Local writer Linda Carol George recently attained the dream of many aspiring authors: to see her children's story published by a book publisher.

The book is "The Hallelujah Corncobs" by Linda Carol George, and it is her first. It has just been released in paperback by University Editions, Inc., a book publisher in Huntington, West Virginia.

"The Hallelujah Corncobs" is a large format, 48 page children's story.

"Let's baptize her! We've never done that before! Oh, please, Sister, please?"

Winnie started to protest, knowing that it would mean the end of Elsie to get the cob wet. But then a wicked thought was born in her mind. Why shouldn't Agnes lose Elsie? Because of Agnes she'd lost the shawl. It was only fair.

Linda Carol George lives near Rising Star, with her husband, Chuck, and their children, Christy and Alex. She writes at the Joy Pecan Shoppe, a family owned business, where she sells the pecans Chuck grows when he isn't teaching World History and Spanish. Linda writes between customers and "lives among the nuts all year long!"

Linda taught in the elementary grades for ten years, in

every grade K-6, then "retired" to run the Shoppe and write full time. She's never happier than when she's creating at her computer, and loves writing all sorts of books for children and teens. "The Hallelujah Corncobs" is based on a story told by her grandmother. It is Linda's first published novel.

"When Winnie and Agnes baptized their corncob dolls in 1898, they never dreamed that it would be written down for children and adults to read about almost a hundred years later. I think my grandmother would have been pleased with my version of the actual happening. And as for Jess Wingate, I think she might have approved that part of the story, too. It is my pleasure to share Winnie and Agnes with you in this book, where truth tips-toes softly into fiction."

University Editions publishes about twenty-five new books each year. The press stresses the discovery of new literary talent, and many of its books are published by new authors.

RSISD Communicator Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

The existing Rising Star High School main building was constructed in 1926. In 1972 it was remodeled and the present gym was built. As graduates reflect over the years they will be reminded of happy and well-spent years in Rising Star High School.

In 1987 a structural engineer for Caddo Construction, Abilene, checked the building for sagging ceilings. The beams in the science room were sagging eight and one-half inches from north to south and four and one-half inches from east to west. The engineer provided specifications for repairing the roof and mentioned that the building was in great need of repair.

In 1988 when the carpet was changed in one location, holes were discovered throughout the flooring, necessitating a new sub-floor.

The original plumbing needs replacing and the walls are separating in various locations. This information is shared to bring to your attention the need for a new secondary facility for grades 7-12. The administration, school board and teachers feel that a new facility is needed and will greatly enhance our instructional program. This project can be accomplished without increasing taxes and while continuing to maintain enough funds to operate our budget for two or three months. If you would care to view preliminary drawings they can be seen in the window of the superintendent's office at 116 North Main. If you have strong feelings, positive or negative, or suggestions, please contact the superintendent's office or one of the school board members.

During May, 1990 a Parent Opinion Survey was requested to be completed and returned. Thirty-three (33)

percent of the survey forms were completed and returned. The administration wishes to express our sincere thanks for your frank opinion and suggestions for the improvement of our school system. This information was used by the school board, superintendent and principals to develop district and campus goals for the 1990-1991 school year.

Respondents felt that the district's overall grade was a B. They also felt that communication from the district to parents needs to improve and that there was too much emphasis on physical education and athletics and too little emphasis on sex education, drug education, writing, dropout prevention, reading and choral music. The most serious problems facing the RSISD included drug and/or alcohol abuse, discipline, drop outs and communication between school and home.

The three most common causes, in the opinion of the respondents, for school dropouts in the RSISD included low expectations of students on the part of teachers and parents, student apathy and lack of parent support. The best five things about RSISD listed by this group included small classes, student/teacher involvement, athletics, band, science and computer programs.

Please remember that your suggestions are always welcome. We want to utilize all resources at hand to provide the best quality education for the students of the RSISD. This can be accomplished if the students, teachers, parents, school board members, patrons and administrators work together as a team. Confusion never leads to success. Believe you can be successful and you will be successful.

Dan Goodman reported an update from Southwest Tract Builders bid on the stripping of the track. Dan also reported baseball would not be available for the 1990-91 school year because the city baseball field was not adequate.

Dr. Don Bryan reported the TEA Monitoring Team would be visiting our campus during the week of January 14-18.

He reported that on January 24 there would be three meetings at the Education Service Center for board training and that on February 7 and March 7 there would be board training on the TI-IN

A fire partially destroyed a house in southwest Rising Star Sunday evening. The blaze was discovered early enough to give the volunteer firefighters the chance to douse it before the entire structure was burned.

The house, owned by Gaynelle Callaway, was occupied by Joel and Tracy Patterson and their children.

A young couple lost all their possessions in a house fire here Sunday night. Joel and Tracy Patterson left their three children with Tracey's mother in Cross Plains while they made a trip to Abilene. When they returned home, their rented house had burned. Firefighters suspected the

cause of the fire to be an overheated ballast on a fluorescent light fixture in a bedroom. The light had been left on.

The house, which was rented furnished, is owned by Gaynelle Callaway of Cross Plains.

The Pattersons have lived in Rising Star just a few

months and just enrolled their oldest child in school here a few weeks ago. Tracey's mother is Patsy Curtis of Cross Plains, a former Rising Star resident.

Until they can find other housing the Patterson family is staying with Calvin and Jennifer Woody in Eva Woody's home. Joel works for a drilling company and, like many oilfield workers, doesn't have full time work.

The children are Brandy, age six, Matthew, age four and Brandon, age three. Brandy wears size 6 clothing and size 12 shoes; Matthew and Brandon both wear size 4 clothing and size 9 1/2 shoes.

Joel wears size 31-31 or 32-31 pants, medium shirt and 9 1/2 shoes. Tracy wears large in shirts, 9/10 in pants and size 7 shoes.

The Pattersons hope to be able to remain in Rising Star. They are thankful no one was hurt in the fire, but are still in shock over the loss of their belongings. Little Brandon, having seen bombs at work on TV, was fearful that their home had been bombed before his parents reassured him that that was not the cause of their personal disaster.

Sharp Announces State Drug Tax Seizure

"We've taken the wheels off an alleged West Texas drug dealer," State Comptroller John Sharp said today, announcing that agents from his office have, for the first time, seized automobiles and other motor vehicles for a violation of the state drug tax law.

"Agents in the Comptroller's office have in the past seized close to 70 bank accounts to satisfy unpaid taxes resulting from illegal drug deals, but this is our first seizure of motor vehicles," Sharp said.

The state law, which went into effect September 1, 1989, gives the Comptroller's office the authority to seize bank accounts and other personal property for failing to purchase the required tax stamps on felony amounts of marijuana and controlled substances. The tax rate is \$3.50 per gram of marijuana and \$200 per gram of a controlled substance.

"It's my unequivocal policy that, whenever possible, the state will return the proceeds from any property seized in a drug raid to local law enforcement officials for their continued drug enforce-

ment efforts," Sharp said. The vehicles seized in West Texas are to help satisfy approximately \$900,000 in unpaid state drug taxes, interest and penalties levied by the Comptroller's office.

Earlier, ten West Texas defendants were arrested on charges of possessing a controlled substance with the intent to distribute; conspiracy; and engaging in a continuing criminal enterprise. The charges follow a three-month investigation involving the Texas Department of Public Safety, the FBI and local law enforcement authorities. Agents from the Comptroller's office were also part of the investigation and were able to identify financial assets and coordinate the seizure of 13 vehicles.

All tax liens filed with the Eastland County Clerk's Office are for unpaid taxes, penalty and interest on narcotics allegedly sold to undercover law enforcement agents between September 26, 1990 and December 13, 1990.

SOCIAL SECURITY

People nearing retirement age who will soon be applying for Social Security benefits can save time and energy with a little preplanning, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

People should contact Social Security 2 or 3 months before the date they wish to

begin receiving benefits. This will allow sufficient time for processing the claim so that the first benefit payment will arrive the month retirement begins. People can apply by telephone, or they can go their local Social Security office.

Whichever way is chosen, they can save time by having certain documents handy. They will need their Social Security card or a record of the number. They must also have a birth certificate and the birth certificates of their spouse and children (if they, too, are filing for benefits), as well as evidence of recent

earnings. This would be last year's Form W-2 or a self-employment tax return for last year.

People who want benefit payments deposited directly into a bank account should have a checkbook or bank passbook in order to give the correct bank account information.

Anyone with question about applying for benefits should contact Social Security. The people there will be glad to help. The Abilene Social Security office is located at 142 S. Pioneer. The office is open from 9 to 4 Monday through Friday.

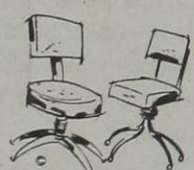

Forfeited Land Sale Set For February

The Texas Veterans Land Board is offering approximately 456 tracts of land for sale exclusively to eligible Texas veterans through a special sale set for February 26. Located in 118 Texas counties, these tracts can be purchased with no down payment. In addition, the VLB will finance the entire amount of all winning bids.

There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one land purchase in the sale.

Successful bidders receive a 7.99 percent interest rate with a 30 year assumable fixed rate loan. The purchaser will be responsible for the current year's taxes.

A \$25 none-refundable bid

fee just be submitted for each bid. In addition, bidders must submit \$320 to cover closing costs. Unsuccessful bidders will have all money refunded except the \$25 bid fee.

The sale will be by sealed bid only, with the minimum bid being set by the Board. All bids must be received by February 26 at 1 p.m. Bidders need not be present at the bid opening.

Tracts not sold in the February sale will be offered to both veterans and non-veterans through local real estate agents.



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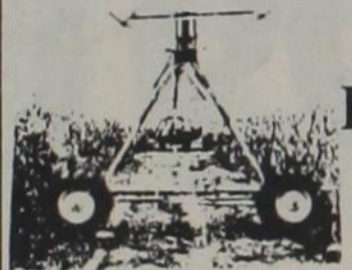

Hogan was served with a copy of the lawsuit, and Judge Jones then made his ruling on Vance's request for a temporary removal of the Sheriff, the suit also asked for appointment of an interim Sheriff.

Subsequently a jury trial can be held to determine whether Hogan should be permanently removed from office.

"This is one of the most unpleasant duties of a Criminal District Attorney," said Vance. "But it is the right thing to do under the circumstances. We will be prepared to go forward with the full removal suit as rapidly as possible."

The charges against Dec Hogan came after a crackdown Jan. 4 in which nine West Texas were arrested on drug and money laundering charges. Among those charged was Steven Patrick Benifel of Ranger, who was charged with possessing and distributing methamphetamines. Several other Eastland Countians were also arrested at that time.

This group waived their rights to a detention hearing Wednesday, and will be held until a Federal Grand Jury considers the case Jan. 28.

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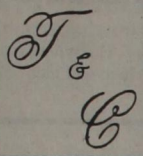
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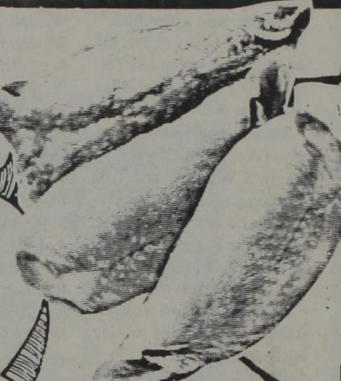
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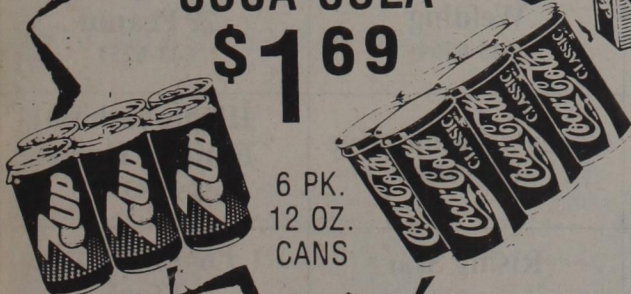

Whooping cough is on the increase around the country, the Centers for Disease Control report, perhaps because of fears about pertussis vaccine. Risks from the disease are much worse than any possible from the vaccine, the CDC points out.

High doses of an acne drug derived from vitamin A can prevent lung, throat and mouth cancers in high-risk people, according to research at the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center of the University of Texas in Baylor.

Mothers who smoke at home increase the likelihood that their children will develop asthma, a Boston University/Harvard study found.

Smart eating: mental deficiencies in the elderly may have more to do with dietary habits than aging, say scientists at the USDA Human Nutrition Research Center. Those who eat well seem to be more alert.

New laser, Nd:YAG, has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for treating gum disease. Michigan dentists say it also can be used to treat cavities and root canals, all without pain.

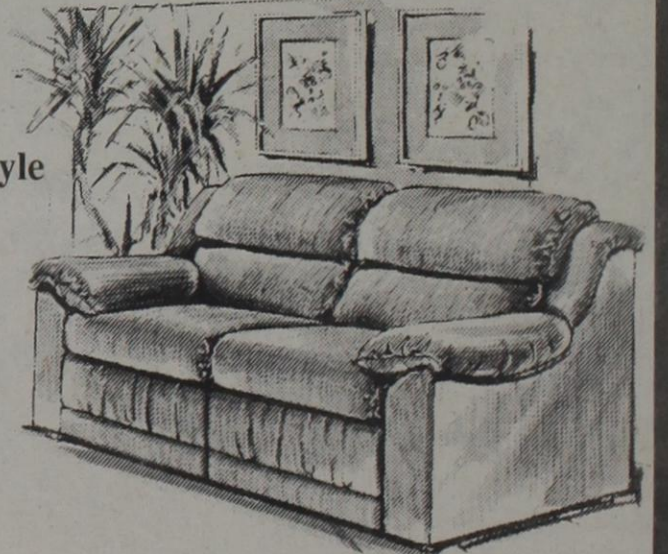


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Chief Deputy Franklin Appointed Sheriff

Sheriff Hogan Removed From Office

Donald R. Jones, Judge of the 266th Judicial District in Stephenville, Texas suspended Dee Hogan Wednesday from the office of Sheriff

in Eastland County.

He appointed David Franklin, Chief Deputy, as Interim Sheriff. Franklin had been acting in the capacity of Sheriff

since the arrest Jan. 11 of Hogan on a Federal Warrant charging obstruction of justice, a felony, and tampering with a government record

under state law.

Hogan is currently lodged in the Lubbock County Jail in Federal custody, with a bond hearing set for Jan. 24, 1991.

Eastland County Criminal District Attorney Leslie B. Vance Tuesday filed suit in 91st District Court asking for the removal of Hogan from office. The lawsuit was filed at 2:10 p.m. As provided in Article 74 of the Government code of the State of Texas, the administrative judge was contacted and the case was assigned to the Hon. Donald R. Jones.

The disqualification of the presiding District Judge in the county where the removal suit is filed is a mandatory requirement whenever an election contest or removal of local official suit is filed.

The suit to remove Sheriff Hogan alleged that on Jan. 11, 1991 Hogan was arrested by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Texas Rangers on a warrant issued by Federal Magistrate W.C. Warnick of Lubbock, charging Hogan with obstruction of justice and tampering with a government record.

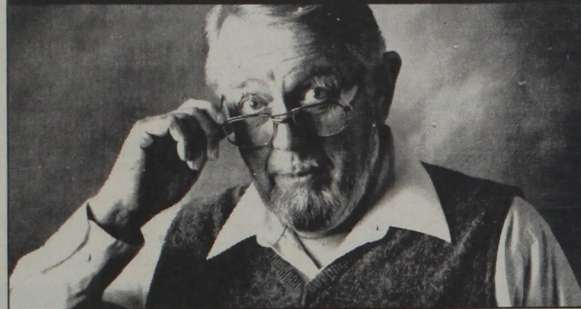
