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Homemaking Hints

"Pica" is a craving for non-food items such as clay, dirt or laundry starch, explains Dr. Cass Ryan-Crowe, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This condition is frequently noted among pregnant women, and it may indicate marginal deficiencies of trace minerals, the specialist says.

Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Families with mentally retarded children often face constant stresses that other families may not experience, she says. Two supports you can give are being aware of the need for occasional relief from the stress and helping in the actual care of handicapped children, the specialist says.

Prevent fires in your microwave oven! Don't use paper grocery bags in the oven-they ignite and burn the interior of your oven, warns Linda McCormack, and family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Family-oriented personnel policies may be in the near future for employees, says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Your best pair of pants isn't looking so good, and you wonder why. Most laundry problems are due to stains, lint and residue deposits often caused by the incorrect use of fabric softeners or wear damage to the fabric, says Becky Saunders, a clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A greater public awareness of the need for family-sensitive personnel policies was a major outgrowth of the 1980 White House Conference on Families, she says.

Thinking about doing some volunteer work. Consider contacting families of mentally retarded children.

As a result, greater flexibility will be expected from employers, along with a more dedicated effort from company insurers to make "pick-and-choose" employee-benefit packages available, she says.

Fall Gardening Time at Hand

Although there is still plenty of hot weather ahead, it's time to start getting things in shape for your fall vegetable garden.

Much of Texas is well suited for year-round gardening, and fall vegetables generally have better quality and flavor than those grown in the spring, says Dr. Sam Cotner, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A. M. University System.

Many popular warm-season vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, potatoes, okra, cucumbers and squash can be planted during the coming weeks.

Also, the so-called "winter" vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, greens, parsley and carrots can be planted now for early harvesting. Later plantings of these cold-hardy crops will supply fresh vegetables well into the winter.

What are some of the important aspects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape, suggests Cotner. You had a garden this spring and fertilizer was applied, little if any additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, apply two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 per 100 square feet and work it into the soil, recommends the horticulturist. If plants make slow growth, apply a light amount of fertilizer between rows and water it into the soil.

Adequate water is vital for a successful fall garden, particularly for seed germination and early plant growth. Cotner suggests "pre-

irrigation" before planting followed by subsequent, light waterings three or four times a week to keep soil from drying and crusting. Water stress during early growth of plants can reduce later yields.

Transplanting is a good practice in the fall since this allows seed to be started in areas sheltered from high temperatures and drying winds. Check at garden centers for recommended varieties of vegetables and strong, vigorous, healthy plants. Or you may want to grow your own transplants, notes the horticulturist.

Drugs Can Cause Heat Reactions

Certain drugs may expose the people who use them to greater risk of sunburn and heat exhaustion, according to physician at Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine. Johannes Steenkamp, D.O., chairman of TCOM's department of public health and preventive medicine, reminds the public that drugs such as tetracycline (an antibiotic) and Thorazine (a tranquilizer) sensitize the skin, increasing the chances of sunburn. Amphetamines, atropine-related drugs including marijuana and drugs for stomach cramps like Donnato and Bentyll affect the heat-regulating system in the brain, he said. Drugs with diuretic (promoting the secretion of urine) effects such as caffeine also affect the way the body responds to heat. Any of these drugs can increase the user's susceptibility to heat exhaustion. "If you think your medication may expose you to greater risks in summer," Dr. Steenkamp said, "check with your physician."

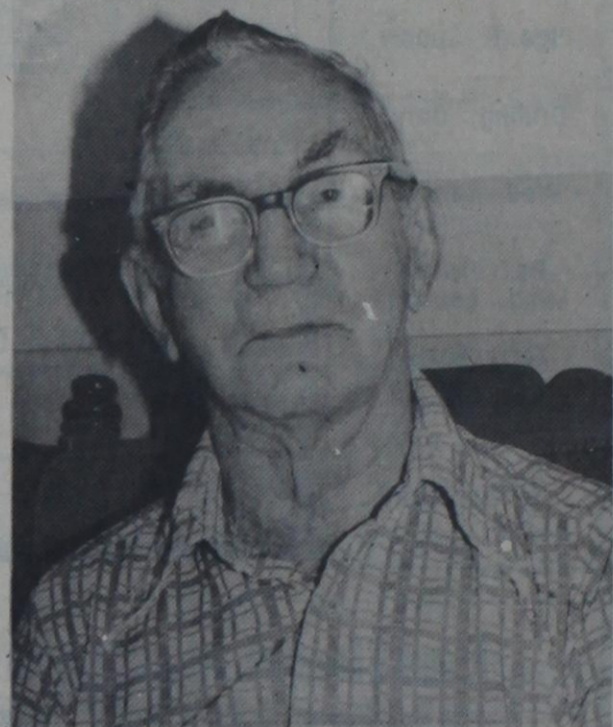
Controlled Grazing and Fencing Seminar Schedule

Oil and Gas Report



A Brownwood-based operator has staked locations for the Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4 N.B. Crutchfield, all developmental wells to be located ten miles north of Cisco. With projected total depths of 2,000 feet, the wells are in a 40-acre lease in the Eastland County Regular Field, H&TCRR County Survey. The operator is Scranton Exploration.

Enserch Exploration of Dallas has revealed plans to drill a 4,200-ft. developmental well in the Lee Ray Field. The operator has 1,805 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's SPRR County Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 13 W.H. Grove. Drillsite is four miles north of Cisco.

County's Scranton Field. The well is designated as the No. 1 Neely "A", pumping oil at the rate of 7 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for a small amount of casinghead gas. Location is in a 128-acre lease in the CT&MGRS Survey. Bottomed at 1,720 feet, the well will produce from perforations 1,656 to 1,657 feet into the hole.

Lula Lee Canet "A" showed potential to make 5 barrels of oil and a small amount of casinghead gas per day. The operator has 106 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's MCSL Survey, A-367, five miles east of Eastland. The well will produce from an interval 1,495 to 1,508 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,575 feet.

Producing 1,530,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 1 Smith was completed successfully as a wildcat by Buck Wheat Resources Inc. of Eastland. Drillsite is seven miles south of Breckenridge. It was drilled to 4,182-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 4,146 to 4,175 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 1.25 choke, and absolute open flow was estimated at 10,050,000 CFPD.

G.C. Jennings Estate showed potential to make 30 barrels of oil and 120,000 CF casinghead gas per day. The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's E. Chambliss No. 2 Survey, four miles southeast of Frankel.

Producing 2,209,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 1 Mattye L. Carter "R" was completed successfully as a wildcat by W.G. Arnot Jr. of Breckenridge. Drillsite is seven miles west of Palo Pinto. It was drilled to 4,535-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 3,850 to 3,866 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 2-inch choke, and absolute open flow was estimated at 3,600,000 CFPD.

President Named For Independent Producers

Newly elected officials of the prominent Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association are headed by President elect Harrold E. (Gene) Wright, and independent producer and petroleum engineer of Gilmer, Texas. He will serve during 1982-83 for the Austin-based organization and its 5,400 members.

Joining Wright are: Bruce Anderson as Secretary, a Houston independent producer, and Bennie C. Downing as Treasurer, a royalty owner and C.P.A. of Austin. Former President Frank L. Pitts of Dallas will serve as the Chairman of the Board of Directors. Pitts is a Dallas independent and heads Pitts Energy Group.

Mr. Wright was formerly a Vice President of TIPRO, served as Chairman of the Task Force on Oilfield Theft, and was Chairman of the TIPRO National Policy Committee. He is serving as temporary chairman of the Petroleum Industry Security Council. Wright has recently been appointed by Governor Clements to serve on the Governor's Task Force on Foreign Investments in Texas.

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A 4,500-ft. wildcat is planned by Bruce A. Wilbanks of Midland at a drillsite four miles north of Cisco, Eastland County. Hailey Energy Corp. of Abilene has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Messengill, a 2,000-ft. developmental well two miles east of Eastland. Pioneer News

In the Introduction to Gold Dust, a little gem of a book, I chanced to find in a Museum Collection, Charlotte M. Younge, compares the collection of "counsels and teachings, which God has sown almost everywhere... which enlighten and inspire the mind... to the gold dust collected by the aged, the indigent and children, of Southern France, during the 18th Century." 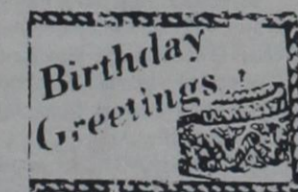

It is a good management practice to have your hay tested for protein content. This can be done by the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M. We have mailing containers and other information on forage testing in the County Extension Service Office.

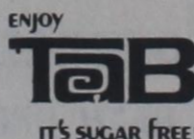

water and spoil quickly.

Because of the abundant spring and summer rains, hay is being made at a record pace in Eastland. I don't remember ever seeing this much hay produced in this county. The quality of the hay is very good in most cases too.

One producer told me his forage sorghum looked like the pictures in the ads for the first time. Even though the sorghum is tall, it is very heavy and has small stems.

I still see a lot of small bales, but it seems more and more producers are rolling hay in the large round bales.

While the big package hay systems help reduce labor and equipment costs on many farms, they require special storage and feeding.

Traditional storage and feeding methods aren't suitable with big hay packages. Due to their size, they must be stored outside in a well drained area. Also, they must be dense because low density packages absorb more

Many producers stack hay on a hillside with the belief that this is a well-drained site. This is a mistake because drainage from above runs under the stacks, causing excessive hay spoilage.

Another mistake is to stack bales under trees, which prevents rapid drying after rainfall.

Stack bales two feet from each other so sides won't touch when settling occurs. If bales touch, spoilage is excessive.

In determining hay supplies, allow two round bales per cow to compensate for additional consumption realized when large packages are fed free-choice. Feed large packages in a rack to prevent trampling losses.

Studies have shown that animals waste 2.6 per cent dry matter when hay is hand fed. When large packages are fed daily with free access on a sod, up to 15 percent is lost. Panels can cut

wastage to 5.5 percent. About 35 percent is wasted when feeding a week's supply without racks.

Since production costs continue to rise, hay should be stored and fed properly to

reduce losses and increase operating efficiency.

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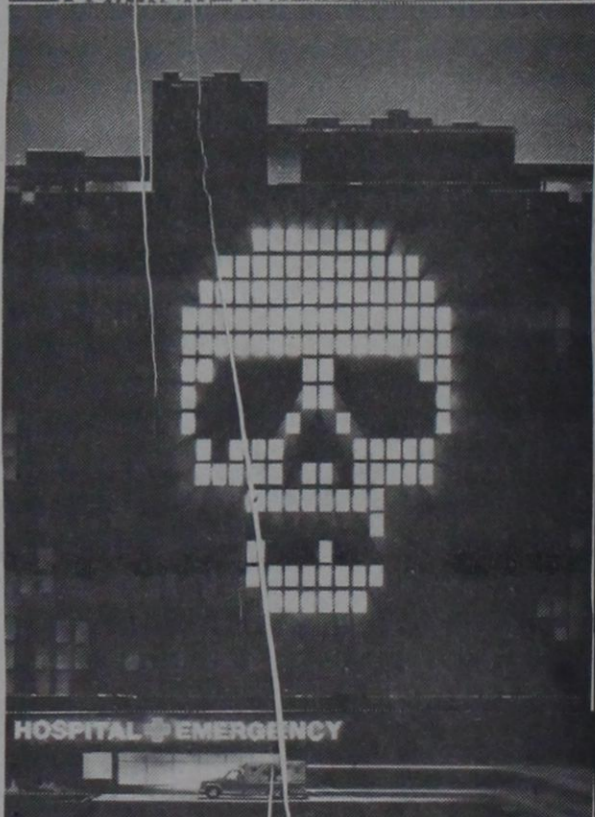
