

### Cattle Owners Must Waive Claims Against U.S.D.A.

regulations will require cattle owners to waive all claims against the federal government when their cattle are treated for scabies, reports the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) explained that cattle infested with or exposed to scabies mites are routinely treated with a USDA permitted pesticide dip. This must be done under APHIS supervision or control, before the animals can be certified for interstate shipment.

Occasionally, when losses result from such treatments

A change in federal cattle owners have filed damage claims against the government.

> The new regulation conforms to a similar waiver provision covering cattle treated for fever ticks - - a provision that has long been in effect, APHIS officials said.

> The change announced covering scabies treatments was first proposed in the Oct. 22, 1975, Federal Register. The public was allowed 32 days to comment on the proposal, resulting in only one adverse comment. Thus, the new waiver rule will become effective on January 28. A complete text of the change will be published in the January 28 Federal Register.

Ronald Bailey of Eastland, Soil Conservation Service director here, has been named acting project coordinator for the Leon - Bosque Resource, Conservation and Development Project, it was announced at the five - county organization's fifth annual meeting Wednesday evening at Proctor Area Recreation Center.

Mr. Bailey will replace Charles Haenisch who has been promoted and named Area Conservationist and relocated at Alice. Mr. Bailey will continue to live in Eastland and serve until about March 1, when Nat Conner will assume duties as project coordinator for the project.

A good number of Eastland Countians attended the annual meeting and elected officers and directors during a business meeting, and were brought up to date on district progress by Haenisch.

Eastland County projects detailed included the nine sections under study for road erosion work; recreational planning for the Eastland County Water Supply District at Lake Leon; erosion and beautification work at Eastland High School Hill where work could begin this summer; the new municipal swimming pool at Cisco; renovation of the Cisco Hospital landscaping; and a master plan for Eastland's City Park.

County agency personnel present were Elmer Foster, FHA; and Gilbert Meredith, ASCS.

John Lee of Rising Star was elected to the Eastland County Board of Directors. About 165 persons attended

the annual meeting. The organization, which coordinates human and resource development for 80,000 people on three million acres in Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Somervell counties, has been in operation

since 1965. Haenisch reviewed the 1975 activities of the organization with a slide presentation.

He described the recreational development in Meridian State Park in Bosque County, where 128 acres of habitat improvement is underway for the Golden Cheeked Warbler, a rare and endangered bird

species. The Leon - Bosque RC&D is working on the project with the help of the Texas Parks and

In recent years, the number of new translations and versions of the Scriptures has risen sharply. For over three hundred years, the old reliable King James Version of 1611 stood virtually alone. With new and rich discoveries of manuscript materials, many of which pushed textual studies to the fourth century and beyond, the need grew for a revision of the "Authorized Version". Too, many English terms had changed their meaning since 1611, so this aspect made the matter even more urgent. Perhaps the most accurate of all recent English versions of the Scriptures has been the English Revised Version (1881 and 1885,) and the kindred American Version of 1901. A more recent edition of the latter, called the Revised Standard Version, incorporates new manuscript discoveries and renders the text in modern English. It is highly faithful to the original Hebrew and Greek

A more recent effort even has produced what is called the New International Version, but only the New Testament is completed. The Old Testament is scheduled for printing in the next few years. It, too, is quite accurate and readable.

texts, based upon the most

reliable manuscript evidence.

Great caution should be exercised with regard to many of the current "translations", especially the Living Bible. The latter is a paraphrase, not a translation and embodies many of the personal opinions of Kenneth Taylor, the author. In many places, it is outright erroneous; in others, it is cheap and vulgar of expression.

All who sincerely desire to know God's will and read it in modern English would do well to choose a version, such as the American Standard Version, the Revised Standard Version, or the New International Version, all of which are much more literal, and hence accurate, translations.




This not the time to put Di-Syston under pecan trees. Several people have told us they have heard it is time to apply the Di-Syston for honey-dew aphid control.

All recommendations of the Extension Service and the manufacturer's label state that Di-Syston should be applied in May or early June. Some pecan growers apply the chemical in April. If it were applied now the effects would be gone by July and August when the honey

When using Di-Syston be sure to read and follow label directions.



Improper pruning of trees can be just as bad or worse than not pruning them at all. On the other hand, proper pruning can turn a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen.

There are 10 pointers to consider as far as the pruning operation is concerned:

1. Do not top trees. Topped trees often die because the topped branches cannot heal, thus letting in decay fungi and bacteria. Also, side branches below topped stubs are usually weaker and are subject to wind

2. Prune at the right season. Prune deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground cofers and evergreens during the winter. However, an exception is that spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias should be pruned after flower-

Make all cuts flush with the trunk. Stubs don't heal properly and the decay and deterioration spreads down the trunk of the tree until wind

5. Seal big cuts with pruning paint. Use pruning paint on cuts larger than one inch in diameter to ward off insects and

6. Repair damaged plants at once. Plants should be kept healthy year-round; this means pruning damaged twigs or branches.

7. Use common sense when pruning. Watch for limbs that may fall over power lines or damage other property.

8. Always prune after transplanting. Pruning is especially important for balledand-burlapped plants; this compensates for roots lost

during digging. 9. Beware of the door-to-door pruner. If you can't handle the pruning job yourself, hire someone with an established operation and years of reputa-





CURL UP WITH A COOKIE

Winter is extra-cozy when the cookie jar is full of old fashioned Pecan Curls. Their attractive laciness and "snowy" edges are perfectly suited when everyone gathers inside. Quick or old fashioned oats and pecans add a pleasant chewiness, so charming with the butterscotch flavor.

To "curl" the baked cookies, turn them upside down on a rolling pin or on several straight-sided glasses. Either type of surface should be wrapped with paper towels or napkins so cookies won't fall off, Remove Pecan Curls when cool and store tightly. So good when you're "curled up" by the fire!

PECAN CURLS

1/2 cup sifted all-purpose

1/4 teaspoon soda

1 cup firmly packed brown

34 cup butter or margarine,

1 teaspoon vanilla 3/4 cup finely chopped pecans 34 cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)

2 tablespoons confectioners sugar

Heat oven to moderate (350°F.). Sift together flour and soda into bowl. Add brown sugar, butter, eggs and vanilla. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Blend in pecans and oats. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto well-greased cookie sheets, allowing about 3 inches

Bake in preheated oven (350°F.) 8 to 10 minutes or until cookies are brown around edges. Cool about 1 minute, then carefully remove cookies from cookie sheets with wide spatula. Turn upside down over rolling pin or several straight-sided glasses which have been wrapped in paper towels or napkins.

Allow to cool completely before removing from rolling pin. Sift confectioners sugar into a small flat bowl. To "frost" carefully

dip edge of each cooled cookie into sugar.

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
