## County Commissioners Old Masonic Lodge at Sipe Springs Burned

Eastland County Commissioners had a full agenda Monday, with topics covering a wide range. Early in the meeting County Agent DeMarquis Gordon announced his retirement on Aug. 31, after 24 yrs. of work with the Extension Service here. The Commissioners expressed regret at losing his services.

Gordon had other business in the courtroom: he presented County Clerk Joann Johnson with certificates from the V.G. Young Institute of County Government (Texas A&M University System) and the office of Continuing Education, Texas A&M University System, for work completed during the 18th Annual Seminar for County and District Clerks. The certificate stated that Mrs. Johnson completed the work with "honor and distinction".

On other matters, Hershell Cordell, representative of the South Eastland County Hospital District, met with the Commissioners to discuss money and records from the bankrupt Gorman Hospital. The District was reportedly dissolved on Feb. 24 of this year.

Cordell again requested that the County accept \$68,000 from the District and put it in the county bank account. He said the hospital district had twice paid the money on billings from the Internal Revenue Service, only to have it returned.

He also said he understood that all claims filed against the hospital district had been paid, an order closing the case had been filed with the U.S. Bankruptcy Court.

Cordell also said there were

stacks of hospital records and x-rays which should be preserved.

The Commissioners delayed action on Cordell's request on the \$68,000 until District Attorney Emory Walton receives an official letter from the hospital district. Cordell said this letter was mailed from Gorman about two weeks ago, and he assumed it had been received here.

The Commissioners held a Public Hearing on the county and city's Grant application for \$350,000 to be used to repair the dam and spillway at Eastland Lake. Several citizens attended the hearing, and questions were asked about the application.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, was designed to represent the court in this year, especially the city and county were cooperating on the proposal.

There will be another Public Hearing on the Grant on Monday, July 16.

The commissioners agreed to a request by Rotell Natural Gas Co. to cross County Rd. 223 (Northwest of Rising Star) in Pct. 3 with a pipeline. Before the approval L.T. Owen, commissioner of the Pct., obtained an agreement from a representative of the company to pay the county for damages to another road. Owen said he had to use county material and a grader to repair the road after it was left in bad condition.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, reported to the Court on jail matters. He said the jail was in "nice, clean and orderly condition." There were presently 24 inmates in the jail, with 17 county prisoners and 7 for T.D.C.

An early morning fire July 3 completely destroyed the building that was formerly the Sipe Springs community center, and in earlier times had served as the Masonic Lodge. Volunteer firemen from Sipe Springs and DeLeon answered the fire alarm about 3:50 a.m. last Tuesday and worked an hour and a half to bring the blaze under control. The cause of the fire was not determined.

Another building nearby

was being used as the community center, but a number of items had not been moved because of remodeling being done in the newer building. The refrigerator, cook stove, piano, ceiling fan and benches used at community gatherings were among the items lost in the fire.

Sipe Springs residents considered the building a landmark and regretted the loss of the building.

There is no list with everyone who helped, but everyone should know - your friends and neighbors and fellow workers appreciate your efforts and are proud of you. Rising Star, take a bow.

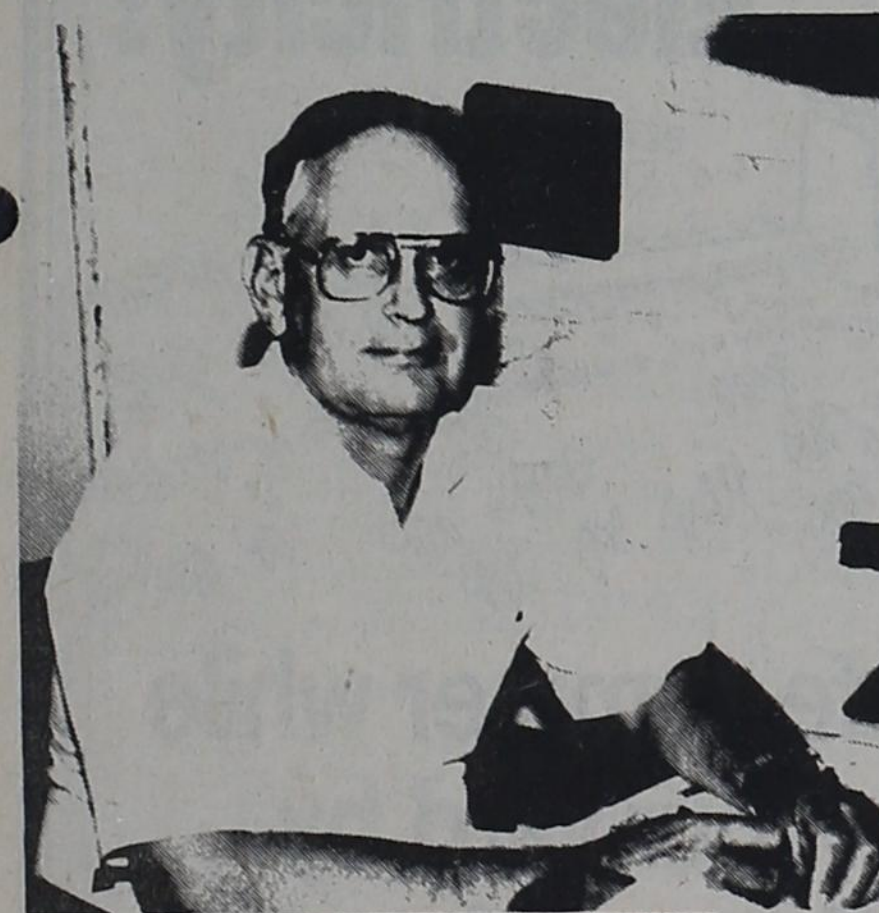
## Freedom Festival Volunteers to Meet

## County Agent DeMarquis Gordon Retires



Dee Gordon is retiring after 24 years as the Eastland County Agricultural Agent. He plans to remain here and raise cattle.

DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent - Agriculture, announced to the County Commissioners Monday that he was retiring August 31. Gordon has served as County Agent with the Extension Service here for 24 years, and has a total of 33 years in Extension work.

The County Agent also said that he and his wife, JoAnne, would continue to make their home in Eastland. The Gordons have two sons - Marquis Jay, a Veterinarian at Caldwell, Texas and Scot, in Graduate School at Texas A&M Uni-

versity.

DeMarquis Gordon was accompanied to Commissioners Court Monday by Dr. Ronald Wooley, Extension Service Supervisor from Stephenville. Wooley told the Commissioners that he was going through the process of finding a replacement for the position of Eastland County Agent.

Gordon's office in the County Courthouse has been a center for agricultural education and related fields since he arrived here Sept. 1, 1966. During the years he has also helped train a number of

young graduates in Extension work, and they have gone on to serve as Agents in other parts of the state.

Currently serving with DeMarquis Gordon in the local Extension office are Janet Thomas, County Agent - Home Economics, Scott Hodges, Assistant County Agent, and Brenda Dabbs, Secretary.

Gordon has always worked for family-type farms and ranches. Highlights of his activities have been work with beef cattle production, peanuts, hay and forage crops, and pecans. He has also led out in programs chosen by the Program Builders Committees, and has been a strong supporter of 4-H programs. His annual farm and ranch demonstrations have been noteworthy.

In 1984 Demarquis Gordon was presented Distinguished Service Awards both on the State and National levels by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents. A number of Gordon's outstanding achievements were recognized, including his work with peanut production.

DeMarquis Gordon told the Commissioners that he appreciated the great team work he had enjoyed with Extension office personnel, Judge Scott Bailey, the Commissioners Court, and a County which supports agriculture. He said he had enjoyed his work here very much.

The Commissioners expressed regret at losing the services of this outstanding County Agent.

## Festival Fun Aids Crimestoppers

The co-operation and generosity of people at the Rising Star Fourth of July Freedom Festival, and vigorous enforcement of the "law west of the Brazos" by Crimestopper Marshalls, who are also members of the Rising Star 4-H Club, and Judge "Ma" Buzzard, who has a very high conviction rate, made Festival activities very successful for the Eastland County Crimestoppers.

After participating in the parade, the Crimestoppers' publicity jail and court were set up in the park for some fun. And when Festival goers were arrested and threatened with jail time for "offenses" of an unusual nature, most generously paid a \$1.00 donation often while physically being dragged to the jail. Those arrested received the warrant issued for their arrest, a bumper sticker, and information about Crimestoppers, a state certified, non-profit organization which

offers rewards for information which results in the solving of felonies which officers might otherwise be unable to solve.

And while \$100.00 in donations was raised to be used by Crimestoppers as reward money, the publicity received may have been even more important.

Anyone contemplating the possible commission of a felony in the community must realize that the donations are a vote for law enforcement by the public, and that the reward money is a good reason for witness, or even an associate of a person committing a crime, to talk and give evidence to officers. And such a person can talk and be paid a reward without their identity being known.

Crimestoppers, with the support of the public, helped to insure that anyone who commits a felony in the county will be brought to justice.

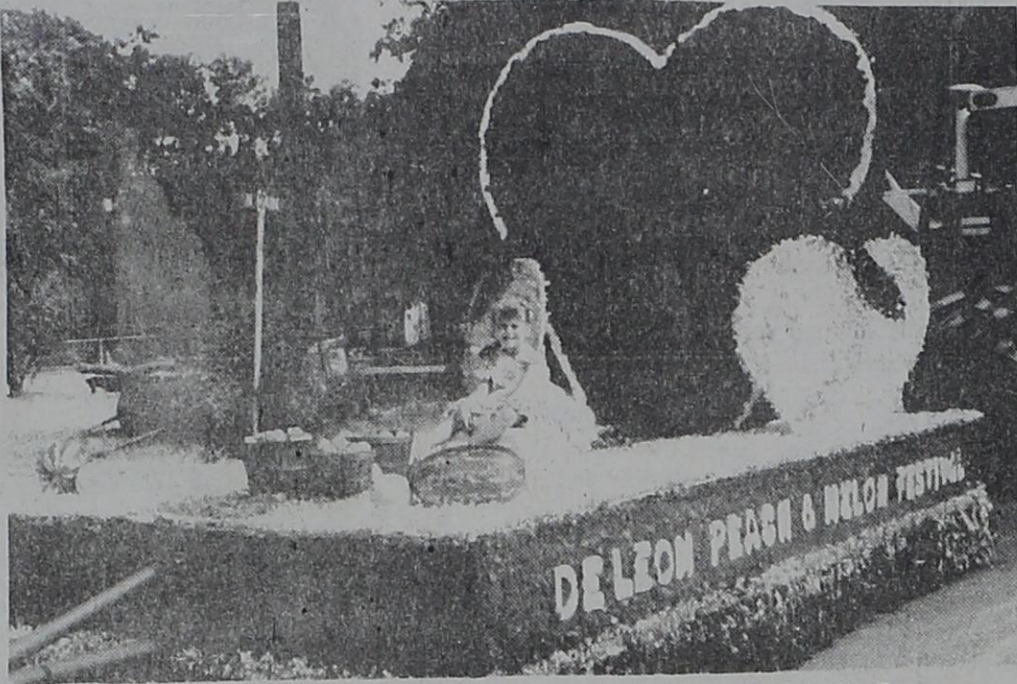

Tami Vandivere of Rising Star was maid of honor; serv-

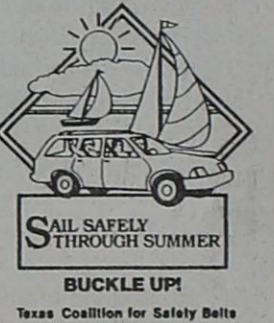
ing their sister as bridesmaids were Susie McGinn and Carol Robbins, both of Rising Star.

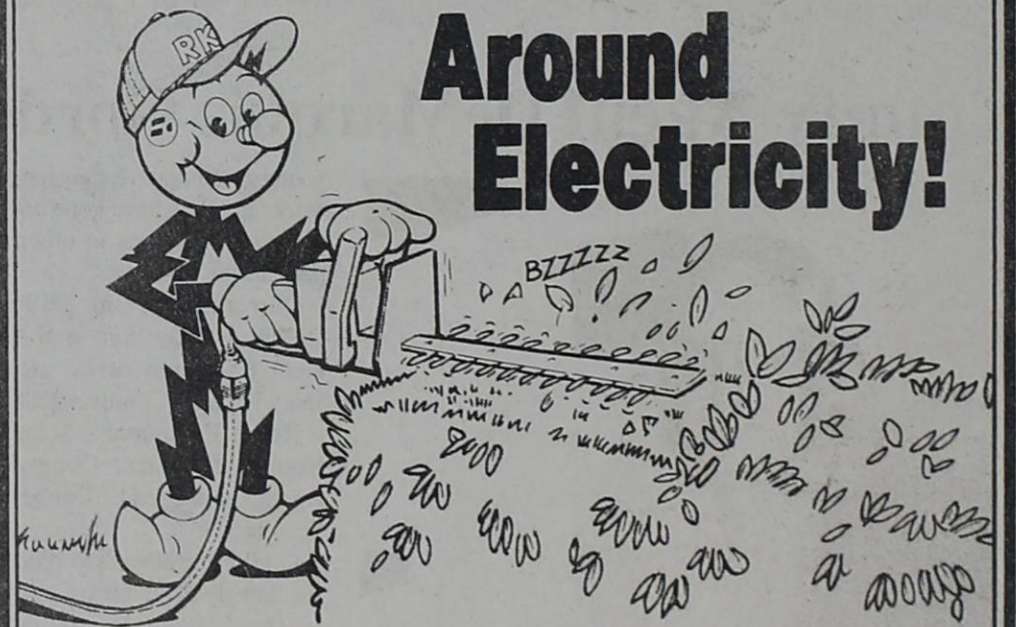

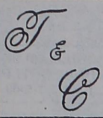

## Car Of Robbery Suspect Seized

Under a new law vehicles used in second-degree felonies may be confiscated by a Court even before a trial of the suspects using the vehicles.

These cars may be ordered forfeited in separate civil proceedings, states Emory Walton, District Attorney.

Such a case came up in Eastland County recently, Walton says.

On April 7 at 5:30 a.m. Larry Weikel, a Cisco Policeman, discovered an apparent robbery underway at Ted's Texaco, Highway 206 (Cross Plains) and I-20.

He and Constable Ted Parrish, the owner of the business, found a suspect hidden inside under some blankets in a storage room. Another suspect was also discovered near the scene.

Then the officers found a car belonging to one of the suspects in a field behind the Service Station. Weikel seized the 1978 Oldsmobile as being used - or intended to be used - in completion of a second-degree felony.

Two Cisco men were indicted on June 7 for burglary of a building. On July 3 a hearing was held in 91st District Court on seizure and forfeiture of a vehicle. The 1978 Oldsmobile was ordered forfeited to the Police Department of Cisco.

## Pioneer Patchwork

Although some of Pioneer's history was disturbingly colorful, or perhaps we could say it was discolorful, we gather that most of this discolor happened after the oil boom or rush arrived, soon after 1920. At one time there were about 20,000 people here and some estimates run about 25,000; however, this boom had all but disappeared within ten years. By 1930, about all that was operating here in the oil industry was a small refinery, locally named "The Phillips Plant." Some oil exploration began again in 1980 and by 1986 had diminished considerably.

The cemetery fence was built in 1948. In August of 1970 the late Mrs. Ethel King Brown was elected treasurer of the Pioneer Cemetery Fund. She served as treasurer for 12 years and asked to be relieved in 1983.

This author will make an effort to get a copy of historical information from at least two other knowledgeable people and will try to continue with these paragraphs in the future. We are aware that this history is like a well organized chronology and is more like a PATCHWORK than a history. So it is.

Eight quilting ladies were treated to a lovely, perfectly delicious Friday morning brunch by Lottie Sooter. It was served in Lottie's pretty back yard in picnic style. Judging from part of the conversation, diets were overtly violated!

Irma and John Miller went to Dallas Sunday to church and to visit with their children.

noon Laverne visited with Sandra Crockett, who was recovering from surgery, in Cross Plains. Friday Laverne and Cowan visited with Jill Winters of Carbon. Jill was also recovering from surgery. Laverne considers this an ordinary week and not a great newsworthy one.

In the "Gay Nineties" at least three local Pioneer boys went to college in Georgetown; Ed Curry, Dr. Dill and the Rev. Ed Anderson. In 1905-1906 and perhaps even longer, Tandy Walker taught in the Pioneer school, a two-story frame building with large windows situated on the hill north of the present Highway 36. Ed Curry and Lafayette King were two of the trustees. The U.S. Census shows that all eight-year-old children were in school, up to age 19.

In 1909, the first automobile in Pioneer frightened a horse, which ran away with a buggy with Miss Fannie Irwin in it. The owner of the automobile was Ed Curry and Miss Irwin was the school teacher.

Some of the work done by children in those days, when there were always chores to be done on the farm, included hoeing, harvesting, peeling, cutting and drying fruit, churning butter, cutting wood for cooking and for heating in winter, feeding chickens, picking and shelling peas and riding a horse on errands. Still, there was time for fun and fellowship such as running, ball games, tagging games, dominoes and checkers, the telling of stories, reciting of poetry, singing of songs and hymns, along with picnics and ice cream socials.

Urban children played musical instruments, joined clubs, held singings and participated in dramas.

**Hidden Sugar**

Q. What foods (besides the obvious ones) contain sugar?

A. Sugar, of course, is a major cause of tooth decay. Some foods that contain "hidden" sugar are: ketchup (some brands contain more sugar than ice cream), pickles, peanut butter, salad dressings, non-dairy creamer, saltine crackers, mayonnaise, cottage cheese, canned vegetables, processed cheese, instant breakfasts and frozen entrees. Remember, removing sugar from the mouth takes away the food that bacteria feed upon. Limiting the exposure time of sugar to the teeth to three times a day or less (mealtimes) can keep decay to a minimum.

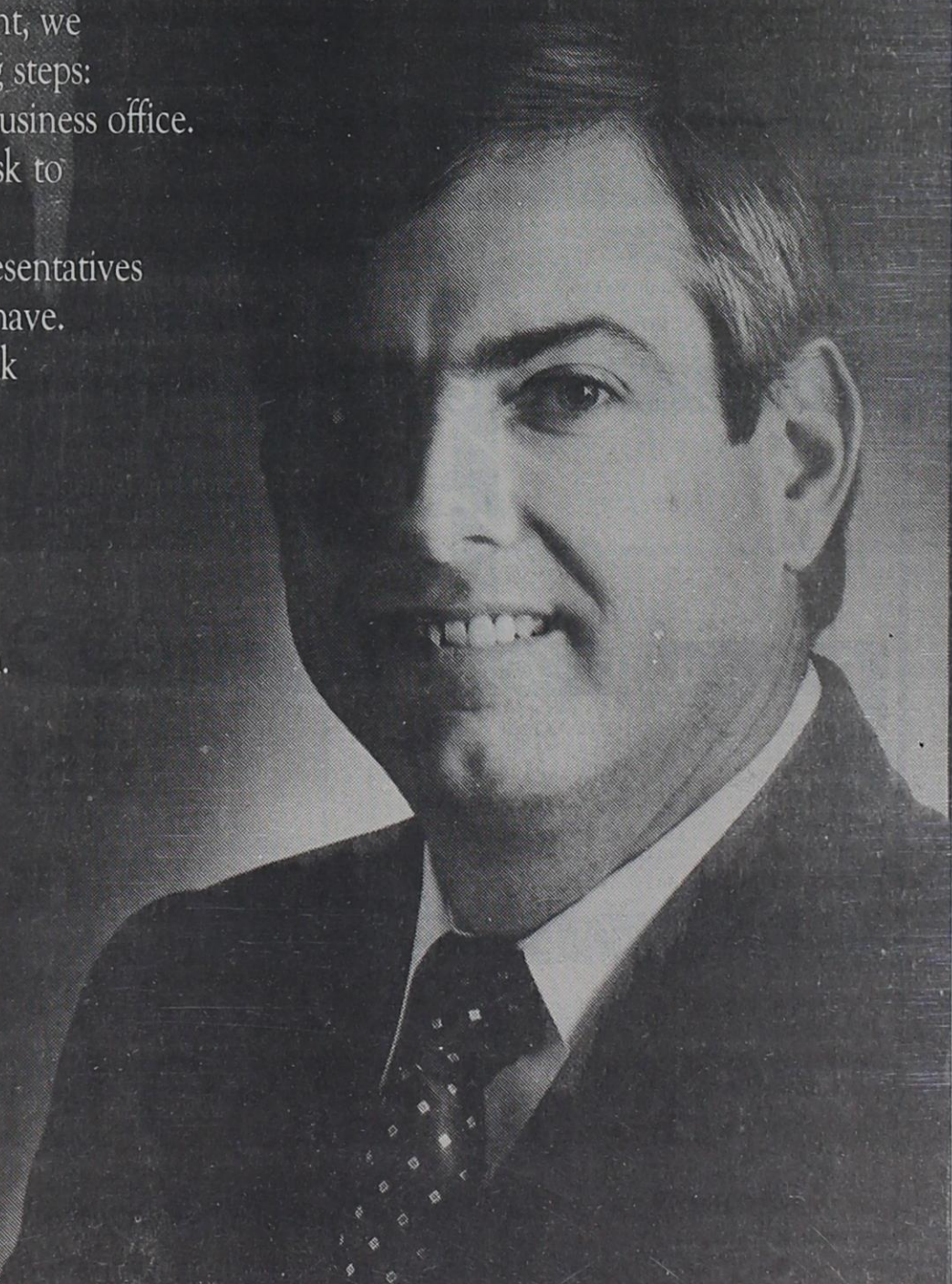

"I'm sending my employees out to help people with questions, filling out forms,

and working out problems on a local, one-on-one basis. There's some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," Bullock said.

Big Country area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse workshop can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555, from anywhere in Texas.

The Abilene office, headed by James Martin, serves Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Concho, Eastland, Erath, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Mason, McCullough, Menard, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, San Saba, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and Throckmorton counties.

## Commission Assesses \$35,500 In Population, Well Plugging

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$35,500 in administrative penalties last week to seven oil and gas operators for problems under commission pollution and well plugging rules.

The largest of the penalties, \$22,000, went to H.E. Austin of Eastland for 11 inactive and unplugged wells on the Mumm lease in Eastland County. Commission records indicate the well have been inactive since September 1985.

Other well plugging penalties included Fred B. Shelton, III, Inc. of Midland, \$3,000 for one well on the E.H. Jones Estate lease, Gaines County; TD Exploration, Inc. of Houston, \$3,000 for a well on the Taylor Unit Nuber One Lease,

San Patricio County; and Tex-Star Energy of Abilene, \$3,000 for a well on the Newton lease, Jones County.

Three companies agreed to pay penalties without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Neal Bearden and Morris Rushing, doing business as Yoakum County Petroleum, Inc. of Plains agreed to a \$500 penalty for an unplugged well on the Rutledge lease, Yoakum County; and Enderli Oil Co., Inc. of Mont Belvieu agreed to a \$500 penalty for an unplugged well on the L.J. Enderli lease, Burleson County. Chenango Enterprises, Inc. of Devers agreed to a \$3,000 penalty for a discharge of saltwater from storage tanks on the A.J. Clubb

lease, Liberty County.

To date in 1990, the Commission has levied more than \$485,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed a total of \$1.1 million in such penalties.

## Pharmacy Topics

Hard-to-identify cases of Lyme disease may be found more easily with an experimental test reported in *The Lancet*, a British scientific journal. Researchers are studying the test in New York and New Jersey.

Fish oil can lower blood pressure, even in patients with hypertension, according to researchers at Vanderbilt Medical School. It works by widening the arteries so more blood can flow through.

Because Medicare does not pay health expenses overseas (except for certain services in this hemisphere), journal Geriatrics recommends that seniors purchase temporary coverage when they travel.
