It's poll tax paying time around at the Jenkins Insurance Agency. If you were 60 years of age at any time in 1962, or if you are still under 60 years of age, you must pay a poll tax in order to qualify as a foter in Texas. Moreover, the tax must be paid before February

Now it is true that the year 1963 offers very little in the way of political issues to be voted upon, but you can never tell when an election will be called - they've had quite a few at Ranger, Baird and other communities recently - and to be on the safe side you should, under the circumstances mentioned above, pay your tax and qualify yourself to cast a ballot.

It is quite true that if you become 61 years of age during 1962 you will be eligible to vote regardless of wether or not you paid your tax. In addition to its influence upon the status of the individual voter, a poll tax paid will also help the schools, since the money collected from this source is credited to the school fund and helps pay teachers and other expenses of providing an education for your fu-

The poll tax is under attack from political sources more concerned, I am afraid, with votes than the public will, and in time it will go. 





## Finance Failure May Stop Program On Screwworm

Austin, Jan. — The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program will be stopped on March 31 unless by that time livestock producers and sportsmen have raised the remaining one million dollars of their three mil! ion dollar goal, the board of trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundaion announced at its meeting here on January 3.


Foundation President Charlie Scruggs said the move could become necessary because the Federal Appropriation Bill specifies that federal funds cannot continue whenever non-federal funds are no longer available on at least a fifty-fifty basis. All of the non-federal funds will have been expended by March 31, and state funds, if appropriated, will not be available until after that date.


The trustees immediately issued an emergency appeal to livestock producers and sportsmen from all five Southwestern States to raise the required one million dollars. They voided their original policy of not asking producers to contribute more than once in an attempt to save the program.

In making the announcement, Scruggs remarked it would be a shame to have to terminate the program at just the crucial time when the screwworm menace is being brought under control. Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico experienced only a fraction of the normally-expected number of screwworm infestations in 1962, while Arkansas had none and Louisiana reported only two cases all year (both of them shipped in from infested states). States east of the Missippi River, which normally experience considerable screwworm fly movement from Southwestern States, reported only one case in 1962, Scruggs said.





Mincemeat Pie Has Universal Appeal

Nothing tempts the palate like good, old-fashioned mincemeat pie.

#### Mincemeat Pie

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

MINCEMEAT PIE

2 cups sifted flour 1 teaspoon salt ½ cup corn oil

3 tablespoons cold water Mincemeat filling

Mix flour and salt. Blend oil in thoroughly with a fork. Sprinkle all of water over mixture; mix well. Press dough firmly into ball with hands. If too dry, mix in 1 to 2 tablespoons more oil. Divide dough; use larger part for bottom pastry. Flatten slightly; immediately roll out between 2 pieces waxed paper. Peel off top paper; place pastry in pan, paper side up. Peel off paper and fit pastry loosely into pan. Fill with mincemeat filling. Roll out top crust and place over filling. Trim ½-inch beyond rim of pan; fold under. Seal and flute edges. Bake in 425-degree oven until pastry is golden brown. 30 to 45 minutes. brown, 30 to 45 minutes.






