISION

1. There will be 3 prizes given to the top three entries as follows: 1st - \$5.00, 2nd - \$2.50, 3rd - \$1.50.

2. All entries must have the arrangement: pecans or part of the pecan plant such as the leaves.

3. Anyone, man or woman from this county, may enter an arrangement in the show.

4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 a.m. when the judging will begin on Friday, December 3rd.

5. The arrangements must remain in place until noon Saturday, Dec. 4th. Arrangements must be claimed no later than 12 noon on Sat., Dec. 4th.

6. Centerpieces and arrangements must be original and created in 1982.

Next week is "pecan show week" in Eastland County. Some of the finest pecans grown anywhere will be on display in the county courthouse lobby December 3 and 4 according to county Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

Delicious pecan pies, cakes, candy, nut bread and cookies will also be judged and displayed. The bake show will be conducted by the Extension Homemakers and Extension Agent Janet Thomas.

The first county pecan show in Texas

was held in Eastland County 30 years ago and has been an important event ever since. The event honors the only native crop of the county and that is a must for holiday baking.

The show is being sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. James Wright, Chamber of Commerce manager, says visitors will see some of the best quality pecans in Texas, as well as prize baked goods.

Plaques will be given for the champion in-shell, champion shelling pecans, and the champion natives. Ribbons will be awarded to the first three place entries of each variety.

Gordon said the pecan crop is small this year, but the quality of pecans are good.

Show pecans not going to the regional show will be sold after the county show closes at noon Saturday. Shelled pecan kernels will also be sold at the close of the show.

Anyone producing pecans may enter the pecan show. Each entry consist of 43 pecans. All entries must be entered at the Extension Service office by 4:00 p.m. Thursday, December 2.

On Friday morning, the pecans from each entry will be weighed, shelled and kernels weighed to determine the number of pecans in one pound and per cent kernel.

## Swine Producers Meeting

There will be a swine producers meeting held on Tuesday, Nov. 30 at the Eastland P.C.A. community room for Eastland Co. swine producers.

The meeting will start at 7:00 p.m. and the speaker will be Dr. T.D. Tanksley from Texas A&M University.

Dr. Tanksley is a swine specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He

will be speaking on breeding problems that producers face.

Starting with what types of animals should be selected and how that has changed, what type of nutrition is needed and disease problems producers can look for.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Eastland County Agricultural Extension Service. Everyone is invited.

## THE REAL ESTATE CONSUMER

If you rent and have had an argument with your landlord recently, the chances are the argument occurred because of a misunderstanding about who was to do what under the terms of your lease.

Now there is a brochure available which may help prevent such arguments. It's called **Apartment Living and the Law**, and it's published by the Texas Apartment Association.

The brochure describes the Texas laws that govern the relationship between a landlord and tenant. In it you will find information about security deposits, ownership disclosure, repairs, nonpayment of rent, evictions, smoke detectors and security devices.

If your landlord can't provide you with a copy of this brochure, request one from the Texas Apartment Association in Austin. It might make life more pleasant for you and your landlord.

### PASSIVE SOLAR DESIGN GAINS POPULARITY

Passive solar design is becoming more popular because it can be made to be both attractive and effective in reducing energy bills.

When oil prices were rising, many people became interested in solar energy. Such collectors require

pumps and storage tanks to circulate water heated by the sun. They are examples of active solar devices.

Passive solar technology consists of features in a building's design which take advantage of natural heating and cooling due to sunshine, shade and wind. The benefits of these natural factors can be enhanced by properly designing windows, roofs and walls. Also important are the house's position relative to the sun and the placement of plants and trees.

If you're interested in passive solar design, ask your broker to show you examples of such design.

### SURVEY HELPS RESOLVE BOUNDARY DISPUTES

Good fences make good neighbors, said Robert Frost. But in Texas, the undisputed location of those fences is at least as important as their condition in preserving friendly relations.

This is why history of accurate surveys is vital to maintaining property rights. Such a history is especially important in densely populated areas where every foot of land is of great value to the owner.

Indeed, most land surveys in the state are related to residential sales, and the

bulk of the state's urban boundary disputes involve property line differences of two feet or less.

Land surveys may be commissioned by property owners and potential buyers. If you have any questions about the boundary of property you own or plan to own, contact a surveyor who is registered with the state board of registration for public surveyors.

### CONTRACT FOR DEED COMMON IN SELLER FINANCING

Seller financing means the seller actually becomes a lender.

The seller will receive a cash down payment and finance the remainder of the sales price. The seller receives monthly payments which include interest and principal.

Often a contract for deed is used in seller financing. With a contract for deed, the buyer does not become the

true owner of the property until some future date, such as when the obligation is paid in full.

The contract for deed enables the seller to evict the buyer if he or she defaults. Complicated foreclosure procedures are not necessary with a contract for deed. Using seller financing, a buyer may also be able to buy a home with a small down payment and with a loan which is below current market interest rates.

However, if the contract for deed is not properly recorded, a dishonest seller could re-sell the same property to someone else.

### "CREATIVE FINANCING" NOT WITHOUT PITFALLS

Creative financing techniques appear to be the intelligent way to avoid high interest rates when buying that new home, but drawbacks do exist.

Most creative financing involves a loan from the seller to the buyer for a portion of the purchase price.

Since the seller wants to make a sale, the loan often is made at a low rate of interest. But because the seller is also anxious for the money, the loan has a short term, say one or two years.

After that time, the balance becomes due in a lump sum "balloon" payment.

The buyer hopes interest rates will drop by that time,

so the loan may be refinanced. With rates stubbornly persisting in the range of 16 percent and upward, these "balloon" payments may cause a great deal of financial trouble.

When considering a creative financing arrangement, make sure you can handle the balloon payment when it becomes due.

# Romel Inc. Reveals Plans To Drill 1,300 Foot Well

# BILFIELD DISPATCH

Romel, Inc. of Lamesa has revealed plans to drill a 1,300-foot developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 25-acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's Mary Ann Clark Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 2 Roane-A. Drillsite is three miles southwest of Romney.

At a location 13 miles south of Graham, the No. 1 C. Dooley has been completed as a new natural gas producer in Stephens County by Frank C. Kramer of Graham.

The well flowed at the rate of 572,000 CF gas per day on a 2-inch choke and was rated at 1,600,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Location is in a 351-acre lease, S.P.R.R. Survey in the Southwest Strong Field. Kramer took the hole to 4,280 foot total depth after entering the pay zone at 4,146 feet. The production interval will be 4,146 to 4,149 feet.

Pumping 31 barrels of crude per day, a new producer has been finalized in the Stephens Regular Field by Big Country Energy, Inc. of Mineral Wells.

The location is in a lease of Stephens County's T.E.&L. Co. Survey, within the city limits of Parks. Well's designation is the No. 1 Brooks.

Total drilling depth was 4,272 feet, and the pay zone was entered at 3,104. It will be producing from a set of perforations 3,104 to 3,108 feet into the hole.

It was drilled to total depth of 3,358 feet and will produce from a perforated interval 3,236 to 3,258 feet.

Showing daily potential to yield 252,000 CF gas on a 1-inch choke, the well was given an absolute open flow rating of 260,000 CFD.

Dallas-based Live Oak Production Corp. has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Dickie Ranch, an oil wildcat to be located six miles south of Woodson. With projected total depth of 4,800 feet, the well is in an 80-acre lease in Stephens County's Sarah Blythe Survey.

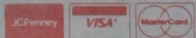
