

# Back In Custody

Randy Lee Wells was under guard and reported in good condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital Tuesday where morning, reportedly is being treated for a possible ulcer.

Wells will be talked about in these parts for a 36-hour

With a red Corvette allegedly stolen from an Abilene car dealer and \$100 used to gas the high powered machine, Randy Wells elluded law officers from Eastland, Palo Pinto and Stevens County as he escapaded across the Big Country.

The 17-year-old Ranger youth, who escaped from custody at about 1:15 p.m. Thursday, was recaptured at about 2:30 a.m. Saturday about four miles southeast of Eastland.

Few police cars could match the Corvette's horsepower and speeds of up to 130 miles per hour, several police sources said. Few police also could match Well's knowledge of Eastland County.

The combination allowed Wells to practically come and go as he pleased, said Eastland County District Attorney Emory Walton. Wells was periodically seen driving at high speeds through town Friday evening, police said.

Walton said that Wells then sold the stereo in Abilene. It has been recovered.

Reports of Wells whereabouts Friday evening were scattered throughout the three-county area. He was spotted about 2:15 a.m. Saturday at a Fina Service Station on Highway 80, east of Ranger. He had been previously been spotted there earlier, and he returned to drink a soda, Walton said.

Eastland policemen Dale Seago and Terry Harbin sighted Wells heading west on Interstate 20 near Olden. They pursued Wells as he turned left on FM 570, heading for Lake Leon.

Seago, the driver, said that his squad car's transmission was slipping and he had difficulty maintaining speed which exceeded 100 miles per hour

Wells then turned onto a dirt road maintaining his high rate of speed with police in pursuit. He made a hard right turn at a T-intersection and headed back towards

When he was picked up, he had \$1 left in his pocket. 'That thing really drinks the gas," Wells told Walton.

The Ranger native said the vomiting began Saturday afternoon after he ate a sandwich. He said he was nauseated all afternoon and after eating dinner that night he again hemorraghed, resulting in his admittance to the hospital.

The doctor who examined Wells after his capture Saturday morning refused to comment on the youth's condition. However, Morren said Wells was complaining of a headache after the chase, and was checked by the doctor, who found nothing wrong.

Sunday, Wells said his stomach and side were sore, but that he had not hemorraghed that day.

Wells said a small blood vessel in his body may have ruptured when his car was hit from behind by that of Eastland Chief Bobby Arriola. Wells said he had stopped and was preparing to surrender when Arriola ran into him. He added Arriola was going at such a high rate of speed he could not stop when he saw Wells had given

When asked if he had been hit or abused Wells said, 'Not in any way." He added he had not been abused during his capture, either.

"Arriola tackled me from behind and threw me to the ground," during the capture, but "they were just trying to stop me," he said.

Wells said he came back to Ranger instead of leaving the area because "I didn't have any money, or not enough to go anywhere." He added he spent some money on a motel Thursday night and he didn't have much left, just enough to buy gas.

Wells said he was being treated for hemorrhaging from the mouth. Sheriff Johnnie Morren said the hemorrhaging may have been caused by a blood vessel that broke during the chase that ended in Well's

By Christine Reich What makes a foster parent? Mrs. Dianne Bowden of Early, Texas, answered this question when she spoke recently to a meeting of the Region IV Child Welfare Advisory Council in Abilene, Texas.

Thursday,

Attractice, blue-eyed Dianne can speak with authority on the subject of foster parenting. In the six years she and her husband Billy have been foster parents, they have cared for forty-one children, keeping some in their home for as long as two and one-half

Dianne is a lively example that boredom and loneliness are not what make a foster parent. A fluent speaker, Dianne is much in demand to share with audiences what she has learned during 400 hours of professional training and her years of actual experience. She and Billy are the parents of four children: Sam, 19, presently working in Houston; Scott, 18, and Twillia, 14, students at Early High School; and three year-old Misty of the home. Besides parenting, Dianne also finds time to pursue her hobbies of painting, sewing and raising African violets.

But after hearing Dianne speak and seeing her in action, one would have to conclude that hobbies are secondary. It is the need of the child and the challenge to the "stand-in" parents that attract her and her husband to this demanding lifestyle. Her voice is that of the crusader, pleading for compassionate, informed treatment for children uprooted from their native environment and their natural parents. Dianne speaks with concern about undiscovered allergies, overlooked hear-

ing problems, and therapy denied the child with severe emotional trauma.

**Makes A Foster Parent** 

Concern is backed by action. Dianne and Billy are licensed to keep a maximum of four children at any one time, accepting children from birth to sixteen years of age. At this time they accept only "special needs" children, those with severe medical problems, handicaps of a serious nature, or emotional problems calling for special treatment. They presently have two foster children, both of whom were severely abused when they came into the home.

Dianne says of their involvement, "We really enjoy working with infants, seeing them become well enough to go to an adoptive home. We have learned as a family the very valuable technique of 'letting a child go' when it comes time to give him up.' Our foster home is really a family home with all members of our family sharing in the daily chores and care of the special needs children." And that is the beautiful thing to see in the

Bowden home. The natural children accept the foster children, picking up the positive attitude of helpfulness from their parents.

What makes a foster parent? Obviously, dedication, enthusiasm, professional training and an ability to forget oneself while remembering a little one torn loose from his moorings. As Dianne modestly asserts, "We feel that professional training, a positive attitude, and much prayer have made us effective

A PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM JUDGE JIM R. WRIGHT:

Upon my assuming the position of District Judge of the 91st District, I immediately embarked upon a course of action which would result in the increase of the number of cases disposed of.

Cases do not dispose of themselves, but rather are disposed of by hard work, by setting the cases for trial and by actually trying them. A program such as this requires work and time. Such a program requires work not only by myself and the staff of the 91st District Court, but also by the general public as jurors.

On many occasions jurors are called to Court but do not actually serve in the trying of a case. Nevertheless, the jurors who are called fulfill an important role in the administration of justice. Many cases are settled and disposed of civil as well as criminal, without trial just because the case has been called for trial and a jury is present waiting to try the case. Therefore, your work and mine is not in vain because our goal of disposition and justice has been reached.

In the short time in which I have been privileged to serve as your Judge, we have utilized an average of over two jury weeks per month in the administration of justice. The remainder of the time has been used extensively and solely for non-jury matters. We intend to continue our work in this area in an effort to give all parties their day in court. You have a right to expect this from your Court, and will receive no less so long as I am serving you as your Judge.

Many politicians make many promises which they cannot keep. However, one promise that I can and will make and keep is that, if I am elected to continue as Judge of the 91st District Court, the Court will be a working Court and will be one in which cases are tried and disposed of as rapidly as possible in accordance with justice. I am asking you to assist me in my keeping of this promise. Your vote and your support will enable us to continue with the plans and to reach the goals which we all have for the 91st District Court.





### County 4th In **Rve Production**

Rye production in Texas was up more than 25 percent in 1979, with Eastland county fourth in the state's total production, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Eastland County trailed only Dallam, Collingsworth and Comanche counties in total rye production. Eastland County reported a yield of 27,100 bushels from 1,300 harvested acres.

Statewide, rye production totaled 513,000 bushels, up considerably from 1978's yield of 406,000 bushels. harvested bushels per acre were up from 14 bushels in 1978, to 19 bushels in 1979.
