Before a person gets his or her first job to apply for a social security number. A person should allow 4-6 weeks to get a card.
After a death in the family — to see if survivors' benefits or a lump sum death payment are payable.
When somebody in a family is disabled—to learn if disability benefits are payable.
When a person reaches retirement age-65 for full rate cash benefits or as early as 62 for reduced payments. A person should come in 2 or 3 months before 65 to arrange Medicare protection even though he or she is not retiring.
Whenever a person has a question about social security.
The people at any social security office will be glad to help provide the answer to any question about social security. The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration".
Call your social security office before you make a visit. You may save yourself a trip.
If you are house-bound or hospitalized, you can arrange to have social security representative visit you.

Eastland County has gained site for a proposed 3,100-foot wildcat in the area three miles east of Rising Star.

It is Capital Equity Transfer Corp. of Abilene No. 1-A Irene Landreth, et al, located on a 100-acre lease.
Drillsite is 467 feet from the south and east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 8, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene completed No. 1 Ellie Scott in the Foster (Marble Falls) Field six miles northeast of Rising Star in Eastland County.

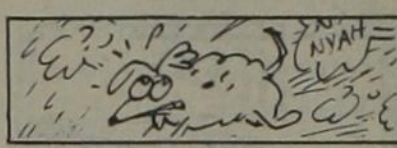
Location is 467 feet from the north and west lines of C.A. Wiggins Survey, A-700.

Daily potential was 83 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus six barrels of water. Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke with 420 pounds casing and 345 pounds tubing pressures.

Don H. Hanvey Oil Interests, Ranger, No. 1 Anna Kinnaird will be drilled in the Dead Horse Creek (Cisco) Field five miles south of Carbon.

FERTILIZER FACTS
(Part 3)

By Wayne Parker
-Phosphorous is essential for plant growth and is needed by plants to complete their normal productive cycle.
-Phosphorous promotes early root formation and growth
-Good seed production depends on adequate amounts of available phosphorous.
-Phosphorous concentration is highest in the seed of mature plants. Phosphorous concentrations of two locally grown crops are: peanuts-the nut contains about 0.6 percent P while the vines average 0.20 percent; wheat-averages 0.42 percent P in the grain and 0.12 percent in the straw.
-Phosphorous enables young plants and roots to develop more rapidly.
-Because of the stronger healthier roots of plants with adequate phosphorous, plants are better able to survive extreme winter conditions.
-Phosphorous increases water use efficiency.
-Phosphorous helps some plants to resist disease.
-Only 20 to 30 percent of the phosphorous from applied fertilizer is used by plants the first year.
-Phosphorous moves very little in most soils, however, it moves more freely in sandy soils than clay soils.
-If only one application of phosphate is made, it should be made early in the plants growing season.

Peanut Contract Price Key Factor

Contracting to shellers for export appears to be the best option for growers of "additional" peanuts, provided the contract price level will result in acceptable net returns to producers. A review of the 1978 crop pool out turns for Spanish and Runner peanuts verifies earlier suspicions that the pool concept may not be well adapted to the broad and varied southwest production area. Preliminary estimates show pool earnings for seg. 1 Runner and Spanish to be at or below \$12 per ton. On the other hand growers who contracted and delivered additional peanuts last fall to shellers for export received 95 percent or more of quota support rate.
Many growers in the Southwest due to drought in 1978 will have undermarketing credit enabling marketing of "additional" peanuts in the quota category in 1979. Growers not having such undermarketing credit would do well to consider contracting their "additional" peanuts to shellers for export. However, peanut grower organizations in the Southwest have concluded that costs of production mandate a price level for contract peanuts of at least 95 percent of the quota support rate.
Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association pointed to three recent developments which indicate that 1979 contract prices for "additional" peanuts in the Southwest are expected to be as good or better than the 1978 level of just over 95 percent of the quota support rate. First, because of 1978 crop quota undermarketing of over 168,000 tons, that amount of 1979 crop "additional" peanuts will be marketed as quota. Such quota marketings will result in a supply of only one half to two thirds as many "additional" peanuts as were marketed in 1979, assuming maximum production of "additional" peanuts. Second, India announced earlier this year her interest to export only about 25,000 of Hand Picked Select peanuts, an amount too small to have any measurable influence on the U.S. peanut export market. Third, peanut shellers in Georgia and Alabama are reportedly making commitments to growers to contract their 1979 crop "additional" peanuts at levels of 96 to 98 percent of the quota support rate.
Proposed 1978 Crop General Regulations were published in the Federal Register on April 27, 1979. Although a 30-day period for public comment is being permitted, it is believed the contracting mechanics are fixed and will probably not be changed. Contract forms are expected to be available at County ASCS offices within a few days. Most area growers are awaiting commitments from shellers that 1979 contract prices will be at least equal to the 1978 prices before making final plans for the production of such peanuts.

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

The pecan nut casebearer is a destructive little insect to our pecans. He is the first of many creatures that competes with us for our pecans. If we can protect our pecans from this insect than later we can worry about protecting them from such things as pecan weevils, blue jays, crows, and squirrels, not to mention hail storms, dry weather and pecan diseases.

In normal years the casebearer adults, which are light gray moths about 1/8 inch long, lay their eggs on tips of small pecans. They do this about May 20-23. In 4 or 5 days the eggs all hatch into small worms that feed on buds below the nuts for a day or two. After this they tunnel into the pecans and frequently destory several or all the small pecans in a cluster.

The best time to spray is when most of the eggs have hatched and before the worms tunnel into the pecans. There are always a few early casebearers and a few late ones. But we want to apply insecticides when we can control 85 or 90 percent of the insects. For that reason we prefer to wait until one or two percent of the pecans have been destoryed before we spray.

The cool weather has confused the casebearer and many of them appear to be late in their development this year. We have guessed that

May 26 through June 1 would be a good time to spray. Since the unusual cool weather is continuing we are inclined to suggest that the latter part of this period would be the ideal time to spray. Since the casebearer development is strung out more than usual you may want to spray twice about seven days apart.

Our good rains in April and May have been good for lawns. Because of the good growing conditions more nutrients are being used by the grass.

A continuous supply of nitrogen through the growing season is the key to maintaining a healthy, dark green lawn.

This calls for applying fertilizer in the early spring at six to eight-week intervals. If "slow release" nitrogen materials are in the fertilizer, use higher application rates to extend the interval between uses.

Each application of fertilizer should apply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen for every 1,000 square feet. The amount of fertilizer needed depends on the analysis shown on the bag. For example, 21-0-0 is ammonium sulfate which contains 21 percent nitrogen (N) and no phosphorus (P) or potassium (K). To get the needed 2 pounds of nitrogen, apply 10 pounds of ammonium sulfate. (10 X

.21=2.1).

Use fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in the spring or spring and fall. The P and K levels in soils build up after such fertilizers. Therefore, only annual maintenance amounts are needed. Lack of nitrogen reduces leaf chlorophyll, resulting in light green or yellow grass. However, other causes of this condition include disease or insect damage, iron chlorosis or acidity.

Iron chlorosis is common on St. Augustine grass growing on alkaline soils.

Information about soil testing and lawn fertilization can be obtained at the County Extension office.

Officers for the May Community Improvement Club this year are Marion McDaniel, president; Earl Epley, 1st vice-president; Eva Ashworth, 2nd vice-president; Rosalie McDaniel, secretary; Effie McGregor, treasurer; and Ludene Michael, reporter.

Tour included the science room, homemaking department, Cundy home, and extended west to Melvin McCleery's, May, southeast to Earl Epley's, east to Windle Glenn's, north to Marion West's, south to Tommy Petross's, and back to the community center. The Texas Community Improvement Program, sponsored by the Extension Service, Texas A&M, and the electric utility companies operating in Texas, strives to achieve more net agricultural income, better homes, economic opportunities, greater cities, and responsible citizenship. Its motto is "working to make TEXAS even better." Cash awards total \$6,400.

Purpose of the program has been to stimulate individual, family, and community effort toward community improvement. The objectives are to make rural life more profitable and stable as well as more desirable and satisfying.

Rural communities under 1,000 population may enter the program. Deadline is January 1. Contest year runs from April 1 to March 31. Communities may enter

through their extension offices. Scoring is based on achievement during the program year. Score sheets are furnished communities entering and determined on achievement of set goals. Long-range programs are set up by program building committees in each county and can assist. Record book with pictures of achievements before and after, community history, and summary of committee reports is required. Record books are required to be in extension offices before March 24 and in State office on or before June 1.

May had four new homes completed last year and 33 remodeled. Its rural rental housing project (12 units) was funded. Community center got inside improvements and a new sheet metal roof. May school received major improvements. Nutrition for senior citizens and the van were other improvements.

Goals set to be achieved include carpeting the foyer of the center, getting a park grant, and holding a centennial celebration November 30, 1981, the date of the first post office in May. The May Messenger, the original newspaper, will be republished to some extent as part of the grant for the centennial celebration.
