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

Aid Approved Congress has approved a

Farm Disaster

\$1.75 billion disaster assistance bill that will provide payments for farmers from across Texas who suffered losses in 1990 or in 1991, says U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

"More than 125,000 Texas agricultural producers suffered losses from flooding, freezes and drought,' Gramm noted. "They will be able to file for claims under this legislation, which will be administered at the local level by the Texas Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS)".

According to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee Texas cotton farmers were among the hardest hit by the weatherborne agricultural disasters of 1990 and 1991.

Harris noted that in excess of 40,000 cotton producers suffered damage valued at more that \$326 million in 1991 alone. In addition, producers of wheat, grain sorghum, corn and hay had extensive losses.

Gramm noted that part of the funding, \$995 million, will be available for payments on either of the two years, at the producer's option. An additional \$775 million is also available, subject to a budget request by the President.

Natural disasters that caused the widespread losses were the 1990 flooding along the Red and Trinity rivers, droughts in the Panhandle and the Rio Grande Valley and freezing temperatures that caused widespread damage to winter wheat production in the Panhandle, North Texas and Blackland Prairie areas.



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


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Guest Slot By HVO

PRIOR , KNOWLEDGE of the city: Little except memory of the post-WWII play & film "Judgement at Nuremberg.". It's a beautiful old, walled citadel; hdqs, for Vince's Regiment; train terminal for our Eurarail expeditions; and principal city of the area known as Franconia. It dates to 1040 and was the scene of the first meetings of the Holy Roman Empire; Hitler's greatest Nazi rallies; and the Allied war trials. It's the birthplace of German Artist Albrecht Durer, Woodcarver Wolgemut and Sculptors Adam Kraft and Peter

- Thanks to Amy, we got into the American Bavarian Army Hotel right next to the Hauptbahnhof (main station), which is adjacent to the Royal Gate (Nurnberg symbol) and Handwerkerhof, an authentic medieval mall where craftsmen stay busy pretending it's still the Middle Ages. They turn out puppets, baskets, pewter mugs, plates, glassware and

oodles of gingerbread cookies.

On a cold wet Saturday afternoon, Nurnberg's attractions are all in good walking distance: historic St. Lorenz Church; and further, the Main 'Market Square, 'where traditional vendors were already breaking camp for the day, and the scene of the annual Christkindlmarkt is held each November, and the 60-foot "Beautiful Fountain" (scaffolled this day for repair) with its gold ring which all must rub for good luck. Further up, the 13th century St. Sebaldus Church, where the choir was in rehearsal in preparation for Sunday 'services. Much of this ancient area, destroyed in bombings, has been restored.

Brisk sight-seeing eventually calls for hot coffee, and one of two McDonald's in this ancient area was in order .-- but alas we chose the wrong one, the one adjacent to and frequented by residents of a half-way house, presumably provided to help cope with the city's wide-spread drug problem.

Evening meal in an authentic cafe in the craft area for Nurnberg's

famous succulent sausages and kraut.

Saturday night at the Army's unbelievable Post Exchange (three floors of inexpensive merchandise) and equally-gigantic commissionary where the military does its shopping. It's a virtual city, with everything from newstands to an automobile dealership, where the Post Exchange, located on the edge of town, provides for service people. Wonder what the future holds, in view of the drawdown reductions?

Breakfast was not German typical at the Army hotel where we stayed; it was a full, American mess-hall volume and quality served on order, with our kind of coffee. So adequate, in fact, that a brief stop at BurgerKing at the P.X. took care of us until late that evening.

(Side note: German money lineup is pretty easy: DMark is made up of 100 pfennigs, and, in addition to 1,000, 500, 50, 20 and 10 bills, also come in 5, 2 and 1 coins. Designation is interesting: 1 DM, (coma, not period) 50 pfennigs. So: 1,50, not 1.50.) Which reminds: when a waiter serves you, they invariable say "So." Trolleys run constantly.

We learned that valuable and irreplaceable works of art were

evacuated from the St. Lawrence Church during the war, and saved. The church itself was damaged by bombs and artillery fire. The roof frame was wiped out, the vaulting, organs and pews totally destroyed. Reconstruction began as early as 1945, and the church was in full use again in 1952. The people of Nuremberg and the parishioners of the church provided the funds. They were helped by a benefactor from the USA who wanted to pay tribute to his ancestors. Work continues on many items, including the stained glass windows.

Our folks tell us that the Christkindlmarkt, the pre-Christmas market that runs Nov. 27 to Christmas . Eve, with the highlight, the Dec.10 candle procession in which thousands of children march in the ancient city, is unbelievable beautiful.

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

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

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

Legal entanglements at all tiers of redistricting, plus a maverick GOP candidate, threaten to make Texas' primaries a rousing, convoluted, politically bloody election.

In other words, 1992 will be business as usual in a state where politics is a contact sport.

To date, no less than nine lawsuits are pending which could alter Texas redistricting, but some of those issues may be resolved by the Texas Supreme Court this week.

Breakdown in Talks The threat that House

The deadlock also heightened the possibility that a kill-the-Democrats House redistricting plan devised by Republicans could become the political map under which elections eventually are held. A Republican threejudge federal court panel is scheduled to consider adoption of that plan this

House Redistricting Chairman Tom Uher, D-Bay City, said he hoped new talks with Hispanic lawmakers would begin, but the hope appeared dim.

"It's more likely that the ''93 regular session as a federal court is going to draw this plan," Uher

After failing to appear for a hearing, a state district judge ordered Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, to pay more than \$49,000 in a civil case accusing him of misrepresenting a client's fire insurance claim.

Turner, who is campaigning to become the first black mayor of Houston, had a bad week: media reports linked him as the attorney in a possible faked death for insurance benefits scam, and his legislative aide was jailed in Louisiana for possession of 64 grams of cocaine.

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
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
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
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
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Your Bible Questions Answered By Dr. M.H. Clark

QUESTION: "Why do Christians worship on the first day of the week instead of the seventh-day sabbath?

ANSWER: The first mention of the seventh day is found in Genesis 2:2,3, where we read the God "rested" on this day from His creation work, and that He "blessed and sanctified" this day. But notice carefully that we read NOT ONE SINGLE WORD about the seventh day or the "sabbath" in the rest of the Book of Genesis, which covers a period of about 2500 years (if we accept the traditional dates of Bishop Ussher). For two thousand and five hundred years there is not one word about it. There is not even a hint that God ever told Adam, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, or Joseph to cease from work and rest on that seventh day or any other day. There is not the slightest hint that anybody in those two and a half milleniums ever observed that day.

But then after God had chosen Israel, the descendents of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, as His special chosen people for a special purpose, He commanded them to observe the seventh day, or "sabbath." It was one of the Ten Commandments in the Law of Moses. (Read Exodus 16:23-36; 20:8-11; 31:12-18.) Notice that in the last reference we are told in verses 13 and 17 the sabbath was "A SIGN BETWEEN ME AND THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL FOREVER." Just like circumcision, this relationship of God with the nation Israel. Then look in the Book of Nehemiah, chapter 9 and verse 14, where in their prayer to Jehovah, the Levites said to Him, "And made known unto THEM (Israel) thy holy sabbath." The sabbath, which God himself had "blessed an sanctified," was not made known to anybody on earth until it was made known to the Jews, the nation of Israel, 2,500 years later. It was plainly said to be a "sign" of the covenant relation between Jehovah and Isreal. The Jews will yet again observe that seventh day when Christ returns to this earth to rule over them, in person, as well as over all the nations.

But in this present age, a separate and different age, our whole faith, our whole hope for eternity, rests upon the glorious fact of the resurrection of Christ (1 Corinthians 15:1-20) on the "first day of the week" (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1-2; Luke 24:1; John 20:1). This first day became the day of Christians, believers in Christ and in salvation only through Him, to cease from their ordinary pursuits and assemble to worship Him (Acts 20:7; First Corinthians 16:1,2). This is undoubtedly "the Lord's Day" spoken of by John in Revelation 1:10. Moreover, we are told over and over in the books of Romans and Galatians that believers in Christ "ARE NOT UNDER THE LAW," that is, the Mosaic Law which was given to Israel and Israel alone. See Romans 3:20, 28; 4: 18-16; 6:14; Galatians 2:





FOOD GIFTS SAFE "Tis the season — to receive such tasty presents as smoked sausages, game birds, and packaged hams — that is, all the things you wouldn't normally have on hand in great quantities because they tend to contain a lot of fat (and often sodium), but which you allow yourself small portions of at this time of year. (After all, you don't want to seem ungrateful about the gifts

people send you.) But how

to store them? And for how

long?

Here's the safe way to handle some of the most popular food gifts you may be receiving. *Refrigerate raw game birds such as turkey for no more than two days before cooking.

After cooking, refrigerate for no more than four days. *Store "cook-before-eating" hams in the refrigerator for no more than one week. Once cooked, the hams remain safe in the refrigerator for five days. Country hams, those that have been drycured in a mixture of salt, sugar, and seasonings and then smoked and aged, remain safe in a kitchen cabinet for as long as a year if unsliced. That's because they contain so much salt and so little moisture that bacteria are not able to grow on them. If you slice some off to be soaked and cooked, it may stay in the refrigerator for five to seven days; what hasn't been cooked can be kept in the refrigerator two to three months. *Feel free to keep unopened hard/dry sausage at room temperature for four to six weeks, or in the refrigerator for up to six months. Upon opening, the product should be stored in the refrigerator for no more than three weeks. If the sausage is labeled "Keep Refrigerated," however, it should be stored in the refrigerator

more perishable. You may put cans or jars of meat on a kitchen shelf, where they will stay edible anywhere from two to five years. The reason they last so long is that manufacturers sterilize them at very high temperatures before packaging them.
