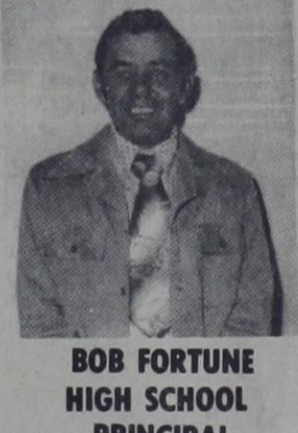

Section demand was very light for peanuts grown in the Southeast the week ending August 19. Trading was slow, but prices held firm. Sellers were not anxious to sell at prices offered by the buyers. Crop conditions were being watched closely. The crop made good progress. Afternoon and evening showers were fairly general. Harvest is underway in north Florida, and is expected to move into Georgia shortly. Farmers are fighting insects and disease, especially in the Younger fields. The Alabama crop was much improved. Prices per pound for shelled runner type peanuts sold on an FOB shipping point basis for September through April

Delivery for Jumbos 35-35 1/2 cents, us splits mostly 28 1/2 cents.

Virginia North Carolina section demand was light for Virginia and North Carolina Peanuts the week ending August 19. Trading continued slow, although prices held firm. A general rain on Wednesday night and Thursday improved crop conditions. Dry weather was affecting many farms. Practically all old crop supplies had cleaned-up. Prices paid per pound for new crop Virginia type peanuts, sold on an FOB shipping point basis for October through March delivery, were 34-35 cents on unshelled Jumbos, 32 1/2-33 cents on Fancies and shelled us splits 27 cents per pound.

Southwestern Section demand was light for peanuts grown in the Southwest the week ending August 19. Trading continued slow. Prices held firm. The peanut crop in Texas was variable. Some areas were in good condition, others were in need of rain. Oklahoma growers received a good rain over the weekend. Crop conditions were better. New Mexico crop was excellent condition. Some rain was helpful at mid week. Prices paid per pound for shelled Spanish type peanuts sold on an FOB

shipping point basis for August through December shipment were 36 1/2-37 cents on number ones, 37 1/2 cents on Jumbos and us splits 29 once fourth-29 one half, runner us splits sold mostly for 28 1/2 cents per pound.

### Exxon Pipeline Sells Portion Of Its Central Pipeline

Houston - Exxon Pipeline Company announced today the sale of its West Central Texas and Gossett to Mexia Junction pipeline systems to Scurlock Oil Company. Both companies are headquartered at Houston. The sale will be effective January 2, 1978. The properties to be transferred include approximately 568 miles of trunk pipelines, 325 miles of gathering lines, 10 trunk pipeline stations, and 17 storage tanks with a total capacity of about 987,000 barrels. Terms of the sale were not disclosed.

Scurlock officials stated that the purchase provides them with facilities already in place to expand Scurlock's existing gathering activities in West Central Texas. Scurlock plans to continue operating the systems with their existing interconnections to other pipeline companies, including Exxon.

### Oil News

Delta Oil & Gas Co. of Breckenridge will drill No. 1 J.E. Tomlin as a proposed 4,500-foot wildcat in Eastland County. Location is nine miles south-east of Moran on a 411-acre lease. It spots 990 feet from the south and 900 feet from the east lines of Section 461, SP Survey.

Staked as a wildcat five miles southwest of Cisco was Walsh & Trant Petroleum Corp. of Tyler No. 1 Anderson-Carr. Slated for 4,100 feet, it spots 467 feet from the south and 3,200 feet from the east lines of John Van Winkle Survey 3. The lease is composed of 270 acres.

Kahan Energy Corp., operating from Cross Plains, will drill No. 2 - Morton as a proposed 4,000-foot wildcat five miles east of Cisco. The planned 4,000 foot venture is located on a 189-acre lease. It spots 2,726 feet from the north and 2,239 feet from the east lines of Section 59, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

LeClair Operating Co. Inc. of Abilene No. 1 D.C. Hagar is a planned 3,400 foot wildcat for the area eight miles southeast of Ranger. Drillsite is 400 feet from the south and 1,300 feet from from the east lines of Section 8, McLennan CSL Survey, A-369. It spots on a 320 acre lease. Staked as a proposed 4,000-foot wildcat in the same area was H. Bryan Poff of Fort Worth No. 1-C Casey Meazell. Site is 330 feet from the north and 750 feet from the west lines of Lot 46, Leagues 3 & 4 McLennan CSLK Survey, A-367. The lease is composed of 40 acres.

Fort Worth Petroleum Corp. completed No. 2-A Alford in the Penn (Ranger) Field two miles north of Rising Star. Site is 1,650 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of Section 26, Block 2, ETRR Survey, A-853. Daily potential was 80 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 20 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 3,303-46 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud acid. The pay was fractured with 20,000 gallons of fluid and 30,000 pounds of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,110 feet, total depth.

### Tri-Region Health Agency Wants To Know Eastland County Health Needs

The Tri-Region Health Systems Agency (T-RHSA) wants to know about your health concerns in Eastland County, said Jim Anderson, Executive Director of the Tri-Region HSA staff.

At an area workshop slated for Thursday, September 1, 1977 at 7:30 p.m. in Eastland at the Eastland National Bank in the Conference Room on the Square, Eastland County and surrounding county residents will have the opportunity to tell the HSA what their problems with health care are. If there are inefficiencies, inconveniences, and inadequacies in area health services, this Agency which makes decisions concerning health care services will be there to listen.

"We expect the high cost of health care to be one concern. We also anticipate other suggestions on ways to improve the health of area residents. We want to hear whatever's on anyone's mind concerning health, because it's our job to see that every individual in the region has access to quality health care," said Anderson.

The HSA like some 200 others across the country, was created by the National Health Planning and Resource Development Act of 1974. It is empowered by Congress to improve the health of residents in its area by increasing the quality of health services and by making them acceptable and accessible to residents as long as they need them.

The HSA will also work to control increases in the cost of health care and to prevent unnecessary duplication of services.

The HSA is required to gather information and suggestions from the people who live and work in the area on what is and what is not needed. That is the purpose of this community workshop.

"The HSA's radio announcement says 'You've got a vested interest,' said M.A. Treadwell M.D. who will host the Eastland workshop. "Every one of us has a personal interest in health, and it's absolutely essential that all of us, both consumers and providers of health care, participate. Together we can make good decisions for our community."

"We know our problems best, and it stands to reason that we should have the main say in what happens where. So I urge everyone to come and to let the HSA know what you think."

The workshop is the first step in the HSA planning process and the first chance individuals will have to participate in the development of better health care for this region.

## Fashion 'n' Fabrics

By FANNIE GLEESON

### DRESSING UP JACKET WITH BINDING

The kimono-style jacket is one of the best designs of all time; proving itself over the centuries in the Orient. McCall's has come out with the unlined jacket and pants illustrated proportioned for children and girls and one for misses; the latter is an unusual size range of six through 24. Sleeves may be cropped as shown or worn long with turned cuffs.

The secret of personalizing simple styling is trim. One of the beauties of making your own binding is a wider band and selection from all types of fabric.

Strips of binding are cut on the bias grain of your fabric. To find the true bias, fold straight crosswise edge over to the selvedge. The diagonal fold marks the bias. Press fold and draw a line on it with a yardstick. Using this as a guide, mark off strips the width needed. Double-fold binding requires a width which is four times the finished width plus one-fourth inch.

Add one-quarter inch at end of each strip for joining seam and cut as many as needed to provide the total length. After cutting strips, join longest strips first with right sides together.

Now the trick. Match short ends on seamline, not along cut edges. If you've matched ends correctly, there will be little triangular "ears" projecting at each side. These are trimmed after sewing.

Join all strips. Then press seams open. Fold strip in half and press. Open the fold and press cut edges toward the center.

Fold again. The narrower side is on top. When applying the binding, the narrower side is unfolded and the cut edge matched to the cut edge on the right side of the garment. Baste and machine-stitch on fold.

Turn binding over the edges and machine-stitch again just beyond the fold line on the right side using a zipper foot. This way, you catch the underfold of the binding. An alternative is to slip-stitch the underfold in place.

To get a neat finish at the end of a bound section, allow binding to extend one inch. After stitching the narrow fold and before turning the binding, fold the end extension to the inside of the binding. Trim the extension to one-fourth inch. Snip the seam allowance diagonally. Turn the trim and after completing stitching, slipstitch the ends.

## CALORIE COUNTDOWN

### TALL COOLERS FOR THIRSTY DIETERS

Certainly dieters can enjoy tall iced drinks that have no calories during the hot summer months. Iced coffee and tea with no sugar, and lemon or skimmed milk added, are refreshing and don't add calories to your daily tally.

Diet sodas or plain soda water served in tall frosty glasses with plenty of ice are also good diet drinks and these can be spruced up by adding lemon slices or fresh mint leaves. Still, if you like variety, there are alternatives.

For a drink that tastes like a chocolate soda, add 2 tablespoons nonfat (skim) milk to a diet chocolate soda. Eight ounces of the soda with 2 tablespoons of milk have less than 25 calories in all.

Orange juice is pretty high in calories (110 per cupful) and a tall glass of it can add up to too many calories. You can make a delicious fruit cocktail that's thick and filling by combining a cup of orange juice with a peeled and diced peach in your blender.

After you've blended juice and fruit, combine them with a cup of sparkling cold soda water and stir in a quarter cup of sliced strawberries. Enjoy the drink with straw and spoon for only about 150 calories in all.

For a fruity milkshake, combine a cup of nonfat skim milk, a half a bana-

na, and a half cup of pineapple juice in your blender with a few ice cubes. It's deliciously filling and practically a meal in itself at just under 200 calories.

A cup of grapefruit juice has 100 calories but if you love its taste, mix it with diet tonic water and add a lemon wedge. A half cup of grapefruit juice mixed with a cup of diet tonic only amounts to about 60 calories.

Commercially prepared lemonade is sky high in calories because there's so much sugar in it. Even if you make it yourself, it's really too high-cal drink for serious dieters. But, fresh raw lemon juice has only 60 calories per cup, and sweetened with liquid sweetener, one cup of lemon juice plus four cups of water makes a lot of low-cal tasty lemonade, about three tall iced glasses of it, at only about 20 calories a glass.

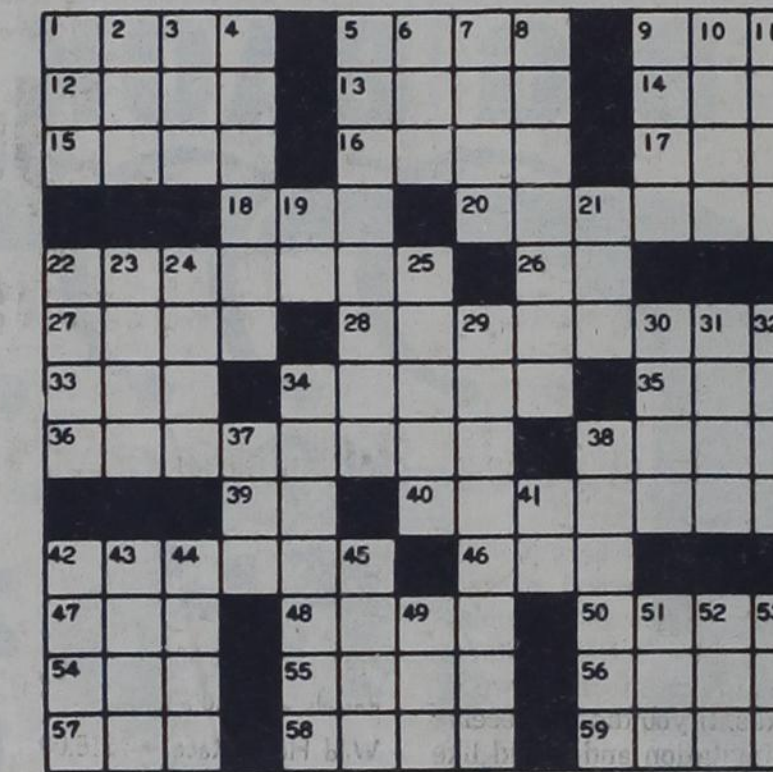
For a sparkling grape cooler, combine a half cup of grapefruit juice (80 calories) with a cup of diet lemon soda (about 5 calories) and pour it over lots of crushed ice.

Fruit juices mixed with diet soda make great drinks at half the calories of the juice and the natural sweetness of the fruit juice can cut the after-taste of saccharin that many find unpleasant about diet sodas. Use your imagination to come up with alternatives to the usual diet coolers.

How can I prevent my skin from drying out from a sunburn? — J.K.

Why don't you rely on the lubricants in most suntan preparations? You will receive the most benefit from them if you reapply them every two hours while you are out in the sun, or whenever the lotion may become worn off or washed off.

I have high blood pressure and I take aldomet twice a day. Do you think I should take the same medicine for the rest of my life? I'm 51 now. — H.A.

What are some general rules to remember if one of my children swallows a bottle of my pills? — Mrs. E.

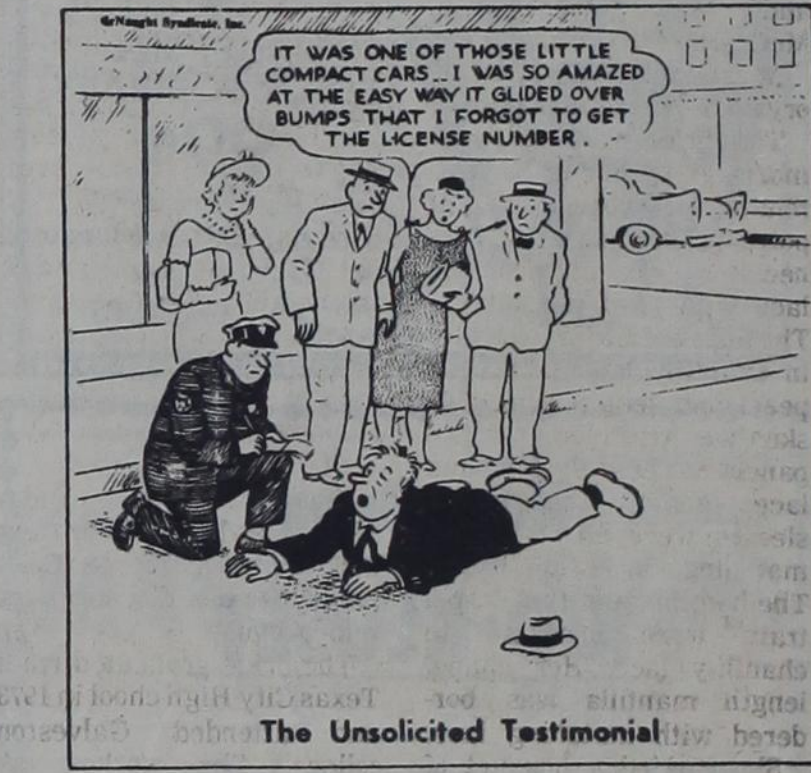

### SPICED JELLIED PEACHES

- 1 can (17 oz.) sliced peaches
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 12 whole cloves
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 1 package (3 oz.) orange or peach flavor gelatin

Drain peaches, measuring syrup. Add water to syrup to make 1-3/4 cups. Dice the peaches. Combine measured liquid, vinegar and spices in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Strain, discarding spices. Dissolve gelatin in hot liquid. Chill until slightly thickened. Stir in peaches and pour into individual molds. Chill until firm, about 3 hours. Unmold. Serve on crisp lettuce, if desired. Makes 2-3/4 cups or 5 or 6 servings.

## The Happy Gardener

### SUMMER CARE

Houseplants still need plenty of moisture throughout the summer. Mist them regularly, at least daily if you are using air conditioning. And, be sure tender plants don't suffer from erratic summer evening drafts that might be too cool for them; keep tropical plants away from open windows.

If you have planted potted plants outdoors in flower borders, be sure you turn them often, once every two or three weeks, to prevent fast rooting in the bed. As soon as indoor growing glorioxias begin to wane, start to dry off the tubers

and store them in their pots until early winter.

Cuttings from rex begonia and African violets should be taken in the summer. Propagate them in a damp rooting medium and keep them in a warm, well-lit spot out of direct sunlight. Plant marigold and nasturtium seeds indoors during the summer. As they mature, plant them in separate pots or window boxes for fall flowers.

Summer is a great season to get children interested in indoor gardening as well as outdoor growing. Growing avocado plants from pits is a good project for youngsters. Show them how to remove the brown covering from the large seeds, dry the pits for two or three days, then support them with toothpicks in a glass of water so that

**SUMPTUOUS SODA** -- Summer and sodas go together. Do try this pineapple treat. Place 2 tablespoons crushed pineapple with syrup in a 12-ounce glass with 2 tablespoons frozen orange concentrate. Add a scoop of vanilla ice cream and stir until blended. Pour in enough chilled gingerale to almost fill the glass and top with another scoop of ice cream.

## C.J.C. Adds Technical Vocational Program

Cisco Junior College has added a new technical-vocational program to its expanding career offerings - one in Building Trades. Vocational Dean Gerald Bint has announced. The new program will begin with the upcoming fall semester.

Dean Bint also announced that Jim Webb, a well-known builder from the Cisco area, will be instructor for the new program.

Bint and Webb described the Building Trades offering as a twelve-month certificate program, and said that in order to receive a certificate students would be required to take the full twelve months of work. However, persons could take only part of the program if they felt they had obtained the skills they desired, but they would not be eligible to receive certification, Mr. Bint said. He also pointed out that the program was not intended to be a part-time course of study, and that students would need to take the full block of courses during a semester. A high school diploma is not required for admission.

The regular state-supported tuition rates at CJC will apply for the Building Trades program Mr. Bint said. He also stipulated that there would be a \$20 per semester lab fee, and students would need to furnish their own hand tools.

Instruct or Webb said, "We expect this to be a really interesting program from start to finish. Much of our work will be on the job construction work, and each year we will construct a residential house from the ground up. We'll also spend some time in the classroom of course but the total course of study should be quite rewarding to those who wish to participate."

Some of the courses in the program will include Building Construction, Materials and Supply, Excavation and Foundation, Basic Blueprint Drafting, Technical Shop Math, Residential Framing, Plumbing and Electricity, Interior and Exterior Finish, Technical Communications, Interior Trim and Cabinetry, Surveying, Architectural Drafting, and Business Law.

Mr. Webb is a graduate of the Cisco Public Schools and Howard Payne College. He has twenty years experience in the building trades field - first as a hobby and later as a full-time business. He is a former member of the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents and is active in civic and church affairs in Cisco. He and his wife, the former Geneva Bint, live on Country Club Ridge near Lake Cisco, and they have two children. ## Football

Thursday, August 25, 1977

Football season is here again.

All over the nation American males are tossing and kicking and running with footballs, all the way from 8 year olds in the backyard to junior and senior high and college teams to the big bruisers of the professional leagues.

Football is a rough contact sport and inevitable will produce its full quota of bumps and bruises, strains and sprains cuts and gashes. Most of these aren't serious and the lads concerned are back in the game shortly.

A thorough medical examination is highly important for boys preparing to go out for football to make certain that there is no physical condition that should be noted before beginning the rigorous training and hard knocks of the game.

Proper physical conditioning hardens the body and increases resistance to fatigue, thus helping prevent injury. A minimum of three weeks of conditioning are recommended prior to the first game of the season. Coaches and team physicians are alert to the fact that many injuries occur when the player is tiring and thus less alert.

Good coaching enables the players to perform better and thus be less prone to injury. Good officiating makes for better games and also helps protect players. Proper equipment and facilities are important to reduce injuries.

Good first aid procedures and medical care, with a physician available during practice drills and on the bench during games are major factors in cutting serious injuries.

Precautions against the extreme heat of early season days also are important. Many coaches now schedule the hot weather workouts in early morning and late afternoon to avoid the heat of the day. The old rule against drinking water during drills and games has long since been proved invalid and dangerous. Water and salt is necessary to replace fluids lost through copious sweating.

If your boy is playing on an organized team, the chances are good that all of these safeguards are observed. If most of his playing is done on a vacant lot in the afternoons and on Saturdays, it becomes the parents responsibility to see that the player has the benefit of the safety principles.

It is no wonder then that so many have consented to die to the world, and even die excruciatingly horrible physical deaths, for the sake of their commitment of Christ. ### Student Earnings

Social security student beneficiaries who are working this summer probably know that earnings affect their checks. But, according to Glyn Hammons, District Manager of the Abilene Social Security Office, they may not know the new earnings limit. For calendar 1977 the limit is \$3,000. This means that if earnings for the year are \$3,000 or less, the student beneficiary is entitled to all of his/her social security payments for the year.

If annual earnings exceed \$3,000 then monthly earnings have to be considered. Generally, if they are fairly consistent, \$1.00 in benefits is withheld for each \$2.00 in earnings over \$3,000. There is an exception to this rule which says that for every month in which earnings do not exceed \$250 a social security check is due regardless of how much total earnings are for the year.

For self-employed students the test is different in that performance of substantial services is taken into account for the month rather than monthly earnings.

Social security considers both the annual and monthly rules when figuring benefits. For this reason it is important for the student beneficiary earning over \$3,000 for the year to know the amount earned each month. Even more important is the student's responsibility to report expected earnings to social security to prevent being overpaid in benefits. Recovery of overpayments is usually accomplished by withholding current checks. This could occur during the following school term when money is needed most.

### City Of Rising Star To Receive \$618.85

Austin-State Comptroller Bob Bullock had some good news for financially pressed Texas cities: city sales tax rebates to date are running a healthy 19 percent ahead.

Rising Star will receive a check totaling \$618.85.

Bullock's announcement came as his office mailed checks Monday totaling \$15.1 million to 868 Texas cities as their August share of the one percent city sales tax.

The August checks bring to \$206 million the total the cities have netted this year from the sales tax. This compares to \$173.1 million for the first eight months of 1976.

Bullock said the increase in city sales tax rebates is really a double blessing. "IT signals the continuing

vigor of the Texas economy and at the same time provides badly needed revenue to Texas cities," the Comptroller said.

Bullock also announced that his office has added two additional WATS lines to accommodate users of his tool-free Tax Information telephone service (1 800 252-5555).

Bullock said taxpayers are making more than 10,000 calls a month on the lines seeking information on Texas taxes and the six existing lines just weren't enough to handle the business.

The Comptroller reminded callers that they can get their questions answered quicker if they call between 8 and 9 a.m., 12 and 1 p.m. and 4 and 5 p.m. when the volume of calls is lowest.
