





In an age when the frontiers of knowledge are being pushed back at an unbelievably accelerated pace and when technology seems to be at its zenith, many are questioning the ethical and moral values of the Gospel. How, they ask, can such a system, flowing from the relatively primitive times of 19 centuries ago, possibly suit the sophisticated demands of the "Scientific Age"?

In the first place, it needs to be emphasized that the Gospel contents did not originate suddenly with the coming of a great thinker or of an exceptional moral reformer. They flow rather from the mind of an eternal and creative God; one, unlike human beings, who is unaffected by the passing circumstances brought on by the parade of centuries. They are not simply the observations of a philosopher contemplating the scene before him and attempting a solution. God, who created man, certainly knows him better than anyone else possibly could and the coming of Jesus, to bring into reality the Gospel era, brought together, once for all, a set of principles perfectly suited to all times, all needs and to all areas of human experience.

In the second place, the basic nature and needs of human beings have not changed. The same drives and passions that plagued our ancestors of six thousand years ago are still with us. The murderous hatred of Cain bears its s somber fruit repeatedly; the wanton degeneracy of Sodom and Gomorrah casts its pall over our people: our homes, our communities and our world; the cruel callousness of Herod regularly robs the family circle of precious sons and daughters. Time has altered some things, but man is still basically the same - - that is, apart from the Gospel.

Finally, the ethical and moral values of the Gospel are as rich and effective now as they were two thousand years ago, when accepted and applied. Who can suggest a better formula for better human relations than the so - called Golden Rule (Matthew 7:12)? Or what marriage counselor could give better advice for a stable and happy home than the one found in Ephesians 5:22 -33; 6:1 - 4? Or what ethical teacher could ever suggest a better way to build character

than the simple words of Galatians 5:22 - 23? Or what psychiatrist could ever offer a more effective cure for anxiety than that found in Philippians 4:4 - 8?

In truth, the Gospel is not out dated; just, sadly enough, ignored and untried by too

The names of some of the bacteria are staphylococcus which involves our high protein foods. Refrigeration helps cut down on this: salmonellosis which also involves high protein foods. This is caused by rodents and flies. Streptococus which comes from scarlet fever and strep throat. Botulism is found in low acidity foods which can be destroyed by heat.

Most of these poisons are odorless and tasteless. They grow best at the temperatures 45 degrees to 160 degrees. To prevent poisons keep things 40 degrees and cook at 165 and

People do not know about these poisonings until about 4 -8 hours after eating.



Treating high blood pressure takes more than one person. It is a combination of the patient, the physician and the pharmacist. 1. If you don't know whether you have high blood

pressure, ask your doctor to check your pressure, or go to your nearest clinic or health center for a pressure check. You should do this even if you feel well, because high blood pressure may not have any noticeable symptoms.

2. If you have high blood pressure, follow your doctor's instructions about taking medicine, diet-including weight loss if you are overweight-and changes in general health habits, such as rest and recreation. These measures will reduce the risk of stroke, heart attack, kidney failure and heart failure.

3. When your physician prescribes medications, keep taking them whether you feel well or not, and whether you think the drugs are helping or hurting. Report exactly how you feel to your doctor. He can then make any suitable changes needed in your treatment program, or he can ask us to dispense a different medication that may be more suitable to your individual condition.

4. Cooperate with the health team of physician and pharmicist. Working together, blood pressure can be kept under control.
