

#### School District In State Gear For 1980-1981 Budget

School districts throughout the state are now gearing up to think about 1980-81

Last year, statewide budgets totaled \$5.66 billionup 13 per cent. School property tax levies were increased 7.6 per cent, but two out of five districts in the state reduced levies.

For next year, state aid to local schools will increase by \$211 million to fund a 5:1 per cent increase in minimum salaries and an \$11 per student increase in operating allowances. Despite rapid population growth in Texas, no increase in the number of students in public schools is anticipatedand in fact, the larger districts are expected to see decline.

In 1978-1979 there was an average of one classroom teacher for each 16.7 students.

Outlook for 1980-1981 Budget Current economic conditions with double-digit inflation will force school officials to make some hard choices in preparing 1980-1981 budgets.

The Legislature provided additional funds for the second year of the State's biennium, and current estimates anticipate \$210.7 million additional State Aid for 1980-1981. The base salary in the Foundation Program was increased by 5.1% plus experience increments of 4-5% a year.

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An additional experience step of 2% has been added for teachers at the maximum. The operating allowance was increased by \$11 per student. The impact will vary among individual districts as the local share of the Foundation Program will change.

Last year the Local Fund Assignment was determined by the lesser of \$0.15 per \$100 of market value or \$0.1712 of

In 1980-1981 the L.F.A. will be calculated at \$0.16 per \$100 of index value consisting of the 1977 estimates of productivity value of open-space land plus market value of other types of taxable property. The L.F.A. of a district, however, cannot increase more than 20%.

Again the State will partially reimburse school districts for tax losses from state-mandated homestead exemptions and productivity valuation of land.

H.B. 621 enacted by the last Legislature eliminated the use of an assessment ratio beginning with the January 1, 1981, tax roll. While 100% assessment is not required for the 1980-1981 school year, some districts may change a year early. Increasing the ratio of assessment requires a commensurate reduction in the tax rate or "truth in taxation" notices and hearings to increase taxes.

The tax assessor must calculate a tax rate that if applied to the 1980 tax roll would provide the same revenue that was levied the previous year. If the board of trustees anticipates adopting a rate that is more than 3 % greater than the rate calculated by the assessor, a record vote must be taken and published in a 1/4-page notice in a newspaper calling for a public hearing on the subject of a tax increase. A second record vote must be taken at the hearing which again just be published with notice of a meeting to set the tax rate.

If the tax rate is to be increased by more than 3{, a decision must be made by the first of August to allow enough time to follow this procedure and to adopt a budget before the 1980-1981 fiscal year begins.

Spider mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With hot dry weather gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves if your vegetables are still surviving the

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant, among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes, peas, eggplants and corn.

Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight-legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size. about 1/60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from red. green and yellow to white and brown. Spider mites deposit their eggs on the underside of leaves. These hatch in about five days. There may be 10-15 or more generations per year

Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infestations will cause leaves to appear biotched or spotted, turn pale or yellowish in color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and stems.

Begin a control program as soon as spider mites are detected and before plant damage is obvious. A light infestation of spider mites can be reduced and kept at low levels by spraying plants with a strong stream of cool water every few days.

If chemicals must be used, select from such effective materials as Kelthane and diazinon. Two to four applications may be needed at five-day, intervals. Always

follow on the pesticide label. May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on roots of bermuda grass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding control

measures should be taken. Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Eastland County will need to treat between mid-July and early August. Timing of application is critical for adequate

White grubs in excessive

numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod. Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at

recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the

soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the Apply diazinon sprays at

the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding.

#### **Drought Relief To Be Made Available To Texans**

Economic relief-ranging from portable fans to emergency feed programs-is available to drought and heatstricken areas of Texas, according to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm.

"Several types of federal programs that will help individuals and businesses, as well as farmers and ranchers in their efforts to deal with the effects of the extreme heat and drought conditions are available," Stenholm stated. "These include existing programs designed to deal with disasters and a new \$6.7 million-dollar program announced this week by President Carter to deal with the unusual heat wave."

Some \$2.5 million of the special fund is earmarked for Texas, Stenholm explained, to be used to assist low income indivduals especially who are facing life threatening situations.

The funds will be available made through the Community Service Administration's network of Community Action Agencies. Eligible activities include: Transportation to local and state operated heat relief centers, purchase or rental of low-cost appliances such as fans or window air conditioners, payment of utility bills, as well as provisions of other supportive services which will reduce the potential hazards to the health of low income persons.

To receive assistance with the funds, households must demonstrate total income at or below 125 percent of federal poverty guidelines (\$9,300 for a non-farm family of four and approximately \$7,900 for a farm family of four), Stenholm said.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHa) will be able to provide financial assistance only after county designated a disaster area by the State FmHA Director, he pointed out. Farmers must have suffered at least 20 percent loss and be unable to obtain credit elsewhere. After becoming eligible, they are eligible for up to \$500,000 at 5 percent FmHA interest.

handles the majority of disaster cases, although the Small Business Administration has provisions for special cases.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has an emergency feed program that can assist a producer who has suffered a 40 percent feed production loss. The County ASCS committee may initiate the program with the State ASCS Committee. The producer must not have enough supplies to feed his cattle and, in most cases, can expect to receive help to tide him over for a three to six month period.

This is a cost-share program of 2 cents a pound of 50 percent of the cost. A survey of the farmer's reserves must be made and an estimate made of what his needs will be for the coming months. He is then eligible for federal assistance on the difference of these two figures.

Further information can be obtained from county agency offices.

### **Evelyn Donham-County Journalist**

by Viola Payne Evelyn Donham is one of the young Eastland County journalists who uses her talent in a very practical way-the writing and production of an area newspaper. As Editor of the historic, 90 yr. old "The Rising Star" she is responsible for a lot of the work involved with each

Rising Star, like other towns of Eastland County, has its own special flavor, and the paper reflects the interests of its readers. With its location near Brown and Callahan Counties, the paper reaches into communities across the County lines.

The 1980 Census lists Rising Star as having a population of 1180 persons, but there are quite a few people living on small acreages near the City Limits. In spite of the oil development pressing upon it, the town has managed to keep the serene look of a rural trade center. Interesting older buildings flank a long main street, and tree-shaded homes cluster nearby. A number of Rising Star residents are Senior Citizens, but another segment of the population is very young. It is the restless young adults who leave Rising Star, and then wish they could go home.

"People tell me I am always happy," Mrs Donham smiles. "I enjoy all aspects of the newspaper, especially the day-to-day contact with people. You never know what will happen next in this business! In a small town, you don't have major spectacular news events, but nevertheless the news contained in the paper is the way most people keep abreast of what is happening in their town and community. Many people don't want to bother with attending the City Council and School Board meetings, but are concerned-and keep up with issues through the

newspaper. 'The newspaper is also important to out-of-town subscribers, to folks who have lived in or around Rising Star at one time and enjoy keeping up with friends and relatives. I think we have an advantage over most big, metropolitan newspapers in that we are able to focus more on our local people. Something that might be overlooked in Dallas might be headlines here. And we really try to highlight our fine young people, especially in school

related activities. 'Another aspect of the newspaper I personally enjoy is writing feature articles. There are so many

talented, interesting people living here that I never run out of interesting stories. Everyone has a story to tellif I will just take the time to

sit down and listen. 'The actual paste-down of the newspaper is always a challenge. Sometimes it's like a big jig-saw puzzle. When I begin, it looks like it will never all fit into place. But as I work, the pieces somehow fit together.

Oddly enough, Mrs. Donham's early life and training was not involved with journalism. She was born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kipp in Feb., 1952, at Brenham, Texas. She attended public school at Giddings, which is located between Houston and Austin. Following her graduation she attended Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. While there she met and married Mike Donham, whose home town was Rising Star. Before long the young couple moved to College Station, where they both attended Texas A. and M. Universi-

In 1972 they moved to Rising Star, and Evelyn took some courses at Cisco Junior

'One thing kind of unusual about my education," Evelyn says, "Is that I never once took a Journalism course. My major was Medical Technology. Somewhere along the line I must have gotten sidetracked, for I became Editor of 'The Rising Star' in December 1976.

Evelyn's life seems to consist of the best of several worlds, including rural life. She and her husband, Mike, live on a farm three miles south of Rising Star, where Mike raises peanuts and Charlois cattle. They have an eight year old son, who will be a third grader this

Evelyn not only contacts a lot of people in the newspaper business-she volunteers for a number of projects around town. Right now she is coaching a Little League girl's baseball team. She is active in the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, and works with the May PTO organization. She even manages enough time to play on a women's softball and volleyball team.

Her latest honor-for her work and diversified activities was her naming as one of the Outstanding Young Women of America for 1979.

to the sun or everexert during extreme heat and humidity this summer, you may get heat cramps, heat exhaustion, or possibly even the rare but serious heatstroke.

Avoiding these hotweather complications is more than simply a matter of staying in cool or airconditioned areas and walking on the shade side of the street - as important as those precautions are. You'll also need to pay attention to medically sound preven-

1. Wear loose-fitting, light colored clothing that reflects the sun's rays and allows for better sweat evaporation, and wear a wide-brimmed hat for added protection.

2. Avoid sudden changes of temperature, such as dashing from an air conditioned building to a hot sidewalk or car. Before getting into a car that's been parked in the sun, open it up for a few minutes.

3. Stick to cool drinks and food, and salt your food liberally. Salt tablets are seldom necessary if you have a well-balanced diet. If you feel the need for salt tablets, check first with your doctor.

4. Don't overeat. Don't overindulge in alcoholic drinks. Your body system needs extra water in hot weather, whether or not your thirst sensation increases. Drink water often, even when you don't feel the urge.

5. Acclimate yourself by limiting exposure to the sun or strenous outdoor activities to just 15 minutes on the first hot day, adding 15-30 minutes each day over a week or ten days.

6. Avoid outdoor physical activity between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. whenever possible.

7. When you exercise in the heat, take a 5-10 minute High School graduates, and break every half-hour. Don't exercise just before or after

8. Drink plenty of water or salted lemonade when you're exercising. You many have heard that drinking water when you're hot and active will bring on stomach cramps, but it is not true; you need to keep up your water intake to replace what you're losing in sweat - so drink when you're thirsty.

9. Also take extra precautions when-ever the humidity is high during a heat wave. When the relative gets above 60%, the air won't absorb as much sweat as your body needs to get rid of, and by 75% relative humidity, it won't absorb any. This, coupled with high temperatures, is particularly dangerous.

10. If the weather is hot and dry, you may not feel sweaty, but in high temperatures you indeed are sweating; the dry air is evaporating the sweat so effectively that you don't get damp skin or soaked clothes. Drink plenty of water; don't be lulled by the false idea that you're not losing any.

11. Take extra care when the official temperature is higher than 85 degree F. If the official temperature is, say, 95 degree F, it may be well over 105 degree F on a tennis court or in your backyard garden, even in the shade. Official reading are often taken from towers or high buildings.

12. If you are on a low-salt or salt-free diet, or if you have a chronic disease, heart disease, hypertension, diabetes, or lung disease, for example - high heat and humidity will put an especially heavy burden on you. Consult your doctor before engaging in any unusual activity or changing your salt intake.
