Homecoming is memories, renewed friendships and a joining of the past with the present. Let's work to make this one really great!

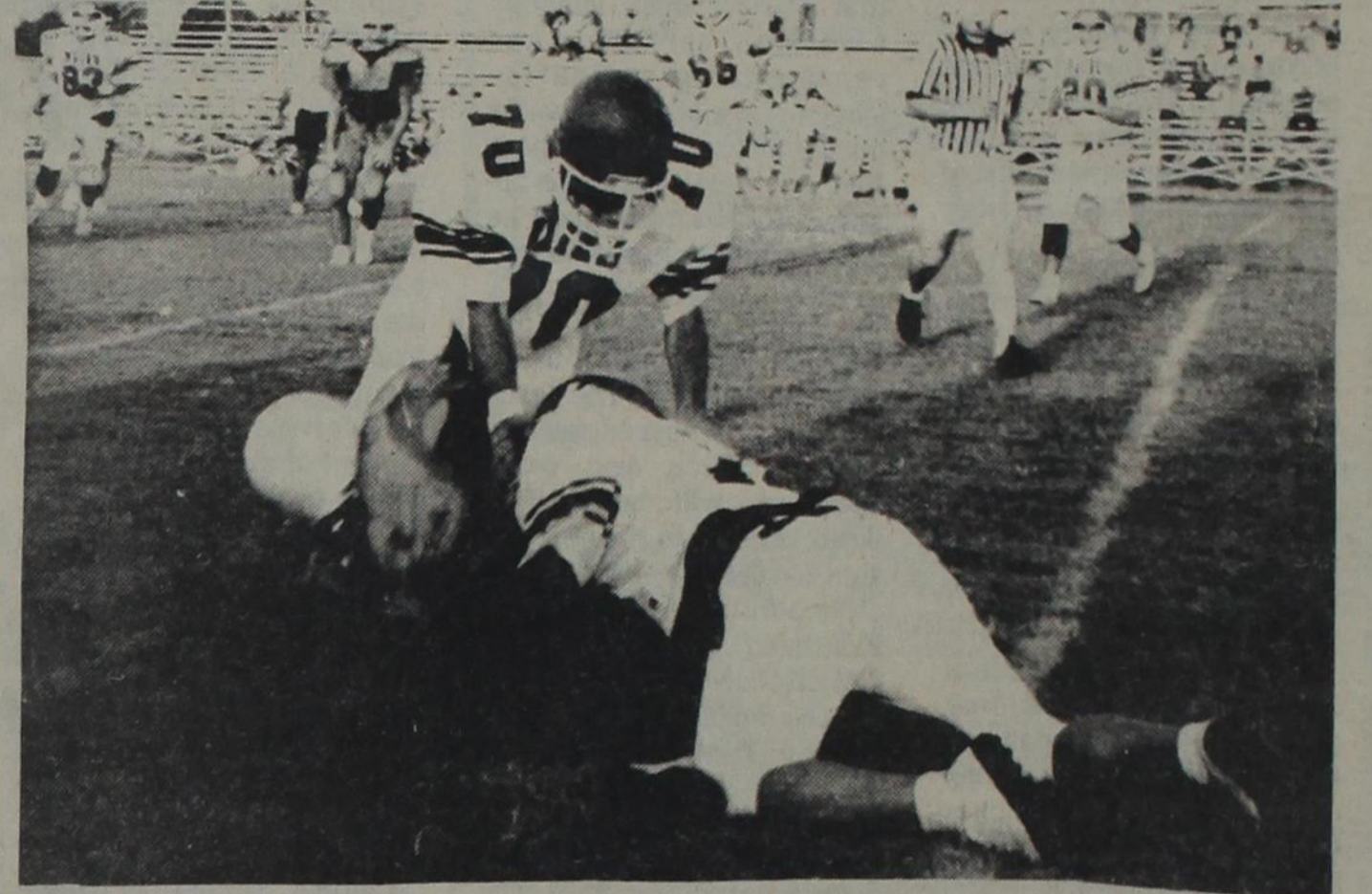
## Wildcats Concede to Baird in Scrimmage

## Charles LeFlore Testifies In Murder Trial

Testimony continued in the Garcia Crime Trial in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday, visiting Judge Herman Fitts said he hoped to complete the trial this week.

A jury of eight men and four women was sworn in late Monday after five days of questioning. They were selected from a group of 48 prospective jurors who were told to return to the courtroom Monday.

On Monday Joe Perry and Barbara Williams heard Special Prosecutor Bill Hart read the indictments against them. Williams is charged with organized crime, murder and conspiracy, and Perry is charged with the same counts plus robbery and rape.

Court appointed attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis are representing the defendants. Perry and Williams are the seventh people to be tried on the 1981 abduction-murder of Debra Jo Garcia of Cisco.

First Charles LeFlore and then his brother Thomas were given prison sentences for taking part in the crime. Last summer Brenda Andrews was given a 33 yr. prison sentence, and two men - Richard Hinton and Pat Starr - were acquitted.

After the jury was seated Monday witnesses Dwight Hamilton and Roy Dennis took the stand. Hamilton said that on Nov. 29, 1981 he and his wife delivered the Abilene Reporter News about 5:30 a.m. to the Quickway Grocery, where Debra Garcia

worked. Mrs. Garcia waited on them for some purchases.

Roy Dennis, the owner of Quickway Grocery at that time, told of a telephone call a little before six a.m.

reporting Debra Garcia missing. He helped search for her at the store. Her body was found about three days later west of Cisco, with a bullet hole in her head.

Court resumed Tuesday with more witnesses called by the Prosecution.

Fire Chief Guthrie of Cisco told of finding Debra Garcia's body near a road west of Cisco. He described it as "Very neat, glasses on - hair was neat - no sign of anything." He checked for a pulse, found none, and called authorities.

Then Charles Allen LeFlore took the stand. He said he pled guilty in 1981-82 to the death of Debra Garcia, and is serving a long term in prison. He agreed that on March 15, 1985 he told the Special Prosecutor "Others were involved."

He told his story of the abduction and murder to the Courtroom, continuing in a halting voice at times and apparently pausing to weep.

He said he was present at the abduction, and named those who allegedly helped him, one of the defendants and others.

He said Garcia was carried to a house near Cisco, where the defendants and others held her and engaged in various acts. According to LeFlore Garcia was then car-

ried to Rising Star, where she was kept for a time. She was then brought back to the house near Cisco and shot.

# Gordon Spot

Pork producers in Eastland County will have an opportunity to vote in a special referendum September 7-8, as authorized by the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act of 1985.

Purpose of the referendum is to determine the continuation of the 100 percent checkoff program which provides funds for pork research and promotion to enhance the pork industry. The checkoff is at the rate 25 cents per \$100 on all hogs and pigs as well as on all imported hogs and pork products.

Referendum voting will be conducted in the county Extension office during normal business hours September 7-8.

All pork producers who produced and owned porcine animals in the U.S. for sale in commerce and who are subject to assessment during the representative time period are also eligible to vote. Also, eligible are 4-H, FFA and other youth who owned porcine animals and are subject to assessment during the representative time period.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will count ballots, and report referendum results.

A meeting for Shackelford County and surrounding county livestock producers who will need their livestock scales on private ranches tested in order to buy and sell cattle, will meet at the Courthouse in Albany, Texas at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 8, 1988, according to Lawrence E. Winkler, County Extension Agent, Shackelford County.

The purpose of the meeting will be to explain the change in policy of checking private livestock scales and this will be done by the Texas Department of Agriculture personnel. The second phase of the meeting will be devoted to scales companies that are registered with the Texas Department of Agriculture, presenting proposals to carry out this registration procedure. The final decision will be for the ranchers to independently or as a group, to form their own decision as to how they will proceed with registering their scale. All livestock producers with private livestock scales in Eastland County are invited to attend this meeting.

It is time to spray your pecan trees to control the pecan weevils. This is one of the most destructive pests of pecans. The adult weevils, which look much like a cotton boll weevil except that the pecan weevil is slightly larger, comes from the ground in late summer to lay eggs in pecans. The weevils emerge from moist soil sooner than from dry soil. I have already seen weevil damage in yard trees that have been watered. The weevils puncture a hole in the pecan and deposits eggs. The eggs hatch larvae which then eats the kernel as it grows. The larvae are creamy-white grubs with reddish-brown heads. They grow to about 3/5 inch long at maturity. Weevils must be controlled

in the adult stage while on the pecan trees, but preferably before they begin laying eggs.

Carbaryl (Sevin) has been shown to be an effective labeled insecticide for pecan weevil control. Its residual has been found to remain active for 8-12 days following application. The trees should be sprayed to the point of run off. If weevils continue to emerge a second or third application of insecticide may be needed at two week intervals.

A SIGNUP FOR ACP cost-sharing will be held September 1-16. The County Committee has determined that critical area shaping, diversion terraces and reorganizing irrigation systems are of high priority during this signup. Practices that are started prior to approval by the committee are not eligible for cost-sharing.

THE PEANUT MARKETING smart card will be used to market peanuts this year. The cards are being prepared at the county office and farm operators will be notified when to come to the office to sign for receipt of the card.

No additional information has been received on the EMERGENCY DISASTER PROGRAM. Producers planning to abandon or make other use of a disaster affected crop are reminded to file an application for disaster credit prior to putting the crop to another use.

COLLEGE STATION - Soaring summer temperatures mean everyone who works or plays outdoors needs to take precautions.

"Drinking plenty of fluids before, during and after outdoor activity can help you avoid heat exhaustion or even heat stroke," said Dr. Alice Hunt, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Inadequate fluid intake can be dangerous. A decrease of more than four percent of body weight through rapid fluid loss from sweating can cause muscle cramping and spasms," she said. "It may also affect cardiac function and temperature regulation in some cases."

Four percent of body weight is just six pounds in a 150-pound person and 2.4 pounds in a 60 pound child, according to the specialist.

Hunt offers the following suggestions for maintaining fluid intake:

# Bank Franchise Tax Allocations

Fifteen taxing entities in Eastland County have just shared \$73,540.48 in franchise tax allocations from the banking firms in this county.

The State Comptroller's office this week sent checks totaling \$51.5 million in bank franchise tax allocations to 2,070 Texas taxing units.

Receiving the largest share in this county are the four Cisco units, which together received \$26,525.74, broken down as follows:

Cisco Hospital District, \$1,770.08 (up 16.68 per cent over last year); Cisco I.S.D., \$13,604.00 (up 10.83); Cisco Junior College, \$2,975.83 (down 1.80); and City of Cisco, \$8,175.83 (down .20).

The City of Eastland received \$6,640.30 (down 3.16) and the E.I.S.D., \$12,795.13 (up 3.17), for a total of \$19,435.52.

The City of Gorman received \$978.11 (down 46.70) and the Gorman I.S.D., \$2,519.65 (down 42.35).

The Ranger units received a total of \$12,528.77, broken down as follows: City of Ranger, \$2,922.60 (up 4.39); Ranger Hospital District, \$1,088.97 (up 19.94); Ranger I.S.D., \$7,264.08, (down 3.43); and Ranger Junior College, \$1,253.12 (down 11.10).

The City of Rising Star received \$145.52 (down 94.97 per cent) and the Rising Star I.S.D., \$304.07 (down 94.95). Eastland County received \$11,103.20 (down 1.82).

This year's allocation is 21 percent lower than last year's allocation of \$64.9 million because of last year's poor economy statewide.

"Although most state industries have seen an economic upturn, banking and finance haven't shown signs of recovery yet. Tax revenues from these industries won't improve until the business stabilize," Comptroller Bullock said.

Bullock said the allocations represent franchise taxes paid by banks that do business in Texas. Banks must file a report with the Comptroller's office by March 15 each year.

The bank franchise tax rate is the same as the state's corporate franchise tax rate - \$6.70 per \$1,000 of taxable capital and surplus, with a minimum tax of \$150, according to Bullock.

The Texas Legislature authorized the bank franchise tax in 1984, and the tax was collected for the first time in 1985.

Bullock said that a portion of the tax goes into the state's general revenue fund, but most of it is allocated to local tax jurisdictions, such as cities, counties, and other local taxing units such as school, water, and hospital districts.

# Business

HERE'S A prediction being made by a number of trade journals these days:

"Smaller, more-specialized retailers in clothing, housewares, etc. Moving away from huge department stores that offer all things to all shoppers. Emphasis will be on quality and convenience...more value for the dollar."

Most of the businesses in this area are small business, so perhaps these words are speaking directly to us. They could be pointing to the directions we should be headed for in the future. Because of the burial of the oil industry around here, most businesses have had to make drastic changes in the way they operate - and more changes appear to be in the cards.

There are already too many empty buildings around and no one wants to see any more. Many of the merchants are looking at avenues they never looked at before and they're experimenting here and there and often they're finding things that don't work - and things that don't work so well.

Lean and mean may be a little terse, but it could almost describe the attitude of many.

The community newspapers have had to make adjustments and others may be called for. No one wants to reduce services but often it is a case of doing what has to be done. A recent attempt to broaden distribution to seek additional customers for retailers failed to achieve the support necessary to continue the effort.

As long as there's cooperation and a united effort to survive and grow, there's no whipping the tough little independents.

Given a half-way normal economy, the area through here will blossom like the traditional morning glory,

and many are seeing hopeful signs, with lots of optimism that there are in fact bright days ahead.

The trade papers indicate that biotechnology will be the hot industries of the future, and most are seeing that agriculture is turning around with marked improvements to be seen after some years of the opposite. Some are guessing stronger exports in grain, cotton and other crops, and a firming of farm values, better cash flow and higher farm incomes.

Most of us are now running leaner than we were when the '80s began. We've all cut back: payrolls and other costs and taken steps to encourage innovation, to sharpen quality and services, to be more flexible, faster on our feet, in order to compete better.

This all bodes well for strength in the future, and as we all go through these less-than-pleasant times, we'll join with all of the small businessmen who would want to shout from the rooftops to one and all:

"We appreciate our customers. We appreciate you're staying with us. We appreciate the way you support the folks like us who have invested in this area because we believe in this area. We appreciate you."

The City Council reminds all residents and city water users that Voluntary Water Conservation is still very much in effect. City Manager Mike Moore states that since June 15 Lake Cisco's water level has dropped five feet. A lot of this loss is from evaporation, but water consumption is also up 35 percent. If it continues at this rate, with no relief from the weather, the City Council will consider mandatory curtailment at their Sept. 13th meeting. This action would result in very restricted outside irrigation and strict enforcement on the part of the city. The current voluntary program means that irrigation is restricted to two days a week - Tuesday and Saturday - 1 a.m. to noon.

Twenty-three bicyclists and six crew members with the Pacific Atlantic Crossing Tour stopped for a brief rest in Cisco last Monday. They had started from Snyder, Texas early Monday morning, and planned to spend the night in the Classic Inn Motel in Eastland that night. Group members are riding their bicycles from San Diego, California to Jacksonville, Florida. They started Aug. 14, and expected to be in Florida this Tuesday, Aug. 30. The average speed on the bike is 40-50 miles per hour, and the riders range in age from 19-61. A crew member said Texas people have been the friendliest of all they have met.

Charlie's Pets, Fish and Supplies is a new business in Cisco. The pet store was opened for Business last week by owners Charlie Tatum and Star Reese. The location is 711 Conrad Hilton Ave., and the business will be open from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Charlie and Starr invite all to stop by and see their beautiful birds, as well as animals and fish. They have several aquariums filled

with tropical and sail water fish - a most interesting display.

Sears is not going to shut their doors completely, according to Don Shepard, Cisco Chamber of Commerce Manager. They are changing locations and will be relocated in Cisco. The local outlet will become an agent store, where all the services that are available now, except receiving payments, will be in effect. One of the local merchants will become the agent. There will not be in floor merchandise in the store, however.

**EASTLAND**  
Plans are underway for Old Rip Day, which will be Saturday, Oct. 1. According to custom, Old Rip Day will start with a large parade. Among the expected entries this year are the HSU Band with the Six White Horses, Junior College Bands and Drill Teams, the Marine Color Guard, and more than ten High School Bands. Following the Parade, a fair is expected to again fill the streets to the south and west of the Courthouse. A number of exhibits are expected to be inside the Courthouse, as insurance rates for the use of other buildings has become excessive. Two big events will be held outside of the fair area - a Statewide Fiddler's Contest in the Majestic Theatre, and a band contest at Maverick Stadium.

The County is being informed that the West Central Texas Interlocal Drug Task Force needs more funding to continue. In the last eight months The Force has solved 133 drug cases involving 92 defendants. Some \$800,000 in cash has been seized, as well as five vehicles, 12 weapons and 100 pieces of jewelry. Several of the successful drug-busts have been in Eastland County. Emergency funding for the Task Force is set up on a population basis, and

Eastland County's share of the needed \$75,000 is reportedly \$5,325. This needs to be raised by October to be eligible for Federal funding of \$175,000.

Soon-to-be details of the Eastland Rotary Club Follies, which will be held on the stage of the Majestic Theatre. This event will feature the talents of Club members, plus some real bonus surprises. Outstanding entertainment will be live, in one spectacular performance. Watch for the date and time.

A meeting to consider the Emergency Ambulance Service membership drive is being held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 30 at the Eastland National Bank Conference Room. Citizens are assisting the ambulance service in its current membership drive in an effort to secure at least 1,700 members for the Cisco and Eastland area. The ambulance company has stated that they will not be able to continue service unless they enroll that many members. The drive is presently at the 900 member level.

Ranger is going all-out for the 1988 Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon. Joe Williams, pledge center co-ordinator, announces that the Ranger Center will be located at the new Fire Station on Hwy. 80 E. Telethon - so come out and visit and watch it there. The Volunteer Firement will also assist with a "Fill the Boot" Campaign. This will be located at the

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red light on Highway 80 on Saturday, Sept. 3.

The resignation of Policeman David Jackson was accepted by the City Council on Saturday, Aug. 27 in a special meeting. The announcement was made to a large crowd of citizens. Jackson was employed by the city last April.

The Ranger Independent School District has made application to the Governor's Office, Criminal Justice Division, for funding under the 1989 Criminal Justice Plan. Senator Bob Glasgow has announced support of this application, stating that "the funding, if approved, would be to fund an Alt Classroom for At Risk students in the amount of \$6,492." The Senator said that we are all concerned about the crime in our cities and communities, and this funding would certainly be of assistance to Ranger ISD.

Lion's Club President Arthur Camacho has presented a \$1,000 donation to Ranger General Hospital on behalf of the Club. Some other gifts have also come in. Citizens are meeting this Tuesday night, 7:30 p.m. at the Holson Hotel to discuss the

needs and future of their hospital.



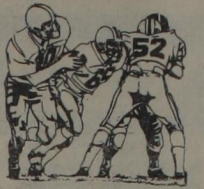

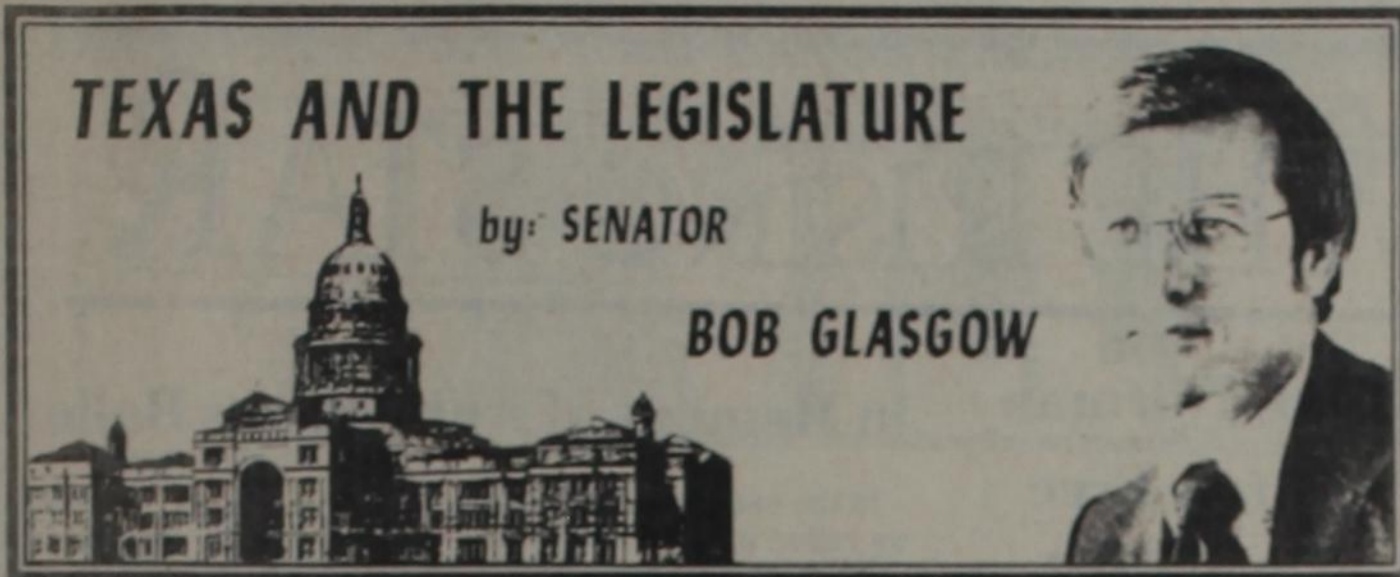

# TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

## The Texas Silver Haired Legislature

Being aware that older Texans are the fastest growing segment of the population, with the number of persons over age 60 in Texas having increased 32 percent between 1970 and 1980, SCR 37 was passed by the 69th Texas Legislature in 1985. This established the Texas Silver Haired Legislature.

The Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, representative, nonpartisan body of citizens 60-plus years of age, elected by persons 60-plus years of age. With the continuing growth of the number of senior citizens in Texas, some approximately 2.5 million at the current time, we wanted to give them a forum to voice their concerns for the needs of older Texans.

The objective of the Silver Haired Legislature is to serve the needs of both present and future older Texans. More specifically, this

forum provides older Texans an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement; to develop a forum for older Texans for discussion of senior citizens' issues, debating these issues and establishing legislative priorities for the Texas Legislature to consider; providing advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the community and offer informed assistance to policy makers; and providing an avenue through which older citizens may serve as a resource to public and private sectors, boards and commissions.

The Silver Haired Legislature first met in September of 1986, and is scheduled to convene again in Austin on September 19, 1988, for a four day session. The new legislators were elected May 24, 1988. I am very pleased that two of the officers, selected during a

meeting of the Silver Haired Legislature earlier this month, are from my Senatorial District. Millard Guess of Millsap was elected Speaker, and James Earl VonTungelen of Cleburne was elected Deputy Speaker. Both representing the North Central Texas area.

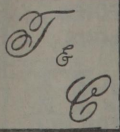

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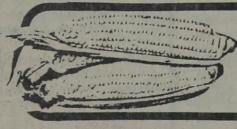

## Either-Sex Deer Harvest

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners and sportsmen in Eastland County that no antlerless deer permits will be required for the 1988-1989 deer season. Antlerless deer taken during the season need only to be tagged with the appropriate tag from the required hunting license.

Annual deer population surveys are being conducted at the present time in order to determine deer numbers and ratios and to develop recommended harvest rates. These harvest recommendations will be made available to the general public by mid-October.

Landowners are reminded that these recommendations are very general and are intended only as guidelines.

Landowners should carefully decide on the number of deer to be harvested from their individual ranches, depending upon their particular knowledge of the ranch.

Hunters and sportsmen are also reminded that, although no antlerless deer permits will be required, the landowner makes the ultimate decision as to how many deer may be harvested on his land.

The general deer season in Eastland County will open on November 5, 1988 and run through January 1, 1989. Please refer to the 1988-1989 Texas Hunting Guide for information concerning seasons, bag limits, and means and methods for taking wildlife in various counties.

A new peanut belt separator aimed at enhancing peanut quality will be demonstrated September 6, at 1:30 p.m. at the Birdsong Peanuts buying point in Gorman.


Peanut producers throughout the state are invited to attend the demonstration, which is being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with Birdsong Peanuts.

The belt separator is a key ingredient of the Peanut Quality Enhancement Project, an industry-wide research project being conducted by USDA scientists, said DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension

Agent. The efficiency and effectiveness of the belt separator machine in removing loose shell kernels, immature peanuts and foreign material from farmer stock peanuts is being tested. Economic im-

Alpha-hydroxy acids, the kind in sour milk and oranges, seem to reduce wrinkles, a Philadelphia dermatologist found. He says the fruit acids won't irritate, if used correctly.

Mumps, long thought of as a disease of childhood, has been appearing on college campuses. The disease is highly contagious and may be dangerous to young men. Vaccination is advised.

Silicon chip tied into a microcomputer constantly tests blood chemical levels during operations, giving anesthesiologists visual analyses. Chip was used in transplant operations in Newcastle University in England and should be adaptable to other surgery, say its developers.

Cyclosporine, the anti-rejection drug, helps burn victims accept skin grafts from cadavers without affecting the immune system that fights bacterial infections, according to doctors at the Southern California Burn Center of the Sherman Oaks Community Hospital.

Asthmatics do better if they exercise, say researchers at the New York University Medical Center. In time the body "learns" to be more efficient at sending oxygen-rich blood to the muscles, which learn to use the oxygen available.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

THE MOBILE BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT WILL BE IN RISING STAR ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 8TH.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

## Drug-Fighting Task Force Has \$\$ Needs

The strongest weapon in West Texas in the War on Drugs is running out of steam, and if the West Central Texas Interlocal Drug Task Force isn't strengthened with cash soon, it could be out of business.

A number of Eastland Countians attended a meeting of the 13-county force Thursday, and heard Native Eastland Countian James Eidson, Taylor County District Attorney, report: "Without funding, this task force is in danger of being extinct."

The Force in its short eight-month life has solved 133 drug cases involving 92 defendants and seized some \$800,000 in cash, five vehicles, 12 weapons and 100 pieces of jewelry.

Several of the successful

busts have been in Eastland County it was pointed out.

Emergency funding for the Task Force is set up on a population basis, and Eastland County's share of the needed \$75,000.00 is \$5,325.00. This needs to be raised by October to be eligible for federal funding of \$175,000.
