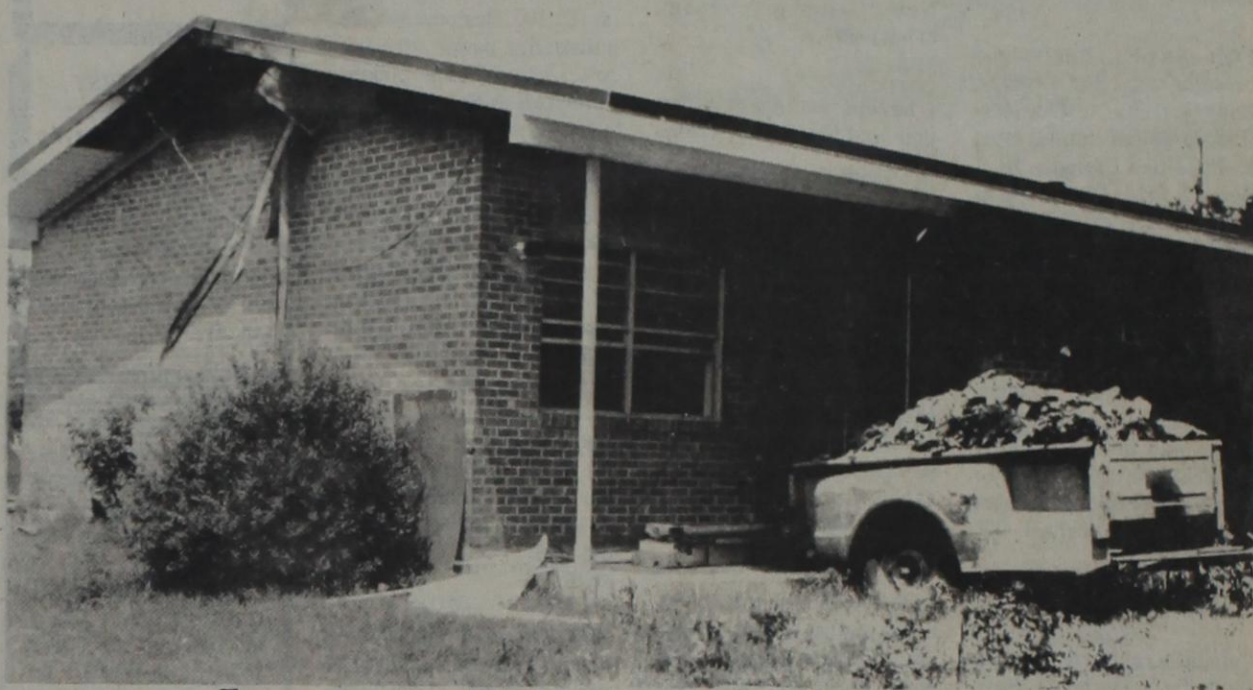

Fire Damages Apartment In Housing Project

Smoke coming from the attic of a newly modernized apartment in the housing project was discovered about 7 a.m. Sunday morning by J.N. Childers. There was extensive fire, smoke and water damage to the ceiling, trusses and roof of apartment 207D on E. Gibson St. Damages were estimated to be \$12,000 to \$15,000. The adjoining apartment in the duplex was not reported to be damaged.

The fire was extinguished within about five minutes of the arrival of the first fire truck on the scene,

the rural booster truck. Also responding to the fire were the city fire truck and the ambulance. Among the volunteer firemen responding to the alarm were Douglas Owen, Willie Vandivere, Truett Horton, Lowell and James Bishop and Bones O'Connor.

The telephone number to call to report a fire is 643-3001. The number is listed on the inside cover of the telephone directory and will ring simultaneously in the homes of several volunteer firemen.

The remodeling

work on the damaged apartment had been completed Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and the apartment would have been ready for occupancy on Monday, said Norman Claborn, executive director of the Rising Star Housing Authority.

Modernization and remodeling on the original 12 apartments in the project was begun several months ago. The remodeling project has turned the 12 apartments into 14 and includes putting down new flooring and adding insulation. Modernization includes the installation

of bathtub/shower faucets which prevent a person from being accidentally scalded and adding alarm systems with switches located in the bathroom and a bedroom of each apartment. The newly modernized apartments comply with federal government specifications for housing senior citizens, said Claborn.

The cause of the fire has not been pinpointed, but the fire had apparently smoldered for several hours before Childers spotted the smoke early Sunday.

WTU Files For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its electric rates for retail customers.

Local Manager Travis Williams said the application, filed Friday, is a system-wide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in

all incorporated towns and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas at Austin for an increase in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

So far, a total of 19 municipalities served by WTU have opted to let the PUC analyze rate requests and to make decisions for them. These are Albany, Chillicothe, Dickens, Eldorado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertzon, Moran, Paint Rock, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule, Trent, and Weinert. WTU has filed complete information about the rate request with each of

these towns.

The principal reasons cited for the new rate proposal is that the present rates are not adequate to support the investment WTU has made in necessary new facilities since the last rate increase, Williams said.

WTU's current construction program, the core of which is the coal-fired power plant at Oklaunion, is the biggest and most expensive in the Company's history. By the time the proposed rates become effective, WTU will have invested more than \$84.4 million in new

facilities and must spend considerably more in the years ahead to satisfy the growing demand for electricity in West Texas.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$26.6 million. This amounts to 11.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are included in the proposal. For residential customers, the average electric bill, including fuel costs, would go up by about 13.2 per cent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

The Significance
Of This Symbol

Centuries ago, while North America was a vast wilderness, the eagle was esteemed in many parts of the world as a symbol of power, courage and freedom. Rulers displayed this bird as an emblem of authority and unity.

In tribute to the judgment of the Founding Fathers, a variation of this eagle figure was adopted by the American Historic and Cultural Society as the insignia of its continuing program to Honor America.

The characteristic emblem, containing the nation's colors, is an eagle in red and white profiled against a bell-shaped blue background dotted with 13 white stars representing the original American colonies, and all encircled in a ring of 50 gold stars.

Cisco Company Posts

Production Figures

S&W Petroleum Co. of Cisco has posted initial production figures for the No. 2 McCormick, new oil well in the Eastland Regular Field, nine miles north of Rising Star.
The well indicated potential for 5 barrels of oil per day on a 10/64 choke. Tubing pressure was 150 PSI. With drillsite in a 68-acre lease in Eastland County's Mary Ann Clark Survey, No. 29, the well had total drilling depth of 2,689 feet. It entered the pay horizon at 2,644 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 2,648 to 2,654 feet into the wellbore.

Pyron Drilling of Graham has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Douglas, a 1,950-ft. developmental try in the Stephens Regular Field. Location is in a 90-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey, about 12 miles southeast of Breckenridge.

Flowing gas at the rate of 1,349,000 CF per day on a 1.5-in. choke, the No. 1 Lauderdale has been completed as a Stephens County wildcat success 15 miles southeast of Breckenridge.

Killion Well Service Inc. of Breckenridge is the operator. The well was drilled to total depth of 4,032 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,898 to 3,906

feet into the hole.
The operation is in an 84-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

M.O. Rife, Jr. of Ft. Worth has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the O'Laughlin Field. The No. 27 M.H. McMurrey showed potential to flow 1,282,000 CF gas per day on a three-quarter-inch choke. It was rated at 1,320,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The operator has 1,780 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's S.F. Harding Survey, four miles west of Grafrod.

The well will produce from an interval 2,852 to 2,906 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,430 feet, with plug-back to 3,099 feet.

The same operator has also filed first production figures on a new oil well in the West O'Laughlin Field nine miles west of Grafrod.

The well showed potential to pump 15 barrels of oil per day on open choke. Bottomed at 4,280 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,182 to 4,187 feet into the hole.

The operator has 2,030 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's A.S. Simmons Survey.

The well will be known as the No. 32 Maurine L. O'Laughlin.

Gas Rate Approved For Unincorporated Areas

AUSTIN--The Railroad Commission has approved new gas rates for customers of Canyon Gas Co. in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County.

The new rates will increase an average monthly bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas from \$17.05 to \$23.96. Approximately 68 customers will be affected by the change.

A Commission evaluation of the previous rates revealed that Canyon Gas was experiencing a negative cash flow.

The new rates are \$7 for the first Mcf and \$4.24 per Mcf for any additional amounts. A purchased gas

adjustment clause was also established so that Canyon Gas can recover costs for gas above a base cost of \$2.125 per Mcf. A new charge of \$20 for reconnects was also approved. The company will collect \$228 in rate case expenses with a 10 cents per Mcf surcharge.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of the state.

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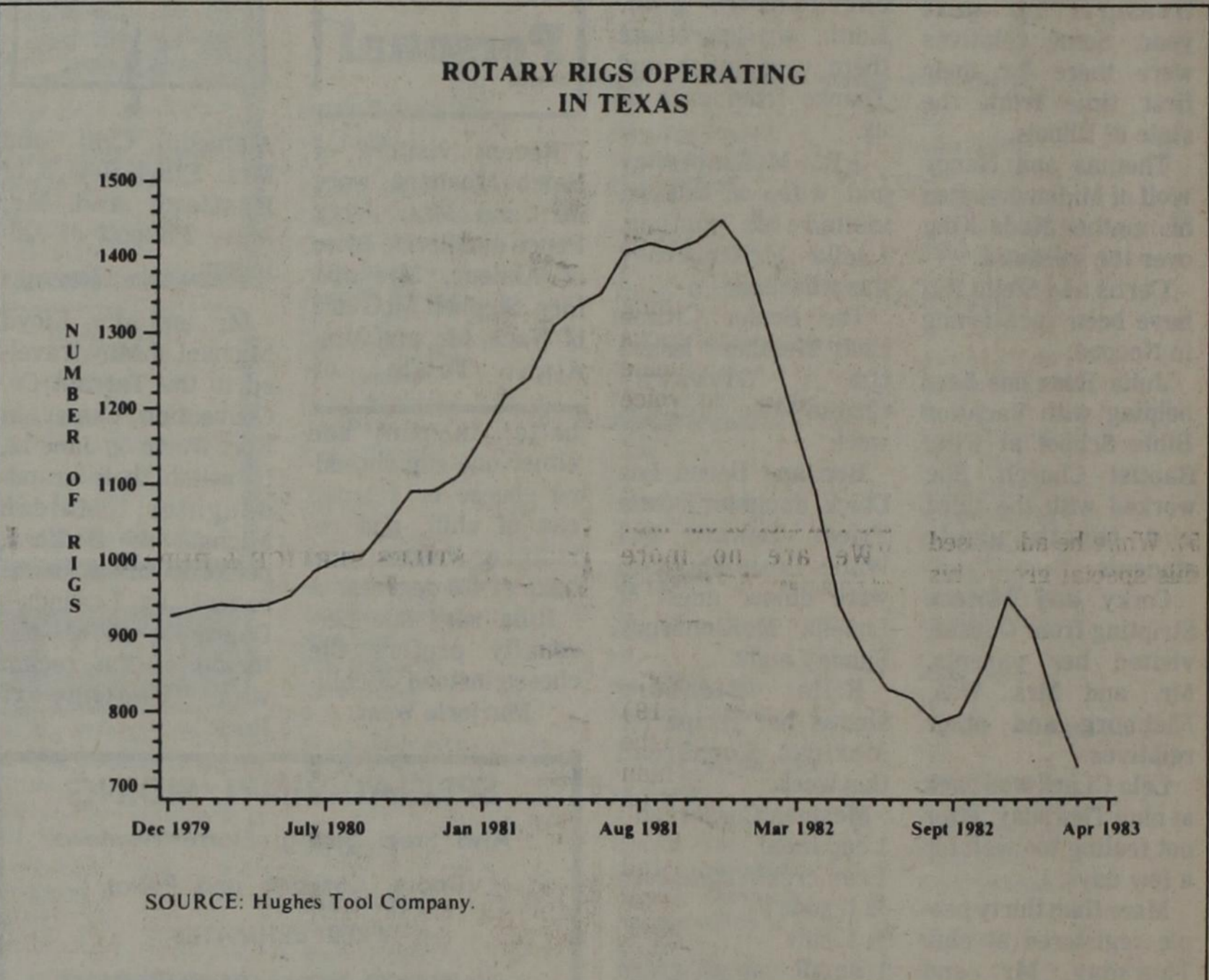

New Gas Rate For Unincorporated Areas

AUSTIN, Texas, June 7—The Railroad Commission has approved new gas rates for customers of Canyon Gas Co. in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County.

The new rates will increase an average monthly bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas from \$17.05 to \$23.96. Approximately 68 customers will be affected by the change.

A Commission evaluation of the previous rates revealed that Canyon Gas was experiencing a negative cash flow.

The new rates are \$7 for the first Mcf and \$4.24 per Mcf for any additional amounts. A purchased gas adjustment clause was also established so that Canyon Gas can recover costs for gas above a base cost of \$2.125 per Mcf. A new charge of \$20 for reconnects was also approved. The company will collect \$228 in rate case expenses with a 10 cents per Mcf surcharge.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of the state.
