Tetanus Deaths Unnecessary, Says AMA Health Official

Despite the outpouring of | new "wonder" drugs, man's ancient enemy, tetanus, has not yet succumbed to a cure.

Even so, death from tetanus, or "lockjaw" as it is commonly called, is "almost entirely unnecessary," says Raymond L. White, M.D., Director of Environmental Medicine for the American Medical Association. "As a disease, tetanus is com-

pletely preventable," Dr. White noted. The only reason it per-sists is that people fail to get immunized, or fail to maintain their immunity. Out of sheer neglect, three-fourths of the people don't have the protection they need.

"If it weren't for medicine's continual concern over the possibility of tetanus-if practically every time a physician saw a wound he didn't take precautions against tetanus-the dis-ease would rank much higher among human killers."

Tetanus is caused by a deadly poison emitted by certain bacteria which contaminate certain types of wounds-especially puncture wounds, or wounds survive long enough in the open in hospital operating rooms-air to infect wounds. But its tracked in on street shoes.


