Through the Editor's Specs

The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce at its noon luncheon at the Elite Cafe Tuesday, gave Comm'r Bob Carter a vote of thanks for his progressive work in improving the roads of his precinct.

Mr. Carter is employing a new method of surfacing which, according to reports, gives almost as good service as standard paving, lasts for years and furnishes a surface, very smooth, not new, having been developed by the government as a temporary surfacing for landing strips for planes, and adapted to road construction very extensively since. It consists of spraying a mixture of hot oil and asphalt on sand, mixing and smoothing it on the top of the road and rolling it down. A section of road near Gorman was treated with it about a year ago and is giving fine service. Thousands of miles of the new surface have been laid in the United States and the results are very satisfactory.

If you drive over the road to the cemetery or out by Ray Agnew and Claude Cox farms from U. S. 183, you will drive on roads surfaced with the formula.

The cemetery road was paid for by donations, including a \$200 contribution by the chamber of commerce and contributions by the city, business firms and individuals.

A great deal of interest is being taken in the oil and gas development east of Rising Star where the Coastal States Gas Company of Houston is drilling a block of some 12,000 to 15,000 acres. There is no information obtainable on the project, but reports of good gas wells having been brought in and some excellent oil production are heard. I understand that a well on the A. D. and Jack Anderson tract on the eastern edge of the block has been completed for big gas, while the first well on the Whiteside tract is also an excellent gas producer. The Skeet Clark well on the western edge of the block is reported to be a good gas and oil producer from a new sand for the area—the Duffer.

It has been known for many years that there is lots of gas in this area, but because the oil and gas ratio is high and there has been no market for gas, drilling has been discouraged. The Railroad Commission is pretty strict about the matter of wasting gas and unless an operator with a high gas ratio to his oil can dispose of the gas usefully he is out of luck for his oil. Hence, no drilling.

But the demand for natural gas—which can't be imported—is increasing to such an extent that companies supplying it to the big centers are reaching out for more territory once known as marginal—and the prospects are that the gas resources of this area—which are considerable—will become of more economic importance than oil was. You can't look for a boom, such as we once had, but perhaps you can expect an extensive, steady and consistently profitable development of oil and gas resources, which will reflect a sound measure of prosperity on all of us through more employment, lease and royalty income and increased taxes to operate our schools and communities.

Incidentally, all of those troubles in the Middle East where such vast resources of petroleum exist, may turn attention back to developing oil and gas potentials at home.

New Type Paving Is Laid On Roads Here

For Legislature

Continued Work For Economy Is Brashear Pledge

State Representative Paul Brashear promised to continue his efforts to obtain for the 76th Legislative District and the State of Texas the maximum in good government for a minimum outlay of tax dollars in a formal statement this week in connection with his bid for re-election.

Mr. Brashear announced last January that he would run again, promising to issue a formal statement later. He is now completing his second term as a member of the Legislature.

During the 54th Legislature, his first term, Mr. Brashear served on a number of important committees, including the Military and Veterans Affairs, Agriculture, and Penitentiaries committees. In the 55th Legislature, Mr. Brashear served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Affairs committee. He was also a member of the State Hospitals and Special Schools, Liquor Regulations, Oil, Gas and Mining committees.

Mr. Brashear is a native of the 76th District, having been born at Atwell in Callahan County in 1917. He is married to the former Helen Ray of the Scranton community. They have two daughters—Ann Etta, who is married and lives in Abilene, and Sarah, who attends the Cisco Schools. They have one grand daughter.

A veteran of U. S. Army duty in World War II, Mr. Brashear is an active member of the American Legion. He was recently appointed to serve a 6-year term of the American Legion's Legislative Committee, a statewide body. He is currently chairman of this committee.

Mr. Brashear's education includes graduation from high school at Cross Plains, Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin.

In private life, Mr. Brashear is an insurance man and a farmer. He began farming as a boy and has owned and operated farms in Eastland and Callahan counties all of his life. He currently owns a farm in Callahan county. His extensive knowledge of farm and soil conservation resulted from several years as an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture soil conservation service units in Eastland and adjoining counties.

Prior to his election as a state representative, Mr. Brashear served as secretary in the House of Representatives and as assistant sergeant-at-arms of the Texas Senate, gaining valuable experience in Legislative procedure. He spent three years as

The annual Williams Homecoming will be held at the Williams school gym on August 9, it was announced this week. Everybody is invited, and former students living here were urged to let their relatives and friends who once lived at Williams but have moved away, know about the homecoming date and invite them to attend.

Those attending were asked to bring basket lunches to be spread in a community dinner at noon. A program will be presented.

A new type of permanent road surfacing, developed during World War II for airplane runways and used successfully on thousands of miles of road in the United States, is being laid down in the Rising Star precinct by Comm'r R. L. (Bob) Carter.

It consists of a hot mixture of oil and 35 per cent or more asphalt sprayed on sand or soil, mixed and rolled into a water-proof surface which becomes almost as hard and permanent as costly bituminous surfacing.

The new paving is being laid on the lateral road from U. S. 183 east by the Ray Agnew and Claude Cox farms and on the street to the Rising Star cemetery. Contributions by the city, residents, business men and the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce are paying for the cemetery road paving. The cost of surfacing the county roads is being paid out of the Precinct Road and Bridge fund.

Cost of the oil and asphalt treatment runs about \$1,200 a mile, Mr. Carter said. Four hundred barrels of the boiling hot mixture is sprayed into the blow sand used for topping by Prater Oil Co. of Tyler, Texas, where the method has been used with consistent success. The county machinery prepares the base, mixes the sand and asphalt-bearing oil and spreads it on the road where it is packed by gang wheels.

Mr. Carter and other county officials gave a great deal of study to the process before undertaking it here. They inspected roads which had been treated with it years ago and watched with particular interest a project laid down at Gorman. Wherever the method has been used it has been uniformly successful, said Mr. Carter. An indication of the satisfaction that road builders have found in the method was seen in the fact that one Parker county commissioner is now laying 60 miles of the road in his precinct.

Roads not scheduled for farm-to-market paving will be treated with the formula, Mr. Carter said. He hoped to lay down a few miles of the new paving each year as the funds in the road and bridge fund permit, gradually treating all non-farm-to-market roads in the precinct.

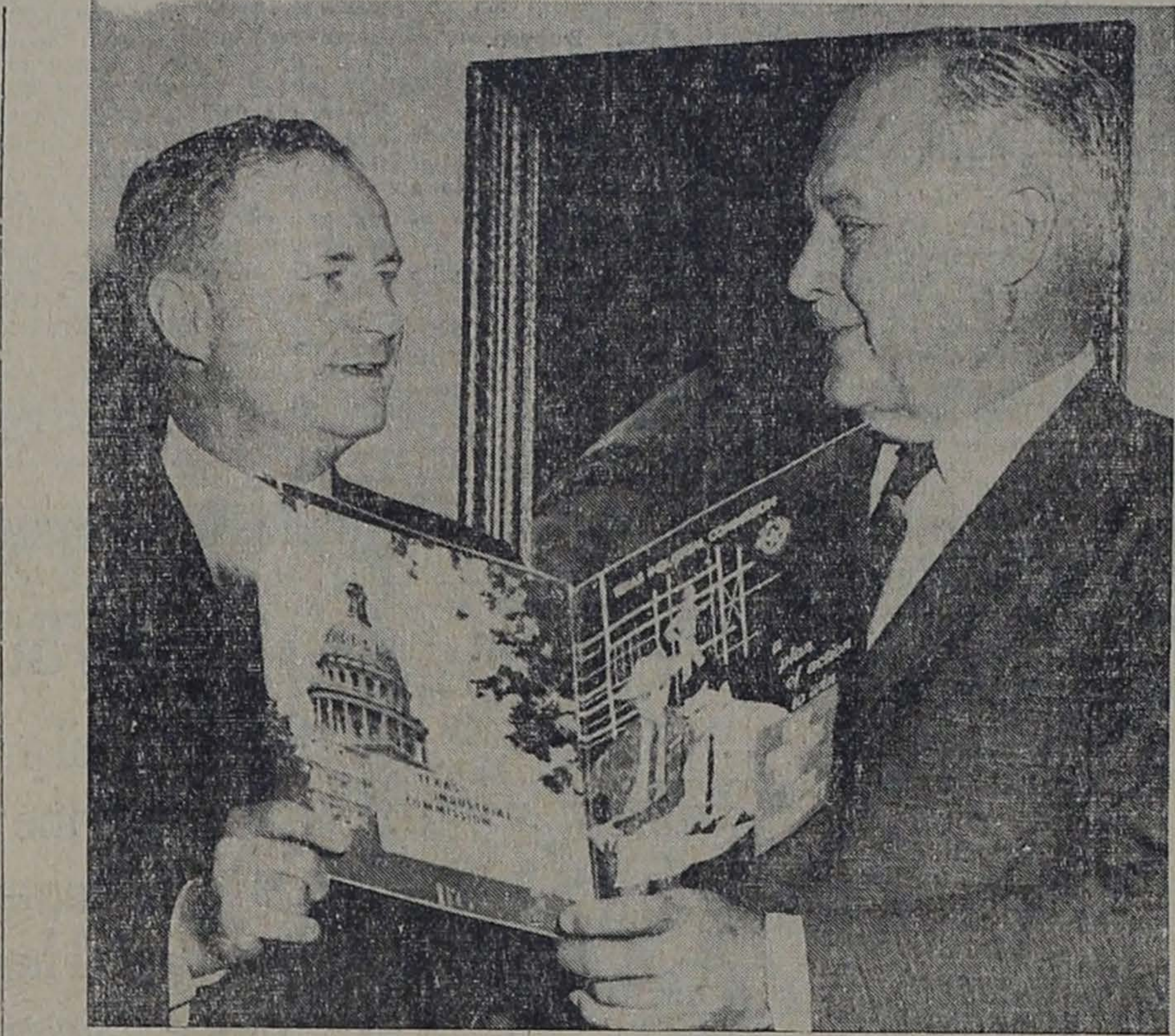
The next dinner of the club will be held at the Elementary School cafeteria at 7 o'clock Monday evening, July 28.

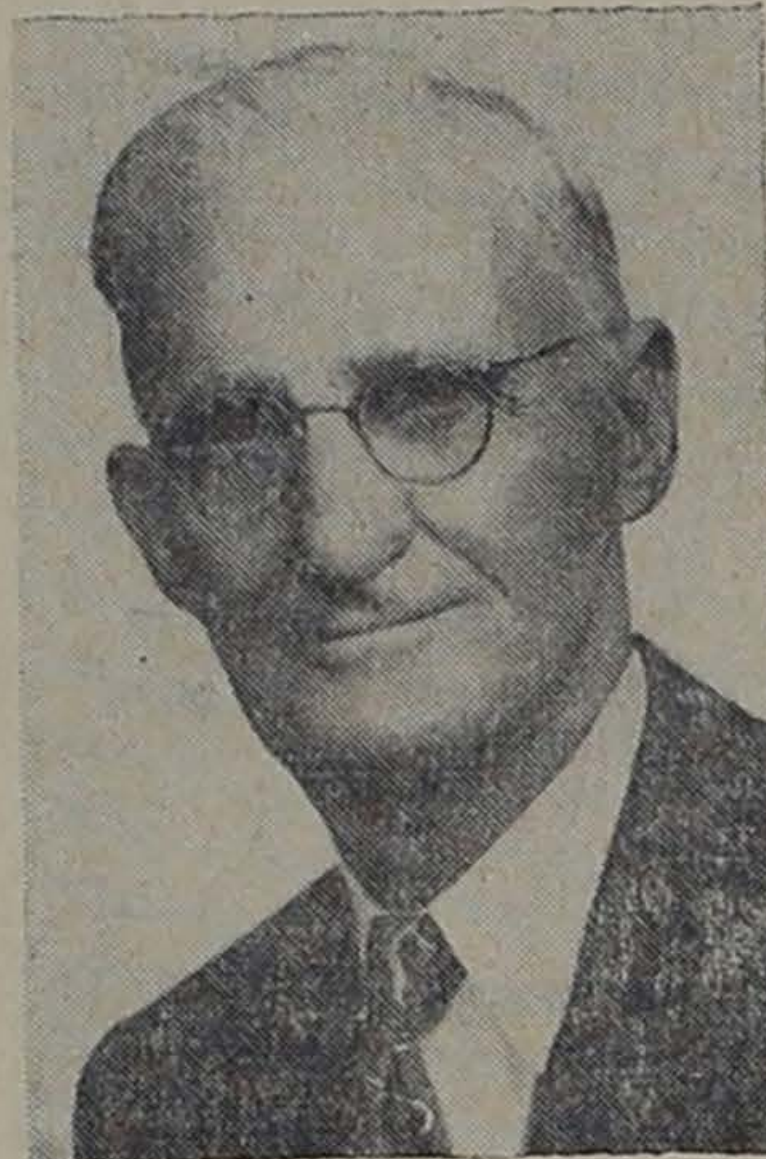

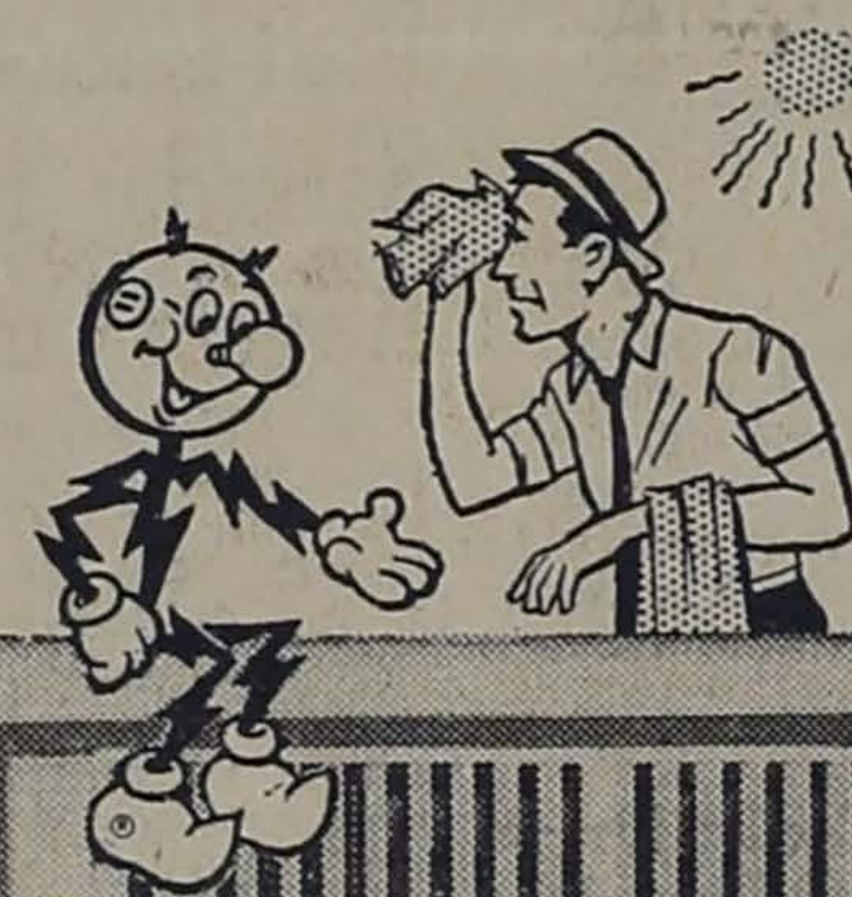

ional question by clearly confirming Texts' claim to 10 1/2 miles.

NOW, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL of the United States has filed a 425 page brief, again contesting Texas' title to the submerged lands between the 3 mile and the 10 1/2 mile limit.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER CLEARLY STATED his sentiment in favor of Texts at the time the Congress acted in 1953. It becomes a strange paradox that his Attorney General now files a suit on behalf of the Federal Government to set aside what the Congress has clearly stated to be Law. The Attorney stated to be the Law. The Attorney General claims that the Tidelands Act passed in 1953 is not clear. The case is to be argued before the Supreme Court of the United States some time next fall.

IN THE MEANTIME, since 1953 the State School Fund of Texas has collected approximately \$75 million from oil companies exploring and producing oil within the 10 1/2 mile zone.

THE DRILLING FOR OIL IN THE GULF is a tremendously expensive operation. For this and other reasons, exploration has been very slow, but the potential is great. With a healthy domestic oil industry, development in the near future should be much greater. This means, of course, that the Tidelands will in time to become even more valuable and more important to

the State of Texas.

REGARDLESS OF THE VALUES INVOLVED, the principle is even greater. The contest of the rightful claim of the State of Texas is a violation of the part of the Federal Government of its agreement with the State of Texas. If the Federal Government had a legal right prior to 1953 to the submerged lands of Texas, certainly it has had no right since. The act of the Attorney General will, of course, be resisted with every possible effort.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, in violation of this provision admitting Texas as a State, contended that the Gulf of Mexico came under Federal jurisdiction beyond the 3 mile limit. The United States Supreme Court upheld this contention on the part of the Federal Government.

IN 1953, THE CONGRESS supposedly settled the jurisdictional

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



People in this area realize we must make best use of our land and the water that falls on it if we have continuous abundant agricultural production. Best land use means conservation farming

to sustain the production from our land which is so essential to the economy of our area.

A conservation program as a whole for the area depends upon the application of conservation upon the land by individual land owners. Our two local Soil Conservation Districts — the Upper Leon S. C. D. and the Palo Pinto S. C. D. each use individualized farm plans as a means of encouraging conservation and as a basis for the development of their conservation programs. No two farms are alike; in fact no two acres of land are identical as to kind of soil, slope, and degree of erosion.

Conservation programs for individual farms must be designed to fit the particular piece of land and the land owners operations. To be of lasting benefit, they are based on a scientific analysis of the land as shown by soil and range surveys. This area has made good progress this spring in conservation planning. Some thirty land owners have made

complete conservation plans for their land in the past two months.

In keeping with a planned conservation program steady progress is being made in the application of conservation practices. Three farms recently installed terrace systems. They are J. G. Harlow, E. L. Boothe, and Aubrey Easter. Farmponds have been recently built on the Ernest Sneed farm at Morton Valley, the H. E. Wagley farm southwest of Cisco, the E. R. Finley farm southwest of Cisco, and the J. G. Harlow farm on Highway 80 east of Cisco.

In addition, E. L. Boothe, J. G. Harlow, and Aubrey Easter each built diversion terraces to protect cropland from outside water. J. W. Overstreet near Almeda has also recently built a diversion terrace. H. E. Wagley, J. G. Harlow, and Guy Cooper who farms near Ranger have recently shaped and seeded grass on waterways for handling outside water and terrace water.

Cost sharing on each of the

above practices was made available through the local ASC committee, with technical service in their installation furnished by the local Soil Conservation work unit.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—SURPRISING AS IT MAY SEEM, the old issue of the Texas Tidelands is not settled.

IN 1953, AFTER 16 YEARS OF EFFORT, the Congress finally passed the so-called Tidelands Bill.

THIS SUPPOSEDLY SETTLED the proposition that when Texas came into the Union, it reserved for itself 10 1/2 miles into the Gulf of Mexico. Ordinarily, the ownership of a State extends 3 miles seaward. But the 10 1/2 mile boundary ownership was written into Law by the Congress, and confirmed the Annexation Agreement by which Texas became a State of the Union.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, in violation of this provision admitting Texas as a State, contended that the Gulf of Mexico came under Federal jurisdiction beyond the 3 mile limit. The United States Supreme Court upheld this contention on the part of the Federal Government.

IN 1953, THE CONGRESS supposedly settled the jurisdictional

WHAT IS A PATENT?

A patent gives you the right for a limited time to keep others

from making, using or selling your invention without your permission. The federal government issues a patent to you if you meet certain requirements.

(1) You must have something useful—a process, a machine, an article, a material, a plant or an ornamental design. The United States will patent only means to make ideas work and will not patent ideas such as new ways to do business, a new mathematical formula or newly discovered laws of nature.

(2) You must have something new. This means you must be the first to make the invention. Before the government issues a patent, the patent office makes a search for related patents and publications to find out if the invention was known to others before you made it.

(3) You must have made an "invention." This means that there must be something unexpected about it and not obvious

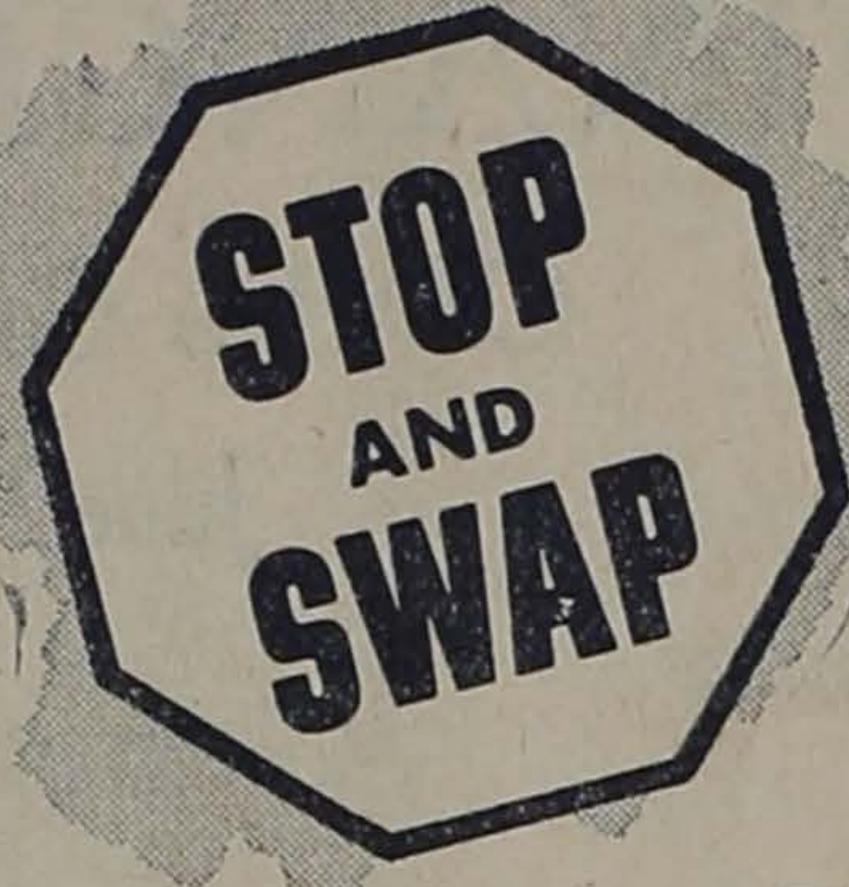
to others working the same art.

(4) You must apply for your patent in good time. You cannot get a patent if the invention was sold or publicly used in the United States or described in a printed publication in any other country more than one year before you apply for it.
