Fishpond Stocking

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District is having their annual fish sale. The last day to order will be April 18, 1991. The delivery date for the fish will be April 24, 1991. We will have Channel Catfish, Blue Cat, Bass, Bluegill, Redcar, Crappie and several other species.

Stocking rates for ponds can be complicated. Several decisions must be made before a stocking rate can be decided upon.

What is the surface area of the pond? Generally, catfish is the only species recommended for ponds smaller than one surface acre. If the pond is larger than one acre several

Will you feed the fish? used. A catfish can grow one pound for every two pounds of feed. Will you fertilize the pond? Fertilization can double the productivity of most bodies

Principles. Once you know

your people use these six

principles of effective dele-

were right for them.

Most of us have difficulty delegating because we don't understand the basic principles of delegation or because, to some of us, the term connotes laziness. Brian Tracy, president of the Institute for Executive Development, sees delegation as a great source of power for accomplishing organizational goals. Delegation enables you to develop the talents of others and frees you to concentrate on your areas of greatest contribution. The power of delegation is the most impor-

tant skill a leader can have. To delegate effectively there are three areas to be considered: planning, principles and performance evaluation

Planning. Before jumping into a job, think it through. Have clearly in mind what you have been hired, or chosen, to accomplish, what results are expected of you and your group, and what it is you can do to make a unique contribution. Make a list of the separate tasks that must be accomplished to complete the job

Prior to delegating tasks you must thoroughly know your people, their work styles, their strengths and their weaknesses. Several months ago *******

· Delegate the whole job Williford to fine-tune the and then leave it alone. It is important that people feel responsible for a total task from beginning to end. You should not look over their shoulders expect for regularly established follow-up. This is a key factor in motivation and the building of competence.

· Delegate for specific results. Set concrete, measurable goals and time frames for accomplishment.

 Delegate with discussion and participation. This develops what is called "job ownership" and builds commitment to doing a job well. · Delegate authority com-

Your people are your most mensurate with the job. Also valuable asset. If you deledelegate decision-making and gate well you can help them problem solving. develop their abilities. If not,

Performance Evaluation. you can discourage them and Efficient delegation requires frustrate yourself. We had a continuing evaluation and assessment. Once a project is delegated regular feedback on how the project is developing is essential. In addition to setting regularly established periods of evaluation a little time spent wandering around will give you instant feedback on how a job is going. Look around. See how people are doing. Be prepared to modify a job if necessary.

Delegating is definitely not telling someone what to do and then waiting to see if it gets done. That's abdicating. Delegating is a learnable skill that calls for clear understanding of the task and ongoing assessment of the abilities of

Traffic Deaths Dropped in 1990

Traffic deaths in Texas dropped to the lowest level in 14 years in 1990, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety.

"Not since 1976 have traffic fatalities been this low in Texas," said DPS Director Col. Joe Milner. "Last year, traffic deaths decreased from 3,361 to 3,243. This is a decline of 3.5 percent from 1989. In 1981, by way of comparison, 4,701 persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents." Also, for the first time in Texas history, the traffic death rate dropped to an all-time low of two deaths per 100 million vehicle miles traveled in Texas. That is a 4.8 percent decrease from the 1989 death

FERTILIZING THE HOME LAWN

The appearance of the home lawn is often the object of great pride to many homeowners. With spring here the urge to fertilize the lawn strikes most of us.

> The best way to determine how much fertilizer and what type of fertilizer is needed is by taking a soil test. Soil testing information is available at the Eastland County Extension Office, which is located in the basement of the county courthouse.

You should apply a complete fertilizer, one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium when soil test information is not available. The fertilizer should have the nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in ratios of 1-1-1, 3-1-2, or 2-1-1. Apply the fertilizer at a rate equivalent to 1 pound of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. This is equal to 7.5 pounds of 13-13-13 fertilizer or 6 pounds of 16-6-12 fertilizer.

For a dark green bermuda grass lawn, apply supplemental applications of nitrogen at 45 to 60 day intervals during the growing season. These applications should not exceed 1 pound of nitrogen per 1000 square feet per application.



The Rising Star New General Manager at **Brazos River Authority**

Roy A. Roberts of Waco has been selected as the next General Manager of the Brazos River Authority. Mr. Roberts, who is presently Assistant General Manager of the Authority, will succeed Carson H. Hoge when Mr. Hoge retires later this year. Mr. Hoge has been General Manager of the Authority since January 1981. The selection was made by a Search Committee of Authority Directors meeting in open session* March 25. The Committee's selection is subject to final approval by the full Board at its next

meeting, April 18. The selection of Mr. Roberts was announced by Mr. Perry Dalby of Belton, member of the Authority's Board of Directors, who served as Chairman of the Search Committee. "We conducted a long and intensive search for the best man to fill this position, and we interviewed a number of wellqualified applicants. We were pleased to have a man already on the staff with the experience and qualifications needed to carry on the Authority's long tradition of service to the people of the Brazos River Basin."

Roberts joined the Authority in 1976 as manager of its Canal Division in Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties. He served in that position until 1981 when he was transferred to Waco to take the position of Director of Planning and Development. He has served as Assistant General Manager since September 1982.

As Assistant General Manager, Mr. Roberts has direct management responsibility for the Authority's Planning, Projects, Water Treatment and Water Resources Divisions, which encompass some 85 employees. In addition to supervision of the Authority's day-to day water

supply operations, Mr. Roberts is responsible for the Authority's long-range water supply and water quality planning. Existing projects under his supervision include regional wastewater treatment systems serving the Waco, Temple-Belton and Sugar Land areas, and the Lake Grandbury Surface Water and Treatment System, which provides potable water to users in Hood and Johnson Counties.

Prior to joining the Authority, Mr. Roberts served in the United States Army from 1956 to 1976, retiring with the rank of Lieutenant Colenel. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from Georgia Tech and a Master of Engineering degree in Mechanical Engineering from Texas A&M University. Mr. Roberts and his wife Bennie live in Waco. The Brazos River Authority was established by the Texas Legislature in 1929 and given statutory responsibil-

ity for conserving and developing the surface water resources of the entire Brazos River Basin in Texas and making them available for beneficial use. It was the first

public agency in the United States created specifically to conserve- and develop the water resources of a major river basin.

The Brazos River Basin covers about 42,000 square miles in Texas, an area roughly the size of the State of Tennessee.

The Authority is governed by a Board of 21 Directors appointed by the Governor for six-year terms, subject to confirmation by the Texas Senate.

Economic Injury Declaration

A small Business Administration economic injury disaster declaration was made in August, 1990 for businesses dependent on nursery, turfgrass and redfish producers. The declaration resulted from agricultural losses caused by a severe freeze occurring December 19 through December 24, 1989.

Although the nursery, turfgrass or redfish producers are not eligible to apply for theses SBA loans, small business concerns without credit elsewhere and small agricultural cooperatives without credit elsewhere dependent on these operations are eligible. In some cases, this may include non-agriculture-related businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the operations affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels.

According to Small Business Administration district Director, James S. Reed, Dallas, the filing deadline for economic injury disaster loan (EIDL) applications is April 15.

The following counties in the Dallas District were declared for EIDL assistance: Bosque, Eastland, Hamilton, Hunt, Parker, Smith, Van Zandt, Cherokee, Erath, Henderson, Kaufman, Rains, Sumervell, Wood, Comanche, Gregg, Hopkins, Palo Pinto, Rusk and Upshur.

Eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives in these counties must have experienced substantial financial losses as a result of agricultural damages caused by the severe freeze. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the freeze are not eligible for SBA economic injury loans. This

The State Board of Insurance has issued a new comsumer publication comparing the 1990 complaint statistics of virtually all insurers doing business in Texas.


"We hope this barometer of customer satisfaction will be useful to Texans as they shop for the insurance coverage they need," said Commissioner Phil Barnes.

The publication compares complaints reviewed by the SBI's Market Conduct Division. In Fiscal Year 1990, the Division investigated more than 25,000 consumer complaints, resulting in \$20.5 million in additional recovery for policyholders.

Complaints for 1990 are weighted against premium volume for 1989, the most recent year for which financial information is available, to produce a complaint ratio for each company.

Seasonal Allergy Season Underway

People who suffer from seasonal allergies already know that the season started early this year.

Their sneezing, itching and congestion told them so.

"The pollen that brings misery to sufferers appeared early due to a mild winter," said Dr. David P. Huston, associate professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Of course, some people suffer almost year round from such allergies because they live in temperate climates where the pollen count remains high most of the time," Huston said.

In temperate areas, tree pollens usually are heavy in March, succeeded in the coming months by other pollens. January and February are relatively irritant-free for many areas.

"Air pollution compounds the problem," Huston said. "Chemicals and smoke can definitely aggravate allergy symptoms."

Some people are afflicted with perennial allergies in addition to seasonal allergies

"These are the people allergic to things which, unlike a specific pollen, are present in their environments yearround," Huston said.

Many people are allergic to the dander of animals they keep in their homes.

Others have what is commonly called dust allergy but is in fact a reaction to contaminants found in dust. Roaches and mites contrib-

Medical Briefs

At Risk for Osteoporosis Female athletes and dancers as well as women with eating disorders have something in common: They may be at risk for osteoporosis later in life. Many of these women are very body conscious and health. desire to be thin, says Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, an assistant professor of pediatrics and chief of adolescent medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Because they may exercise without consuming many calories, they are at high risk for reduced bone density. In the short term, that can cause stress fractures; in the long term, it can put the women at risk for osteoporosis, Hergen-

ute heavily to this. Molds are also common causes of allergic reactions. Air conditioning systems and air ducts frequently harbor these allergy villians.

"Avoidance is clearly the best of all alternatives," Huston Said, "but we have to be realistic. Avoidance is not always possible."

Over-the-counter relief is available for allergies that cause runny noses, itchy eyes and congestion. Those most commonly used are antihistamines, but they can cause drowsiness.

Prescription drugs, including antihistamines that do not cause drowsiness, are available through physicians.

"Allergy shots are not necessarily the first line of therapy," Huston said. "The shots do help some people, but they should be reserved for patients whose allergy symptoms cannot be adequately controlled in other ways.'

Allergies and allergy-like reactions can result from conditions other than pollens and perennial irritants. Foods, for example, can be a source of allergies, and some dyes and other substances can cause allergic-like reactions. Careful screening by aller-

gists can help people pinpoint the causes of their suffering, Huston said.

Pulido's Nachos For Ranger Games



The Texas Rangers Baseball Club has chosen Pulido's Mexican Restaurants as the official supplier of nachos for home games beginning April 8.

Pulido's expects to serve 90,000 pounds of chips, 3,000 cases of cheese and 1,500 cases of jalapenos, according to Robert Pulido, president of Pulido's Mexican Restaurants. Last year more than two million people attended Texas Rangers' games.

The family owned business was opened in 1966 by Pedro and Dionicia Pulido in Fort Worth. Since that humble beginning, the family has expanded the number of restaurants to include 11 Pulido's Mexican Restaurants, a Mi Hacienda Restaurant in Hurst and Cafe Pulido in Arlington.

Today the Pulido's restaurants are in Fort Worth, N. Richland Hills, Irving, Stephenville, Weatherford, Mineral Wells, Cleburne, Brownwood and Eastland.

In 1985 Pulido's opened their tortilla & chip factory in southwest Fort Worth, where all of the restaurants tortillas and chips are made. The 10,000 square foot factory is capable of producing 9,000 pounds of chips and 4,000 dozen tortillas each day.

The tortilla & chip factory expanded in May 1990. The expansion added 4,800-square feet of warehouse space. The public may purchase fresh tortillas, chips, tamales, pralines and salsa directly from the factory from 7 a.m.- 4 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

The April nomination total, a decrease of 6,072 barrels daily when compared to March purchaser nominations, estimates Texas oil purchases in the coming month. April 1990 nominations totaled 1,855,982 barrels daily.

The Commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972. It applies to all fields in the state except the East Texas and Kelly-Snyder Fields, which have been set at 86 percent.

Chairman Krueger also reported that April nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 18,383,915 Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per day). March nominations totaled 20,530,047 Mcf/d. April 1990 nominations amounted to 20,878,823 Mcf/d.

The next statewide oil and gas production allowable hearing will begin at 10:00 a.m., Thursday, April 18, 1991, at the Railroad Commission in the William B. Travis Building, 1701 N. Congress Avenue, in Austin.

Major purchasers filed these April nominations from the floor at the hearing: Amoco Production Company, 145,000 barrels, unchanged; Chevron U.S.A., Inc., 120,175 barrels, down 25; Conoco Inc., 64,500 barrels, up 1,000; Exxon Company, U.S.A., 137,200 barrels, down 2,100; Mobil Oil Corp., 114,500 barrels, unchanged; Phillips 66 Company, 79,700 barrels, unchanged; and Texaco Trading and Transp. Inc., 115,350 barrels, down 200.

Chairman Krueger reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 7,294,000 bar-

dards. The water system has a number of items needing attention; both the the elevated water tank and the storage tank where chlorine is added are among the items in violation of state regulations. Also, several items in the drainage system don't meet state requirements. The closing of the landfill doesn't stop the City's obligations and expenses; the landfill must be monitored for five years and certain work must be done to see that it meets regulations. Much of the machinery and equipment owned by the City is old and worn out and breaks down often. One item has already been taken care of-a new pump, costing about \$5,000, for the sewer plant; it has alleviated some problems with the sewer system.

Of course, the money from all the City's problems but City officials will breathe a huge sigh of relief when the refund eventually arrives.
