

## City To Receive Official Bicentennial Recognition In Saturday Ceremonies

Rising Star will become an official Bicentennial community this Saturday, as the town receives both the Texas and National Bicentennial recognitions.

The ceremony will take place Saturday afternoon in the downtown area and will precede and carry over into the parade marking the start of the 24th consecutive series of local summer rodeos.

On hand as the city for the Bicentennial recognition will be Joe Hodges of Abilene, general chairman of the Abilene Bicentennial Commission. Mr. Hodges is scheduled to speak downtown at approximately 3:30 p.m., with the parade to begin shortly afterward at 4:00.

A Bicentennial - decorated speakers' platform will be located in the business district of Rising Star, from which Mr. Hodges will make his address. The parade, led by the Rising Star High School Band, will precede in front of the platform, where the march will stop and the presentation of the official Bicentennial certificate and the national Bicentennial flag will be made to Owen Aikin, general chairman of the Rising Star Bicentennial observance and to Mayor C.M. Carroll and others of the local Bicentennial committee. The band will then play the National Anthem, the flag and certificate will be carried as part of the parade, and the march will continue through town.

Hodges, who is a partner in the newly formed H&H Oil Company in Abilene, has served this year as Abilene's Bicentennial general chairman. Mr. Hodges and his wife

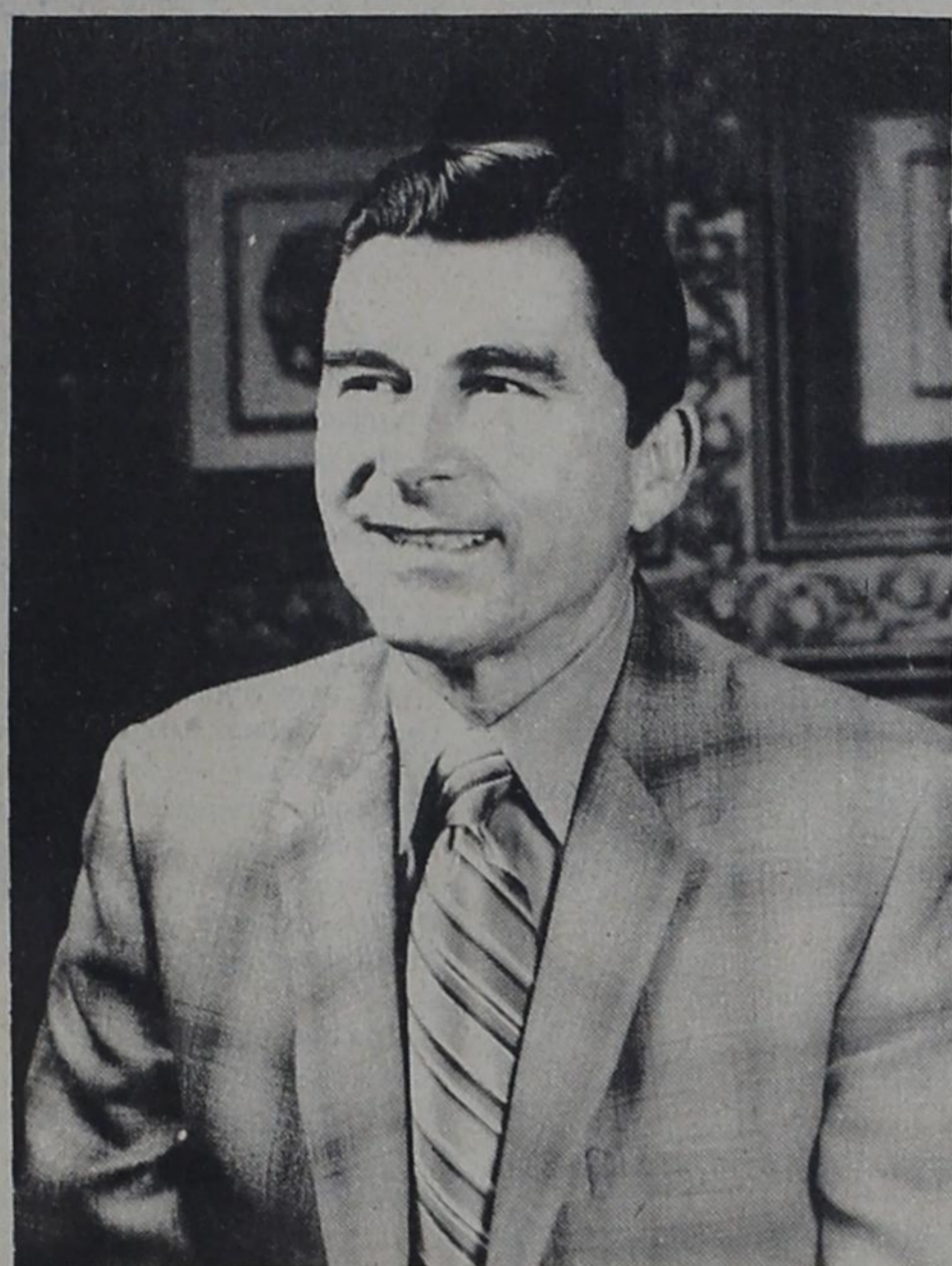

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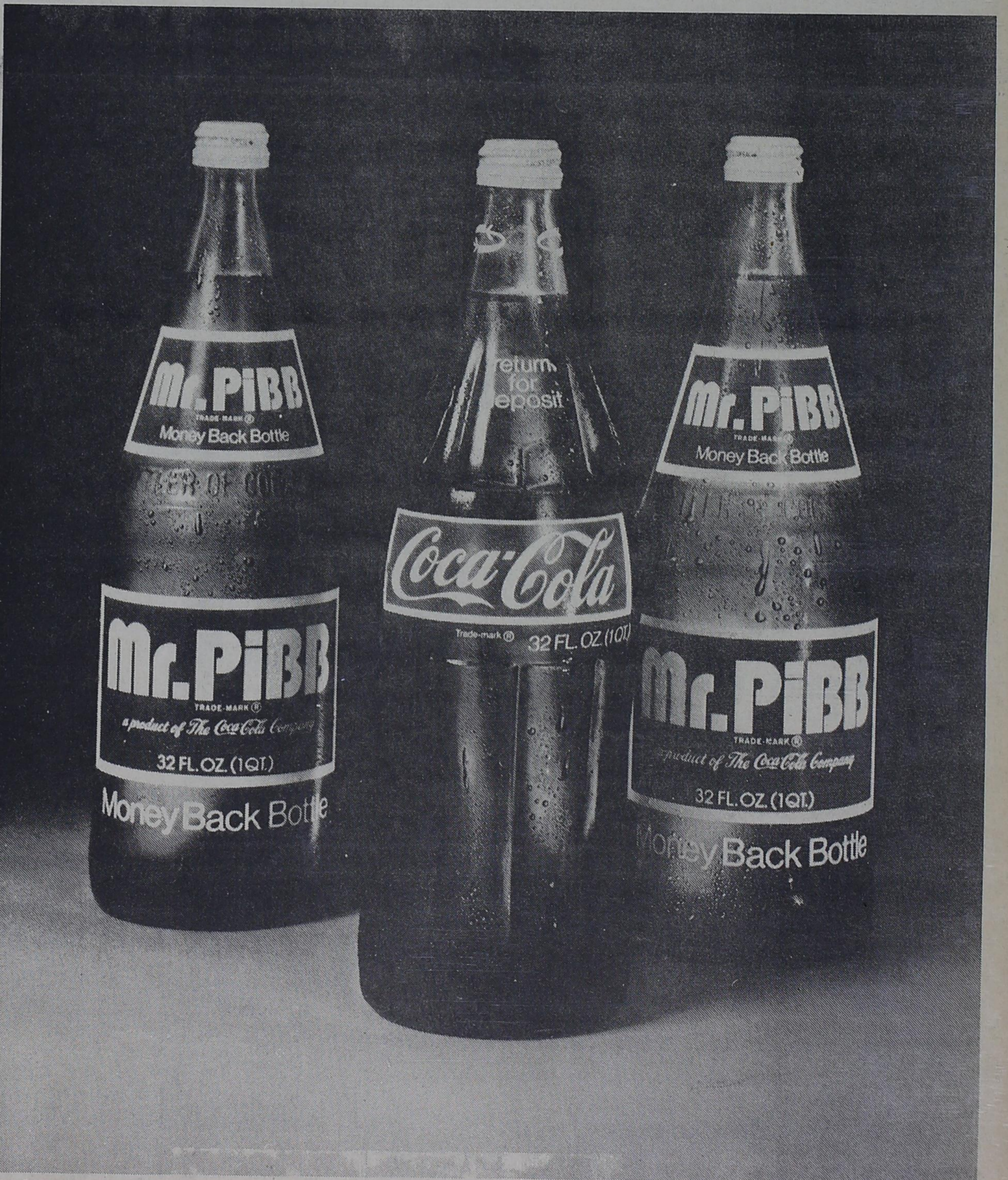

## Mrs. Earp Relates Tour Of Arizona

Mrs. Margie Earp of Rising Star has recently returned from a two week trip to Arizona where she visited with her son, Roland M. Earp Jr., and daughter - in - law, Barbara and her grandchildren.

Mrs. Earp traveled to Strawberry, Arizona, with her sister and brother - in - law, Mr. and Mrs. David Kerr of Carbon, where they met the Earp Jr.s, for a weekend in the high country and forest land of Arizona. While in the Strawberry area, they visited Zane Grey's cabin among many other places of interest. Driving through the high mountains and vast forests with lots of snow still on the ground in late April, seeing all the rushing waters in the rivers and high water levels in the lakes makes one realize that Arizona is not all desert, but a very beautiful place indeed.

Mr. and Mrs. Kerr returned to Carbon from Strawberry via Roosevelt Lake and crossed over Roosevelt Dam, which is the largest masonry dam in the world and completed in 1911. To get to the dam crossing which is one - way traffic, only there is some 30 miles of gravel road twisting and turning along the banks of the lake. From Roosevelt the Kerrs traveled on to the Globe - Miami area which is one of the great centers of the copper mining industry of Arizona, then through the White Mountains and over into New Mexico and arrived in Carbon just in time to help one of their cows give birth to a new calf.

Mrs. Earp and Barbara traveled on to the Grand Canyon via Mormon Lake, Ashurst Lake, Lake Mary, Flagstaff, the San Francisco Peaks and through the Quaking Aspen Forests. Upon arriving at the entrance to Grand Canyon National Park, Mrs. Earp was asked if she were 62 years old. After admitting to being at least that much, she was informed that if she would go to the visitor center in the Park, she would be presented with a "Golden Age" card good for life in all the National Parks, which entitles her to free admittance to all their services. Sometimes it pays off to admit to being a "Senior Citizen".

Roland Earp Jr., and his family live in Ajo, Arizona, which is in the South Central Desert of Arizona where he is employed as a Boilermaker for one of Arizona's Copper Mining Companies. Mrs. Earp spent the rest of the time there with his family. Even the Desert country is quite beautiful as it is plentiful with the huge Saguaro Cactus as well as many other varieties of cactus,

many of which are in bloom this time of the year. There are also many Palo Verde and Mesquite trees, with rolling hills and mountains as far as the eye can see.

### THE FOOD SPOILERS

Mr. Phil Baird from the Texas State Health Department in Public Health Region 4, Abilene, visited Rising Star's food dealing services. This included our school cafeteria. He was pleased with the results of our cafeteria and staff.

Along with his visit to the different places, he also prepared a program explaining the different bacteria which cause food poisoning.

The names of some of the bacteria are staphylococcus which involves our high protein foods. Refrigeration helps cut down on this; salmonellosis which also involves high protein foods. This is caused by rodents and flies. Streptococcus which comes from scarlet fever and strep throat. Botulism is found in low acidity foods which can be destroyed by heat.

Most of these poisons are odorless and tasteless. They grow best at the temperatures 45 degrees to 160 degrees. To prevent poisons keep things 40 degrees and cook at 165 and over.

People do not know about these poisonings until about 4 - 8 hours after eating. Hopefully the FHA organization can get a program of this kind for the public next year.

### IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

- Treating high blood pressure takes more than one person. It is a combination of the patient, the physician and the pharmacist.
- If you don't know whether you have high blood pressure, ask your doctor to check your pressure, or go to your nearest clinic or health center for a pressure check. You should do this even if you feel well, because high blood pressure may not have any noticeable symptoms.
  - If you have high blood pressure, follow your doctor's instructions about taking medicine, diet—including weight loss if you are overweight—and changes in general health habits, such as rest and recreation. These measures will reduce the risk of stroke, heart attack, kidney failure and heart failure.
  - When your physician prescribes medications, keep taking them whether you feel well or not, and whether you think the drugs are helping or hurting. Report exactly how you feel to your doctor. He can then make any suitable changes needed in your treatment program, or he can ask us to dispense a different medication that may be more suitable to your individual condition.
  - Cooperate with the health team of physician and pharmacist. Working together, blood pressure can be kept under control.
