Three Million Dollar Budget Projected For County

"We are looking at a \$3-million-dollar County budget for next year."

This projection came from both Judge Scott Bailey and County Auditor Emma Morris during the Commissioners Court meeting on Monday, July 27.

The final figure for 1987-88 was expected to be at least \$300,000 higher than the budget of last year, which was \$2,800,000. The Commissioners

are required to have a new budget in operation by Oct. 1, 1987. Additional funds are being requested for a number of County offices, Judge Bailey said. The Commissioners

remarked that many of these services have fixed costs, and there was almost no way they could be changed. A number are regulated by the state.

"The state tells us how to do everything," one Commissioner remarked. The County Auditor reported that last year there was a \$50 million-dollar valuation of taxable County property, and this year the valuation is \$493 million.

Judge Bailey stated that the Tax Appraisal Office has not set the effective tax rate for generating the funds the County needs. There will be a shortfall to the County of around \$300,000 unless there is a tax raise, the Judge indicated.

"We have a 'cushion' or reserve operating fund of around \$900,000 presently on the books," the Judge said. "If we have to dip into that for \$300,000 next year, and then continue, the County will be broke in two years."

The cost to the County of indigent health care is expected to rise sharply next year, Judge Bailey said. For 1986-87 the Commissioners budgeted \$47,560 in the General Fund for this service. Next year the cost may go to the limit allowed by state law - and that is 10 percent of tax-generated County funds. The Judge estimated that this could be as high as \$80,000.

He recommended that 1 percent additional on taxes be allowed for indigent care. The Commissioners appeared agreeable to this, and also agreed to sign purchase orders on indigent care patients from each of their Precincts.

There was some discussion of calling an election after Oct. 6 to ask for a one-half cent sales tax hike to generate more County revenue. This procedure is now allowed by state law. The Commissioners expressed mixed feelings on this type of tax, and no decision was made.

Judge Bailey reminded the Court that the general tax rate cannot be raised more than 3 percent without public notice, and is subject to a rollback.

Further discussions will be held before the upcoming budget is finalized.

Jail Compliance Attempts Continue

"There are 25 people in the County Jail today, and five county prisoners housed in Granbury." This was the report from Billy Bacon, Eastland County Commissioner, at the Commissioners Court meeting Monday.

Bacon said that the five prisoners had been carried to Granbury because "all the closer places are full." The cost, he reported was \$45 each per day.

The Jail Standards update was held while the Commissioners made plans to attend a meeting of the Texas Jails Standards Commission in Austin on Wednesday, July 29.

County Judge Scott Bailey outlined the plan the group will present to the Commission, in an effort to comply with the standards set up for the county.

A 48-inmate jail is being considered at the present site, subject to acquiring adequate land. Reports from a recent Jail Standards Commission letter, however, indicated that they were "Not pleased with architect James Wheeler's concept of the kitchen location," and that more personnel would be required in a 48-bed facility, including "One in the control room at all times."

"We are looking at a million dollar debt to the county if we have to set up such a place," Judge Bailey said.

The present jail will be paid off in 1990.

More suggestions will probably be forthcoming from the State Jail Standards Commission on Wednesday.

Attorney Files For Payment From County

Eastland County Commissioners met in an Executive Session during their regular meeting Monday to discuss a Write of Mandamus filed in an Austin Criminal Court by Attorney George Gray.

Gray, represented by an Austin law firm, is seeking to command the county to pay him \$17,010 for defending Brend Andrews in the organized crime trial connected with the murder of Debra Jo Garcia.

The disputed amount is for his work on behalf of Andrews from around October, 1986 until April 3, 1987, when he was appointed by the Court as the defense attorney.

The County has paid Gray \$3,000 set by Judge Herman Fitts for his defense of Andrews from the April 3 date until the end of the trial in early June.

The Commissioners requested that District Attorney Emory Walton file an answer to the Appeals Court on behalf of the County.

Tips for Crime Prevention Given

Some 125 people attended a meeting to hear tips on self defense and crime prevention last Thursday evening. Eastland County Deputy Sheriff H.V. Fillingim, head of the crime prevention unit for the county, came to Rising Star to present the program.

Fillingim emphasized that any Rising Star or area resident can get help with any problem that should arise by calling Eastland County emergency police dispatch number, 1-629-1728.

Some of the tips he offered were:

Observe anything unusual going on in the neighborhood. Notify neighbors if you leave home. Have someone pick up mail, and newspapers.

The Rising Star City Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Henry Burk at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 14. Councilmen present were Tom Bailey, James Cook, Cole White, Pete Starks and Clinton Crisp.

Minutes of the June 9 meeting were presented and accepted.

Utility and treasurer's reports were presented, discussed and accepted.

Motion was made by White and seconded by Crisp that James Cook, George Warfield, Georgia Hennessey and Dr. Charles Barnes be approved as Park Board members. Motion carried.

On new business Rex Long presented a list of signatures of concerned citizens to Mayor Burk, with three proposals they would like the City Council to consider.

Discussion was on enforcement of a curfew, street lights, and the possibility of hiring another patrolman.

Launching a boat is a relatively simple part of boating. Even before backing the trailer down the ramp, a few commonsense rules should be followed, say the boating experts at Mariner Outboards.

While in the lot and out of the way, stow all gear. All rods, tackle, coolers, bait, water skis, clothing, life jackets, etc., should be transferred into the boat before backing down.

Make sure the drain plug is in (then check it again), tilt the motor up and unplug the trailer lights. Then, check out the launching ramp. Make sure that the ramp extends smoothly into deeper water; look for obstacles, holes or a sharp drop-off which might "catch" trailer wheels.

When ready to proceed, pull into position and, using your partner's guidance and rearview mirrors, back carefully toward the ramp. Remember, when backing, that the stern of the boat will move in the opposite direction of the tow vehicle's steering wheel. If the wheel turns right, the stern will go left.

If driving a boat off the trailer, your partner should climb aboard while the rig is stopped on the ramp.

The safety straps and bow

line should be disconnected, and the trailer should be eased into the water until the boat floats. Trim the engine down before starting. The operator should slowly back off the trailer.

If launching a smaller boat, attach a bow line and, when deep enough, push the boat off the trailer and guide it ashore or to the dock with the line.

Move as quickly as possible while on the ramp. Once launched, move away from the ramp area so others can utilize the facilities. Offer to assist other boaters whenever possible.

D&B Fish Farms has become the first private fish hatchery in Texas to successfully spawn hybrid

striped bass.

State hatcheries have spawned hybrid stripers for a number of years, but D&B is the first private hatchery to spawn the hybrids and offer them for sale in Texas.

"Our fingerlings can reach one pound in one year," D&B owner Mike Baughman said. "We expect they'll be three pounds in another year, then six to seven pounds the year after. That's exciting growth! We've found these hybrids can reach 12 pounds even in small ponds."

The hard-fighting hybrid stripers are highly prized as put-and-take sport fish and as an aggressive predator to thin out lakes overpopulated with small fish. Hybrids do not compete with large

mouth bass.

D&B's hybrids are unique in that they are offspring from a male striped bass and female white bass. Hybrids created by State hatcheries have typically been a male white bass/female striper cross.

California fish farmers have begun raising and selling hybrid stripers as a food fish. Unlike other bass species, hybrids will eat pelletized fish food as readily as channel catfish.

"We see tremendous long-term potential for hybrids as a food fish and sport fish," Baughman said.

Appeals Court Rules In Favor Of Constable

Charles Ray Levisay, write-in winner as Precinct 1 Constable of Comanche County, appears to have won the latest round in a legal skirmish between himself and the Comanche County Commissioners Court.

She indicated that the Commissioners will decide soon whether the Appeals Court decision will be accepted. If not, the appeal will be pursued to the Texas Supreme Court.
