

U.S. Highway 183 Completed

When, on October 26, 1979, the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation formally accepted from the Abilene Paving Co., as completed, a rebuilt section of U.S. Highway 183 from Romney to Rising Star, it meant that one of the worst sections of public road in this area had finally been

eliminated. Reconstruction of the route required the better part of two years and five months, with time out for Old Man Winter, at an estimated cost of \$1,690,000. Contract was let to the Abilene, Texas, firm on July 6,1977. Final cost details are still being worked up, according to Harley Fox, techni-cian with the office of TDHPT Resident Engineer Buddy Hawn at Eastland, and the exact figure will not be known for some time. But it should not vary substantially from that estimated, Mr. Fox said. The original contract price was \$1,747,611.54. The final figure includes cost revisions for changes made during construc-

The completed project, measuring 9.115 miles, fills a gap between the rebuilt section south of Cisco, srossing the Leon River, and the Brown County reconstruction. With the exception of a small segment south of May, U.S. 183 has now been rebuilt between Cisco and Brownwood. it is a broad, level and inviting avenue of pavement made as safe as is humanly possibble, where fools as well as sensible drivers are entrusted with a means of transportation that for all its excellence and happy uses, can suddenly become as lethal as the impact of a oneton projectile.

Fox told Eastland County Newspapers that no traffic count has yet been made to compare present traffic with former volume, but that he was sure there had been an increase in the number of vehicles over the route since the

rebuilding. Residents along the highway as well as users of the road will agree.

be graded for nut size, percent kernel, and freedom of defects. Pecan producers will be at

each show to answer questions on pecan culture and where current season nuts can be purchased. The idea of county pecan shows began here in

Eastland County 27 years ago. This, the oldest of all pecans shows, will be held December 7th and 8th, in the county courthouse. The rapid acceptance of

new varieties, such as Choctaw. Wichita, and Kiowa, can be contributed. to a great degree, to pecan shows. It's a good way for growers and consumers to become familiar with the new varieties and their character-

In the pecan show, samples entered will be weighed to determine the number of nuts required for one pound. This can range from 32 nuts per pound for large Mohawk. to 80 nuts per one pound for the small varieties.

Percent kernel is also measured. The Whichita variety can be as high as 62 percent kernel, while Stuart. at its best, will only be 49 percent kernel.

In addition to size and percent kernel, pecans are graded for freedom of insects and disease, blemishes, uniformity, and kernel color.

A total of 43 nuts of any variety constitutes an entry in the show. The pecans entered must have been grown in 1979 and be entered by the person or family who produced the pecans. Native variety seedlings and improved varieties may be entered in the show. A grower may bring one entry of each variety, and as many different entries of natives as he chooses. All entries become the property of the Pecan Growers Association. Winning entries will be sent to the regional pecan show. Ribbons will be given to exhibitors who have first, second, and third place entries. Trophies will be given to the exhibitor of the champion shelling pecan, champion in-shell pecans, and champion native pecans. There will be a class for the smallest pecans.

Both, commercial pecan growers and vard tree growers in Eastland County and surrounding areas are encouraged to enter pecans in the county show. There will be no county pecan show in Comanche County this year, and growers from that county have been invited to

enter pecans in our show. Start selecting pecans for the show now. These should not be put in air-tight containers. They need to dry; therefore, put entries in paper or cloth bags.

There is no better place to view a wide range of pecan varieties than at a pecan show. Consumers can see high quality pecans on exhibit and can then deter-
