Four Eastland area teenagers returning from the high school football game were killed early Saturday when their collided south of Graham with a semi-tractor-trailer truck.

Dead at the scene were the driver, Scott Brown, Grandal Garrett, both 18 and of Eastland, and Carrie Frances Hays, 19, of Carbon.

The fourth victim, Brenda Carole Hull, 17, of Eastland was dead on arrival at Graham Memorial Hospital, according to the Department of Public Safety.

The youths were returning from the area playoff game in Wichita Falls where the Eastland High School Mavericks defeated Holliday High School when the wreck occurred shortly after midnight 12 miles south of Graham in Young County.

Brown and Garrett, both 1982 graduates of Eastland High, had been starting linemen on the team their senior year, and they worked together at Moylan Construction. Miss Hull was a senior at the school, while Miss Hays worked as an assistant dental hygienist in Eastland.

"They were some of the doers in our school, academically and in extracurriculars," said Eastland High School Principal Keith Watkins.

"It just puts a damper on the whole community because they were just good citizens

DPS Trooper Robert Dial said the car carrying four Eastland-area teenagers did not turn into the path of the truck as was earlier reported.

Defensive Driving Course Will Be November 29-30


A defensive driving course will be held Nov. 29-30 in the Ranger Junior College teaching auditorium from 6 p.m. until 10 p.m.





Travel in central america sometimes frustrations!

"Doctor, I want to report that the Local Veterinary Diagnostic Lab has diagnosed African Swine Fever in a hog autopsied this morning." The workds were those of Dr. Floyd Jones a "Texas Aggie," USDA veterinarian stationed in Guatemala City as advisor to the Guatemalan Ministry Agriculture. "Further, I have examined the tissues myself and I believe we could be faced with a serious situation here."

This message came to me on a Friday night at 11 p.m. when I was snoozing away in my Panama City, Panama Hi-Rise apartment, oblivious to even the traffic noise that sometimes keeps me awake.

"Have samples been forwarded to the USDA diagnostic facility in Plum Island, N.Y.?" I asked Dr. Jones. "No, but they will be on a plane first thing in the morning." Then followed a discussion concerning type of tissues to send, notification of U.S. Customs officials that important samples were to be rushed through the Miami airport and notification to my USDA God-my boss in Washington-Thanks Dr. Jones, you've made my night!

African swine fever is perhaps the most devastating of all hog diseases was discovered in Africa, raised havoc in Europe, now present in Brazil and Haiti and recently eradicated from the Dominican Republic, an island in the Caribbean Sea, by U. S. intervention and assistance. Cost was several million dollars. If Guatemala had the disease now it could move quickly up through Mexico to Texas and all of the United States--Costs for eradication could be millions of dollars but nothing compared to what it would cost American farmers if not eradicated!

Gotta move quick-Get the boss on the horn, explain my plan for a diagnostic team from my staff in Colombia, Panama, and Costa Rica to move rapidly to assist Dr. Jones and the Guatemalan government. Phones work well and all people are contacted-ready to go. Supplies included. By this time its Saturday and my secretary is at the beach and cannot be contacted. Other workers are not at home. Some respond quickly without benefit of overtime or complaints of weekend work - now its time for own plane reservation-Eastern Airlines-sorry we don't

go to Guatemala-Pan Am same story-try COPA-no answer-best get a phone book and try some other telephone numbers.

Columbian Airline-we only fly Tuesdays and Thursdays-Panama Airlines-no answer. (Its not a work day) Iberia Airlines-no answer-Brazilin Airlines, no answer, etc., etc., etc. Finally my secretary calls-Thank God! "Marva, would you please see if you can get me an immediate reservation for Guatemala City?" "But Sir, all the airline offices are closed"-I know, I know. "Will try," Thanks. Two hours later. "I'm sorry Doctor but I cannot get you a confirmed reseration today. However, I am told that TACA airlines has a flight into the airport at 8 p.m. tonitht. I will try to contact them there at that time and let you know. Thanks.

"Sir, TACA airport office says they have a flight at 6:30 a.m. in the morning to Guatemala, but they cannot confirm a reservation since reservations is not their function-they said be at the airport at 4:45 a.m. and perhaps you can get on." Thanks.

I hardly heard the alarm at 3 a.m., but Anna nudged me onto the floor and into the bath. Gulped the coffee, grabbed two large bags of clothes, my brief case with my brain and headed for my car and the airportcar loaded with disinfectant and other supplies destined for the airplane should I get on.

Was raining pretty good when I got about a mile away from my apartment and I thought I must take it easy so I won't slip and slide. Roads were covered in places with rocks from slides and I couldn't go fast anyway. Just relax if I can-stop for all the lights, etc.

A knock on my car

window at one of the lights-"Senor, quiero ver su licensia." (I want to see your license) Thats what the Panamanian National Guardsman said. He had knocked with his billy club and he had a large postol on his hip. Further, I could see he was backed up by other guardsmen with rifles at the control point on the

road.

In my best Tex-Mex
Spanish I said, "Here
is my Embassy PX
card," I hadn't received
my official
Panamanian License
yet. In my heart I knew
I wasn't going to make
that important plane.
"Venga aqui" come
over to the guard
shack-"Don't you have
a drivers lcense for

Panama? No senor,

you see I've only been in Panama 3 weeks and the Embassy of the United States said I could drive on my Texas license until the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Panama issures me my permanent permit."

"Do you admit that you went past the stopping point for this light and are now in the middle of the cross traffic lane?" No, it was raining and I only saw the light-you can also see there is no line at the light indicating where you should stop. However, I can clearly see now that I am out of the car and getting really wet, that I am in the middle of opposing traffic. "Do you know that the fine for this is 25 Balboas and you must see the judge tomorrow morning"-etc., etc., etc.

Fortunately for you my father works for the government is familiar with your work-please move your car on down the road. Thanks, en Espanol.

Airport looks goodbright lights, etc. Few people—This is going to be a breeze!

Sir, I would like a ticket to Guatemala, round trip. I have 30 kilos overweight. Does your company accept U. S. Government Transportation request? Quien sabe (who knows) and the agent disappears behind the wall with my blue GTR form. Meantime people are lining up behind-includes 33 "students" from Equador with a mama hen who had all of their passports, tickets and other items. These people look like guerillas to me, I thought as I tried

to look casual and nonchalantly glanced over my shoulder-Mucha Spanish mutteringalmost wish I couldn't understand anything they said--However, my Tex-Mex helped me understand that nothing was worse than an old bald headed gringo holding on

the line!
Finally an interpretation was made.
The Transporte Aereo
Centro Americana International Company
would be pleased to accept me as a passenger
along with my 30 kilos
overweight. Thanks.

Moving right along-

"Please go to Gate 6." I went to the toilet. Then to a place where one pays \$10.00 departure tax for use of the airport-another line, but this time I'm behind Equadorians who by now were having real trouble-loud talk and airport police are coming. "Faltan 250.00 Bal-boas fine because you overstayed your visa in Panama"-Now I'm sure they must be guerillas headed for Guatemala-they were so swarthy brown-men with mustaches and a swaggering few women who looked as they could shoot any of us down in cold blood. And then an angel appeared. Thanks. He had been in the crowd all along-a crippled man with a cane- super duper guy because he stepped forth and said if they were having a problem he would provide the \$250.00. He did amid lusty "guerilla" student cheers and the crowd moved on and it was my turn to pay my \$10.00.

We were almost on schedule when we left. After only a one hour

The First Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamation

By the President of the United States

A Proclamation



HEREAS, It is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty God, to obey his Will, to be grateful for his Benefits, and humbly to implore his Protection and Favour: And whereas both houses of Congress have, by their joint Committee, requested me "To recommend to the People of the UNITED STATES, a Day of PUBLIC THANKSGIVING and PRAYER, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful Hearts the many Signal Favours of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a Form of Government for their Safety and Happiness."

Now, THEREFORE, I do recommend and assign THURSDAY the Twenty-Sixth Day of November next, to be devoted by the People of these States, to the Service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be: That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks for his kind Care and Protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation; for the signal and manifold Mercies, and the favourable Interpositions of his Providence in the Course & Conclusion of the late War;—for the great Degree of Tranquility, Union, and Plenty, which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational Manner in which we have been enabled to establish Constitutions of Government for our Safety and Happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted;—for the civil and religious Liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge;—and in general, for all the great and various Favours which he hath been pleased to conferupon us.

AND ALSO, that we may then unite in most humbly offering our Prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech him to pardon our National and other Transgressions;—to enable us all, whether in public or private Stations, to perform our several and relative Duties properly and punctually;—to render our national Government a Blessing to all the people, by constantly being a government of wise, just and Constitutional Laws, directly and faithfully obeyed;—to protect and guide all Sovereigns and nations, (especially such as have shown kindness unto us) and to bless them with good Government, Peace and Concord;—to promote the Knowledge and Practice of true Religion and Virtue, and the increase of Science among them and us;—and generally to grant unto all mankind such a Degree of temporal Prosperity as He alone knows to be best.



Shop Early - Mail Early

This year, the Postal Service is joining forces with the business community of Fort Worth, Texas in urging customers to shop early and mail

early for the holidays. Postmaster W.H. Hathman has offically declared the start of the holiday shopping season by asking shoppers to shop early and mail early this year and to make certain that mail is addressed correctly (including ZIP codes) and packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays.

"Normally, we handle about 1.2 million pieces of mail a dayincluding cards, letters and packages, but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 4.7 million

pieces," the Postmaster says.

The key to successful holiday mailings is to mail early and correct-Postmaster Hathman says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas dates-mailing including those for the armed forces stationed overseas--occur this month. Mailers can get specific information on the inter-national dates by calling us here at 334-2985," Hathman "Customers should also take care to write Legible ZIP Coded addresses for both the intended recipient and the sender.

Since mail sorting depends on the ZIP Code as well as the name of the particular city and state, the use of the correct ZIP Code will aid us in processing the mail.

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season."



The contract for deed enables the seller to evict the buyer if he or she defaults. Complicated foreclosure procedures are not necessary with a contract for deed. Using seller financing, a buyer may also be able to buy a home with a small down payment and with a loan which is below current market interest rates.

However, if the contract for deed is not property recorded, a dishonest seller could re-sell the same property to someone else.
